

Three Donley County communities to have elections Saturday

City alderman, city and county school trustees, Clarendon College's Board of Regents and board members of the Donley County Hospital District will be decided by Donley County voters this Saturday, April 3. Voting boxes will be set up in Clarendon, Howardwick and Hedley with each polling place opening at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and closing at 7 p.m. Saturday night. The only political races in Clarendon and Howardwick with candidates facing opposition this Saturday are city alderman elections. In Hedley, five candidates are seeking election to the three expiring school board posts. All other candidates in Saturday's election will run unopposed.

Clarendon will have ballot boxes in two locations:

Clarendon's City Hall and the Clarendon Public School's Administration Building. Voters for Clarendon's city alderman race will cast their ballots at city hall. Sam Lowry will be election judge for this race.

Six candidates are vying for three expiring positions in the alderman race. Candidates include incumbent city councilmen Charles Deyle and Bob Kidd. New

entries in the alderman race are Jimmy McElroy, Jerrel Grant, Kenneth Casteel and Tex Selvidge.

All remaining ballot boxes in Clarendon will be located at Clarendon's School Administration Building. Residents will vote to decide expiring positions on Clarendon's School Board; Donley County's School Board; Clarendon College's Board of Regents; and Donley County

Hospital District's Executive Board. Election judge at the school will be Willard Skelton.

The two incumbent candidates with expiring terms on Clarendon's school board running unopposed are James McAnear Sr., and Gene Alderson. The two trustees for Donley County's School Board, also unopposed on the ballot, are Pct. 1 trustee C.W. Estlack and

Pct. 4 trustee Billy Ray Johnston.

Three posts on Clarendon College's Board of Regents will be voted on in Saturday's election. Incumbent's R.E. Drennan and Delbert Robertson will run unopposed along with Fred Chamberlain, who filed for the remaining position.

Incumbent members of the Hospital District's Board running unopposed on Saturday's ballot are Bud

Hermesmeier, C.C. Ayers, Amsil Adamson and Vernon Berry.

Howardwick voters will have only one ballot box located in their community. Votes for Howardwick alderman will be cast at the Howardwick City Hall, with Mrs. Alfred Reynolds serving as election judge. Howardwick residents may cast their votes in the County

School Board trustee election and the Hospital District board member race at the Clarendon location.

Candidates for the three expiring Howardwick alderman terms include incumbents Neal Mann and Will Corgill. New entries in the race are Margaret Berry, Alton Hendrick, B.B. Winkels, Bill Johnson and Glen Day.

Hedley residents may vote

at the Hedley Lion's Den on main street. Three ballot boxes will be located in Hedley. Along with the unopposed incumbent Hospital District election, voters will choose winning candidates for the Hedley School Board and city alderman races. Election judge will be Ross Springer.

Running for the three expiring Hedley school board posts are incumbents Harold White and Fred Watt along with Bobby Joe Wiggins, Betty Dwight and J.D. Skaggs. In the Hedley alderman race, incumbents Henry Moore and C.L. Taylor along with J.S. Hinds and V.G. Hinds are running unopposed for the four expiring positions. Hedley Mayor D.E. Boliver is also running unopposed for re-election.

Work doesn't end with harvest at Bolin Warehouse

The work operating a grain warehouse doesn't stop when the harvest is over in January.

According to Blackie Johnson, local manager of the Bolin Warehouse, its a year-round occupation breaking down into roughly three job areas: buying, selling and repairing.

"The busiest time, of course, is the fall," Johnson said. Then, from approximately October till mid-January, he said they buy the harvested grain from area farmers and store it in one of

15 locations around Clarendon. At the warehouse site, there are two Quonset hut buildings 160 ft. long by 60 ft. wide plus 12 smaller silo type storage buildings. The large storage warehouse beside Highway 287 just east of Clarendon's city limits is also owned and utilized by Bolin Storage.

Johnson estimated the warehouse's operation has a total storage capacity of one million bushels of milo grain. He said the company usually hires from four to five extra men during this initial phase of the grainery operation. "That time of year its long

hours and seven day weeks," he said.

All grain coming into the warehouse must first be weighed. This system includes a 60 ft. platform on which trailers are driven to be weighed and large scales which register from 10 to 100,000,999 pounds of weight. From the grain's bushel weight the moisture content of the kernels can be determined. Johnson said varying weather conditions when the grain is weighed determines its moisture content. If the grain is too wet, it must be placed in large dryer before storage. This dryer blows heated air through the milo and is capable of drying 50,000 pounds an hour. The dried grain is then transported by overhead augers to the various storage bins.

When the harvest ends and the grain is stored, the warehouse operations move into their second stage, selling the grain. Milo is sold primarily to area feed lots and grain brokers, Johnson said. By June or July this grain is sold and the warehouse emptied out. The work doesn't stop, however.

During these summer months until fall, Johnson said all equipment damaged during the previous season must be repaired. "Everything has to be torn down." During this equipment repair, Johnson also works with area milo planters

determining ways to produce better grain yields in the coming year. He said he inspects area fields of grain before and after planting to make suggestions on what varieties of grain will do the best in the different soil conditions. Primary factors in this decision are the amount of moisture in the soil at planting and the time of year. This fieldwork includes advising the farmer on steps to take if any diseases or pests have infested their crop.

Johnson said more grain is being planted this year around the Donley County

area and the warehouse might include corn storage next fall. He said great

amounts of grain were produced this past season due to the county's flood disaster which washed out much of the planted cotton.

The Bolin Warehouse is part of the D.H. Bolin operations based in Wichita Falls. The Bolins purchased the warehouse in 1964 from D.F. Cook. Johnson has been warehouse manager since 1967. Previously he had owned and operated the Memphis Seed and Delinting Plant.

Johnson and his wife Shirley live in the Giles Community here in Donley County. They have two children enrolled in the Memphis School system: Tom, 16, a sophomore at Memphis; and Sherry, 13, a freshman.

Other employee at the warehouse is Loyd Dickerson. Dickerson and his wife Doris have four children. Jane, 18, a junior at CHS; Mrs. William (Alice) Brown; Ann, 16; and Mark, 11, both Clarendon school students.

Jury finds area man competent to stand trial

Clyde Gilbreth, accused of the 1968 shooting of Clarendon District Attorney John Gillham, was found competent to stand trial for that charge at a competency hearing Monday at the Donley County Courthouse.

Pending his trial, Gilbreth is currently free on bond "under stringent conditions," according to County Attorney John Knorpp. No trial date has as yet been set and until that time Gilbreth has been placed in the custody of his brother in Utah.

Gilbreth had a similar competency hearing Oct. 8, three months after the shooting incident occurred. At that time a Donley County jury found him not competent to stand trial. Legal basis for this decision hinges on whether or not the accused can "assist his lawyer in his own defense" and if he understands "rationally and reasonably" the charges brought against him. Gilbreth was admitted to the Rusk State Hospital for the Criminally Insane on Oct. 22, 1968.

He remained there until this past November 6, at which time doctors at Rusk certified Gilbreth as competent to stand trial and recommended he be transported back to Donley County for a court hearing. He had been in the Donley County jail since November. Attorney Richard Bird of

Childress called five witnesses for Gilbreth's defense, including Dr. James Hunter, a psychiatrist at Rusk, and Gilbreth himself, who was the first witness after the noon break. State District Attorney Charles Darter called one witness, Dr. Mary Bubliss, a Plainview psychiatrist.

The competency hearing took only about four and one half hours of courtroom time. Attorneys for the state and the defense began screening prospective jurors at 10 a.m. Monday morning. The trial was underway by 11:30 a.m. and, allowing an hour for lunch, the jury reached their decision by 4 p.m. that afternoon. The jury deliberated approximately one hour and ten minutes.

Dr. Hunter, the first witness of the trial, was on the stand for the longest period of time. His testimony included the admission into evidence of a copy of a certification signed by the superintendent of the Rusk Hospital stating Gilbreth's "competency (had been) determined" and that he was "not considered dangerous to himself or others."

In his testimony, Hunter said he had been in close contact with Gilbreth for seven years at the hospital, seeing him "almost every day." He described Gilbreth as "no disciplinary problem" while at the institution.

He said Gilbreth's condition had been diagnosed as schizophrenic paranoia when

he first entered Rusk. Under cross examination by State District Attorney Charles Darter, Hunter said persons suffering from this mental disease "don't act the way they say or think. Their emotions are blunted so that they don't realize anything is wrong with them." He said Gilbreth had been on medication to repress the disease symptoms since his initial admission to Rusk.

Paranoic schizophrenia as a life-long illness which symptoms can be repressed through medication and re-socialization therapy. Darter asked if Gilbreth would be dangerous if he stopped taking this medication, and Hunter replied this was a possibility but it was impossible to "predict with any accuracy."

The possibility of Gilbreth ceasing to take this medication was a point Darter returned to frequently during the state's case.

Gilbreth himself took the stand directly after the noon recess. Defense lawyer Bird led him through testimony asking him if had helped select jurors for the trial that morning and was he now ready to stand trial. To each question, Gilbreth replied "Yes, sir." Bird also asked Gilbreth what he wanted to do, replying he would like to "go to Utah." Gilbreth had recently deeded a Utah farm he owned to his brother who mortgaged it to raise money for Gilbreth's defense.

State Attorney Darter

cross-examined Gilbreth, asking him if he would continue taking the medicine used to relieve the symptoms of his disease. He replied, "I take them because they tell me to." Defense Attorney Bird pointed out that Gilbreth had at one point asked to be taken off medication while in the Donley County jail, but after three days had requested he be given the medication again.

Darter also questioned Gilbreth concerning two consultations he'd had with the State's only witness, Plainview psychiatrist Dr. Mary Bubliss. As described by Gilbreth, he had first met with Bubliss in 1968 shortly after his arrest. He said this meeting lasted 1 1/2 hours. The second meeting, in December last year, "only lasted eight minutes," ac-

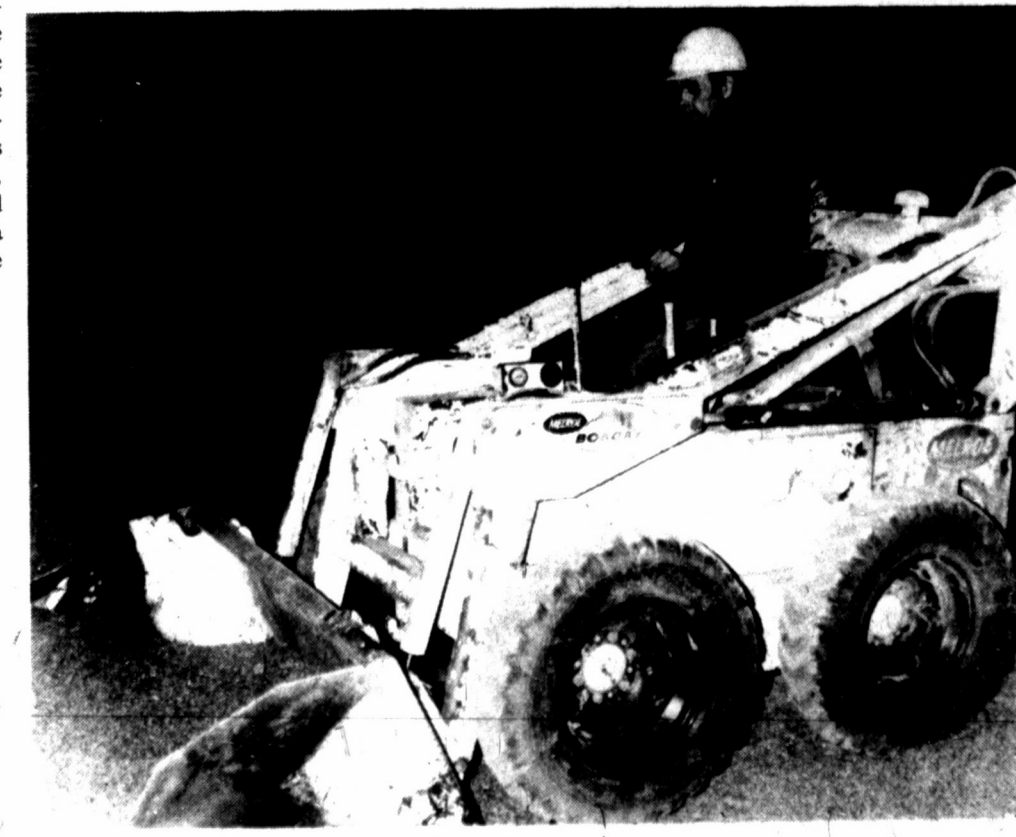

charges brought against him. Bird, in his summation, compared Bubliss' opinion with Dr. Hunter's of Rusk, saying how Bubliss' opinion was rendered after two meetings, the more recent lasting only eight minutes, while Hunter had observed Gilbreth for the past seven years. He also referred to the incident of Gilbreth's willingness to go back on medication. Both sides rested their cases at 2:40 p.m. Monday. District Judge Robert Montgomery presided over the trial.

During Bubliss' testimony, she said she believed Gilbreth's condition was in a remission phase. "This terrible tragedy of his illness is its unpredictability," she said. Bubliss said she did not think Gilbreth was competent to stand trial because he only understood the charge against him "in the theoretical framework." Darter echoed this thought in his summation before the jury, saying, in effect, Bubliss had said Gilbreth did not have a "rational and reasonable understanding" of the

Memphis writer publishes new book

Donley County writer Virginia Browder recently published her fourth book, "Tude Harrell", chronicling the life of her mother.

Sub-titled, "Gay 90's Girl in Old Amarillo," authoress also deals with early Amarillo history and pioneers from 1881 - 1963, the years of Tude Harrell's life.

Miss Browder said she originally began the work as a Christmas present for her sisters during the 60's. Most

of the book dealing specifically with her mother was written at this time. She said she later enlarged upon this original work by adding more Old Amarillo history. Tude Harrell's parents were the sixth family to move to Old Amarillo in the 1880's.

The book contains over 50 photographs from the Browder family album along with historical pictures of early Amarillo pioneers. Its cover design includes a portrait of

Tude Harrell taken before her wedding in 1904.

Miss Browder's earlier works include "Butterfly Dust," a collection of poems; and two historical accounts of the Panhandle region, "Giles Chronicle," and "Donley County, Land O' Promise."

Copies of "Tude Harrell" may be obtained either at Miss Browder's antique shop in Memphis or at the Clarendon Press. It sells for \$6.50.

German mother, son here recently for family visit

It has been four years since Gillen and his mother last visited the United States. Anita was living in Austin at that time.

when we had snow on March 8. "It is so warm here and then it turns very cold in just a few hours," she commented, using Anita as her interpreter. Our blowing dust and dirt does not bother her, she said, it just causes her to dust and clean the house again.

Anita said her mother Mrs. Gillen, is always busy, even when she is visiting with her. She has crocheted one stole and has almost finished another one as gifts during her stay. Anita says it's wonderful to come home

from a busy day at work and enjoy the meals her mother has prepared and to find her house sparkling clean because her mother cannot sit and do nothing.

Mrs. Gillen is from a family of ten children. She lost her mother and father when she was fourteen years old and with the loss of her husband had to care for her own three children alone. Anita recalls how hard her mother worked to accomplish this and how proud her mother is now of the conveniences her children now possess.

She also commented on the difference between the average German and the average American family. The cost of living in Germany is higher, she said. Marks, the German dollar, will not purchase as much in Germany as our dollar will in America. Few have color television sets and carpet in the average German home. On German television, she said they enjoy watching American programs such as Bonanza, Kojak and Columbo. Translation from English to German is done by the voice of an interpreter.

Mrs. Gillen said one of the highlights of this visit to the United States was flying in a nine-passenger private plane which Anita's ex-boss sent to fly them to Austin for a visit.

When Mrs. Gillen left Germany, friends and relatives asked her to bring them something from America. She has found many things in Clarendon's stores and shops. In fact, she has purchased an extra piece of luggage in which to carry them. She said blue jeans, the typically American clothing style, is a "must" for her grandchildren in Germany.

Cris Gillen is employed by an oil company and spends most of his time away from his homeland working in Saudi Arabia and other Eastern countries.

They will receive the normal coverage for all county residents, and in addition, Red Cross will replace blood for one year for the following members of his or her family; all members of his or her family; all members of the household under 18, children over 18 who cannot be blood donors, parents and parents-in-law (where ever they may live.)

In administering the blood, the hospital will transfer to the patient the small Red Cross fee of \$23 per unit for handling and typing. Rare bloods are the same. There is no cost for the blood itself, only for handling and typing the blood.

Pallbearers were Snooks Sparks, Jiggs Mann, Roger Johnson, Wayne Riggs, Joe Lovell, and Jim Robinson.

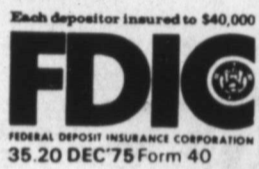

New laws for sales tax exemptions

John Sarich, manager of Clarendon's Chamber of Commerce, recently received a letter from the Texas State Comptroller of Public Accounts concerning businessmen claiming sales exemption from Sales Tax for certain items.

The letter requested Sarich to make information concerning new laws recently passed concerning those exemptions available to the public.

Briefly stated, the ruling requires that only those items which are purchased in Texas and delivered in another state or country can be exempt from the Sales Tax. Acceptance in Texas of the item purchased makes the transaction taxable. Proof of delivery outside of Texas must be provided. The Texas retailer must keep on file for inspection by the Comptroller all shipping records, truck logs, and

receipts as proof of export. Since exports to Mexico have been a particular problem, the retailer must also retain in his files a copy of the shipper's export declaration bearing the U.S. Customs proof of export stamp or the "pedimiento de importaciones" formal entry document properly stamped by Mexican Customs.

Failure to maintain, and produce for inspection by the Comptroller, proper, documented proof of export will make the retailer liable for the Sales Tax on items reputedly exported.

The new ruling also tightens the definition of "forwarding agent" making it as clear as possible that he or she may act only as the middleman between seller and carrier and will not be allowed to deliver directly to the purchaser.

For businessmen wishing further information concern-

ing this new ruling, copies of the ruling may be obtained by writing the Tax Information Division of the Comptroller's Office—in Austin or by calling the toll free number 1-800-292-9687. Speakers to advise civic or social groups on the new ruling can also be acquired by request to this address or telephone number.
