




















## Post Office Seeks Additional Worker

Registration for the Beef Referendum began June 6 in more than 2,000 county ASCS offices across the U.S. Cattle producers have until Friday, June 17, to register for the Referendum. Actual voting will be July 5-15 at the ASCS offices.

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
