Measles, Rubella Rebound Immunization Urged

Paul Turner, Senior Public
Health Adviso Health Advisor in the
Immunizations Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources, said that measles and rubella have
rebounded dramatically this year. For example, he said, last year there were only 105 cases of measles during the
first three months of the first three months of the
year; this year in period of time, there were 896 cases, or nearly a nine-
fold increase Similarly fold increase. Similarly, rubella this year compared to 81 cases for the same time period last year.
According to Tu
According to Turner, there
has been no has, been no change in the
disease itself to account for the resurgence. "Health
scientists feel that the
problem is not one that problem is not one that
involves a change in the measles,", Turner said.
