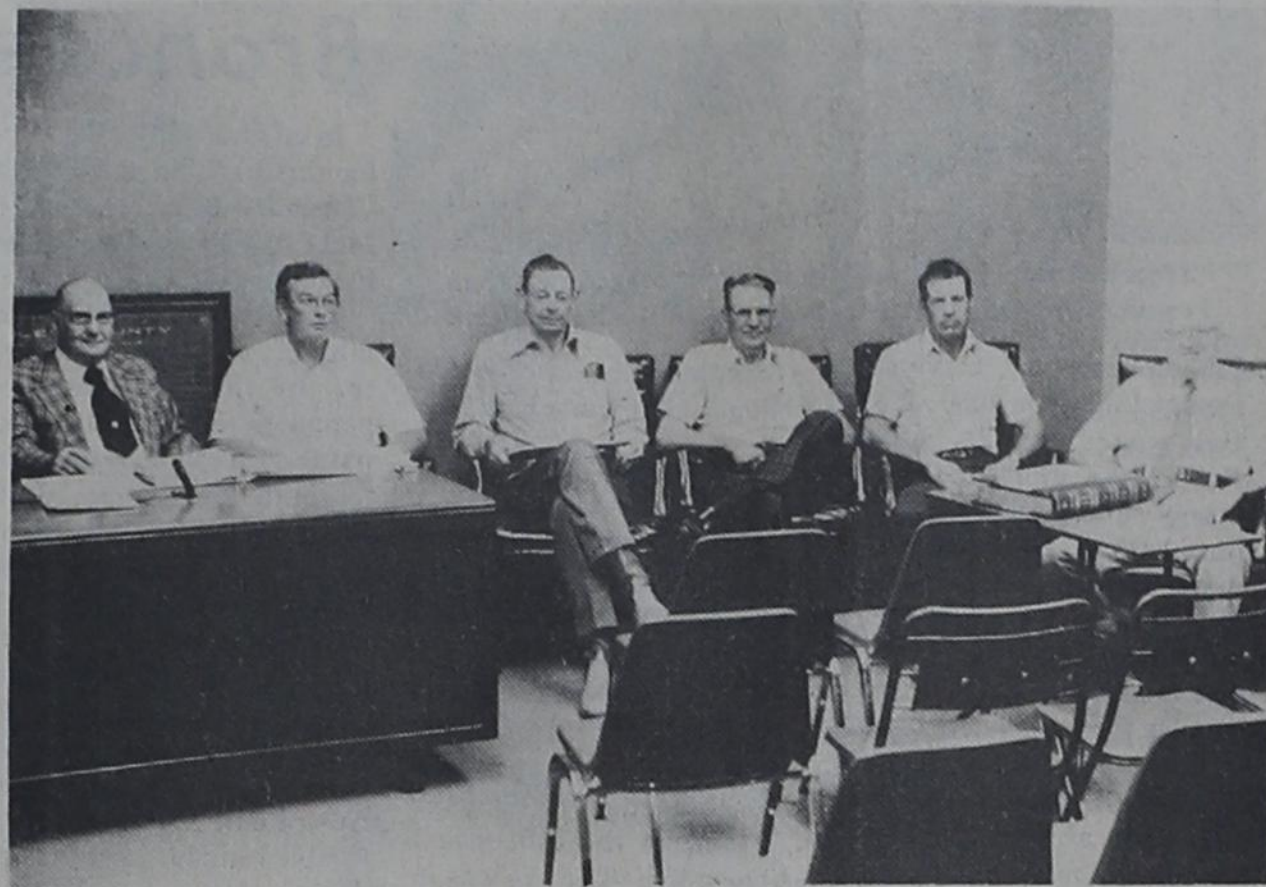

Commissioners combine county funds 2 citizens show at revenue sharing hearing

Only two persons appeared before the Donley County Commissioners Court Wednesday morning when a special public hearing was held to consider requests for portions of the approximately \$53,000 Donley County will receive in revenue sharing during the Entitlement IX period beginning Sept. 4.

Athlyn Estlack and Mel-

ville Mills asked the commis-

sioners to apportion a lump sum of \$300 or \$50 per month for six months for the Senior Citizens. Estlack and Mills said the money was needed to help defray the increasing cost of utilities.

"We have an allotment of so much for utilities, but it (the cost) is exceeding that,"

Estlack said. "We're draw-

ing up.

In their regular session that afternoon the commissioners considered the 1978 budget as prepared by County Judge W.R. Christal.

Bill Francis, the CPA with whom the commissioners contracted to reorganize the county's bookkeeping system, advised the commissioners to consolidate all four constitutional funds, except for 15 cents of the Road and Bridge Fund, into a single General Fund effective Jan. 1, 1978.

The 15 cents of the Road and Bridge Fund is restricted for that purpose alone, and Farm-to-Market, Lateral Road and License Registration fee monies are also restricted to road repair use.

Francis said the commissioners could include the income from license registrations and the Road and Bridge special in the Farm-to-Market fund. "Just leave the Lateral Road fund alone," he said.

Francis said the commissioners should combine all their separate funds into a single budgeted fund so that they and the voters could get a clearer picture of what the tax money is being spent on.

The Commissioners waited until 11:30 but nobody else

Local group plans town meeting

Eight Clarendon citizens met in the Hospitality Room of Farmers State Bank Thursday morning to discuss the possibility of starting town hall meetings in Clarendon.

Attending the meeting were Shirley Clifford, Beryl Clinton, Clarence Hamilton, Gerry Knight, Cynthia Manning, Leonard Selvidge, Kenneth Vaughan and Jeanice Weatherly.

The holding of local town hall meetings is part of a regional program coordinated by the West Texas Committee for Town Meeting and the Institute of Cultural Affairs in Amarillo.

According to Amy Bridgeham, an organizer of local town hall meetings who came to help Clarendon form its own meeting, all the advisors in the program are vol-

unteers like herself. Bridgeham said she had been to about 60 towns in West Texas and Oklahoma encouraging the formation of local town meetings.

A Panhandle-Plains Assembly, constituted of representatives from communities in the Panhandle and South Plains, is scheduled to meet in Amarillo Sept. 17. There the representatives will discuss with Max Sherman what further steps their individual communities can take to increase citizen involvement.

A "Statement of Practical Vision" for the Panhandle and South Plains will be printed reflecting what the town meetings have revealed about the future of West Texas towns.

Bridgeham described the

usual first town hall meeting as one taking three to four hours and best tied in with some other event in which the whole community will be interested such as a barbecue or a play.

The "business" segment of the get-together, guided by two "neutral" advisors, is of two parts: Session 1,

emphasizing a positive approach, inquires into what are the most common aspirations of the entire community. Session 2, called the "focus session," involves separating the general meeting into small discussion groups, where each group writes a list of from 10 to 20 "clear challenges."

After that, the general group reconvenes to write proposals suggesting ways to meet the challenges.

Bridgeham said she hoped that Clarendon could have its town hall meeting Sept. 10 so that local representatives could be chosen then for the Sept. 17 Amarillo meeting.

However, some of the Clarendon citizens at the meeting said they did not believe a workable town hall meeting could be gotten together in Clarendon on such short notice. They told Bridgeham that they were not sufficiently representative of the town to set one up themselves.

Also, some of the citizens expressed concern that the people of Clarendon might erroneously suppose that the organizations the attendees represented in their daily occupations were the ones sponsoring the idea.

Concern was expressed, too, that if people got the impression that any particular group was sponsoring the town hall meeting other groups might feel they were not expected to attend. In particular, although Clarendon as a city might hold the town meeting, at least some of the subjects that might be brought up as challenges and proposals at the meeting could be of concern to Donley County as a whole.

A couple of the citizens at the meeting asked Bridgeham how a town hall meeting could be kept on a positive, rational level and not be turned into a confrontation.

Bridgeham said that confrontations in town hall meetings are avoided because of two factors: (1) the way the format is organized; i.e. by breaking into smaller groups to write challenges and by narrowing down general hopes as expressed by individuals into related, practical projects, and (2) the roles played by the "neutral" advisors who come in to help. ("Their purpose is to hold that meeting together," Bridgeham said.)

It was finally decided to hold another preliminary meeting and invite key individuals representative of as many groups in the city as possible. The second meeting is scheduled for 6:00 tonight, Thursday, Sept. 8, in Clarendon City Hall.

Agent warns of insect, worm dangers

All owners of horses in Donley County should make sure their horses, especially colts, have been vaccinated for encephalitis, warns County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

"The above average rainfall during August has caused an increase in the mosquito population in the Panhandle," Gooch said.

"Just in the last couple of

weeks I have noticed more mosquitoes out in the evening," he said.

Gooch said he had also seen an increase in boll worms the last two weeks. "The boll worms are not a serious problem yet," Gooch said, "but they bear watching."

Corn ear worms have also been noticed in the head of sorghum plants. "The far-

mers who are producing sorghum might want to check their fields to make sure they're not getting some head damage from this particular worm," Gooch said.

Any area farmers who believe their crops are being infested by boll worms or corn ear worms should contact Ron Gooch at the County Extension Office 874-2141.

'I'll take time!' Retired teacher values memories

"Maybe I was just lucky, but I always seemed to get the cream of the crop," retired math and history teacher Joseph Monroe Baker said of the students whom he instructed during the 50 years of his teaching career.

Although born in Lampasas, Texas, Baker moved

at an early age with his family to the Indian Territory. He attended South Eastern State Teachers College at Durant for two years, North Texas State College for two summers and one summer at Abilene Christian before he received his bachelor of science degree in social sciences with

a minor in math at West Texas State College.

Baker began teaching in Bryan County, Okla., in 1916 and continued there for ten years. In 1926 Baker and his wife of six years, Mittie Elizabeth, decided they wanted to return to their native state. While visiting his wife's parents in Memphis in that year he met Theodore Smith who was campaigning for the position of superintendent of schools in Hall County.

"How do you think you'd like to teach out in this country?" Smith asked Baker.

"Well, I like this country real fine," Baker replied.

"Well, they need a superintendent over in Eli," Smith said. "You go over there tomorrow and apply to the president of the school board."

"I might just do that," Baker said.

"No might about it. You go over there and apply," Smith countered.

Baker followed through on Smith's suggestion and was hired as Giles' superintendent over 14 other applicants. That was the beginning of his Texas teaching career and the first of several practically shoe-in jobs.

Baker taught four years at

Eli before moving to Giles in Donley County in 1930. After five years in Eli, Sloan Baker, the Donley County school superintendent at the time, asked J.M. Baker to move down to Smith, where he remained for five years.

"Roosevelt's farm program caused a lot of the smaller farmers to go out of business about that time," Baker said. "What students we had at Smith were transferred to Memphis, so I came back to Giles and taught three years more."

Those were the dust bowl years. Baker said that, despite the Depression, the children of that time seem to him to have been the happiest he ever knew.

"They didn't have much," he said, "but, I'll say this, you never saw a happier bunch of children any place than those children back in the dust bowl days. It seemed like what they got they appreciated; they were glad to have what they had and they took care of it. They'd get out to play when the play period time came and they'd have a big time, everybody in a good humor."

Giles was consolidated with Hedley in 1944, and Baker went to Hedley as principal in the grade school and as math and history teacher in the junior and senior high schools.

It's primarily the students he had at Hedley whom he remembers best, he said, because he still receives visits from some of them. Two of them are themselves now teaching in the Hedley school: Glindol Holland is the high school principal and John Leggett teaches history there.

Baker said he had many outstanding students in his 50 years of teaching, but the first one that comes to his mind is David Boliver. "David did all his junior high math and his senior high math under me," Baker said. "That boy was as near a genius in mathematics as I ever had. When David was a junior in high school he came to me one day and said, 'Mr. Baker, I'm thinking about taking a couple of courses this summer by correspondence from Texas Tech.' "I said, 'That's just fine. What are you going to take?' "He said, 'I'm going to take trig and physics. Do you reckon I can make it?' "I said, 'Boy, that's just right down your alley.' "He said, 'Well, if I get balled up this summer, do you reckon you'd have time to help me?' "I said, 'I'll take time.' "That boy came to me one time for a little help," Baker said.

Boliver went on to Texas Tech and then to Rutgers for his master's and doctor's degrees. Now he is professor

of mathematics at Trenton College, New Jersey, Baker said.

"I had a girl student who came as near being a model student as a teacher ever had. Today she is the Home Ec teacher down at Gainesville High School. Her name was Mary Alice Hunsaker. She wrote me a letter about how she owed everything she had done to the influence I had over her while she was in school. I answered her letter. I said, 'No, Mary Alice, you

had the potential to begin with. All I did was to help you develop that talent that God gave you."

Baker said he never had any problem keeping his students' attention. "If a teacher will just add a little bit of humor every day in each one of the classes, that'll get their attention quicker than anything."

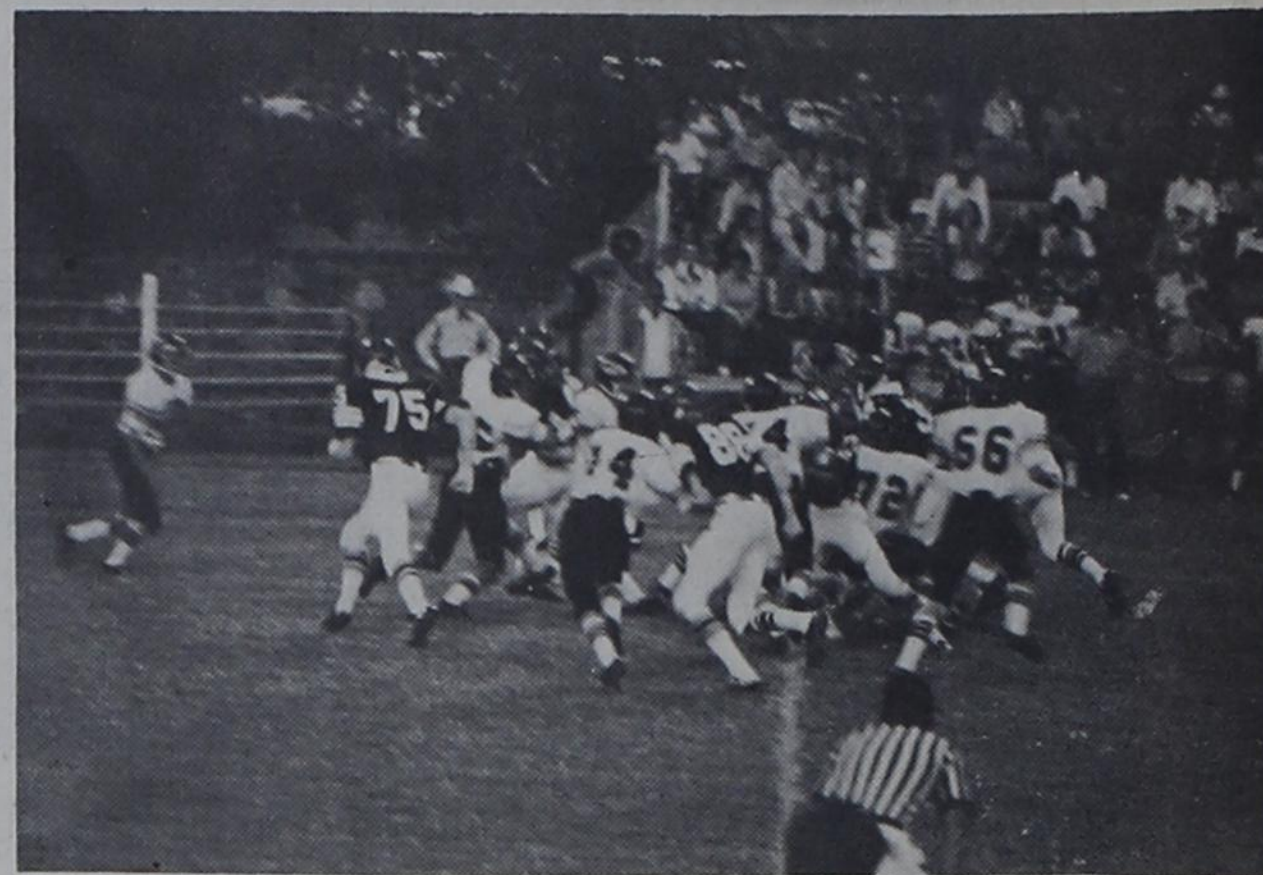
"I'd pull a little clean joke on them. Lots of times it would have something to do with their school work."

Baker believes that the essential problem of modern teaching is caused by two factors: neglect of the basic skills and inadequate discipline at home.

"What I mean by the basics is reading, writing and arithmetic," Baker said. "About a year or two before I retired they came out with this idea of modern math. I introduced it over here at Hedley High School, and a lot of that was just a puzzle to the students. We'd take up different bases, but these children had been brought up on base 10. Well, base 7 was just a puzzle, and it took those children a long time to understand that."

Baker said he never had a serious discipline problem because all the children knew him and knew he would treat them right. "I bet you couldn't find a student out of all these students I've taught that wouldn't say I've always treated them right," he said. "But I have had to spank a few of them. Ninety-nine per cent of the students who have had the right kind of discipline in the home, who are taught what is right and what is wrong, who are forced to obey the regulations in the home won't give you any trouble in the school. I've spanked a bunch of children, but only when I had already exhausted all other means of reaching them."

Baker retired in 1966 after 49 years of teaching and continued to teach one more year as a substitute. Of his life's work Mr. Baker said, "I didn't make too much money. Teachers seldom do. But I'll always treasure that experience of helping those children grow. I wouldn't trade it for a million dollars."

Broncs swamp Tigers 49 - 0

In an unusually long game for this early in the season, Clarendon Broncos beat the McLean Tigers 49 - 0 last Friday night.

The two hour and 15 minute game owed its length to the high number of penalties and uncompleted passes. The total of penalties for both teams was 13. 60 yards against Clarendon and 55 against McLean. 1 of 11 passes and McLean. 1 of 11.

Clarendon Head Coach Jerry Wilson attributed the score to two factors. The first, he said, was McLean's frustration. "They had seven fumbles and just couldn't get their offense moving," Wilson said.

The second factor, Wilson said, was that Clarendon's defense gave the offensive team good field position.

"Ken Shelton did an excellent job as defensive

tackle," Wilson said. "He only played a quarter and a half and had 3 unassisted tackles, 5 assisted, 2 quarterback sacks and caused one fumble."

Wilson also complimented Billy Gardner on his running and quarterback Dan Brandes and Gary McClellan for their performances in the backfield.

Wilson said he thought the most noteworthy aspect of the game was that, after working on punt blocks all week and not on punt returns, the first thing his team ran into was a punt return. He was referring to Kelly Choate's 34-yard punt return for Clarendon touchdown, the only score in the first quarter.

Wilson was glad that everybody on the Clarendon varsity squad got to play Friday night. The second

team defense played part of the third quarter and all of the fourth, while the second team offense played about two minutes of the third quarter and all of the fourth.

Clarendon's next varsity contest will be another home game, this one against White Deer Sept. 9 at 8:00 p.m.

"White Deer is a young ball club," Wilson said. "Only two of their defensive and one of their offensive starters are back for a second year. They have 34 boys out for football with an average weight of probably 165 across the line and 150 in the backfield," Wilson said.

The Clarendon junior varsity team plays Claude this evening (Thursday, Sept. 8) at 6:30 in Claude.

On Saturday, Sept. 10, the freshman team will play Panhandle at Panhandle starting at 10:30 a.m.

A free 64-page booklet dealing with the many tax situations faced by farmers is available free from most Internal Revenue Service offices.

"Farmer's Tax Guide," IRS Publication 225, covers numerous tax facets of agriculture, including crop destruction, sod sales,

drought sales, poultry purchases and the Federal Highway Use Tax.

Also included in the publication are instructions for use by farmers in completing Form 1040 and related schedules, a listing of the important tax dates which affect farmers during

the course of the year, and several useful tips on how a good recordkeeping system can help a farmer insure that he or she takes advantage of all legal deductions.

WHAT IS THE CHURCH? IS IT NECESSARY? IS IT A DENOMINATION? IS IT AN INVISIBLE FEDERATION OF ALL DENOMINATIONS? CAN A PERSON BE SAVED WITHOUT BEING A MEMBER OF ANY CHURCH? WHAT DOES CHRIST HAVE TO DO WITH THE CHURCH, IF ANYTHING? IF CHRIST IS THE SAVIOUR, WHY BELONG TO A CHURCH ANYWAY? ACTUALLY...

IS THE CHURCH Really IMPORTANT?

Only one book in the world, the Bible, can teach us accurately and fully about this widely misunderstood subject, the church. To clearly understand the church one must first clearly understand two principles relating to the church.

The first principle is that Jesus Christ, and not man, was the builder, founder, head, and foundation of the church (Matthew 16:18; Ephesians 1:22; 1 Corinthians 3:11).

The second principle to understand is that the word church means "the called out"—referring to those individuals who have been called out of the world through the gospel and have been redeemed by the blood of Christ (Acts 2:47; 2 Thessalonians 2:14; 1 Peter 1:18,19).

The church is therefore the spiritual domain made possible, or purchased by, the blood of Christ (Acts 20:28; 1 Corinthians 6:19,20). This relationship is also described as the spiritual body of Christ (Ephesians 1:23; Colossians 1:18,24) and also as the kingdom of Christ (Colossians

1:13; Hebrews 12:28). When a person is baptized "into Christ" (Romans 6:3), he is at the same time baptized into the church of Christ (Acts 2:38-41), the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:13), and the kingdom of Christ (John 3:3-5). These are not three different organizations, but simply three different designations of the same spiritual fellowship in which Christ saves.

Therefore, all who have been redeemed by the blood of Christ are, without any choice, members of Christ's church or body or kingdom.

Does, then, one have to be a member of Christ's church or spiritual body or kingdom to be saved? While many will say "No" through misunderstanding, the Word of God teaches plainly that the church is that spiritual body which Christ will save (Ephesians 5:23). It necessarily follows that if a person wants to be a part of the spiritual body which Christ will save he must, therefore, be a member of Christ's church.



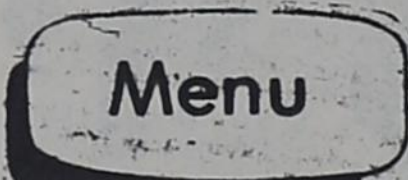

Three sisters tour parts of Alaska

Three widowed sisters, Henrietta Salmon of Clarendon, Caroline Bullock of Fayetteville, Ark., and Grace Baker of Clovis, N. Mex., 64, 66 and 68 respectively, flew to Fairbanks, Alaska for a vacation.

Two weeks were spent touring parts of Alaska. They saw the Fair at Fairbanks and saw a 70-pound cabbage.

They enjoyed a picnic at Mt. McKinley but did not go up the slope because of the snow and cold temperature there.

A four-hour boat ride up the Tananna River gave them an opportunity to see the beauty of the green countryside and the wild animals. When the boat made a stop at a cabin, they saw the oldest Eskimo in the settlement and he showed the group how to dry and smoke meat from animals and wild game birds. He used the same primitive method his ancestors employed, by cutting strips to hang on a wooden rack to dry and then hanging in a "smoke house" to cure by

smoking.

Fish traps were fashioned out of dead tree trunks with nets attached to Y's in the branches. Sometimes they had to quit fishing early and bring the large quantity of fish to the cabin.

Storing the cured meat was another interesting thing for the women. Very long poles were set in the ground with small houses at the top, far from the ground to keep predators from stealing the meat and to keep it from being covered by the deep winter snow.

Houses were covered by pieces of the tundra, much as adobe buildings are covered with sod, and bright flowers grew on the house tops, as well as the yards.

Two hundred miles of the pipeline were on a drive the ladies made and they took pictures along the way. They also looked at the glaciers and the muddy water their movement caused in the rivers.

The three ladies who made the trip were the Eden sisters.

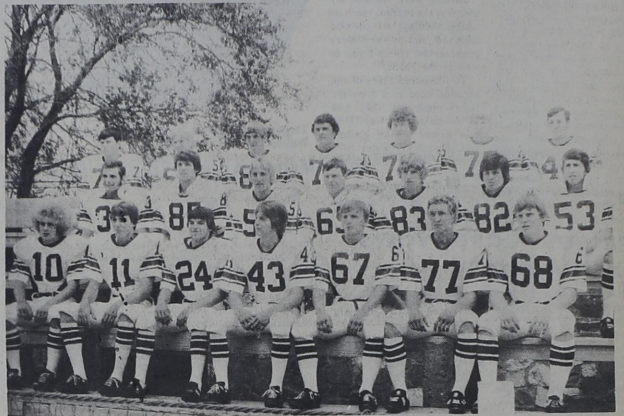

On the other hand, too much television -- and unmonitored television, -- can be a form of destructive play. If children are allowed to watch all kinds of programs, they see great amounts of the negative -- at a time of major development

in their lives. They may be exposed to an over-emphasis on crime, terror and the abnormal. Television "overtime" tends to interfere with family time together -- and thus, relationships. It can rob children of eating and sleeping time, too.

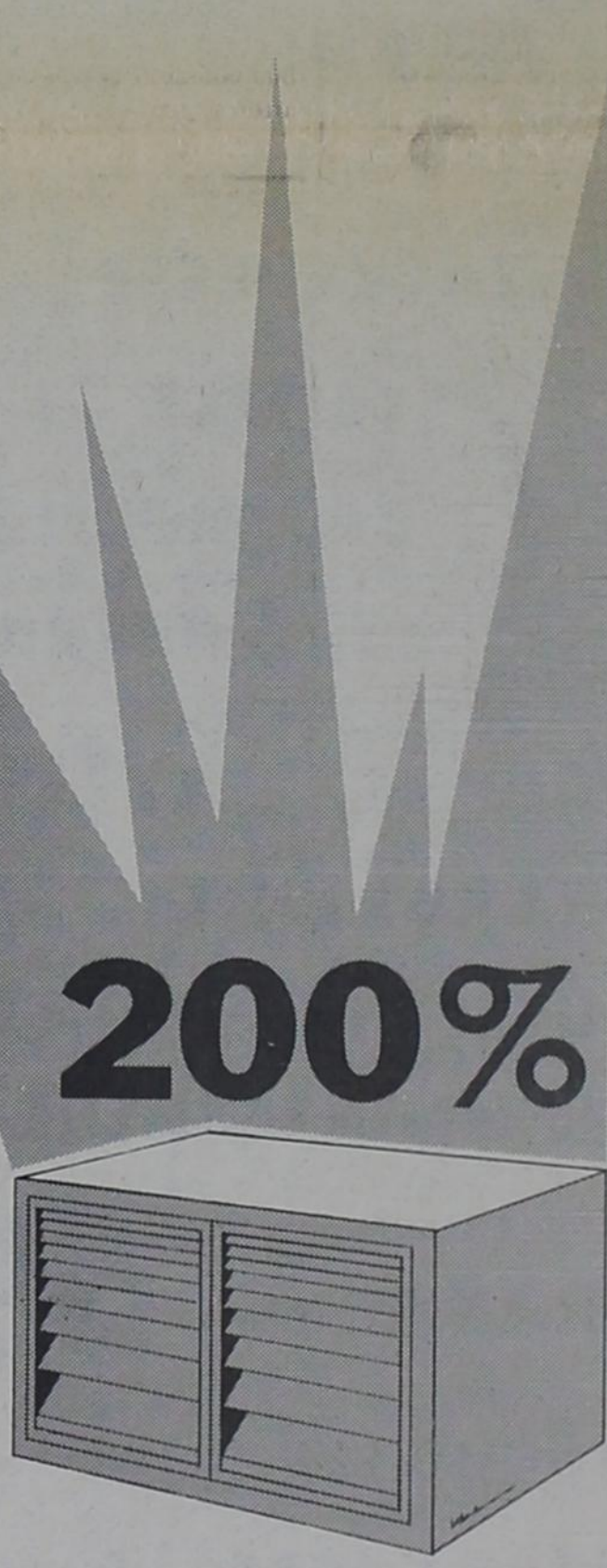

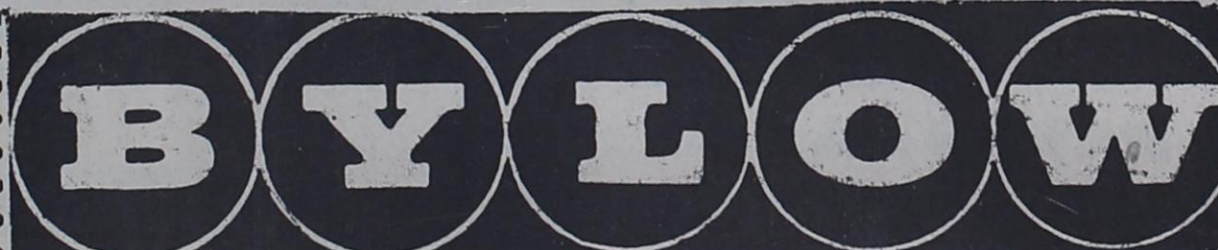
