Five volunteers attend firefighting school

Five members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Dept. attended the 48th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M University, College Station, July 24 through 29. Jerry Hawkins, Clyde Price, Pat Robertson, Jimmy Floyd and Bob Berry participated in the six-day training event which included classroom instruction and actual fire fighting practices. Jimmy Floyd, Bob Berry and Pat Robertson were in the Firefighting I group which dealt with structure

fires, extinguishers, sprinkler systems, hose and nozzle handling, apartment fires and commercial and retail complex fires.

Price took Fire Prevention III which covered inspection practices, basic insurance rating, fire and explosion investigation and fire prevention problems. Price is Clarendon's fire marshal.

Hawkins took Firefighting III which covered hazardous chemical fires, placement of firefighting equipment, and firefighting tactics.

Clarendon Future Farmer of America Farris Hightower recently returned from the FFA convention in Fort Worth with a \$4,000 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scholarship.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is currently sponsoring 160 Texas students in college. Hightower is one of 25 Texas youths who are recent winners of the award. The winners are determined according to need and leadership in FFA as well as by their scores on the SAT and the ACT.

"I'm going to Clarendon College for one year and then transfer to Tech," Hightower said. "I'll major in agri-

cultural engineering. It covers a wide area. I'll have to decide what I want to specialize in."

Accompanying Hightower to Fort Worth were Paul Hermesmyer, Jay Lindley and Clarendon High School Agriculture Instructor Bob Berry.

Three local youths were also awarded the Lone Star Farmer degree at the convention. Farris Hightower and Paul Hermesmyer received their certificates in Fort Worth; Dennis Swinney, who was unable to attend the convention, received his in absentia. The youths received this award

based on their project programs and leadership in FFA. Only three per cent of the FFA membership receives the Lone Star Farmer degree.

Bob Berry said that Area I, which includes Donley County, was also honored to have one of its members, Elvin Carraway of Spur, selected as state president. "It's an honor," said Berry, "because our sparsely populated area only has 70 voting delegates, while other areas, such as Area V, have 200. So, Carraway was voted in on the basis of his abilities and not by the number of votes we could command."

profession and to help us make a case stick when we arrest a man with enough political pull to drive prosecuting attorneys out of court."

Behrens said that the best speaker had been W.J. Estelle, Jr., Director of Texas Department of Corrections, who talked about discipline problems on prison farms. "He told it like it is,"

Behrens said. "We gave him a standing ovation."

Another speaker who Behrens said "told it like it is" was Dallas Police Chief Donald A. Byrd. "He said that Federal District Court Judge Sarah T. Hughes could not be blamed for her

present 'extreme' approach, since for more than five years she had been trying unsuccessfully more moderate means to persuade the county commissioners to do something about the Dallas County jail."

Behrens said that the speaker who bored him the most was a man with a PhD who gave the sheriffs a statistical profile of themselves.

"There were 100 new

speakers taught approximately 2,000 volunteer and paid firemen representing 800 cities and 25 states. Also attending the school were firefighters from other countries and provinces.

"There was a fellow in my

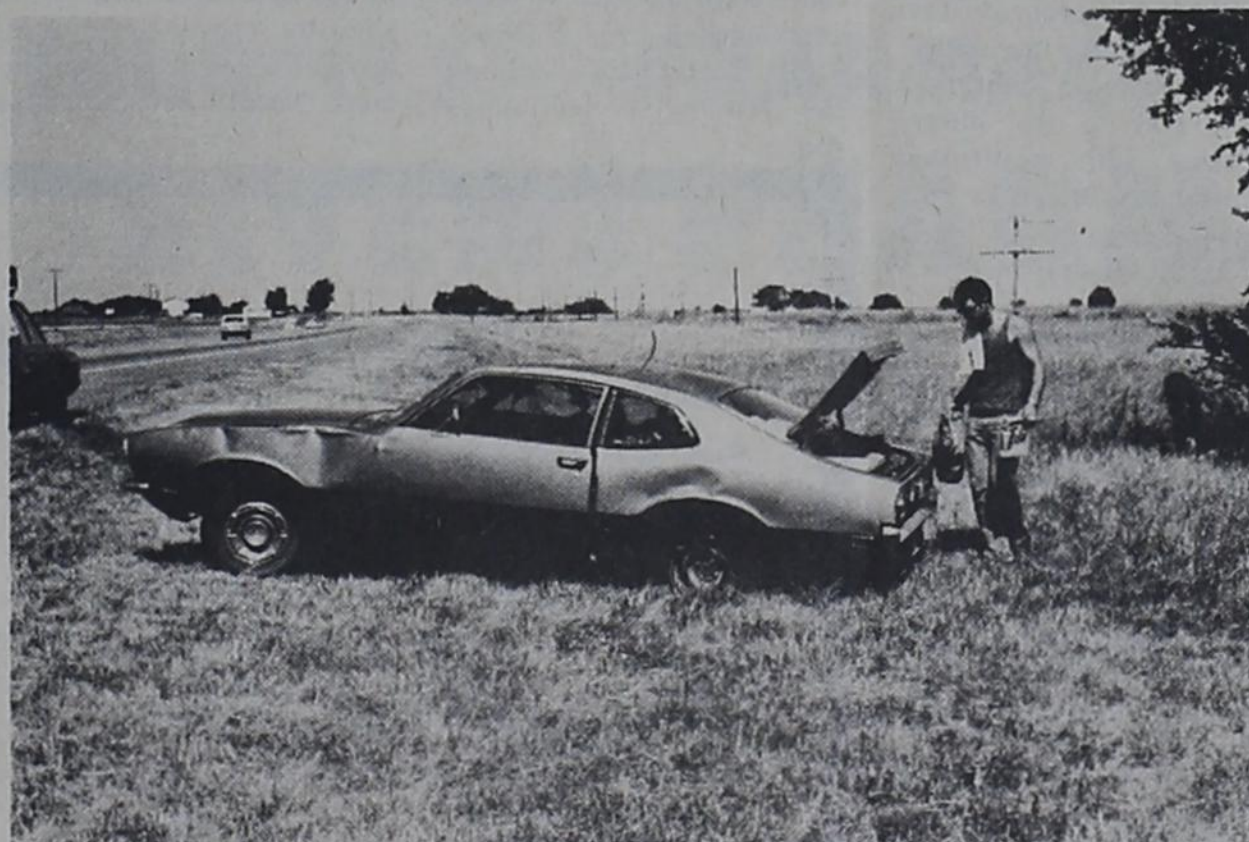
class from Canada," said Hawkins. "He told me that in Canada they pour water into their boots and gloves in order to prevent frostbite when they go out to fight a winter fire."

A Midwestern U. student was fortunate that neither he nor his fiancée was seriously hurt when his car went out of control after a blowout and rolled across Hwy. 287 Friday. Four others in a similar accident on Saturday were not so fortunate.

4 injured in 1 of 2 similar accidents

Tire blowouts, possibly due to the hot pavement, caused two auto accidents on Hwy. 287 this weekend.

Just before noon Friday a 1973 Ford Falcon driven by a young Wichita Falls woman went out of control on 287 in Martin, careened into the bar ditch and rolled over to the opposite side of the highway before coming to a halt.

The woman said she didn't know what caused her to lose control of the car, but it appeared that the left rear tire had blown.

Eight passing CBers offered assistance and called for an ambulance. However, the woman had suffered only

some scratches. Her fiancé, an ROTC student at Midwestern, was asleep on the passenger side of the car when the accident happened; and he, too, was not hurt. The ambulance returned to Clarendon without them.

In the second accident, which occurred about 11:30 Saturday morning four miles east of Lanes Lake and was also caused by a tire blowout, all four persons in a 1977 Chevette were injured.

As with the first accident, the car went out of control, rolled over in the bar ditch and ended up on the opposite side of the highway.

All four occupants, three from Amarillo and one from Wichita Falls, were thrown out of the car. State Highway Patrolman Burch said it appeared that the car may have run over the head of one of the four.

The injured were taken to Hall County Hospital in Memphis, and two of them were then transferred to a hospital in Amarillo, Burch said.

Burch said it was possible that the heat of the highway could have caused blowouts in both accidents. "The tires (on the Chevette) were not that worn," he said.

Old courthouse, a set for horror movies

I think the old courthouse would make a superb set for an old-fashioned horror movie -- if we could ever find anyone of Bela Lugosi's caliber to star in it. This notion came to me the other night as I walked from my rooms over Bains' Fountain Shop to the newspaper office.

It was the night of the full moon, and the enlarged orb hung low and bright on the southwest side of the courthouse. The courthouse itself was mostly hidden in the blue-black shadows forced upon it by the large American elms and evergreens. A very loud and ominous-sounding owl was doing his best to ward timid souls like mine away from his domain.

Imagine that! I thought. A haunted courthouse right in the center of a prospering little town!

Pettigrew Hamilton told me that this particular owl -- a husky 2-ft. tall Great Horned -- ordinarily roosts atop the Methodist Church with occasional jaunts to the vicinity of Chamberlain

Motors. "He's been photographed before," said Pettigrew, "but if he sees you he won't look at you. He's a very disdainful owl."

The Great Horned Owl of Donley County Courthouse is not, however, the only piece of romantic background for our movie set. Bats, too, cavort in the courthouse. I discovered this fact the first time I went into the place. As I was climbing the worn stairs up to the courtroom to take pictures of the 4-H'ers working on their recordbooks I almost stepped on the decomposing corpse of one of those eerie mammals.

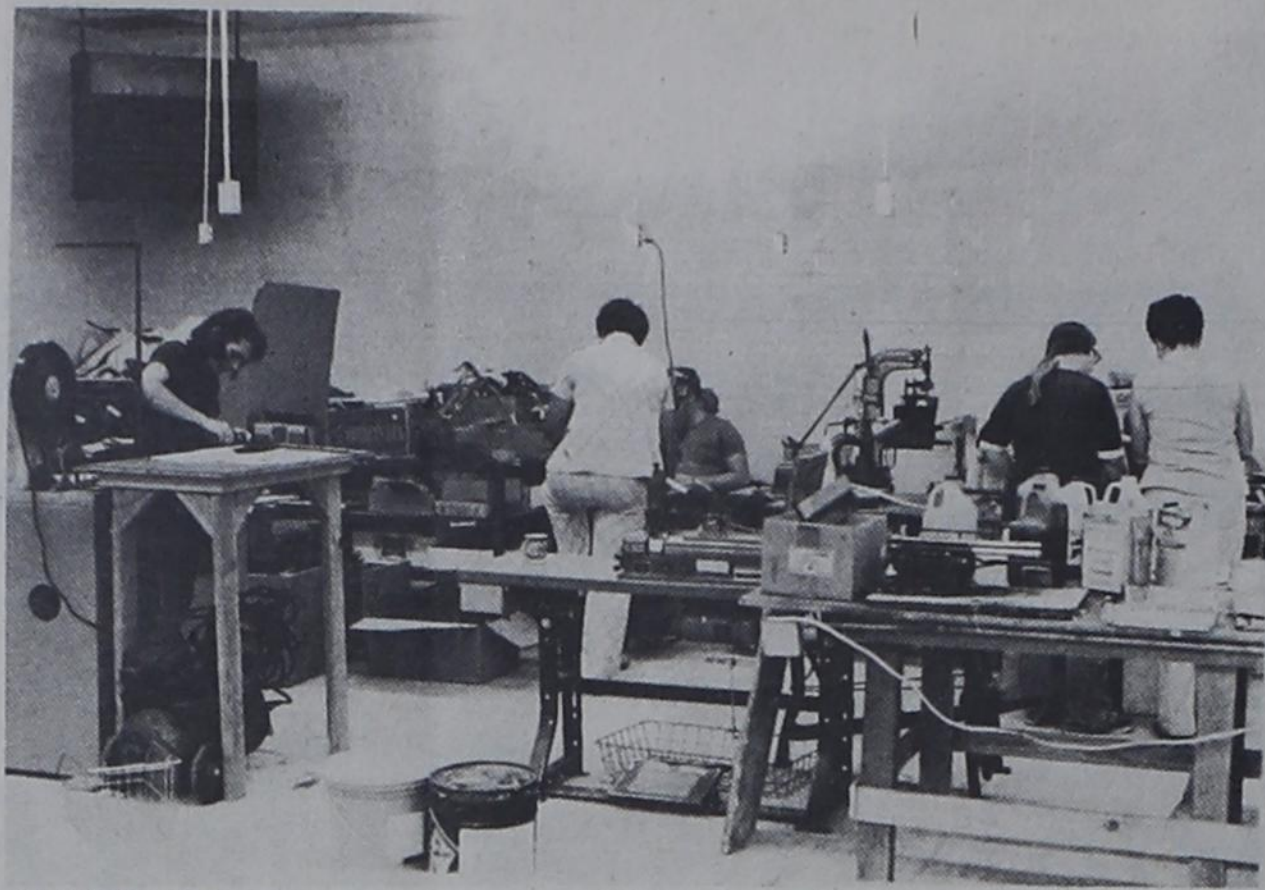
Besides the moon, the owl and the bats, there are all the cobwebs and the spooky little nooks and the peeling paint...and County Superintendent Jerry Hawkins' chair.

You should see Jerry's high-backed, black leather chair if you haven't already. "It took me a long time to get up enough nerve to sit in it," Jerry told me the first time I saw the chair. The curious thing is that the chair is not

spooky because it is old but because it is new, or at least newer than almost anything else in the old courthouse. And, I suppose, its high, straight back gives one the immediate impression, however quickly sublimated, that the purpose of the thing is not for comfort but for torture. One might just naturally suppose that a trap door exists hidden just there in the floor, and down beneath it is some ghastly device of Fu Manchu's.

It's hard to find Jerry in his office. I don't blame him. I hate to go into that place, too. But Jerry's secretary, Ellen Bryan, seems quite cheerfully at ease there, despite the fact that she has to face that great black chair all day. She thinks the old building would still be of useful service if it were to be remodeled inside.

Mrs. Bryan is probably right in her assessment, but, still, I would like to see some good old-fashioned horror flicks made in the great stone monstrosity before it's finally made tidy.

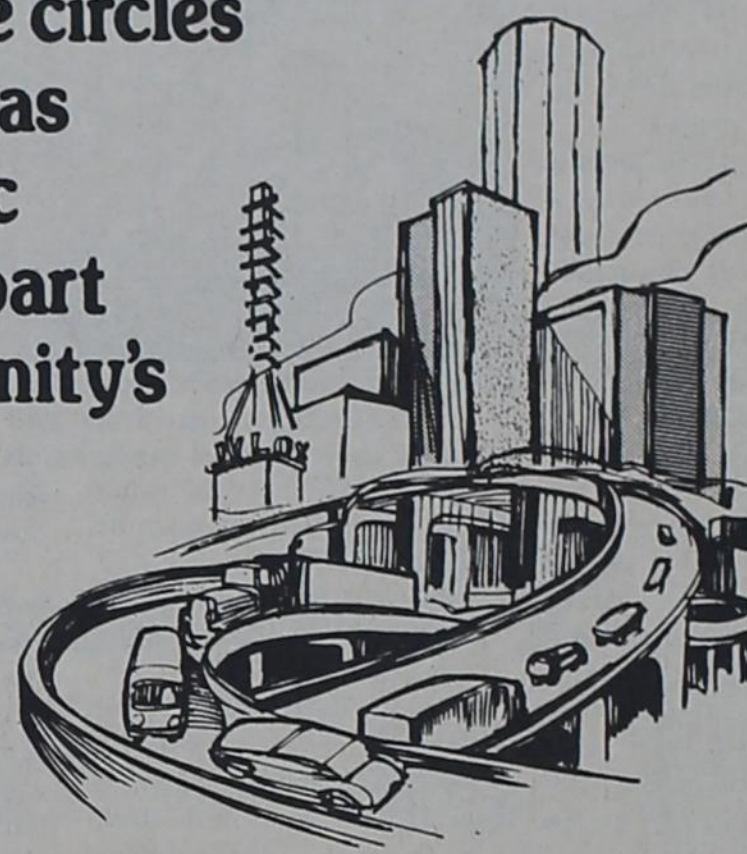

Andis' s raise cattle-working dogs

"I've seen a dog pen a chicken," said Bob Andis, who is proud of the intelligence and sturdiness of the Australian Blue Heelers and Catahoula Leopards he raises on the Hip-O ranch south of Ashtola.

"Blue Heelers are called 'Heelers' because they drive the Louisiana territory. They used them to fight the Catahoula is a head dog. He bunches cattle by snapping at their ears."

Bob Andis and his wife, Vera Lee, have been raising cattle dogs for 10 years, both for profit and for a hobby.

"They're so affectionate and intelligent," Vera said as Coony, one of the young Heelers, took a running jump into her arms. "All you have to teach them is obedience. They already know how to work with cattle. It just comes naturally to them. They want to please."

Coony is about 10 months old now. As Bob walked toward his house to get some coffee, the young dog pulled at his pants leg. "When they start doing that," Bob said, "it's time to start working them with the cattle."

The Andis' also raise Rottweilers, which are ancestors of the Doberman pinscher and, like dobermans, make good guard dogs. One of the Rottweilers, Cocaine, will have pups in August. "She'll probably have ten pups," Bob said. "The top five will draw \$600 apiece. I sell them to command training. One of those dogs can keep five men on the ground."

The Heelers and Catahoulas are naturally friendlier than the Rottweilers, but even they are chary with their affection. "They're one-man dogs," Bob said. "If you don't get the pup before it's eight to ten months old, you'll never have 100 per cent out of him. Oh, he'll work all right and, if you're real patient with him, he'll obey you, but you'll still only get about 75

per cent of what you would have gotten had you been his first master."

Both the Blue Heelers and the Catahoulas have interesting histories.

"In the early 1800's," Bob related, "Scottish settlers took Blue Merles to Australia -- the Scots called them sheep dogs -- and used them to work cattle. Because so many of the dogs died from the heat in Australia, the Scots abandoned them. The remaining Blue Merles cross-bred with the wild dingoes. After a time the cattlemen noticed this new dog following their herds. The ranchers picked up some of the pups and started working them with the cattle. These Blue Heelers I have are five generations away from the dingoes. There are only about 600 pure-bred

Blue Heelers in the United States right now.

"The Catahoula Leopards were brought by the Spaniards from France into the Louisiana territory. They used them to fight the Indians. When the Spaniards went on to California they left some Catahoulas behind. After the U.S. took over Louisiana the American farmers started using the Catahoulas to work cattle, sheep, hogs -- just any kind of livestock."

Bob and Vera led their guest out to the kennels to see the Catahoula pups. Coony and Sissy ran around the humans as they walked along the path. Suddenly Coony crooked her right front paw and continued running on three legs.

"They pick up burrs in

their pads all the time," Bob explained, "but they'll keep on working the cattle the entire day on three legs. The Catahoulas' pads are even tougher. They don't feel the burrs at all."

Jocko is the name of the Andis' primary male Catahoula. He has produced seven litters of top cattle-working pups by his mate, Jill. "Jocko helps train them," Vera said with her unquenchable enthusiasm. "They're just like humans the way they teach each other. It's so much fun to watch."

"One day," Bob recalled, "I had Jocko and two of his pups out helping me with the cattle. Jocko was on the left side of one head. One of the pups was on the left with him, while the other was on the right side. The next day I heard a ruckus behind some bushes. I thought one of the dogs had found a coyote, but it was Jocko and the pup that had been on the left side with him, Bingo. Now Bingo must outweigh Jocko by 20 pounds, but Jocko had him down and was really giving him a lesson. After that Bingo stayed on the side opposite Jocko."

Bob Andis exhibits an acute sense of professionalism in the way he takes care of his dogs. He designed and built two kennels, one for four dogs and the other for eight, where concern for the animals health and well being is just as evident as is the concern for ease and quickness of cleaning. The kennels face south so that cool breezes are let in and cold northers blocked. Also, direct sun rays are minimized. A sloping concrete floor and drainage system make it possible for Bob to hose down the kennel runs without having to go inside any of them. "I can clean all of them in fifteen minutes," he said.

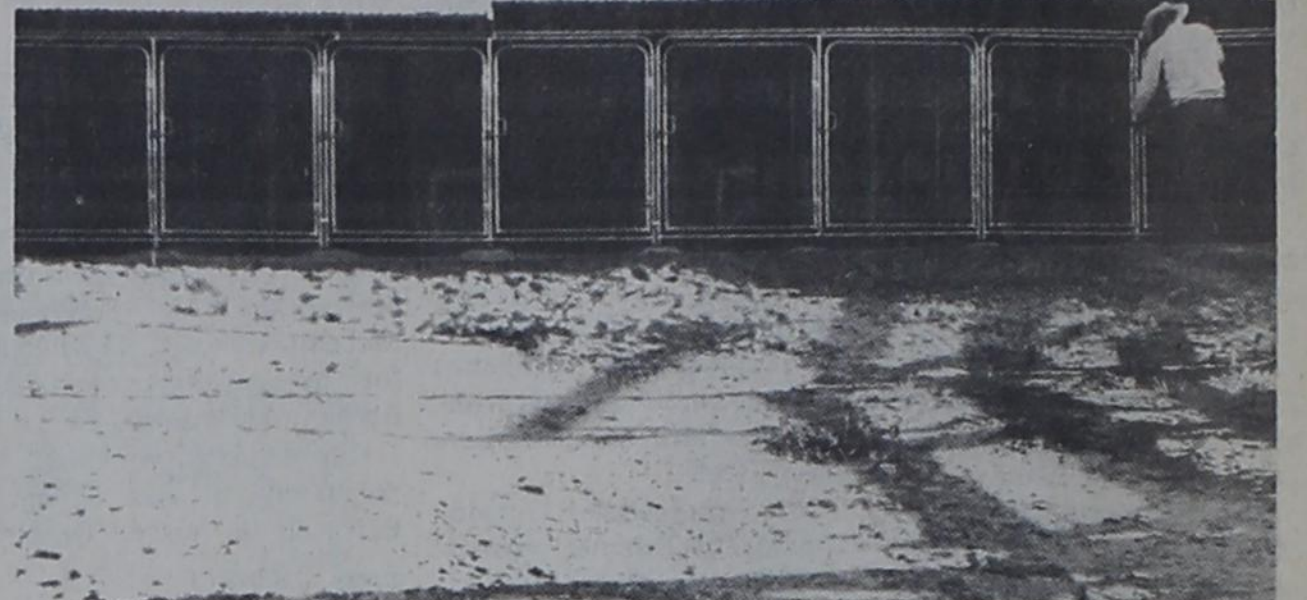
Once every two weeks Bob gives the dogs a good dip in a solution to eliminate lice,

ticks and fleas. "The tick cycle is 14 to 21 days, so a dip every two weeks is enough to keep them clean," he said.

He feeds the dogs a 28 per cent high protein pellet, which he buys by the ton. "By buying in that quantity I can feed a dog for 25 cents a day," he said.

Despite the relative inexpensiveness of feeding dogs by the dozen, however, the Andis' hobby is an expensive one. Bob has offered \$4,000 for a male Blue Heeler, and he ships about a hundred dogs per year to buyers in other states at a cost of \$2 per pound.

One lady in California stipulated that she come to stay with the Andis' a week before deciding whether she would sell them one of her dogs.

All the trouble and expense is obviously worth it to Bob and Vera Lee Andis. They're as proud as parents when they show Coony's and Sissy's "college diplomas" to visitors. (Both dogs recently were graduated

from an obedience training course at Amarillo College.)

And last weekend, Coony and Sissy won 5th and 6th places in obedience out of a group of 22 dogs at the AKC show in Amarillo. Moreover, Coony won "best of show"

for her breed.

Coony and Sissy are special dogs to the Andis', who have extended them house privileges. "They are part of the family," said Vera Lee.

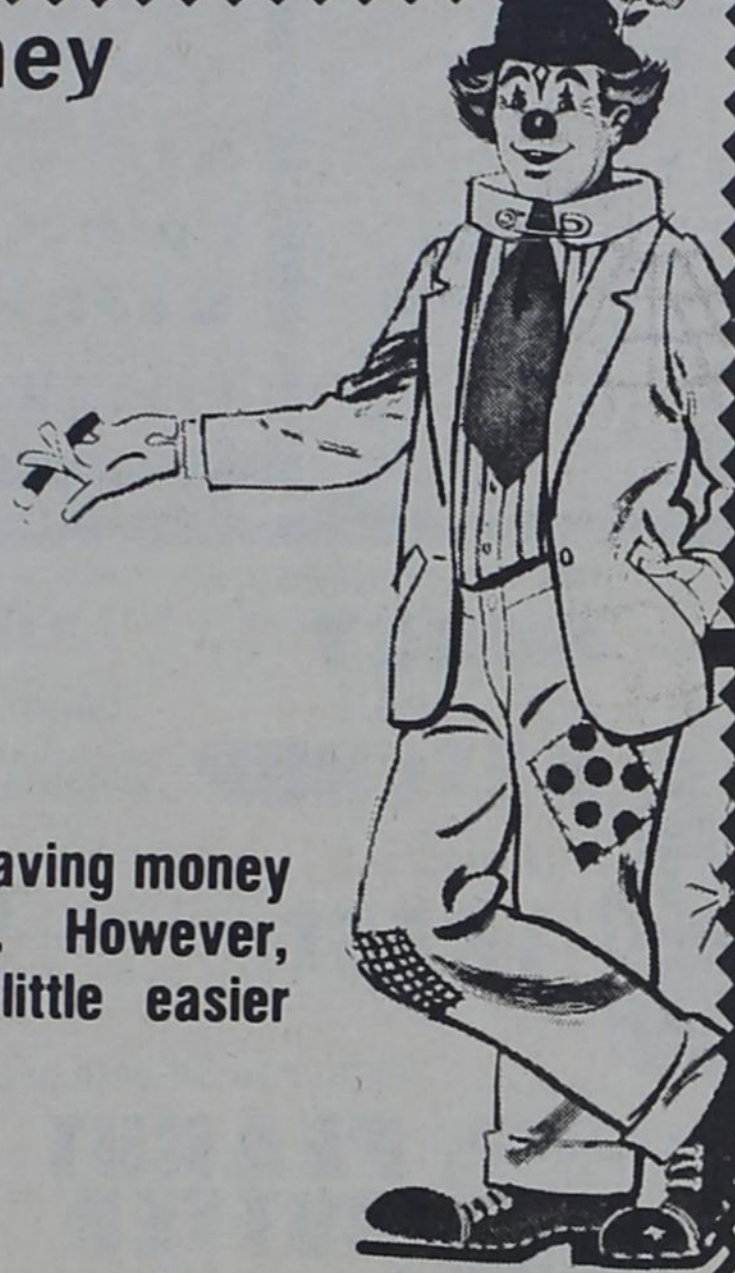

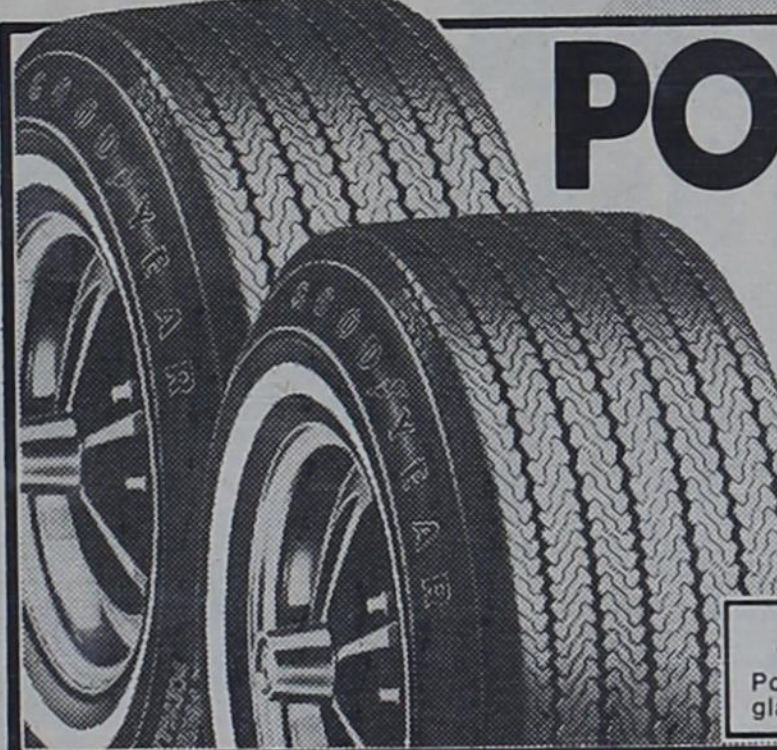

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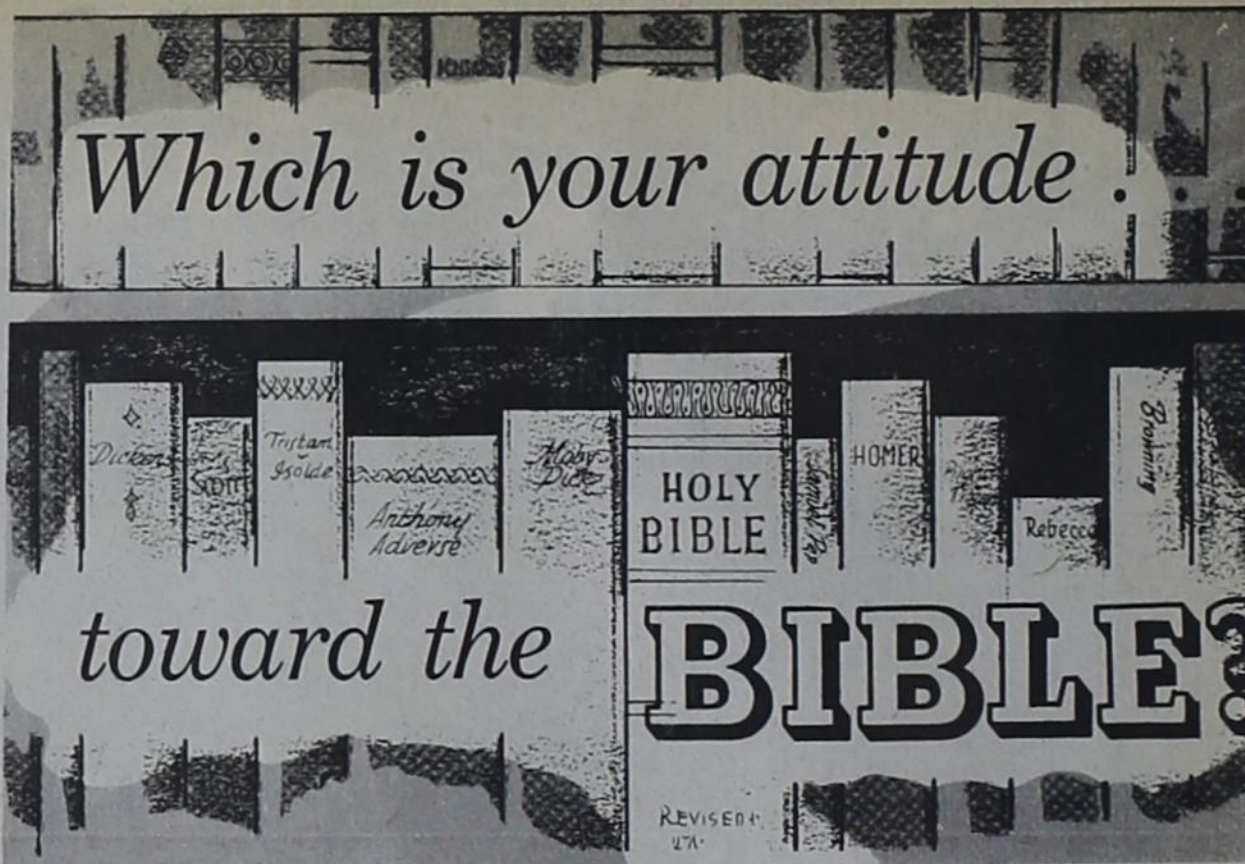

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Do you have a Bible? Most people do. Do you read the Bible? Most people don't. What is your attitude toward the Bible? It is the most loved and the most hated book in the world. In between these two extremes there are many other attitudes toward the Bible.

Antagonism: There are some like Jehoiakim of the Old Testament, who took the word of God addressed to him and cut it to pieces with his knife (Jeremiah 36:23). He despised God and any word of God. There have been many like him. Emperor Diocletian in the third century decreed that all copies of the Bible should be destroyed. He also decreed death as the penalty for reading the Bible.

Ridicule: The atheist Thomas Paine, like Communists of today, scoffed at the Bible and said that it would soon become a mere museum relic. Paine is dead, and yet the Bible is our nation's "best seller" today. The Bible forewarned of such scoffers (2 Peter 3:3).

Superstition: Many people look on the Bible much like a superstitious person who carries a rabbit foot or a buckeye. They do not read it, but feel safer if it is close by. They lay their hand on it when they swear, but they never handle it aright as the word of truth (2 Timothy 2:15). They clutch it in fear in foxholes but refuse to read it in times of peace.

Indifference: There are many who neither hate it nor love it. Their indifferent attitude results in ignorance.

Prejudice: Many people read the Bible to prove their point. They use the Scriptures for their purpose (2 Peter 3:16). They do not read their Bible with the sincere desire to find what the word of God is.

Loyalty: In contrast to the extreme attitudes of Jehoiakim and Diocletian, there have been great men like John Wycliffe and William Tyndale. Wycliffe, who lived in the fourteenth century, was dedicated to the proposition that the "Scriptures are the property of the people." He was hated for this attitude, and 40 years after his death people dug up his body and threw his ashes into the River Swift as an expression of their violent hatred for a man who loved the Bible so much. Tyndale was determined that even a plowboy should know the Scriptures. He was forced to work in secret because his life was in danger. As a result of his efforts thousands of copies of the Bible were circulated in England in the sixteenth century. For all of this he was imprisoned, treated shamefully, and finally strangled and burned.
