One vote decides Howardwick election

City and county elections last Saturday in the Donley County area resulted in one race with a single vote making the difference between election and defeat.

In the Howardwick alderman race, with seven running and three to elect, incumbent Will Corgill polled 33 votes, one more than incumbent Neal Mann, defeating him for that post. Alderman candidates polling the most number of votes were newcomers to the council, Margaret Berry

and Alton Hendrick. The only Clarendon election with opposing candidates was also the alderman race.

With three to elect in a field of six candidates, incumbents Bob Kidd and Charles Deyhle were re-elected along with a new councilman Tex Selvidge.

The Hedley school board election had five candidates vying for three expiring terms. Winners in Saturday's election were incumbent Harold White and Fred Watt along

with newly elected candidate J.D. Skaggs.

Judges for the elections were Willard Skelton, at the Clarendon School's balloting boxes; Sam Lowry, at Clarendon City Hall; Altie Randals, Howardwick; Royce Springer, Hedley City election; and Mrs. Myrtle Kirkpatrick, Hedley School election.

Several candidates were also elected Saturday in unopposed political races. In Clarendon, School Board Trustees winning unopposed were in-

cumbents James McAnear, Sr. and Gene Alderson.

Three posts on Clarendon College's Board of Regents were also voted in with unopposed candidates. Regents named were incumbents R.E. Drennan and Delbert Robertson along with Fred Chamberlain.

Hedley races with unopposed candidates were for alderman, with winners incumbents Henry Moore and C.L. Taylor along with newcomers J.S. Hinds and V.G. Hinds. Hedley Mayor D.E. Boliver also

won a new term unopposed.

County wide offices decided in Saturday's election included two members of the County School Board and four members of the Donley County Hospital District Board. School Board members winning unopposed were G.W. Estlack and Billy Ray Johnston. Incumbents re-elected to the Hospital District Board unopposed were Bud Hermes-meyer, C.C. Ayers, Ansil Adamson and Vernon Berry.

Jim Milam's Canteen at the lake reopens for summer

When Jim Milam opened the Howardwick Canteen three years ago, he said he planned to be semi-retired, operating the store and fishing in his spare time. He sold out his interest in his auto dealership in Stratford and moved his family to Lake Greenbelt in 1973. Now he said, he's working more hours in his semi-retirement than he did before. "Around here, from Memorial Day to Labor Day its full blast."

Part of Milam's working schedule can be attributed to his inability to let things remain the same. When he and his wife Connie first purchased the land where the Canteen is built, the only

construction standing was a 20 ft. by 20 ft. metal building which had served as a combination grocery/bait shop. The Milam's re-stocked it with groceries and set themselves up in a semi-retirement business. It was only six months before they decided to expand their operation into a dining room facility. Six months later, they added a line of sporting goods, tripling their store's size in a year.

"We got started in it," Milam said, "and it just became more and more of a challenge." The Milams began coming to Lake Greenbelt in the sixties for weekend fishing. They purchased the Canteen

property in 1973. Milam's grocery stock includes "at least one brand" almost all grocery and dairy items. The store is also stocked with frozen meats.

The store's sporting goods section carries a complete line of fishing equipment. Hunting equipment and water sports items including skis and life jackets are also stocked. Milam said he also keeps emergency supplies

for boat owners on hand. The cafe features an a la carte menu during the week plus a complete dinner meal each Sunday. Free coffee is also served to each customer.

With three different type businesses operating under the Canteen's single roof, Milam said he still has plans for enlarging his operation. He owns land across the highway from the store's present location and, according to Milam, if things go as

planned he will build a new facility there in the future. If he originally had definite plans about retirement, he seems to have re-scheduled them for a while.

Two of the Milam's children work at the Canteen: Jean, wife of Clarendon City Policeman Jerry Holland; and the Milam's 15 year old son Dan, a freshman at Clarendon High School. Other employees at the store are Tracy Dubois and Joe Engel.



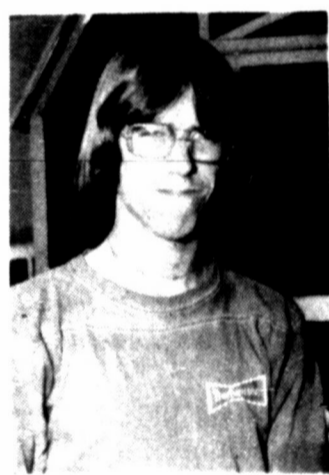

Phone rate increase effective in mid-April

A telephone rate increase for Clarendon residents was approved by the Clarendon City Council at a meeting last week, according to City Administrator Bud Knorrpp. The increase was the culmination of negotiations between the city and General Telephone since last November.

General Telephone originally asked for a yearly total increase of \$21,758 for telephone operations in Clarendon. The city negotiated this rate down to a yearly increase of \$7,780.

This money will be derived from increased monthly costs for all residence and business phones; an increase in installation charges for new telephones; an increase to 25 cents for all pay phones in Clarendon, and a monthly increase for service to business type phone systems

like the Key Line phone systems and the Private Branch Exchange (PBX) phone systems. All rate increases will be effective April 16, the next scheduled billing for General Telephone in Clarendon.

In dollars and cents, cost of a private line per month increases 35 cents, from \$8.50 to \$8.85 per month. Business phones will increase to \$18.75 per month, a \$1.24 increase.

Installation for new phones will now cost \$30 for residential and \$40 for business, up from \$22.50 and \$32.50 respectively.

The increase in business type phone systems jumps from \$21.87 per month to \$23.45 for the Key Line system and from \$26.25 to \$28.15 for the PBX system.

The last rate increase for General Telephone in Clarendon was Dec. 16, 1974.

Clarendon schools hosted District's 2-A's University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) contests Thursday, April 1, winning the high school competition and placing fifth in the elementary-junior high school contests.

Most of the day's U.I.L. events were conducted on the Clarendon College Campus. Speaking events were presented in the First Baptist Church and a few events were concluded Tuesday, March 30.

Eight schools representing District 2-A entered the various interscholastic events. In the high school competition, Clarendon gathered 114 1/2 points to win top honors. They finished just ahead of Shamrock with 114 points.

Clarendon entries placed first in four events: They were Karen Burgess, 1st in Informative Speaking; Mac Thornberry, 1st in Persuasive Speaking; Sheri duBois, 1st in Feature Writing; and Farris Hightower, 1st in Science competition.

These students will now advance to Regional competition at Texas Tech in Lubbock April 23-24.

Tuesday, March 30, Clarendon's entry in One-Act play competition was named runner-up.

Clarendon placed second in four events Thursday

including Paula Hardin, 2nd in Poetry Interpretation; Patti Page, 2nd in Prose Reading; Tammy Blackburn, 2nd in Headline Writing; and Ralph McGarity, 2nd in Science competition.

Third place winners from Clarendon were Mary McGarity, 3rd in Poetry Interpretation; and Brenda Ritchie who placed 3rd in both Number Sense and Shorthand.

Students from Clarendon named to alternate positions were Mona Robinson, for Persuasive Speaking; Cindy Reynolds, Shorthand; and John Duke, Spelling.

Clarendon's One-Act play entry, "Kind of the Castle," was also named alternate in dramatic competition conducted here Tuesday, March 30. Cast members were Kevin Cates, Liz Bromley, Helen Riggs, Mac Thornberry, Patti Page, Jack Bell and Mike Skinner.

Two Clarendon entries placed in the elementary-junior high U.I.L. competition. Clarendon finished fifth of eight schools entering the contests.

Winners were Sherilyn Walker, placing 2nd in 7th-8th grade spelling; and Rick Hayes, winning 3rd in 7-8th grade oral reading.

In the high school U.I.L. competition, Shamrock placed second behind Clarendon. Other competing schools, in order of how they

placed, were Wheeler, 100 points; Wellington, 80 points; Claude, 55 points; McLean, 42 points; Silvertown, 5 points; and Memphis, 2 1/2 points.

Winner of the elementary-junior high competition was

Wheeler with 82 1/2 points; followed by Shamrock, 40 points; McLean 27 1/2 points;

"CHILD FIND" seeks handicapped

In a recent news conference in Austin, Texas it was announced by the Chairman of the State Board of Education, Joe Kelly Butler, that the Texas Education Agency and the 1,121 independent school districts in Texas are beginning an intensive effort to locate and identify every handicapped child of school age who is not now in school. It is an ambitious undertaking and it is called "CHILD FIND".

It will search out handicapped persons between the ages of 3 and 21 -- young people who are blind, deaf, physically handicapped ... those who have learning disabilities such as language problems ... and the emotionally disturbed and mentally retarded.

In locating these youngsters, it will carry out the instructions of the Sixty-First Texas Legislature which in 1969 unanimously passed Senate Bill 230 which provides for public special education for every handicapped child in Texas. By order of the people of Texas through their Legislature, public education in Texas is for every child. Public schools are for the handicapped ... today as never before.

How many handicapped children are there who are not in school? No one has any idea. No statistics are available. The handicapped children not in school are simply lost. Their futures are lost a little every day they're not in school. Their contributions to society are lost.

The productivity and happiness of their families are lost. They need to be found. That's the purpose of CHILD FIND.

"CHILD FIND will help people realize handicaps are nothing to hide. Handicapped people generally are very special people. They have insights and special abilities not usually developed by many individuals in our society. To help them achieve their fullest individual potential as human beings, we have special education programs in the Texas public schools," Mr. Butler said.

Today 76 percent of school-age handicapped children are enrolled in special education programs. It is the goal of the Texas Education Agency to be serving the needs of every handicapped child in the state between ages 3 and 21 by the year 1980. CHILD FIND is a major unified, positive "push" in that direction.

"On behalf of the thousands of handicapped children who need special education help and aren't getting, we appeal to the people of this area for assistance in CHILD FIND. We believe our readers will want to know about the program and its progress. We promise to keep you informed...we ask that you let us know your ideas," emphasized Mr. Butler.

Funds for the implementation of CHILD FIND are being distributed throughout the state on the basis of the number of children in public schools in each region. The individual programs of the Education Service Centers are being unified by a statewide public awareness and public information program. Every person who knows a handicapped child who is not in school should phone CHILD FIND at 806/376-7463. Anyone in this area may call, COLLECT if it is long distance, to report handicapped children not in school.

Clarendon College played host to FFA and 4-H teams Wednesday, March 31, for their first annual Soil, Range and Grass judging contest. The event was jointly sponsored by Clarendon College and the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Competition was conducted at various land sites around the Clarendon area and at the college.

Twenty-two teams from throughout the Panhandle entered the contest. Competition was divided into three areas of judging: Grass Identification; Pasture and Range Judging; and Land Judging.

Grass Identification required contestants to identify and give certain character-

istics of 60 varieties of plants. Points to be identified were the plant's grazing value, if it was an annual or perennial; a warm or cool season plant, and was it a native or introduced grass variety.

The Pasture and Range judging involved four sites around the Clarendon area.

Contestants had to judge native grasses at two range sites; classify and recommend improvement for an introduced grass at an improved site; and identify

15 native plants in their natural environment at the final site.

Land Judging also involved four sites. Each site was rated by the contestants on a 1-7 scale. The soil was evaluated according to surface texture, permeability, depth slope and surface run-off.

Local officials assisting with the contest were Jack Moreman and Jerry Hawkins of Clarendon College; Monty Sowers and James Gillespie of the Donley County Soil

and Water Conservation Service; and Ernest Barbee and Claude Thomas, district directors of the Soil and Water Conservation District.

Clarendon College students also served as group leaders at the contest's sites and worked to prepare the various sites for the competition.

Winners in Grass Identification were: 1st, Samnorwood; 2nd, Stratford; 3rd, Valley; 4th Clarendon.

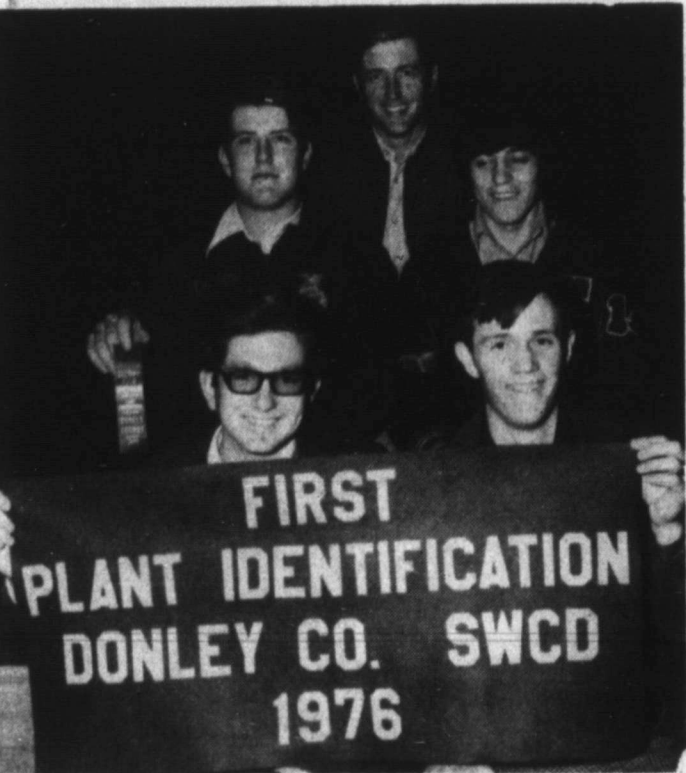
