

One-Act Plays due here

Clarendon High School students begin Interscholastic League competition here Monday with the presentation of District 2-A One-Act play competition.

Seven area schools will enter the competition set to begin at 2 p.m. Monday in Clarendon College's Harned Sisters Auditorium. Four schools will present their play entries during the afternoon. Following their presentations there will be a break with the remaining three schools set to begin productions at 6:30 that evening.

Judge for the plays will be Ronald M. Myers, head of the drama department at Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. The public is invited to attend all of the plays. A 50 cent admission fee will be charged for both the afternoon and evening productions.

Clarendon's High School's entry in the One-Act play competition will be "King of the Castle" by Nevil Martin. The play is directed by CHS speech and drama teacher Mrs. Jean Stavenhagen.

Fourteen receive credit from college last week

Thirteen student nurses along with their instructor received certificates March 18 for completing a 16 hour instructor's course in cardiopulmonary resuscitation at Clarendon College.

College Dean of Students Beryl Clinton presented each student with their certificate, the first ever issued by the college for a continuing education course.

Continuing education courses like this are designed to update professionals on current developments in their field, Clinton said. The cardiopulmonary resuscitation course was designed to teach the method of first aid endorsed by the American Heart Assn. This type of aid is concerned not only with the patient's breathing but his circulation as well when administering first aid.

Instructor for the course was Genevieve Jones, a certified registered nurse anesthetologist. Those students enrolled in the

Accident reported in Donley County during February

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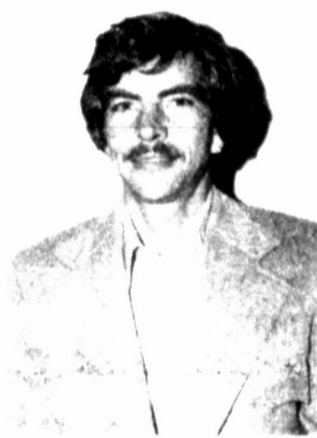

Six candidates vie for three aldermen positions -- job profiled

Three positions on Clarendon's City Council expire this year with two incumbents seeking re-election and four new candidates filing for the post.

Election for the city offices will be April 3. The two incumbent alderman up for re-election are Charles E. Deyhle and Bob Kidd. New entries in the alderman race are Kenneth Casteel, Jerrel Grant, Jimmy McElroy and Tex Selvidge.

Every two years, either three of the city council's alderman or Clarendon's mayor and the remaining two alderman serve expiring terms.

Basically, these five alderman and City Mayor 'Flip' Breedlove comprise the governing body of the city. They have two meetings each month, usually on the first and third Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m.

At least five of the six council members have to be present at these meetings for official business to be transacted. Each council member has an equal vote in city business.

General city matters handled by the council include approving payment of all city bills, setting and enforcing city policies, determining salaries for city employees, purchasing any equipment needed for city use, passing

and enforcing city ordinances, setting the city tax rate and, in general, conducting all city business.

All city business and policies set by the council are carried out by City Administrator Bud Knorpp.

Money handled by the council is set up in seven separate funds. Individually, no council member has control over any of these funds. In the handling of all city money, the council acts as a group.

These funds are budgeted by the City Administrator and this budget must be approved by the council.

The only occasion when city councilmen do not act as a group is when they are

divided into smaller committees by the mayor for some specific project. There are no permanent committees on the council.

The only salary city alderman receive is \$1 for every meeting they attend during the year. Mayor Breedlove receives \$2 per meeting.

Employees of the city include the city administrator and his secretary, three policemen, a city superintendent in charge basically of water and sanitation, four men hired to work in the sanitation department and four men who work in the city water and street department.

Incumbent Charles E. Deyhle, 51, has served on the city council since 1967. He came to Clarendon in 1951, practicing veterinary medicine here since that time. Statewide, Deyhle has been active in professional organizations, at one time serving as vice-president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Assn. Locally, he has served two terms on the Clarendon School Board and is a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Methodist Church. He and his wife Frances have four children: Mrs. Jimmy (Sandy) Hill, of Wichita Falls; Charlie, a vet. student at Texas A&M; Mrs. John (Becky) McKinley, a student at Texas Tech; and

Jenny, a CHS student. **Incumbent alderman Bob Kidd, 46,** has served at that position since 1970. He has owned and operated the Phillips 66 station on Highway 287 here for the past 16 years. Locally, Kidd is a member of the volunteer fire department and serves as secretary treasurer for the Nazarene Church. He and his wife Joan have three children: Bobbie Keith, aged 19; Doug, 17; and Kathy, 15. **Jimmy McElroy, 26,** has been manager of J.W. Lumber Co. here for the past 2 1/2 years. A 1968 graduate of Clarendon High School, McElroy currently serves as 2nd vice-president of the local volunteer fire depart-

ment. He is past president of the Clarendon Little League and is a member of the Jaycees and the First Baptist Church. He is married to the former Kathy Scitern.

Jerrel Grant, 34, began his construction business in Clarendon a year ago. Previously, he had been an independent building contractor in Houston. Locally, Grant is a member of the Clarendon Jaycees. He and his wife Barty have two sons, Cody Joe, aged 14; and Cory James, 11.

Kenneth Casteel, 33, has operated his plumbing business in Clarendon for the past three years. He moved here from Amarillo. Casteel, a native of Lakeview, is

locally a member of the Jaycees. He and his wife Rita have two daughters: Jamie Kay, aged 13; and Angie Renie, 11.

Tex Selvidge, 42, has lived in Clarendon since 1964. He was Dean of Students at Clarendon College before purchasing John's Men's Store last July. Currently, Selvidge serves as a member of Clarendon's Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. He is also a member of the local Lions Club and the Methodist Church. Selvidge has two children by a previous marriage, Chad, 14 and Shay Ann, 10. He and his wife Nancy have two children: Scott Newland, 12; and Shay Ann Newland, 8.

Clarendon Printing, Office Supply is week's feature

In Clarendon, George Wayne Estlack's printing shop goes back a long ways. His father bought out a printing shop here in the early twenties, enlarging this business a few years later to become Clarendon's second newspaper. The Donley County Leader was established officially March 12, 1929. In those days their competition was Clarendon's first newspaper, the Clarendon News, which dated its beginnings back to the late 1880s.

The same year Estlack's father established his newspaper he began working his son in their printing operation. At the time, G.W. was 12.

In 1942, Estlack's father became postmaster of Clarendon. "Then," said Estlack, "he turned the whole operation over to me. Printing, reporting and advertising." In the interim, Estlack also married his present wife, Ruby Dell. "We got married in 1936 and

she's been more or less in the business ever since."

The Donley County Leader bought out their competition in 1945, the same year they moved to the present site of Clarendon Printing and Office Supply. They published weekly for the next thirty years. In 1974 the Leader ended its 45 year history when it was purchased by the Clarendon Press.

But printing is still Estlack's business. He owns five printing presses, three letterpress type machines and two offset printers, plus an estimated 250 different varieties of type faces and sizes. Estlack said one of letterpress machines was probably built in the late 1880s.

Estlack said he learned the printing business using such a printing press. The letterpress process uses molten lead heated to 550 degrees then squeezed and cooled into lead slugs with raised letters on the edge. These letters are grouped to form words and sentences

which are arranged into a column of news type.

Printing newspapers using letterpress involved large presses to print the newspaper. This press was mounted into a pit dug into the floor of the shop. Large rolls of blank newspaper weighing over 1,200 pounds were fitted into the press by an overhead hoist still mounted to the roof of Estlack's shop.

When he sold the Leader, Estlack said he had to break down the press and sell it as junk iron simply because there is no market for these machines any longer.

Estlack keeps examples of his printing in the shop. One magazine type publication entitled "Donley County Men and Women in Service - Victory Edition, 1943," contains the pictures of local residents in the armed services at that time. Estlack said he has only a few copies of the publication left.

He also keeps old newspapers, including some back issues of his father's old newspaper rival, the Claren-

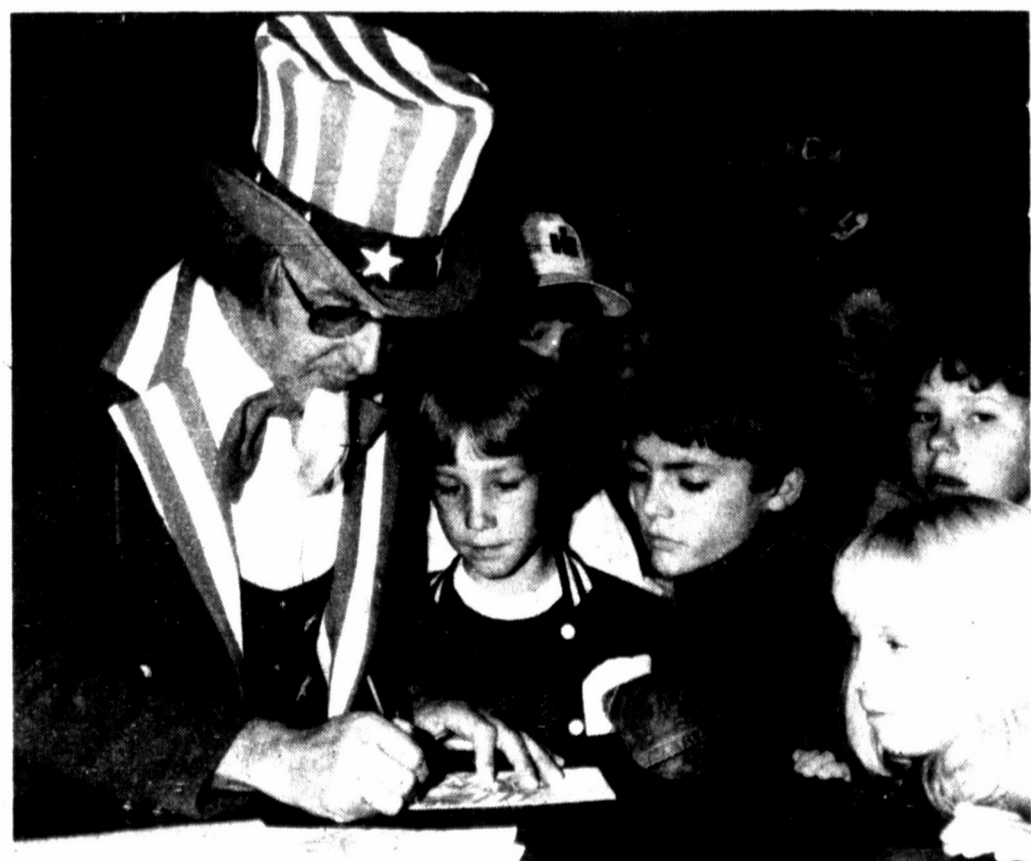
don News. One copy of the News contains the story chronicling the last hanging in Donley County, June 4, 1910, when C.R. Miller was hanged by sheriff J.T. Patman.



Parent education seminar set

AMARILLO -- A parent education seminar this Saturday at Amarillo High School Auditorium is expected to attract several hundred area community, church and school leaders.

The event, which will focus on parenting skills, teenage pregnancy, mother - infant relationships and other topics, is being offered for the public, and gets underway at 4255 Danbury at 9 a.m.

Sponsors are the Texas Home Economics Association, District J, Chapter, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Golden Spread Chapter of March of Dimes.

Presentations by two noted pediatricians and a representative of the National Center for Child Abuse in Denver, Colo. will highlight the occasion. In all, six presentations will be offered through speeches, slides and films in emphasizing the needs and importance of parent education.

According to Carolyn Osborn, District J Chairman of THEA, objectives of the seminar are to review the role of genetics in birth defects, to emphasize good nutrition in the successful outcome of pregnancy, to understand the needs of pregnant adolescents and to emphasize the importance of mother - infant relationships.

Dormant oils may control insect pests this spring

Late winter and early spring is the season to apply dormant oils for controlling some of the hard-to-kill insect pests on trees and shrubs, says Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dormant oils are specially refined petroleum oils that contain emulsifying agents which allow mixing with water. They are effective for controlling pests such as scale insects, mites, pecan phylloxera, insect eggs and hibernating caterpillars. These oils kill the egg as well as immature and adult stages of insects and mites by enveloping them in a continuous film of oil, thereby smothering and ultimately killing them.

Dormant oils have several advantages over most other insecticides, such as being less expensive, giving good covering action, leaving residues on fruit and nut trees that are exempt from tolerance, and being safe to handle. However, oils are toxic to leaves, have low toxicity to some insects, and are relatively unstable in water solutions.

A dormant oil can be used on any trees and shrubs that are in the dormant stage, points out Gooch. However, better insect control will be obtained if used in late winter or early spring just before new plant growth begins. Apply the oil when temperatures are between 40 and 65 degrees F. Do not make an application if freezing weather is expected within 48 hours after treatment.

When mixing and applying dormant oils, use only the amounts recommended by the manufacturer. Some trees tolerant to normal

application rates of oil may be damaged if excessive amounts are used. Even normal applications of oil have been noted to damage beech, sugar and Japanese maple, walnut, butternut and some spruces. Cover tree trunks and limbs thoroughly with the spray but avoid excessive application of the oils, cautions Gooch.

Styles for spring fashions predicted

Unrestricted fit and simplicity of design marks "The Classic" in fashion predictions for spring of 1976.

These were the predictions given us by Becky Culp, Clothing Specialist for Texas Agricultural Extension Service during a two-day training session in Amarillo on Feb. 10 - 11. All the District I County Extension Agents-Home Economics attended the sessions on Clothing Update for Spring. We also received training on children's wear and maternity wear.

Part of the session emphasized new program materials and teaching techniques to use in our counties in the clothing area. Rules for the 1976 4-H Dress Revue were reviewed. The Dress Revue will be held in August as the climax to clothing projects the 4-Hers will be participating in throughout the summer months. You will hear more about the dress revue as time goes on.

As you begin to think about your spring wardrobe, you may be wondering what styles and colors will be good for spring.

Along with the classic design, the suit is going to be good again this spring. Whether with skirt or pants, suits will be available as mix-and-match separates as well as in planned pairs. The full, easy shapes are similar to the big look, but less extreme. Shirt jackets, cardigans and blazers will all be seen with flared or softly gathered skirts and straight-leg pants. Suits will be seen in denim, gabardine, poplin and twill in the colors of corals and pinks, plum, jade green, blue and black and white.

The soft look, frequently called "the tube" can be worn belted or not. Soft dressing with flared or gathered skirt and feminine detailing offers a variant. Either style is easy to wear and can range from casual to dressy, depending on the fabric, color and accessories chosen. The soft look can be achieved with featherweight knits, jerseys, muslin gauzes and interlock knits. Colors range from warm sun colors to bright pastels and the dusty naturals.

The big dropped-shoulder tunic jumper will still be seen, but in a slightly slimmer version worn over tailored shirts and roll-collar sweaters. Newer is the softly tailored jumper with fitted or semi-fitted bodice and fuller skirt. Either tailored or very soft blouses complete this look. Colors and fabrics are never matched and may be only slightly coordinated. Mixes that provide visual excitement will be youthful while traditional color combinations will be used for a more elegant look. Fabrics such as denim, woven synthetics and tweeds will look good in the All-American red, white and blue.

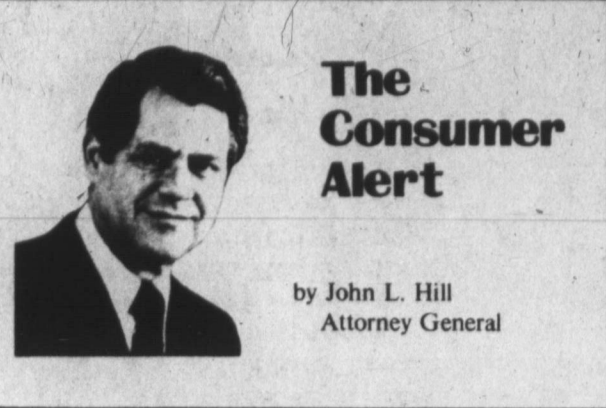

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Every day thousands of Texas consumers receive flyers and mailers proclaiming a "special sale" on one or many items. Newspapers are full of "spring specials" on everything from lawn and garden equipment to Easter dresses.

And many of these sales are advertised something like this: "Buy one for \$10, get the second one for half price," or "normally sells for \$59.99, our sale price now \$39.99."

These are price comparison advertisements, our Consumer Protection attorneys say, and they are a widely used and effective means of promoting a product.

In price comparison advertising, current prices for goods or services offered for sale to consumers are compared with previous prices, with future prices, or with other stated values. This is to show price reductions, cost savings, or sales, and is a common form of advertising.

Price comparisons that accurately reflect current market value help consumers by providing information useful in making buying decisions. But price comparisons based on inflated or arbitrary prices can be misleading, and our lawyers say, could constitute violations of the Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act, which prohibits "false or misleading statements of fact concerning the reasons for, existence of, or amount of price reductions."

They say that while most businessmen use price comparisons to advertise legitimate cost reductions, there are a few unscrupulous merchants who treat both consumers and

their competitors unfairly, by misusing price comparison advertising.

For example, they may raise the price of an attractive item, then later offer "an incredible price reduction on our most popular line of power tools."

Our lawyers say it's misleading and illegal if the seller raised his price on an item a short period before a sale, since the previous price must have been in effect for a reasonable period of time, and must have been sold regularly at that price before the sale.

Consumers should also read sale literature carefully. Phrases such as "made to sell for \$29," or "compare at \$7.99" can be meaningless. They may not mean the merchandise actually sold at that price, or that the merchant even tried to sell it at that price. Yet they give the impression that the purchaser will be getting a real bargain.

Other phrases such as "reduced from manufacturer's suggested retail price" can also be misleading if a manufacturer customarily lists an unrealistically high "suggested price" so retailers can offer what seems to be a good buy. And offering merchandise at "factory price," "dealer cost," or "wholesale" can be deceptive if the merchant's definition of "dealer cost" means what an item cost a dealer, plus his overhead, advertising costs, sales commissions, and other expenses.
