Police capture teenagers after long, high speed chase

Two teenaged boys were charged with theft and evading arrest Friday after they allegedly stole a carton of cigarettes and led several local and state police units on a chase from Clarendon to Wildorado.

Thomas Singleton Ivey, 17, and Tommy Delton Garrett, 18, are accused of having stolen a carton of Marlborough cigarettes from Clifford's grocery about 1:15 p.m. Friday and attempting to evade police in a chase involving speeds in excess of 125 m.p.

Donley County Sheriff's Deputies Jimmy Thompson and Ralph Hill joined Clarendon Patrolman Danny Hill in a pursuit on Hwy 287 to Claude, north on FM 1151 toward Groom and on Hwy 207 to I 40, where two Department of Public Safety units from Panhandle joined the chase.

Charges filed against suspect in boating incident

Charges were to be filed Tuesday against an Amarillo man who allegedly was driving the boat that injured Matthew Britten of Groom Aug. 21 at Greenbelt Lake, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Game warden Gary Hunt.

The incident, which occurred near the area called the "cliffs" about 6:30 p.m. two weeks ago Sunday injured Britten to such an extent as to cause the loss of one kidney and the possibility of his losing an arm and a leg. Sheriff Truett Behrens told the **Clarendon Press** last week.

As of press time Tuesday, however, Gary Hunt said that Britten was out of intensive care and the doctors had some reason to hope they would be able to save his arm. "The main thing they're worried about now is infection," Hunt said. "There are all kinds of

parasites in that water." Hunt said that the accident occurred while Britten was swimming in the lake, the boat coming upon him as he was on the surface of the water.

Troy Welty, lake patrolman for the Greenbelt Water Authority, drove his boat around the lake after hearing of the incident, looking for the boat which eyewitnesses described to him. Sheriff Behrens said, but he never saw it.

Welty said he had seen a man who fit the description of the witnesses before but that he couldn't find him after Britten was injured.

Hunt said Tuesday that he would be going to Amarillo to serve warrants against the accused man. Hunt said he felt he had enough evidence from descriptions supplied by witnesses to justify his charges.

Spencer Hayes to receive God and Country award



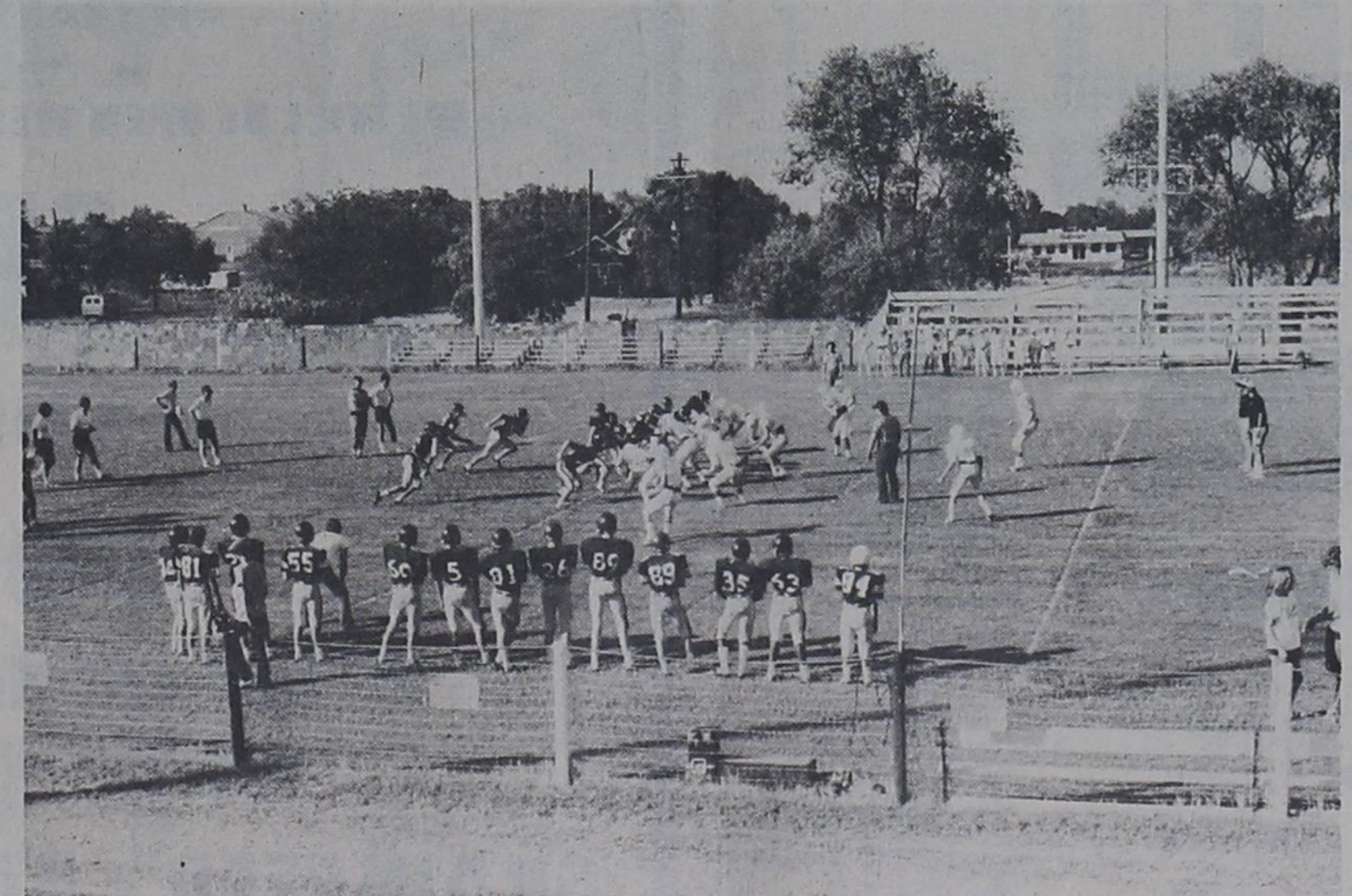

Broncos improve in 2nd week of scrimmages

The Clarendon Broncos fared better last weekend in their scrimmages than they did the week before, although the freshman scrimmage against Quanah Thursday afternoon was a slow starter.

"We started out real sluggish," Head Coach Jerry Wilson said of the freshman game in which Quanah

topped Clarendon 4 to 1. However, Wilson said that he felt the Clarendon boys finally "started catching onto offense and doing a better job." He praised Darrell Gilliam's running.

Clarendon's varsity team won the next scrimmage 5 to 2 against Groom. "We felt like our offense generated more of a punch this

week, too." In the scrimmage against Groom Billy Gardner broke

through several tacklers in two long runs in which he should have been tackled, according to the coach. "In one isolation play he broke for 70 yards, shaking off a lot of tacklers in the process. He's got the strength. He's bench-pressing 280 lbs. right now," Wilson said.

In the Saturday morning

scrimmage Clarendon's junior varsity team played Lefors' varsity, Clarendon winning 5 to 1. However, Lefors, a Class B league school, has only 15 boys on its entire team. "They needed another scrimmage," Wilson said, "so we scheduled them against our junior varsity."

In the game against Lefors Lynn Thompson did a good job at quarterback, Wilson said, and Alvin Reese at running back.

Coach Wilson, pleased though he was with the improvements, said that he still had some problems to work on. Among the primary targets for improvement workouts the coming week Wilson stressed his defensive line, the backs' faking and the team's "7" techniques.

Wilson said he had viewed the films of the scrimmages 10 times. "It's just what you have to do," he said, "look at each kid. I think we're going to have to do some switching around. Some of the boys aren't doing what they're capable of in their present positions."

Besides working out the rough edges Wilson said the Broncos would be preparing this week for their home

opener against the McLean Tigers at 8:00 p.m. Sept. 2.

"We've seen them scrimmage twice and also looked at them on film," Wilson said.

Wilson said that studying McLean's scrimmages is particularly important this year because they are a very different ball club than in the past. "McLean's present coach is their third in three years," he said. "We feel like they're a much better ball club than they were last year. They're not as big, but they're stronger."

"They have two backs -- a kid by the name of Haynes and another boy named Simpson who run with authority. They're tough to tackle. And they have a guard who's exceptionally tough and big by the name of Scott Raines," Wilson said.

Golf pro Jerry Thompson nurtures greens

When you go out to the Clarendon Country Club golf course you're just as likely to find 33-year-old golf pro Jerry Thompson in dirty denim repairing a mower as in slacks and sport shirt swinging a club. That's because Jerry is not only the pro but also the course superintendent, and he enjoys the latter job just as much as the first.

"I've played a lot of courses that weren't real good golf courses, but I

nevertheless enjoyed playing them because it was clear the superintendent took extra care with the appearance of his course," Jerry said.

"Where you've got a labor force and machines you can do extra things like cut greens in different shapes, and you can do other things to make your course unique," he added.

"Until 1970 clubs had to rely on hand mowers to cut their greens, and it used to take a man two days to mow

the greens. Now, with triplex riding mowers, all the greens on this 18-hole golf course can be mowed in seven hours."

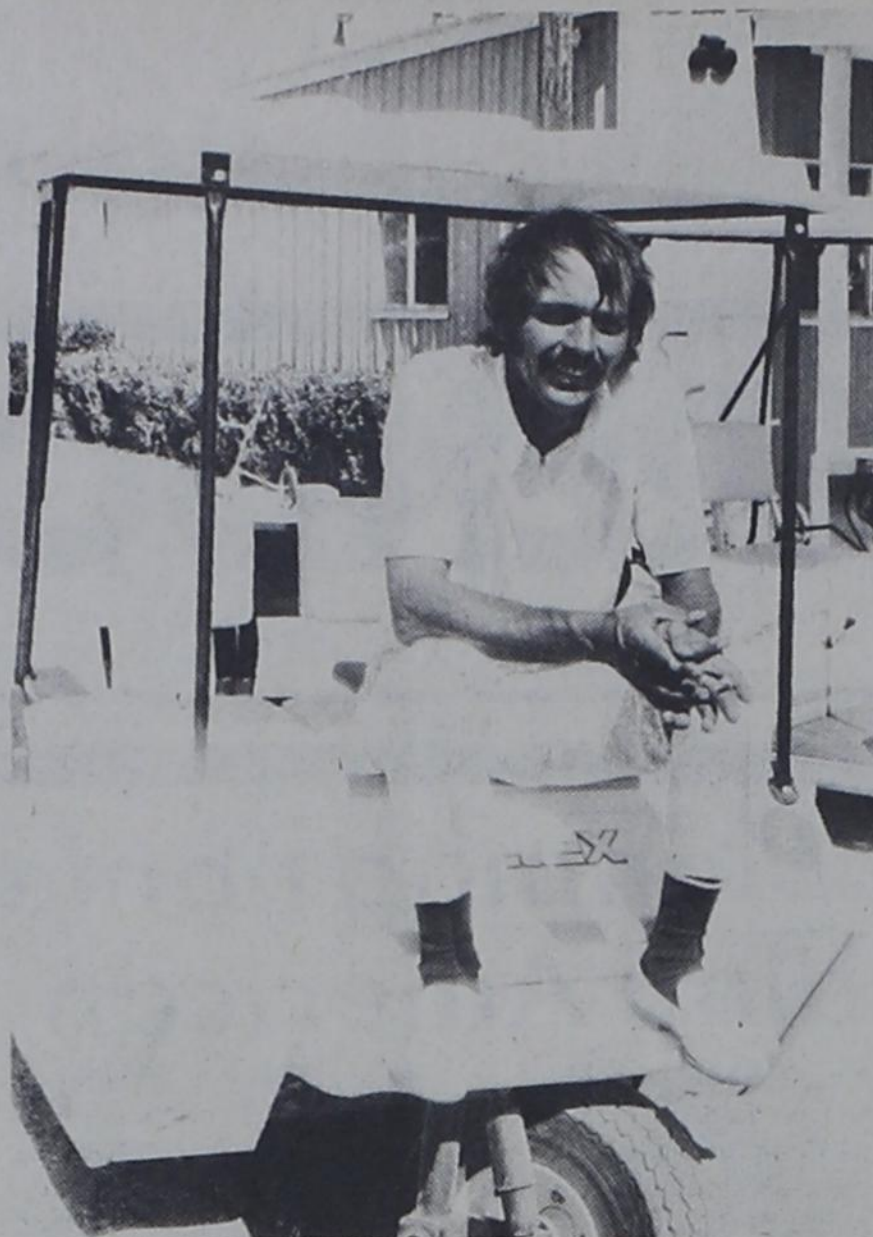
Turf management can be a very technical aspect of golf course superintendence. "Our fairways and tee boxes have coastal bermuda grass cut at one inch," Jerry said, "and our greens are creeping seaside bent mown at 3/32 of an inch."

"We've got some of the largest greens you'll find in this part of the country," Jerry said. "The average is about 10,000 sq. ft. It costs a lot of money to keep up the greens, but it's just one of the characteristics of this golf course that we want to keep up."

The darkly tanned Jerry Thompson would obviously have to prefer the out-of-

doors in order to do his job, but he is an outdoorsman to such a degree as to dislike any aspect of his job that keeps him inside four walls for even a few hours. "I spent four years as an assistant in a golf shop," he said, "so I want to get out on the greens."

For much of the year he can do exactly that. "Two years ago we had a real good winter, but this last winter there was enough snow and ice that it wasn't as good. Still, it's a 365-days-a-

year operation," Jerry said. Many people are likely to assume that since the country club is private, the golf course is, too, and that therefore only members can play it. However, Jerry said that the course is semi-private; that is, it is open to anyone who wants to play and for the same rates as members.

"We run two major tournaments every year for the general public and a bunch of little ones for members," Jerry said.

The tournaments are strictly amateur. No money is given but only trophies and non-redeemable merchandise valued at a maximum of \$250. "We have a College Invitational scheduled for Sept. 16 and 17. Eight senior colleges and about 13 junior colleges will be participating in the three round 18-hole tournament. Some of the senior colleges will have to send their junior varsity teams because the Southwest Conference doesn't allow back-to-back tournaments."

Jerry, who turned pro in 1968, said that the greatest difficulty he faces as a country club pro is that he has to be a teacher and a great player at the same time. "You have to teach golf theory and technique by the book, but you can't play a great game that way. I once asked David Eichelberger how he had hit a certain shot, and he said to me 'I really don't know.' A great player plays out of a feel for the swing. They're not that technical with their theory. They're not thinking of it."

"When you're teaching golf, though, you're breaking it down to theory and technique. That's the only way you can teach it right."

"I try to give a player a knowledge of his own swing, not just a cure. My role is not that of a coach who tells a player what to do with every shot. I provide him with enough knowledge of the theory that he won't have to ask me what to do."

Jerry said that golf is one of the few games the vast number of people try to play without any knowledge of theory and technique. "It seems like they just borrow a set of clubs, put on some golf shoes and start playing. They'll start their game thinking all they've got to do is knock the ball from one green to another. They don't realize that the line of flight is determined by the spin on the ball. Everything is just the reverse of what you might expect. To hit the ball high you've got to strike down on it. To hit the ball to the left you've got to swing to the right."

Jerry said that the students he has right now are quite serious about their game. He said that the main difference between men and women when they start to play golf is that many men sacrifice technique for power and that the greatest problem for women is lack of power.

"There's only one way to hit a golf ball correctly," he said. "Every good player makes the same move at the ball. You'll never find the person who just picks up a golf club and becomes a golfer."

"For each grade level we have a mainstream of study through the year," she said,

"The 7th and 8th grades have a choir.

"In all the grades, though, we'll be doing basically five things: listening, singing,

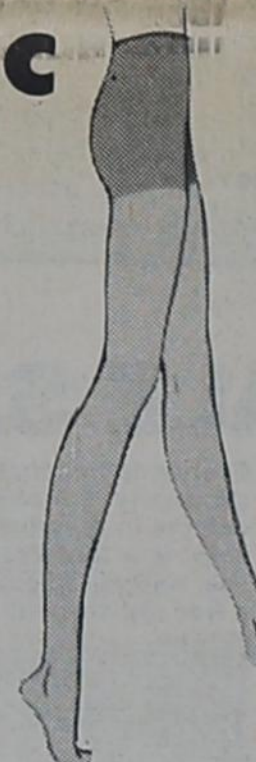

Clarendon College enters 79th year

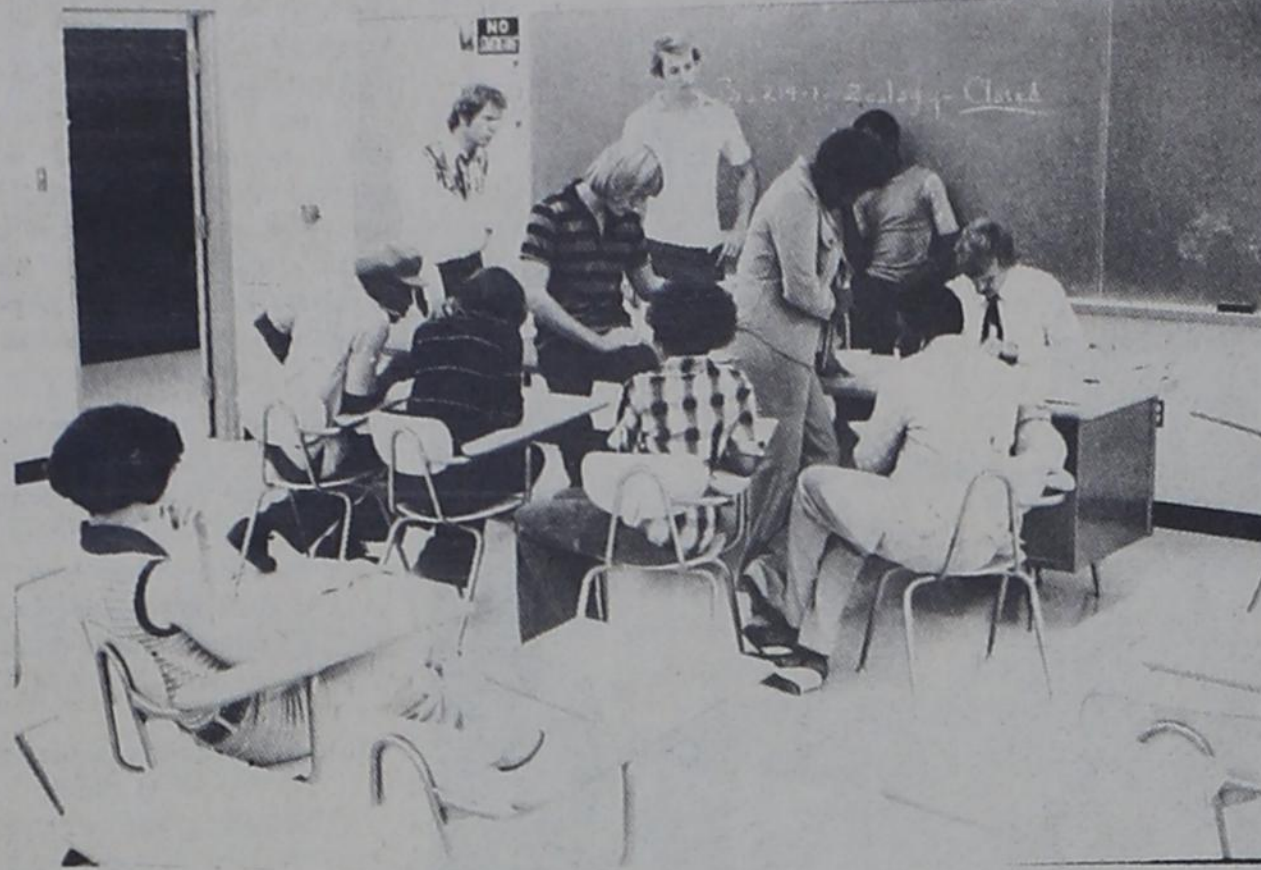
In 1968 the City of Clarendon, a small farming and ranching community of 1900, located in the South-eastern Panhandle of Texas, opened the doors to a newly constructed campus. When those doors were opened a dream came true for many. A bitter battle had been won by some and lost by others.

To build the new campus for an institution that is the oldest in the Texas Panhandle, established in 1898, meant raising of taxes and extended the supporting tax district from city to county boundaries. As in tax issues everywhere there were those that were for and those against such action. The new facilities opened with pride by some, hard feelings by others.

Now, nine years later, the college has grown from 244 students in 1968 to over 500 in 1976-1977. Most of the wounds that hard feelings in getting the new college built have healed and many that were against the construction are now among some of the college's strongest supporters.

The present campus meant a new life for a faltering institution. Each year has meant increased enrollment. New programs have been created. New opportunities in education have been made available to the people of Clarendon and the surrounding area. The philosophy, to serve the people, is being accomplished. Vocational Technical course of studies has become part of the institution in recent years. Programs in Auto-Mechanics, Radio-Television Repair, Vocational Nursing, Ranch and Feedlot Operations, Cosmetology, Electronic Organ Repair, and Secretarial Training were established to train local area students in vocations that they could use in each of their own communities, where those services are needed by the residents of those towns.

Academic programs have been established recently in outlying towns, providing educational service to residents of those towns that were unable to travel the distance to area colleges to

take courses. Evening classes have been taught in various area towns including Pampa, McLean, Shamrock, Memphis, Childress, Wellington, and Valley High. New programs are constantly being evaluated to provide needed services to the area. Programs are

updated yearly to provide the best of education. These accomplishments do not come easy for a college located in a small community in an un-industrialized county. Supported by local taxes and state appropriations, the college is the smallest in Texas. No other college in the state has fewer dollars to work with. Some have said that it is impossible for Clarendon College to exist with no more financial assistance than it has available. Not only has it existed, but it has grown and continues to grow while many, some in the panhandle area, have lost enrollment.

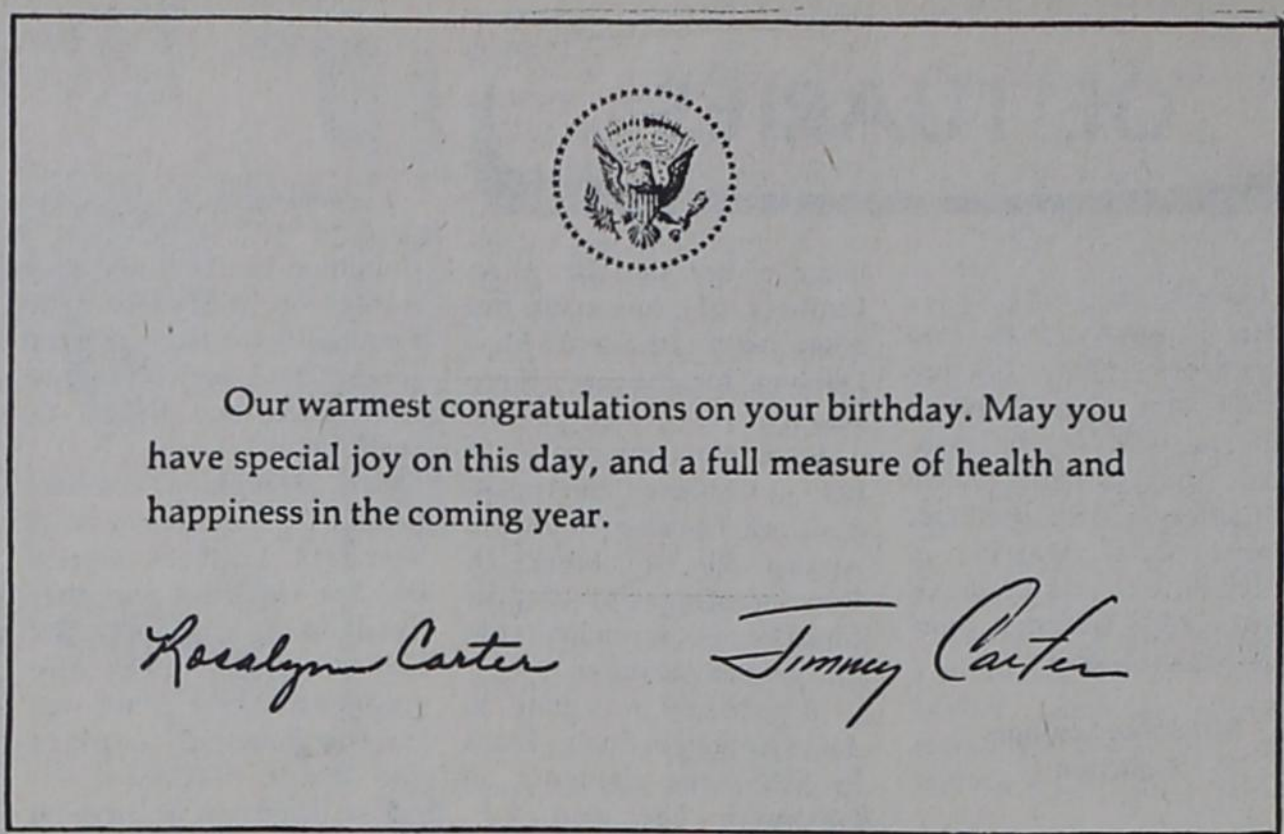
Dedication, sacrifice, and determination of administration, faculty, and staff of the college has made the existence and growth possible. Local interest and support of a proud community has made an impossible dream become a reality. The 244 students of 1968 grew to 338 in 1969. Enrollment leaped to 410 in 1970, 423 in 1971, 425 in 1972, and fell to 361 in the Fall of 1973. Since that time the college has increased each year, reaching the highest of the school's history in the Fall of 1976 with 560 students.

The fall term of 1977 began on Monday, August 29. For the 79th year, Clarendon College will once again be open to serve the people of the Texas Panhandle in education. Registration was held on the 29th and classes began on the 30th.

Small grains need fall nitrogen

Don't spare the nitrogen on small grains this fall, says Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

He lists three important reasons why wheat and other small grains need nitrogen at planting or a short time afterward:

- for early grazing,
- to help decompose residual straw, and
- for high production.

Sufficient fall growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen at planting, emphasizes Gooch. The advantages of early planting and favorable fall growing conditions can be lost if nitrogen fertilization is delayed until the condition of the stand can be determined. Establishing a good uniform stand requires some nitrogen, and most soils are deficient in this nutrient.

To meet nitrogen requirements during the fall growing period, producers can apply the total requirement before planting or can apply a small amount at planting followed by top-dressing soon after planting.

Of course, fall nitrogen fertilization is also affected by the amount of straw from the previous crop, adds Gooch. The bacteria and other microorganisms needed to decompose the straw require nitrogen and can use soil and applied nitrogen, thus reducing the amount available to plants. Since the 1976 crop produced above-average amounts of straw in some areas, it may be necessary to apply a higher proportion of the total nitrogen requirement in the fall.

The general rule in applying nitrogen has been

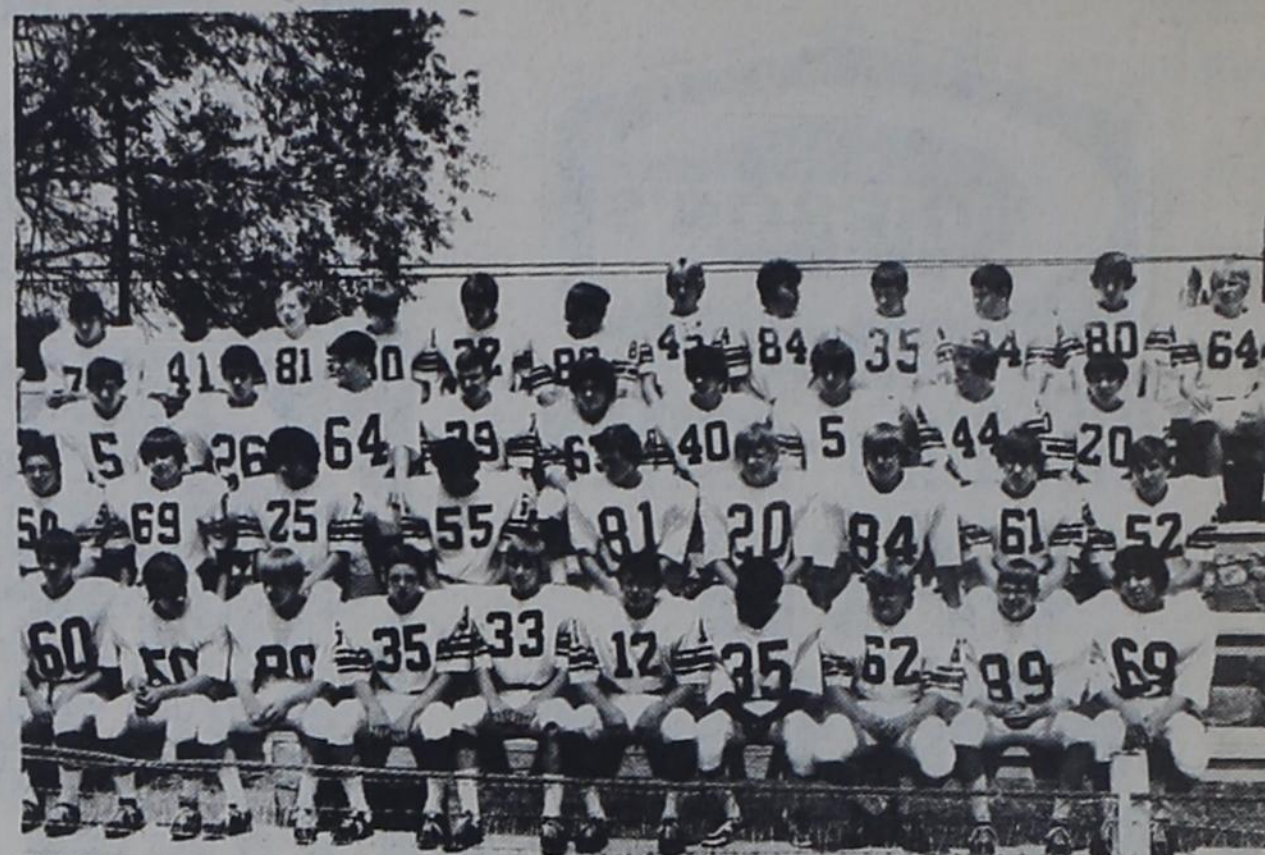
