Thunder Junction Buys Water Slides

Three water slides for Thunder Junction have been purchased from an existing Water Park in Covington, RI and plans are to bring those to the Thunder Junction site.

Ralph Hatfield of Chicago Continental, Inc. recently inspected the slides and made the purchase agreement on behalf of Thunder Junction. "The slides are in excellent condition," said Hatfield. The fiberglass is clean, and the tower and stairs are well engineered and constructed in a very professional manner.

The three slide complex will feature a center straight slide for speed and two outer triple twist slides will thrill riders before hitting the water.

In addition to the water slides, six go-carts have been purchased in Arlington. The go-carts have fiberglass bodies and a 5 HP engine.

Bids are currently being taken on construction of the slides, the pool, the go-cart track and the Administrative building. The Administrative building will also have a video arcade and games. The pool area for the slides will be 40' by 43' giving a total water area of 1720 square feet.

Cancer Community Crusade Emphasized

"Look for the American Cancer Society Sword when you give to cancer control," says Camille Day Nies, American Cancer Society District 29 Senior Field Representative, "If you don't see the Sword, it's not us!"

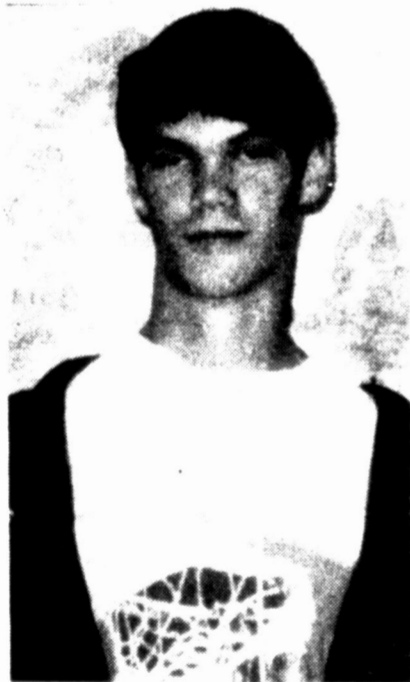


LEE CASKEY AND CENET RHODE made a great team as Donley County Senior Citizens Fundraiser Chairman and Salesperson! See story on p. 2.

From Dunkirk To Clarendon

French foreign exchange student Stephane LeJan knew he finally had become "Americanized" when he began dreaming in English instead of French.

The Clarendon High School senior points casually to the daily scribbles in his journal that his mother made him promise to keep before he left his homeland. As the months pass, the writings gradually move from his native language to the English he has learned in the states.

That is not to say that his English is perfect. Conversations with the leggy LeJan sometimes move at a slow pace as he carefully ponders the use of the English language to express himself. Lone gone are the days, however, when LeJan and his host family, the Phil Barefield family, constantly referred to an English/French dictionary.

LeJan's journey across the Atlantic to the Panhandle town of Clarendon began more than a year ago when he received a brochure in the mail offering him a chance to live abroad for a year. He did not believe his parents would allow him to leave home for a year, but he convinced them that he needed a strong base in English to find a good job.

"I told them I wanted to go anywhere, especially Texas," LeJan said. "Everyone dreams of going to the United States. It's a big country." The American International Student exchange Program tried to place LeJan in the Texas Panhandle without success, Lynette Barefield said.

"I knew Stefane had worked for a year to get approved in the United States and I figured if Mark (Barefield) had done that much work and couldn't find anyone to sponsor him that would be a great disappointment," Mrs. Barefield said.

Big Changes Coming in CRP

"The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), under which producers retired from production over 36.4 million acres of cropland under 10 to 15 year contracts, has three significant changes in it this year," said Drew Thornberry, CED.

Producers with CRP contracts expiring September 30, 1995 can extend the maturity dates for one year for part or all of the land. No new land can be added. Rental rates remain unchanged and crop insurance requirements will not apply to one year extensions.

CRP participants have a one-time chance to withdraw part or all of their land from the program. Not all CRP acreage is eligible for removal. CRP acreage with cover such as filterstrips, waterways, strips along riparian areas, windbreaks, shelter belts, shallow water wildlife areas, certain timber establishments or wetlands and acreage subject to wildlife easements will be required to remain in CRP. Acreage released from CRP is not eligible for subsequent CRP enrollment.

Sign-up for one year extensions and early releases form contracts will be May 15 through June 2.

Concerning the third change Thornberry said that there will be modified program requirements covering CRP land preparation for fall seeding for producers whose contracts expire this year and who wish to plant CRP acres this fall. Under current requirements, CRP cover may be destroyed without penalty during the last 90 days of the contract, but not earlier than July 1, to prepare a seed bed for fall-planted crops only. In summer fallow and certain other arid areas, producers may apply for an earlier date than July 1 to conserve moisture. A grazing plan or conservation plan is needed for early release.

The only reason a producer may apply for the earlier date is for the preparation of a seedbed for fall planting. In some areas, maintaining crop cover till July could effectively prevent the planting of a fall crop.

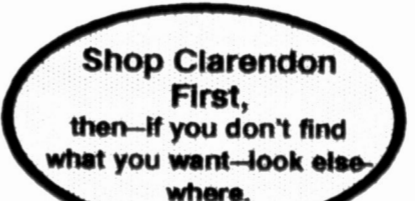
"Producers wishing to begin land preparation before July 1 must obtain approval from the county committee, and the CRP rental payment will be reduced," said Thornberry.

The 1994 Clarendon Bronco football team once again had a successful season. To those outside of the organization, last season may not have seemed to be much of a success. The Broncos, however, see last season as a time of great challenges, trials, and a rebirth of bronco football.

A brand new staff of coaches, led by head coach, Kent Allison, showed the way for the mighty

Clarendon struggled against Groom and Paducah, where Senior Justin Griffin drained five of six three-pointers to squeak past the Dragons, and then cruised past Lockney 86-59. The Broncos captured third place in the canyon Rotary Tournament and posted a win against Fort Elliott after driving more than an hour over snow-covered roads.

The thriller of the year was a triple-overtime win over Shamrock in Fighting Irish country. Sophomore Dean Stanzione was moved up from junior varsity and was a mainstay during an intense and tiring game. Sophomore, Roy Williams, moved the game into its second overtime when Moore missed the second shot of a one-and-one on purpose and Williams jumped out behind the three-point line before drawing nothing by net. The tough pre-season schedule prepared the Broncos for a tough district schedule as they fought and clawed their way to a District 2AA co-championship with Panhandle. "I told my players after the season that I was more proud of the gold ball for winning District 2AA than anything else we had accomplished this season," Avery said. "I've been coaching boys basketball a long time, and I've never been in a district this tough."

"The boys played hard every night, and I was very proud of them. The seniors (McCampbell, Jeremy Hicks, Michael McKinney, Fields, and Griffin) provided excellent team leadership. They held this team together."

Clarendon cruises to a 77-49 Bi-District win over West Texas High in Amarillo. Fields had a phenomenal 10 assists, and Moore had 22 points. Freshman Clemmie Smith had 14 points, 9 rebounds, and one blocked shot. The crowd came to its feet when Freshman Brent Gaines, in a late-game substitution, scored two points.

Gaines was moved up from junior varsity late in the season, as was Robert Taylor, and Mark Barfield. Drew Jeffers advanced to the varsity level in mid-season.

Post-season honors rolled in for the Broncos. McCampbell was named District 2AA Most Valuable Player, and Fields and Moore were named to the elite District 2AA squad. Smith, Griffin, and Williams were awarded Honorable Mentions.

Fields was invited to the Golden Spread All-Star game in Amarillo and was named to the second team of the All-Region team. Smith was named Freshman of the Year by the Amarillo Globe-News.

But McCampbell continues to reap the rewards of a sensational senior season. He was invited to the Golden Spread All-Star game but had to turn down the invitation because he had accepted invitations to play in three other all-star games. He first participated in the Fast Break Tournament in Austin, and then started in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches game May 6 in San Antonio. The 6'5" senior will cap off the year with a game in the prestigious McDonald's Texas Association of High School Coaches game in Fort Worth this summer.

In addition, he was named to the Amarillo Globe-News First Team; Region I First Team; and the TABC State Second-team squad. The Amarillo Rotary Club named him as their February Athlete of the Month and Lone Star Basketball Magazine selected him as the best 2A Player in the State.
