2 weekend accidents damaging but not fatal

Two freak accidents happened again this week on Hwy. 287, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

Friday night a GMC pickup driven by Douglas Van Ausdal of Salt Lake City, Utah was towing a Chrysler car on Hwy. 287 when the tow bar came loose. The car ran off the road and hit a telephone pole, snapping the pole in two but leaving it standing because the break was so clean and close to the earth. No one was injured.

About 9:45 p.m. Saturday night a 22-wheeler diesel truck hauling a powerline transformer collided with a 1971 Chevrolet Nova near FM road 1755 in Lelia Lake.

The Nova was totalled and the transformer toppled off

the truck's bed, spilling 3,300 gallons of oil, but no one was injured.

Approximately 15 persons, not counting police, eventually showed up to eliminate the oil spill, according to Highway Patrolman Ray Burch. Two came from the Clarendon Police Department, three from the Donley County Sheriff's Department, six or seven from the Volunteer Fire Department, three people with two wreckers and two ordinary citizens, Burch said.

At the time of the collision the oil spill covered a strip about 50-ft. long, but after

traffic had run through it for three hours the spill affected

CPA to organize county accounts

The Donley County Commissioners voted Monday to contract with Bill Francis, a CPA with Dozier, Dickens and Francis of Amarillo to set up an accounting system for the entire court house, and they set a \$50 salary increase for all county officials and most county employees.

Francis told the commissioners that their records need to be expanded and caught up for the year because the system as it now exists can jeopardize the county's revenue-sharing. He said their system would be a little harder than some

counties to reorganize because Donley has been operating on a precinct basis rather than county-wide.

Gene White moved that Francis be contracted with to set up a bookkeeping system for the county that will give adequate records to perform an audit. "It should be all together, balanced, tied into the bank and one where we can pick a report right off it," he said.

Buford Holland moved that the commissioners raise the salaries of county officials and employes \$50 a

month except for Troy Guy, county veterans service officer who received a \$25 a month raise. Also, the salaries of the two clerks in the tax office were set equal.

Holland's motion carried and the raises become effective Sept. 1.

The commissioners denied an appeal from the JA ranch to lower the taxes assessed on its rangeland.

However, they did alter the taxes on the Barlow Cattle Co. after listening to the argument of Larry Peters, manager of the

company. The reassessed valuation on his property was set at \$9 on one-fourth of the land and \$6 on three-quarters, plus \$2,000 on improvements. Peters had been unable to attend the date set for equalization hearings because his plane had broken down in Oklahoma, he said.

• voted to pay each

member of the Donley County Juvenile Board \$50 per month effective Sept. 1.

• set 10:00 a.m. Monday, Aug. 31 as the date for a revenue sharing hearing.

• formally requested \$18,657.65 from the state of Texas as Donley's part of the Lateral Road Fund;

• authorized travel expenses for County Service Officer Troy Guy to attend a Veterans Affairs Commission Conference in Dallas Sept. 19-22;

• sold a used and dismantled photo machine and

dryer to Cecil McAfee;

• gave two stainless steel sinks to Clarendon Junior College for use in growing agricultural specimens;

• approved a bid of \$5,121.63 to repair White Fish bridge;

• cancelled a 10-year tax debt totalling \$101.34 on a house now owned by Roeda Rattan but owned by the First Baptist Church during the taxation period in question, 1964 through 1973;
• and closed a country road in Precinct 3 which is not used any more.

Four charged with assault on youth at lake party

Four Pampa men were charged Sunday with assault with intent to cause bodily injury and with theft, according to Sheriff Truett Behrens.

Larry Pierce Anderson of Amarillo woke Deputy Sheriff Jimmy Thompson early Sunday morning and told him that the four Pampa men, Thomas Ivan Clark, Barney Earl Sawyer, Randy

Earl Best and Gary Ray Johnson, had assaulted him sometime Saturday night at a "party" on the Cliff at Greenbelt Lake.

Anderson was taken to the Amarillo hospital where nine stitches were sewn in one eye.

The four accused were also charged with stealing record tapes, stereos and a gun, Behrens said.

Howardwick dump approved

Howardwick City Attorney Mike Sanders told the council Monday night that their application for a city landfill had been approved by the Texas Department of Health Resources.

The aldermen thereupon began discussion of what would be the best and least expensive way of fencing the 5-acre area. They also asked Sanders to write a trash-burning ordinance for them.

At the very time the council was discussing a fire ordinance several fence posts and some grassland were burning in the present dump site behind Sid Blues. Morris Crump, who is leasing the

pasture from Dwight Blair, came to the council meeting to protest about the trash-burning.

"If we hadn't had some rain recently and if the wind had been out of the southwest, I could have lost my whole pasture," Crump said.

The aldermen assured Crump they had just been making plans to make sure such fires didn't happen in the future.

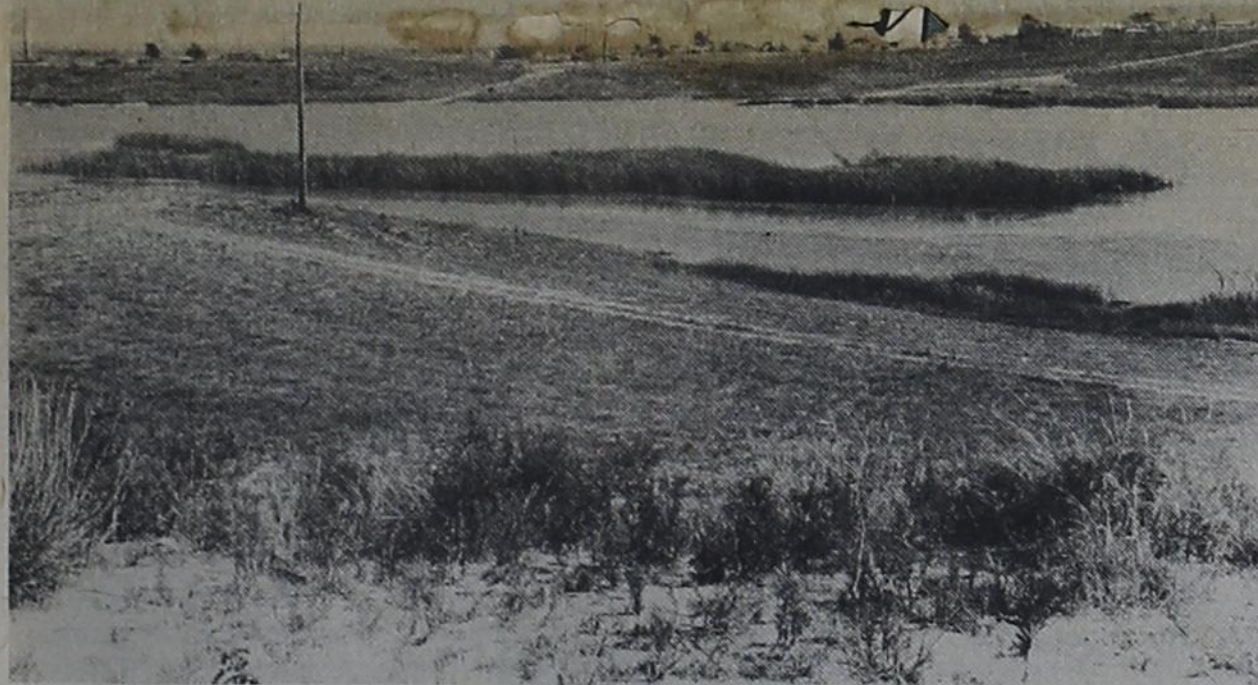
The aldermen also approved a \$100 a month increase in the salary of City Secretary James W. Dunn as a recompense for staying in the city hall another half a day per week.

Half-way through the meeting angry words were exchanged between members of the council and Jim Milam, who accused the council of giving him the "runaround" regarding his third application for a beer-off-premises license.

Sanders told Milam that it had not been 15 days as required by law since his public notice was published in the newspaper and that the council was not therefore bound to consider it yet. He also told Milam that if he felt aggrieved by the council's approach to the issue he could file suit in court against them.

The council also appointed Jim Cargill, E.E. Boone, Henry Bland and Melville Mills alternates for the zoning commission.

Youth drowns at Greenbelt Lake

An Amarillo High School student drowned in a cove in the Kincaid Park area of Greenbelt Lake early Tuesday afternoon.

Charlie Sanders, 17, died when he attempted to swim to shore from a reed-covered island where he had been fishing with another Amarillo youth, Mark Romero, also 17.

The youths could walk most of the distance between the reeds and the shoreline, but part of the way would require swimming. Deputy Sheriff Ralph Hill said.

Romero said that when he and Sanders were at a point in the lake where the water is about 5 ft. deep, Sanders yelled out, "I can't touch bottom. I can't go any further."

"I said, 'Well, let's start swimming,'" Romero told Justice of the Peace M.O. Weatherly. "He was a good

swimmer. He didn't even try to help himself. And the water's not that deep out there. The man who found him stepped on him."

Romero's father, Ricky Romero, who had accompanied the boys on their fishing trip, said that he was several yards upon the shore at the time of the drowning. He said that his son called out to him, "Dad, I can't find him."

The elder Romero said that a boy weighing about 80 pounds jumped out of a boat and swam to help Sanders.

However, the 240-pound Sanders almost pulled the smaller boy down with him. Justice of the Peace M.O. Weatherly ruled "accidental death by drowning" at the inquest, according to Sheriff Truett Behrens.

Behrens said that he had asked Sanders' mother if she wanted an autopsy per-

formed to make certain there were no other possible causes of the death. Behrens said she had declined.

"We have to be pretty careful about this sort of thing," Behrens said. "Last year there was some trouble after a young woman drowned out here. The J.P. at the time didn't record enough details, and witnesses got out of pocket."

The Sanders' death was the fifth drowning at Greenbelt Lake during the 10 years the lake has existed, Behrens said.

Pandora's legacy

Remember Pandora? She was the ancient Greeks' version of Eve. The gods entrusted a peculiar box to Pandora which she was ordered to deliver to Epimetheus and was strictly forbidden to open. As Epimetheus wasn't home when Pandora arrived, the girl had time to dawdle and while dawdling to become curious. Eventually she could take no more but opened the box and let loose all the illnesses, troubles and sins of the world.

Various inferences can be drawn from this story: (1) that Woman's curiosity is the cause of Man's woes; (2) that a person is less likely to be affected by troubles if he or she is not curious; and (3) that not all responsibilities and trusts are enstiable ones.

At the moment, I am interested in the last two possible morals because I have to face them day after day in my job as a journalist. Especially this last week did it hit home when I went out to Greenbelt Lake to report on a drowning.

I have personally seen very

little of death in my lifetime despite the fact that I have lived through some of the bloodiest decades in world history. I decided that if the opportunity came to me I would see what a drowning victim looks like. but I wouldn't take my camera. I waited until the next day to photograph the area where the drowning occurred, expecting the fact that no people appear in the picture to carry some of the melancholy tone of the incident.

Later I asked myself if I had done the right thing. Perhaps it would have been more responsible to have taken pictures of the enwrapped corpse or at least of the ambulance driving away or of the victim's tearful fishing companion. One theory holds that such "reality" pictures presented to the public occasionally make people more safety-conscious. The Texas Highway Department once made an acquaintance of mine who had lost his driver's license for excessive speeding

tickets watch a movie showing some gruesome scenes of highway accidents. For at least several months after that my acquaintance took his speedometer very seriously.

On the other hand, some of my fellow journalists, especially the television reporters, have angered me by seeming to take a gluttonous interest in people's grieving moments. And I certainly am not interested in appealing to that "thing" within all of us that made the "spaghetti westerns" profitable for movie producers.

It's one of those issues journalists often debate when they get together for a little shop talk but never resolve. Whether to photograph such scenes will always be a decision individual reporters have to make with little guide but their own sense of the tasteful and the responsible. And, like Pandora, we will always have to bear the judgmental eye of the public—whether we do or don't photograph.

This study gave primary emphasis to the Dead Sea Scrolls and archaeology in the Bible Lands.

He has appeared on lectureship programs and conducted numerous religious seminars throughout

the United States and in many foreign countries. He has written articles for the *Firm Foundation*, *20th Century Christian* and *Power for Today*.

Jon was the chaplain of the Miami Civitan Club, past president of the Sunset Elementary School PTA and served on the Dade County Steering Committee for better schools.

You never outgrow need for immunization

Tetanus immunization is not kid stuff. Adults need its protection, too.

More than half of the reported cases of tetanus occur in persons 50 or older.

Tetanus—also known as lockjaw, can often be fatal. It is caused by spores of bacteria which can enter the body through a wound. The spores are almost everywhere, but particularly in manured soil.

Because the tetanus germ cannot grow in the presence of air, deep puncture wounds or cuts are a favorable growing environment for the germ, Cynthia Manning says.

Once in the wound, tetanus germs secrete a toxin. This toxin is so powerful that one-fourth teaspoonful is enough to kill 100,000 people.

For children, protection against tetanus usually starts with the basic immunization series—in which the tetanus toxoid is given in combination with diphtheria

4-H youth development

4-H, the youth development program of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, offers exciting projects and activities for every young person between the ages of 9 and 19 who has a curious desire to learn.

4-H encourages learning by doing and provides citizenship and leadership skills, points out Cynthia Manning, county agent for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. 4-H wants to involve youth—rural, urban, suburban, teens and pre-teens from all races, creeds, ethnic and economic backgrounds. 4-H youth learn, work and play together.

In 4-H young people can learn how to make things, grow things, take care of things, and repair things in a wide variety of projects, says Cynthia.

And the great part about the whole program is that 4-H youth can select what they want to do. Projects include things such as nature study, wildlife, entomology, animal science, beef cattle, horse and pony, dog care, plant science, gardening, field crops, home economics, foods and nutrition, clothing, automotive, bicycle, small engines, mechanics, electricity, personal development, citizenship, leadership and public speaking.

4-H has a lot to offer. So, if you want to get involved in an action-oriented program, contact the county Extension office, adds Cynthia.

toxic and pertussis vaccine at two, four, six, and eighteen months with a booster when they start school.

To continue the protection, physicians generally recommend a booster every 10 years. Adults should consult their physician or local health department about their immunization status.

Everyone should be protected against tetanus, but it is particularly important for pregnant women and agricultural workers and adults in occupations in which tetanus-favoring injuries are frequent.

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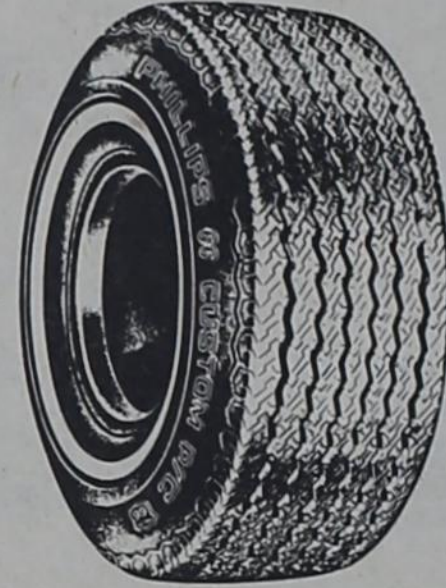
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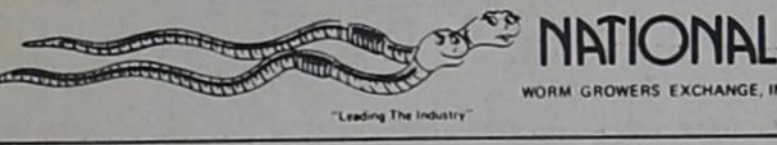
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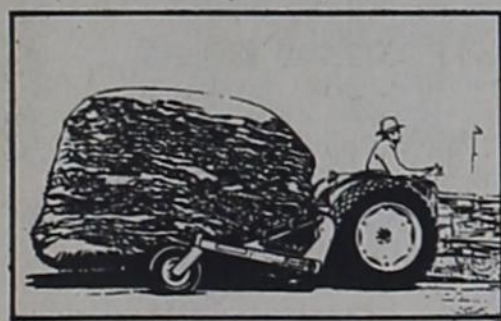
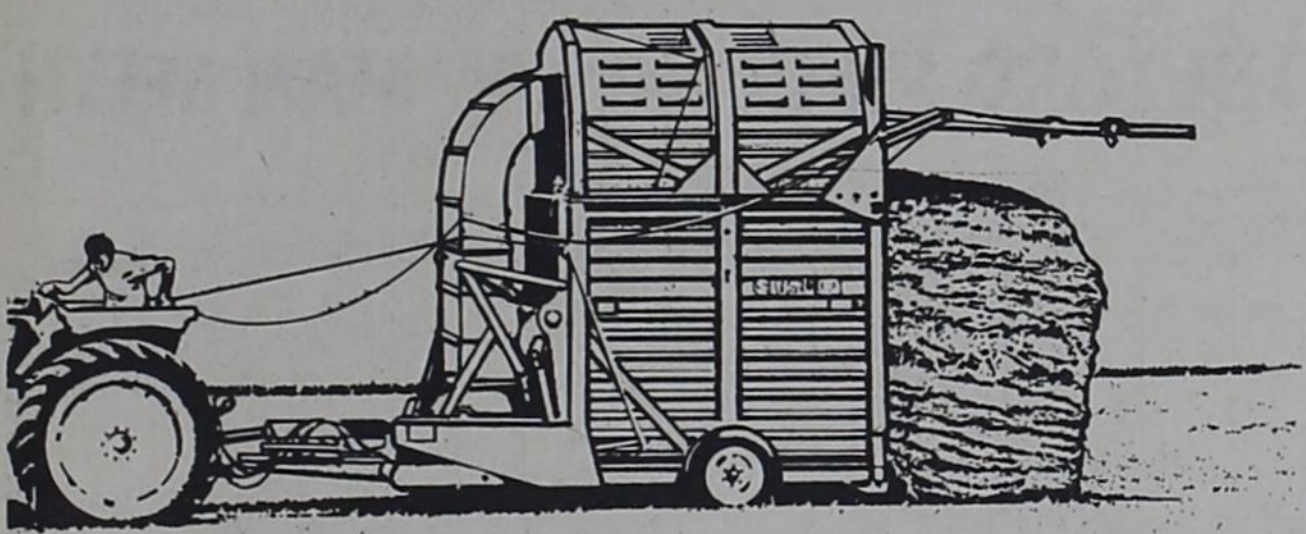

Man may delight in his physical prowess, mental skills, or social prestige. Again, God is not impressed.

The finest clothes, the newest automobiles, the most luxuriously furnished homes, and the most beautifully landscaped yards are definite symbols to man of his material success. Yet these contribute nothing to his standing before God.

Human learning, higher education, and higher and higher academic degrees may exalt the wisdom of man. Man's spiritual rank before God, however, is not determined by his intellectual development or amount of formal schooling.

No, the Lord does not see as man sees. The Lord is concerned with man's humility, not pride; his character, not reputation; his sacrifice, not wealth; his service to others, not preeminence over others; his spirituality, not physical attractiveness or strength of body; his brotherly love, not ancestral stock; and his devotion to the teachings of Christ, and not clothes or automobiles or homes or furniture or college degrees or fame.

We may impress ourselves and others with material success, but they become mere flimsy veneer before the powerful, penetrating eye of Almighty God, from whom nothing is hidden. "For the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart."
