Roughriders prove Rough

Friday night the Clarendon Bronchos visited Boys Ranch. The Roughriders proved to be more than the Bronchos could handle as they defeated the Bronchos by a margin of 21-16. This is the second defeat the Bronchos have suffered. The game was hampered by fumbles (4) and injuries. Fullback and middle line backer John Hall did not play any of the second half as a result of an injury he received the last play of the first half. Corky Patterson, Johnny Shields, Gary Thomas, Dan Hall, and Barry Hightower all suffered injuries.

The Roughriders won the opening toss and elected to receive. On the ensuing kickoff Roughrider Joe Maloy ran the ball back to the Broncho 49 yard line. From this point it took the 'Riders only 8 plays to get their initial touchdown with Jimmy Bryant carrying the ball the final 2 yards. Curt Conner was successful in his PAT kick. With a little less than 3 minutes off the clock, the Clarendon team knew

that they were going to have a tough night.

The Bronchos managed to return the Roughriders' boot 20 yards before being halted. John Hall, Billy Gardner, and Keith each helped move the ball down field where Hall lunged 4 yards to cross the goal line. Clarendon had taken 12 plays, yielding 6 first downs, to reach paydirt. Hall kicked the PAT and the score was knotted at 7 with 5 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

Boys Ranch decided against a run-back so they downed Hall's kick-off in the end zone. Unable to pick up their first down from the twenty, the 'Riders were forced to punt the ball away and the Bronchos once again had possession. The first quarter ended with the score still 7-7.

The first play of the second quarter found quarterback Dan Brandes caught behind the line of scrimmage for a 3 yard loss. It was fourth down with about 13 yards needed for the first down and about 14 yards for a touchdown. The Bronchos opted to try for

a field goal. Hall booted the pigskin through the uprights for the 3 points that put the Clarendon Bronchos ahead for the first and only time in the game, 10-7.

The remaining minutes of the first half saw the ball trade teams several times with neither team gaining points. The half ended with Clarendon earning 137 yards on the ground and 72 through the air for a total of 209 yards. Boys Ranch had 73 yards on the turf and 25 yards passing for a total effort of 98 yards.

The Bronchos were unable to move the ball on their first possession of the second half so Irvin Thomas punted, making the goal line 30 yards farther for the 'Riders. Broncho defense held fast and Boys Ranch punted to the Broncho 5-yard line where a run-back was attempted. The Roughriders made the hit and the ball jarred loose with the 'Riders covering it. The Broncho goal line defense rose to the occasion. They not only held the Ranch, they pushed the ball back to almost the Con't on page 4.

15-yard line. The fourth down effort saw quarterback Rattan try a touchdown pass which was batted down by Broncho Kelly Choate. The Bronchos took over on the seven but lost the ball mid-field on downs. Driving to the Broncho 5, Bryant fumbled the ball and Broncho Keith Topper immediately pounced on it. The next play saw the Bronchos give up the ball on the 20 by a fumble. This time Rancher Buster King capitalized on the opportunity and ran in from the 9-yard line for a six pointer. The extra point try was blocked. The third period ended with the

Roughriders ahead 13-10. Midway through the fourth quarter Maloy went in from 1 yard out for the Riders third score. A fake kick allowed Boys Ranch to make 2 points to go with their final TD. The Bronchos had 6:18 left in which to get on top of the now 21-10 ballgame. With slightly less than 2 minutes remaining, the Bronchos scored on a pass from quarterback Brandes to Gary McClellan which moved the ball 65 yards to pay dirt. The Bronchos tried for 2 extra points but were stopped. An on-side kick didn't go as planned and the Riders took possession on the Broncho 35. They ran out the clock insuring their second victory

of this season. They had lost 2 earlier games. The Bronchos are now 2-2 with always tough Childress their opponent next Friday at the Bobcat Stadium. The game will kick-off at 8:00 p.m.

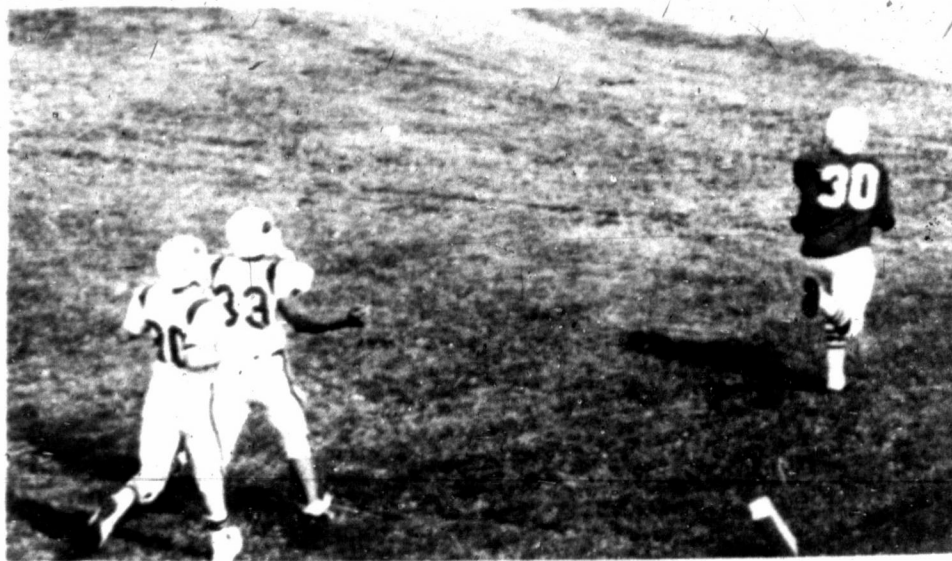

The Clarendon defense, who stopped Valley cold after the first series, quickly covered a fumble to set up the second touchdown.

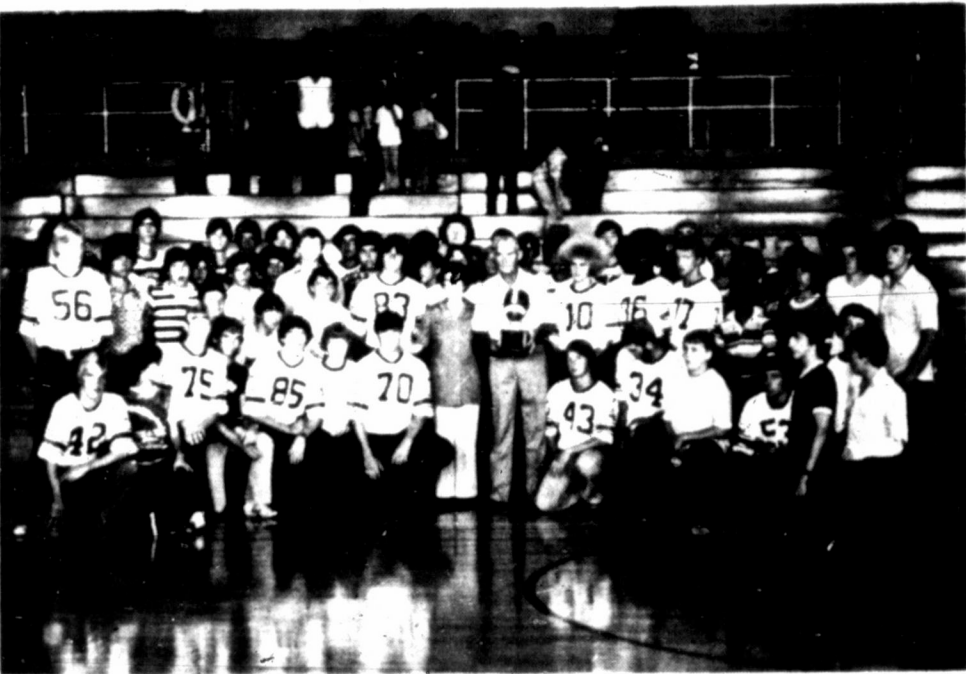
Tommy Lowe scored the TD from 4 yards out and Bobby Weatherton ran the conversion to make the score 16 - 0, at half time.

Low interest disaster loans to be available

Disaster victims will be able to get long-term loans from the U.S. Small-Business Administration at greatly reduced interest rates.

"President Jimmy Carter's action, in signing HR 692, substantially benefits Americans who suffer loss or damage to their businesses or homes," District Director Philip J. O'Jibway said.

"Specifically, interest rates on physical disaster loans to homeowners is reduced to one percent on the first \$10,000, three percent on the next \$30,000 and six and five-eighths percent thereafter," O'Jibway said. "Interest on physical disaster loans for businesses would be reduced to three percent on the first \$250,000, and would be six and five-eighths percent thereafter," he continued.

Interest rates on economic injury disaster loans for businesses will be reduced to

three percent on the first \$25,000 and six and five-eighths percent for up to thirty years.

Other important provisions of the bill, which amends the Small Business Act and the Small Business Investment Act, include authorization for SBA to make regular business loans to small homebuilders, displaced business loans to small homebuilders, displaced business loans to business owners affected by construction projects of a state or local public entity, and economic injury loans even though a natural disaster is not sufficient for a disaster declaration. It also grants SBA greater authority to determine whether a small business concern can perform a specific government contract.

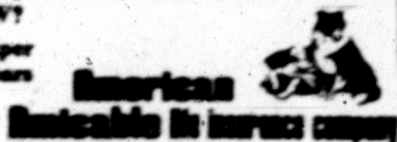

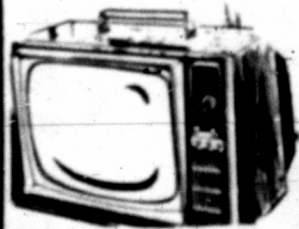

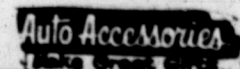

Construction shows Clarendon's progress By Jeanice Weatherly

Building permits issued to date this month total \$76,200 according to records at city hall.

Two new houses account for the figure: Bell & Bell Builders of Amarillo, permit for \$31,200 dated September 15 is for a home to be built at 1506 West 6th for Todd Knorpp. The other permit, dated September 21, for \$45,000 is for a house to be constructed at West 7th and 700 S. Jefferson for Troy Skinner. W.W. Lovelady, Clarendon, is contractor.

This month a number of property owners are adding storm windows, storm doors, weatherstripping, insulation, and other energy saving items before winter arrives.

Although this is a seasonal procedure with householders (preparing for winter) there may be a tax credit for individual taxpayers who have installed certain energy saver items. Legislation is under consideration at this time to establish eligibility for the taxpayer.

The Knorpp home under construction is an "energy home" and differs from the usual construction by having 6 inches of insulation in the exterior walls, instead of three, and having 12 inches of insulation in the attic area.

Sales of storm windows and doors and related products are up as reported from J & W Lumber, with carpenters and contractors working out of the yard all busy.

A spokesman for Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber indicated their sales on such items up 15 to 20% in recent days.

In addition to the \$76,200 issued in permits this month other permits for 1977 include \$5,000 to Kenneth Morrow, \$5,500 to Donny Phillips, \$22,000 to H.R. Bright for Gibson's addition and \$7,000 to H.M. McClendon. This brings the permit total for new or additional construction to \$115,700 for the year so far.

There has been general activity in the business community of Clarendon with real estate sales, purchases, moves, remodeling and "sprucing up" which would indicate a more stable economy and confidence of business owners in the climate of economics in Clarendon.

On Kearney Street, Clarendon's main street, literally from one end to the other there is, under way or completed, some type of refurbishing in the business section. K.M. Windom is completing work on the building of his which will be

a rental storage facility at the north end of the street; at the other end, the Day Care Center renovated part of the building also housing Steve's Automotive into a mural walled, small fry oriented day nursery.

In between, the Farmers State Bank had the north wall of their building stuccoed and painted and the parking lot leveled. Paul and Elmonette Bivens moved partitions to add space and moved the prescription counter to the rear of the store, rearranged the counters and stock nearer the front, and changed the name of the store to Bivens Pharmacy.

Next door the Bob Marrs building sold to James F. Hayes, farm, ranch and mortgage broker, for offices. Repair has already been done to the roof. The Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700 bought the buildings adjacent to the Donley County State Bank and are in the process of major remodeling.

Osburn Furniture replaced the awning in front of their store and added metal siding for easier maintenance. Goodman Furniture moved to the Spier building which they purchased and did a great deal of changing; redesigning the front of the showroom, moving partitions, adding a new roof and installing an overhead freight door at the side. Jack Clifford purchased the building vacated by Goodman's.

Henson's remodeled too; adding an office for the bookkeeping department and wood paneling to the showroom. Four new sections of shelving are now accommodated and carpeting will complete the current project.

Barbara's Fabric added shelves and a partition for a ceramics studio in the rear of her store. Bain's improvements were to basic structural needs in their building and not readily seen. Pauline Morris, Public Accountant, did interior changes with the addition of lowered ceilings, heat and

air, and partitioning to divide the space into several offices.

City offices were moved from the red brick building on West 7th, after major changes and remodeling to the ground level of the city hall building on highway 287.

Texas Saddlery, Skinner Enterprises, purchased the property vacated by city hall and became another manufacturing firm in Clarendon. The business, made changes to accommodate a three ton lift, freight elevator, moved walls for easy movement of supplies and merchandise, built a loading dock and installed a number of electrical outlets. This expenditure amounted to \$18,000 to \$20,000 and was correlated by Troy Skinner, one of the three Skinner officers of the firm. The other two are Gary and Sam Skinner.

County offices also had some changes with the City-County Library and Home Economist-County Extension Agent offices relocating in newly repainted space in the old court house. The county purchased a building with plans to remodel for use by the Justice of the Peace.

Acreage opened for development

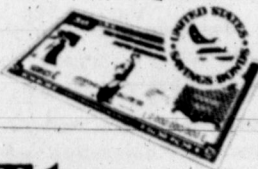

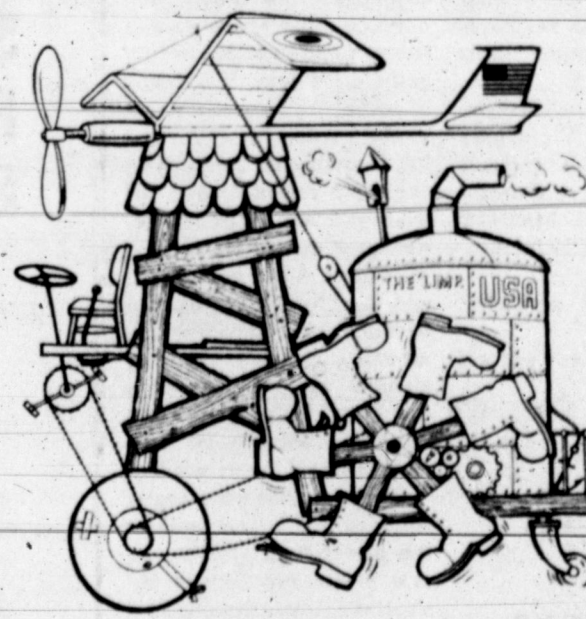

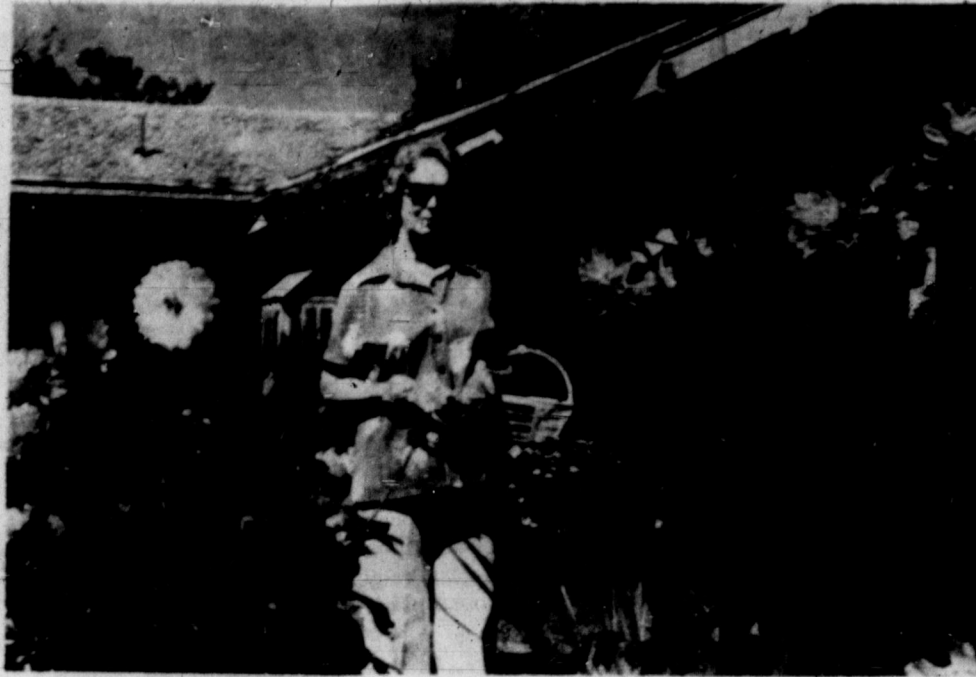

Mrs. Christal enjoys gardening

Mrs. Gertrude Christal enjoys sharing with others her knowledge of raising flowers and of maintaining a beautiful garden that stays beautiful the year round. She attributes her success to lots of hard work, to the use of organics, and to tender loving care.

Mrs. Christal explains that Judge Christal does most of the digging and heavy work while she sets out the bedding plants, waters, and does light hoeing. Fifteen to twenty minutes every day once the beds have been initially prepared is the amount of time she generally devotes to her garden.

Preparing the beds begins when the annuals have received a good freeze. The soil is roto-tilled and organic compost mixed in. The organics commonly used include bone meal, cotton seed meal, blood meal and ashes. "It takes about seven years for the use of these organics to begin to pay off," said Mrs. Christal. The last of Oct. into Dec. is a suitable time to set out bulbs for spring flowers. Little care is given the garden during winter months except perhaps water on pretty days.

Mrs. Christal explains that flowers bloom in her garden the year round in the following sequence. Beginning with crocus in January, jonquils, lilies, iris, peonies, oriental poppies, daisies, roses, day lilies, perennial phlox, gladiolas, cannas, dahlias, and mums. For color all summer annuals such as petunias, marigolds, and periwinkles are good. Color contrasts may be achieved by the use of silver king, dusty miller, larches ear and sweet alyssum. A variety of plants such as babies breath and fountain grass add interest and shade for smaller flowers. Ground cover such as sedum and hosta hold soil where it tends to wash and provides beauty at the same time. As a means of adding additional interest to the garden Mrs. Christal has blooming shrubs such as crepe myrtles, rose of sharon, lilacs, mock orange, nandenas; potted plants such as caladiums and geraniums; and also, hanging baskets of fern and jew. Heavenly blue morning glories running along a white lattice fence and a bird bath situated at a prominent focal point help complete this lovely garden.

Grass that has been neatly trimmed and edged outlines the flower beds. Each year new plants and flowers are experimentally planted. This year Mrs. Christal had luck

with delphiniums which normally aren't acclimated to this area. Also, Zoysia grass in plugs has been sodded. Zoysia has numerous advantages, explains Mrs. Christal. It retains a dark green color, holds its shape well, is hearty, requires little water, and needs few trimmings.

Mrs. Christal takes pride in her lovely place by providing the tender loving care so necessary to plants. She dreams each year of a

garden more beautiful than the year before, and carefully plans for new plants. Gardening is a hobby the Christals share and enjoy together, but one of the

greatest joys they receive from their own garden is being able to share it with others.

A visit to this lovely home, to sit on the porch swing and visit and view the garden, listening to the song of the birds and seeing an occasional squirrel dance by is time well spent. It has been said, "One is nearer God's heart in a garden than any place else in the world."

Clarendon is fortunate indeed to have these lovely folks who contribute so much to the community. Judge Christal serves as County Judge, while Mrs. Christal makes a home each day become more beautiful than the day before.

"I have announced my candidacy for Governor of Texas. I'm confident I can and will win."

According to a statewide poll, 6 out of 10 people are ready for a new governor. The poll only confirmed what I've been hearing all over Texas this year. People are against the idea of anyone holding the state's highest office for 10 years. No governor has asked for 10. No governor has been given 10. There are other reasons folks are ready for a new governor. State spending has jumped from \$3 billion to \$8 billion the last 6 years. He's vetoed less than two-tenths of one percent of the two previous budgets and not one penny's worth of the current appropriations; it's the first time that's happened in twenty years. And, while we've heard the boast of "no new taxes," we've seen our property taxes increase by \$1 billion along with substantial hikes in state licensing fees.

"I've traveled the state this year, visiting with folks. Whatever their overall assessment, most Texans lacked confidence in the present governor's persuasiveness and vision. They felt he had failed to measure up to their expectations and to live up to his promises."

"Texans are hungry for an effective gubernatorial spokesman on energy policy. They are frustrated that our governor hasn't been able to get the Texas viewpoint across in Washington. They are wondering, too, why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleaguered farms and ranches."

"I fully agree with the people's assessment; that's why I'm seeking the office of Governor."

"I'm proud of my record as Attorney General and Secretary of State. It shows that I'm not afraid to roll up my sleeves and work hard. It indicates that I have the ability to assemble a capable staff, that I prefer to work closely with people, and that I'm not reluctant to make changes when they can benefit the state. I'll be this kind of governor, given the job."

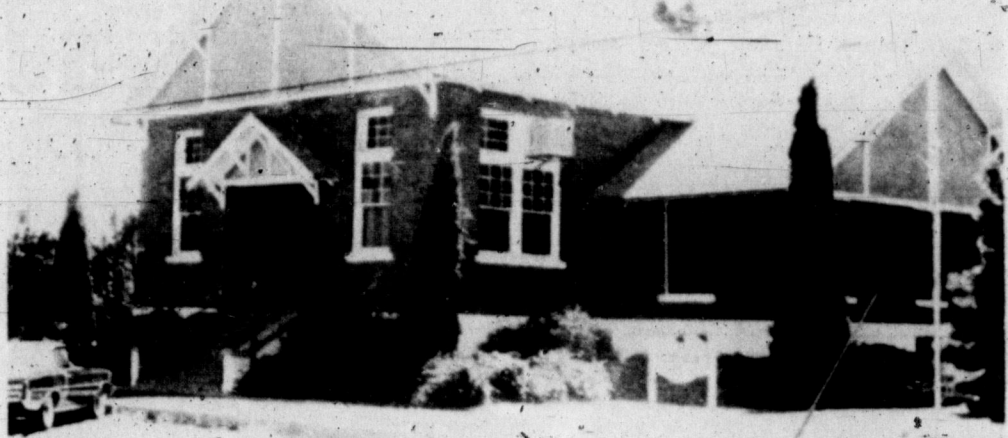

The daring accomplishments of Emanuel Dubbs

Emanuel Dubbs was an Indian fighter, buffalo hunter, circuit judge and Christian preacher in Donley Co. during its founding days some one hundred years ago. He was born Mar. 21, 1843 and reared in Stark Co., Ohio on a farm. At the age of eighteen Dubbs joined the Union Army and served four years until wounds received forced him home. At home in Ohio he married, and in 1871 went by way of covered wagon to Kansas. In Kansas, Dubbs worked for the Kansas-Pacific Railroad Co. doing grading work.

In 1874 Dubbs joined the buffalo hunting party of A.C. Myers & Charles Rath. This group traveled to Adobe Walls. From Adobe Walls, Dubbs and his hunting outfit, which consisted of three men plus Dubbs, one four-mule team, six yoke of oxen, and one hundred supply wagons, pulled away from the main hunting group and moved south. They made camp at the site of present day Lelia Lake. Within three weeks, the four hunters had more than 1,000 buffalo hides. These hides then were worth \$2.50-\$3.50 each. Being proud of their accomplishment as successful hunters the men loaded their wagons to limit and started toward Adobe Walls. En route to Adobe Walls Indians attacked and killed one of the hunters. In escape, Dubbs rode his horse to its death and completed the journey to Adobe Walls on foot carrying only a saddle.

In June of the same year, 1874, some 700 Indians led by Chief Quannah Parker raided and attacked the twenty-nine hunters and merchants camped at Adobe Walls. Dubbs again narrowly escaped, and his dislike for the Indian foe magnified. These encounters caused Dubbs to join Gen. Nelson A. Miles. With him they fought the redskins in Palo Duro Canyon, until the marauders, humiliated with defeat and threatened with the bitterness of winter, retreated to reservations.

In the year of '78 Dubbs settled with his family near Ft. Elliott. Here he farmed, hunted animals of the wild, and sold produce to citizens and officers of Ft. Supply. In 1879, Dubbs was elected first county judge of Wheeler Co. receiving \$400.00 per year salary and although he had no formal training as a judge, he stood for right and justice. At the time Wheeler Co. was

organized twenty-six counties were attached to Wheeler Co. for judicial purposes, and one of the twenty-six was Donley.

Serving as a circuit judge April 11, 1882, Dubbs presided when the first appointed officials of Donley Co. were sworn in. Those officers were G.A. Brown, judge; B.H. White, treasurer; Jim Oty, tax assessor; J.H. Parks, surveyor; and Chas. Goodnight, Leigh Dyer, and S.B. Nall commissioners. It was not until '84 the first official election was held.

By 1898, Dubbs and his family had moved from Wheeler to Clarendon. In Clarendon Dubbs preached for the Christian Church and served a large portion of the Panhandle area as an evangelist. All denomina-

tions turned out to hear him as he preached in dug outs, school houses, and brush arbers. He baptized mass numbers in lakes and helped to establish churches.

Dubbs died April 23, 1932 and is buried in Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon. There are some who remember him. They remember him as a genuine cowboy and as a preacher who could never see why people did not accept Christianity as wholeheartedly as he.

Donley Co. owes much to men like Dubbs who virtually reclaimed her great land from savagery and opened her land up to settlement by buffalo hunters and pioneers. These men braved so many dangers, but they blazed the way for future progress and greatness.

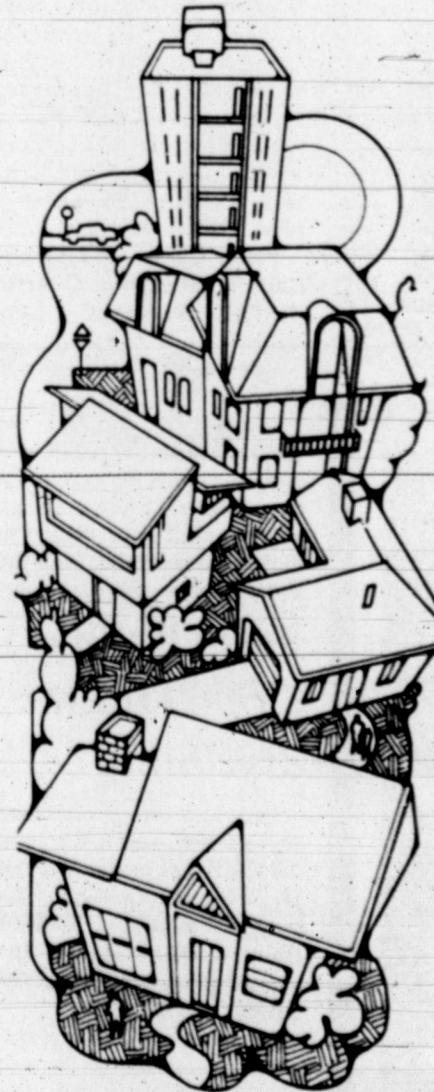
