

Over 400 contestants expected here for college rodeo

An estimated 400 rodeo riders, ropers and racers will be in town Thursday through Saturday, April 17 for Clarendon College's first National Intercollegiate Rodeo Assn. (NIRA) sanctioned rodeo.

Each night's performance will begin at 7:30 at Clarendon's Rodeo Arena and conclude around 9 p.m. A rodeo dance will follow from 9 p.m. - 1 a.m. every night at the slab beside the arena.

The college now joins the ranks of thirteen other colleges and universities in Texas' Southwest region who sponsor NIRA approved rodeos. Points won in this rodeo will be applied towards NIRA national competition.

Eighteen schools will compete include rodeo teams from Texas Tech, currently leading in Southwestern NIRA competition, and Eastern New Mexico University.

Clarendon College's Rodeo Team is currently in 7th place in the 18 school competition.

In past years, the Clarendon College rodeo has been limited to local competition with entrants ranging from 14 year olds to college age. This is the first to offer strictly NIRA as well as RCA professional riders.

Dick Morgan, Clarendon College rodeo coach, estimates that approximately 50 per cent of the riders at this weekend's show are also members of RCA, the professional rodeo cowboy organization.

Top contenders from Clarendon to win in the three-day event are team members Linda Condron, currently 4th in Southwestern Region competition for girl's breakaway roping; Ken Wood, listed in the Southwest's top ten steer wrestlers; Buster Haning, a Southwestern top ten bull rider; and Tim Faye, top ten in bareback riding for Southwest teams.

Judges for the rodeo's nine events are Bill Reinstein, ex-world champion saddle bronc rider; and Walter Hess, a finalist in the national bull riding.

Boys events include bareback riding, roping, team roping, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding and bull riding. Girls will compete in breakaway roping, goat tying and barrel racing. Team trophies will be presented to both boys and girls teams along with trophies for best all-around cowboy and cowgirl. Belt buckles will also be given to individual event winners.

Due to the large number of contestants, some have been scheduled to compete at 9 a.m. Saturday morning in the arena. This "slack" competition will be free to the public. All other rodeo performances are \$2 for adults and \$1 for children. Music at the dance will be by the Country Impressions Thursday and Friday night.

Johnny Woodard will perform at the final dance Saturday.

Stock for the rodeo will come from Freddie Cordell of Childress.

Belt buckles to be contributed to individual event winners were contributed by local organizations and merchants. Those contributing include the Chamber of Commerce, Clifford's Grocery, Morris Sand and Gravel, James Owen's Boot Shop, both the Donley County and the Farmer's State Bank, the local Coca Cola Bottling Plant, Dairy Queen, Chamberlain Motor Co., Syd Blue's Liquor, the Outdoor Entertainment Assn., Riggs Farm and Ranch Supply and Greene's Dry Goods.

Report of Clarendon as growth center incorrect

A report in the Amarillo Globe News that Clarendon had been designated as a growth center was incorrect, according to spokesmen from the Panhandle Regional

Planning Commission (PRPC).

The article, published in the April 4 Sunday edition of the Globe News, contained information that Clarendon along with the Amarillo - Canyon area, Perryton,

Borger and Tulia had been named as growth centers recently by the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA), a division of the Department of Commerce.

Benny Lawrence, director

of Regional Planning at PRPC, said these six cities had been submitted as potential growth centers, but Clarendon and Tulia had not been approved by EDA.

Lawrence speculated the Globe-News had used their back files when writing the story and assumed each town submitted had been accepted.

The Panhandle region was accepted by EDA March 15 as an economic development district, however, which benefits all cities in the PRPC area. According to Lawrence, EDA notified PRPC they felt six growth development centers were too many for a single district. He said Clarendon and Tulia were probably dropped because they had the smallest population of cities submitted.

"EDA was thinking of two or three centers per district," Lawrence said. "We cover 25,000 miles here and felt six centers were justified. Their thinking probably comes from the smaller districts."

Basically, if Clarendon had been approved as a growth center the city would have held priority over other area towns for various governmental grants and loans.

Lawrence explained growth centers were established to indirectly help neighbor-

ing counties with economic difficulties. One of the criteria for a growth center is it be within 25 minutes driving distance from this type county, referred to as redevelopment counties. He said the federal government would put money into an already flourishing community, thinking that this added economic stimulant would eventually benefit the surrounding area as well.

Clarendon could benefit, however, from this area being approved as an economic development district, Lawrence said. Because of the new designation, PRPC may now offer additional technical assistance for obtaining government grants as well as conduct feasibility studies for various business and civic projects.

Equal funding for County Emergency Medical Service is also possible now due to the approval. If the area was not designated as an economic development district, its cities would only be eligible for federal funds up to 25 per cent for Emergency Medical service.

Lawrence said he did not rule out the possibility of Clarendon eventually being named a growth center, but time was needed before the application could be re-submitted to EDA.

Annual English workshop due at college April 20

The Third Annual Greenbelt English Workshop will feature Dr. Linda Robinson of Eastern New Mexico University as guest lecturer this year.

The workshop will be presented at Clarendon College Tuesday, April 20 and will include several special sessions dealing in teaching English at the high school and college levels.

Dr. Robinson is currently Division Director of the College of Liberal Arts and Science at Eastern New Mexico. She received her B.A. in journalism at the University of Texas at El Paso, and her Ph.D. from Tulane University. Her past teaching experience includes teaching at the elementary level, two years at the University of Texas at El Paso, one year at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia, and four years at Louisiana State University.

Dr. Robinson has also worked in the field of radio-television advertising, copywriting, and editor for trade magazines and newspapers, and has served as both reporter and bureau chief in the newspaper industry.

A writer of both short and feature stories, Dr. Robinson

was instrumental in doing research for *Frontier College*, the official history of the University of Texas at El Paso, published in 1964.

Other topics to be covered by panel members are: Janet Smith, Pampa -- "Rich Man Poor Man" by Irwin Shaw; Farrell McAfee, Clarendon -- "Inhumanity in American Literature"; Kay Eudy, Turkey -- F.S. Fitzgerald; Jennie Barbee, Clarendon -- "Flowers for Algernon" by Daniel Keys; Pat Maupin, Valley -- "Adjustments in Going Back to School"; Terry Scoggins, Instructor of English, Clarendon College -- "Science Fiction and The Classroom"; Lloyd Risley, Instructor of Science, Clarendon High School -- "The Technology of Science Fiction."

The workshop is open to all area English teachers and is under the direction of the language Division of Clarendon College. There is no charge for the workshop.

Registration and coffee will be held from 9:00 to 9:45 in room 102, Academic Building, at the college, with the first session starting at 10:00 in room 102.

Land was named to that post by Civil Defense Director Billie Christal. He replaces Mike McCully who recently resigned after many years service.

According to Land, two blasts of the Clarendon sirens will indicate a weather alert has been issued for our area by the weather bureau in Amarillo. Two blasts do not mean a tornado has been sighted but rather the possibility of a tornado exists. Land said the immediate weather conditions in Clarendon will be considered before blowing this alarm. If an alert is issued and weather in the city does not seem severe enough to justify sounding the alarm, it will not be sounded.

If a tornado is spotted in the area, the sirens will be left on, making a long, uninterrupted wailing sound. Five signals used with the system include one blast, indicating a grass fire or a fire outside of the city limits; and three blasts, indicating a house fire within Clarendon.

Land said area residents may check the siren system each day when it is sounded at 12 o'clock noon. He urged persons to notify the Fire Department if the siren in their area of town is not working.

Personal property tax rate set

Donley County's personal property tax rate was retained at its 1975 level by precinct commissioners at their month meeting Monday, April 12.

The 1975 list of values placed on individual personal property items was retained by unanimous commissioner's vote. County Judge Billie Christal presided over the meeting with all commissioners present.

Election votes from the April 3 County School Board election were also canvassed at the meeting. Candidates running unopposed in that race were G.W. Estlack from Pct. 1 and Billy Ray Johnston from Pct. 4.

In regular county business, the precinct commissioners approved the payment of all county bills during the morning session. The afternoon session was taken up with reports from three county employees and discussion involving the personal property tax rate, and three resolutions placed before the council for their approval.

Monty Sowers of the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation Service presented to the commissioners an update report on the Lakeview Watershed Project south of Clarendon. Cynthia Manning, Donley County assistant extension agent, requested specific items of equipment to aid her with a canning workshop she is planning to teach this summer. Estimated cost of the items was \$17.95. The commissioners voted to purchase the equipment after a short discussion.

Final county employee scheduled to talk to the

commissioners was Donley County Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr. Lindsey was called away from the courthouse most of the afternoon and Judge Christal relayed his request to the council. Lindsey's request involved new bedding be purchased for the Donley County Jail. Several existing mattresses at the facility were reported in poor condition. Christal also cited state regulations stating these mattresses would have to be replaced with fireproof mattresses.

Lindsey's request also involved repairing or replacing a damaged washing machine at the jail. The commissioners agreed to begin a search for the necessary replacements.

Three resolutions placed before the council were all passed after short discussion of each issue. The first involved the county's juvenile/adult probation pro-

gram, currently financed with federal funds. These funds will cease in May, 1977. The council voted approval for continuation of the program for another year, through May, 1977. County money would have to finance the program after that date and council members specified they would reopen the question at that time.

The second resolution before the council involved a unanimous vote to continue the county's Comprehensive Employment Training Activities (CETA) program. This program provides jobs for needy individuals in Donley County.

The commissioners also approved the final resolution, a map submitted by the Texas Highway Dept. indicating possible new county roads to be constructed in accordance with requests made by the commissioners.

Five cases were tried in County Court during the month of March by County Judge Billie Christal. Two cases involved persons charged with driving while intoxicated. In both cases, the parties pleaded guilty and were placed on probation for six months.

Another Clarendon man was assessed a \$100 fine for the illegal transportation of alcohol. Misdemeanor theft charges were also brought against a local man who pleaded guilty to the charge and served a 21 day jail sentence in the Donley County jail.

Two cases of driving with an expired drivers license were also brought before Judge Christal. One case was dismissed when a prosecuting witness failed to appear. The other person accused of driving with an expired license pleaded not guilty and requested a jury trial. His trial is currently pending.

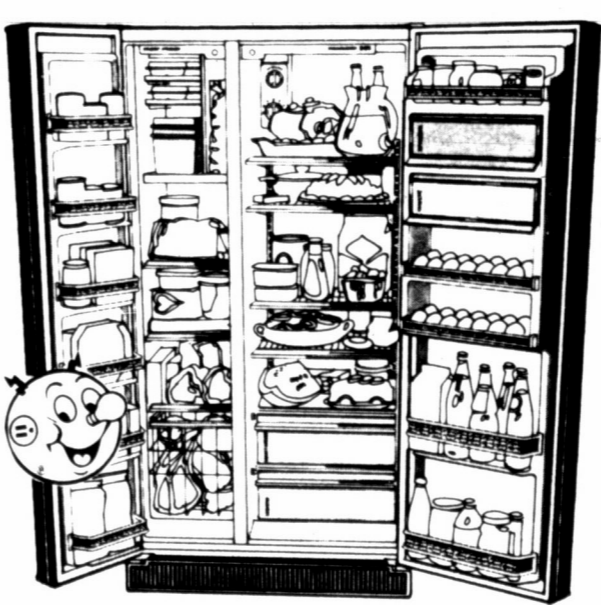

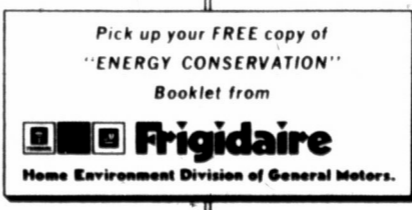

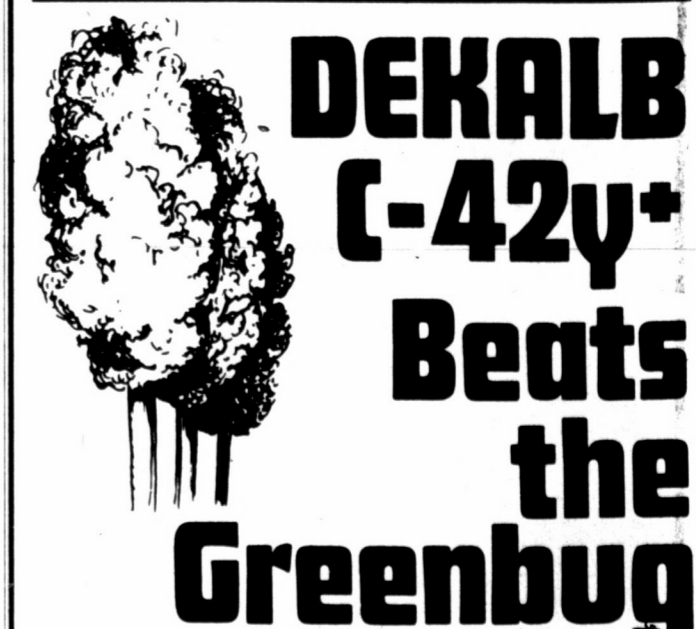

Bike Rodeo promotes safety knowledge, goodwill

A Royal Ambassador Bicycle Rodeo sponsored by Clarendon's First Baptist Church attracted approximately 20 contestants from Clarendon and the Mobeetie Baptist Church Saturday, April 10.

Officer Jerry Burgdorf of the Dept. of Public Safety,

said these rodeos are designed to teach bicycle riders bike safety. Burgdorf along with church leaders from Clarendon and Mobeetie were in charge of the contest.

Contestants were divided into three divisions according to school classification.

Division 1 included grades 1st - 3rd; Division 2, grades 4th - 5th; and Division 3, grades 6th - 8th. Ribbons were presented to the first three winners in each division. A team trophy was also presented to the Mobeetie entrants for obtaining the highest team score.

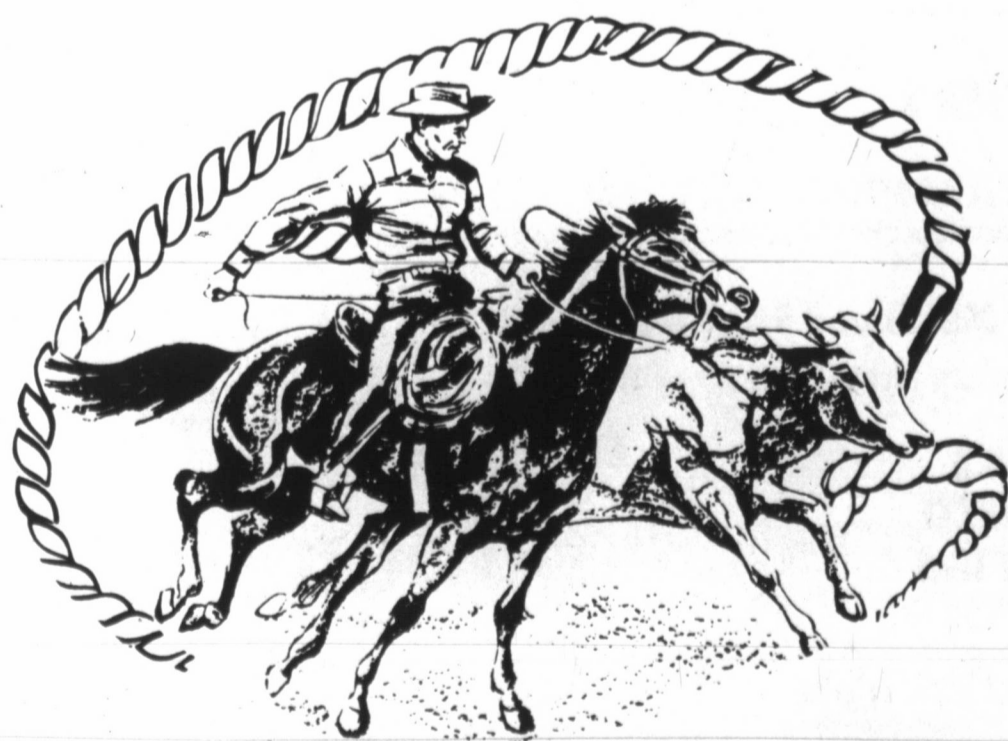

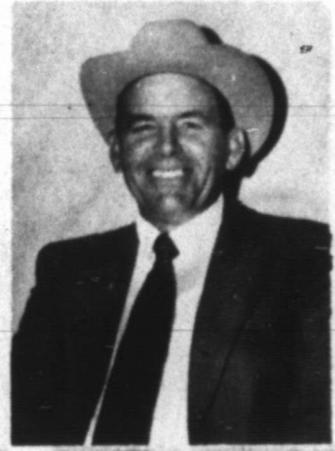

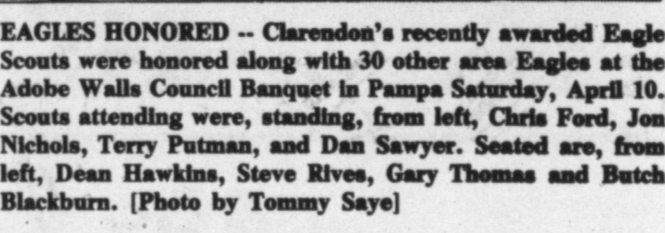
Tech President Grover E. Murray made the announcement of Wall's appointment as the Red Raider during news conference at Jones Stadium.

Helpful suggestions presented for preservation of home food

Do you plan to preserve some of your family food supply at home? Do you know how much you want to preserve? When should you start planning? A good time to start planning for fruits and vegetables is before the harvest season starts, whether you grow your own food or plan to buy it.

Consider the amount of freezer space you have whether it is a chest type, upright or a part of your refrigerator. First man born here visits town Tuesday

Clarendon Hildebrand, named for the city he was born in.

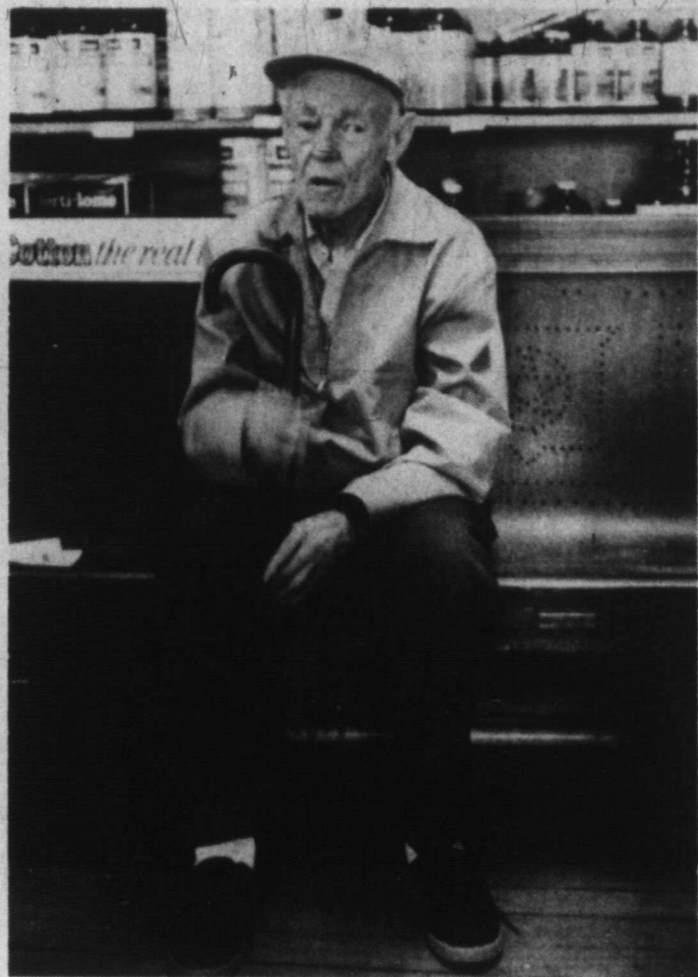
Born July 21, 1887, he was the first boy child born at the present site of Clarendon. His father owned a traveling restaurant which followed the gangs of railroad workers as they progressed across the Panhandle.

Mr. Hildebrand was in Clarendon Tuesday to visit with the few persons he remembers from the old days

of Clarendon. He now lives in Amarillo, a retired bricklayer. Periodically he said he returns to Clarendon to visit. He hasn't lived here since 1925.

Tuesday, he talked and pondered the old times with people coming in to Frank White's Clarendon Hatchery and the merchants along main street. His memories include the last hanging in Donley County, Oct. 10, 1910, when C.R. Miller, notorious thief and murderer, was hanged by Clarendon sheriff J.T. Patman.

His other memories are mostly about people long since gone from the town which gave him his name. But Clarendon is still here and Clarendon Hildebrand keeps returning. When asked when he'll return, he replied, "I don't know. I may never come back."

Brucellosis topic of state-wide meet

The "merry-go-round" on the eradication of brucellosis is continuing. New regulations regarding this cattle disease, commonly known as "Bangs," have been proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission to meet federal standards. These regulations will go into effect unless rejected at a statewide hearing on April 15.

The hearing will begin at 9 a.m. in the Trinity Room of the Downtowner Motor Hotel in Austin. Anyone interested in attending to voice their opinions on the proposed regulations is encouraged to do so, says Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The proposed regulations are aimed at effectively controlling and eventually eradicating the disease and to thereby establish Texas as a Certified Free State. The regulations are in accordance with the U.S. Animal Health Association and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Gooch lists a few of the requirements set forth in the proposed regulations. First of all, all male and female cattle two years of age or older offered for sale at any livestock market in Texas intended for breeding purposes must be tested for brucellosis. Steers and spay-

ed heifers will be exempt. If an infected animal is found in any herd, the herd will be quarantined on the owner's premise until such cattle have been tested to meet the requirements for quarantine release. Herd owners will have the right to supplemental tests. Reactor cattle will not be branded and condemned to slaughter

until results of such supplemental tests (if requested) are ascertained.

Regarding calf vaccinations, Gooch points out that the proposed regulations call for all female beef calves to be vaccinated between the ages of three and eight months.

The proposed regulations

on brucellosis control and eradication also provide specific definitions and procedures in classifying cattle, obtaining and maintaining certification status, and qualifying methods and standards. Cattlemen interested in reviewing the proposed regulations are invited to stop by the county Extension office.
