

County's Saint's Roost Celebration plans finalized

Donley County's annual Saint's Roost celebration featuring rodeo events, a 4th of July parade, art and craft exhibits, a fiddler's contest, an old settler's reunion, a horse show and racing turtles is set for four days of summer excitement July 1-4.

Plans for the annual event were finalized Wednesday, May 19, by sponsoring group for the celebration, Clarendon's Outdoor Entertainment Association. Other local groups sponsoring Saint's Roost activities include the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees and the Al Morrah Shrine Club.

Saint's Roost Rodeo begins its three-day run Thursday, July 1. Friday, Clarendon's Jaycees will sponsor the annual turtle race down Clarendon's Main Street. Area youths may enter their racing turtles in one of three age brackets: five years old or less; ages six through ten; and ages 11-14. The race is set to begin at 2 p.m. Friday.

Saturday, July 3, is the big day with many events scheduled at the Donley County Courthouse Square. County Craft Fair '76 begins at 9 a.m. through 5 p.m. Friday. The Old Settlers Reunion is from 10:30 a.m. to 12 o'clock noon; a barbecue from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.; the Independence Day Parade at 2 p.m.; the Old Fiddler's Contest at 3 p.m. and final rodeo performance and dance that night.

County Craft Fair '76 will feature exhibits of arts and crafts by local and statewide artists displayed on the courthouse lawn. According to Rev. Pettigrew Hamilton, committee member in charge, exhibits and features of the fair will be similar to last year's presentation. Art works by area artists will be

displayed along with exhibits of other arts and crafts. Food and drink will be sold on the grounds and a special entertainment area for children will be set up.

The Annual Old Settlers Reunion begins at 10:30 that morning on the square. Approximately 120 area

pioneers gathered last year, according to Tunney Kent, event chairman, with more expected this year. Highlights of the reunion are

awarding of prizes to the oldest returning settler; the oldest settler from Donley County; the settler having traveled the farthest to

return; and the settler with the largest family. The local Chapter of the Al Morrah Shrine Club will sponsor a barbecue on the

square beginning at 11 a.m. Pre-event tickets for the meal may be purchased from any club member or at Clarendon's Farmer's State Bank

Price is \$2.50 per plate. All proceeds from the event will go to the Shriner sponsored Crippled Children's Hospital in Dallas.

Afternoon activities get underway at 2 p.m. with the parade down Clarendon's Main Street. Float competition with trophies offered as prizes, riding clubs, car clubs, kids on decorated bicycles and an open division for "almost any kind" of organization will be parade features.

Three o'clock that afternoon is starting time for the Saint's Roost Old Fiddler's Contest. Music Makers from the area will compete on the square with several prizes offered.

Sunday, July 4, activities include a Jackpot Team roping contest at 1 p.m. sponsored by Clarendon's Roping Club at the rodeo arena; and the Clarendon horse show presented in Amarillo at the Bill Cody Arena.

The Horse Show Sunday will conclude a three-city series of horse shows presented that weekend in Amarillo. Burl Hollar, Outdoor Entertainment Assn. member, said horse shows presented by Amarillo's Panhandle Quarter Horse Exhibitors, the city of White Deer and Clarendon were combined in the past to attract a larger number of nationwide visitors and entries. Each show awards prizes to winning entries.

The Clarendon show, sponsored by the Outdoor Entertainment Assn., includes 43 halter and performance judging divisions. There is also a youth competition for children 14 and younger and 14 to 18 years old.

The show, set to begin at 8 a.m. Sunday morning, will be free to the public.

Rodeo performances planned during Saint's Roost Celebration

Annual Saint's Roost Rodeo has three performances slated beginning Thursday, July 1, with over \$2,000 worth of prize money at stake. Performances Friday and Saturday are set for 8:30 p.m. at the Rodeo Arena.

Thursday's show will begin at 7:30 p.m. with a Kid's Rodeo for entries below 13 years of age. Regular rodeo performance

will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Events include bareback riding, calf roping, bronc riding, team roping, bull riding, a wild mare race and barrel racing. Entry fees will be \$20 for riding events and \$30 for timed events.

Special events every night of the rodeo include a wild calf race with three-man teams roping and riding a wild calf across a finish line; and a calf scramble, with

cash prizes tied to calve's tails for contestants to retrieve.

Thirty-six entries will be accepted for each regular rodeo event. Contestants may enter from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. June 30 by going by or calling the Rodeo Headquarters located at the Rodeo Arena. Blackie Johnson, rodeo committee head, said 18 entries would be accepted by telephone for those

unable to come by the headquarters June 30. Telephone number is 874-2612.

Each rodeo performance will be followed by a rodeo dance at the open air dance floor beside the arena. Thursday, Moe Bandy, Nashville recording artist, and his band will provide the entertainment. Friday's artist is Johnny Bush, another singer based in Nashville. Final dance performance will

be by Lubbock's Tiny Lynn and his band.

Clarendon's Volunteer Fire Dept. will serve breakfast in the Rodeo Showbarn after each night's dance.

Stock for this year's rodeo will be provided by C & C Rodeo Company of Childress. Bill Mecham of Quanah will announce. Two half-beefs will be given away at each rodeo

performance with each rodeo ticket buyer eligible. Winners will be determined by a drawing of that performance's ticket stubs. All beef prizes will be donated by area ranchers.

Two saddles will also be given away to the "Best All-Around Rider" and "Best All-Around Roper" entering the show. Sponsors for the saddles are local businesses Greene's Dry

Goods, Greenbelt Ford Inc., Knorrp Insurance Agency and Syd Blue's.

Box seats are also available for the three-day rodeo run. Seats are \$13.50 for the three days plus admission price each night. Reserved parking spaces around the arena are also offered for \$7.50 plus admission price each night. Those interested in box seats

should contact Jerry Guage in Clarendon. Parking spaces may be obtained by contacting Jim Owens at Owens' Boot Shop in Clarendon.

Profits from both the rodeo and dance are used each year for improvements to Clarendon's Rodeo Arena. In the past, new restroom facilities and a press box have been added to the arena.

Mistrial declared in case Thursday

A mistrial was declared Thursday, May 20, by District Judge Robert Montgomery in a Donley County court hearing involving aggravated assault charges, a third degree felony, against a Borger man.

Charges against Mike Kimbrough of Borger arose from a March 6, 1975 incident outside a Donley County drinking spot, Steve Wilson of Pampa had filed the aggravated assault charges against Kimbrough. He was accused of causing serious bodily injury to Wilson during the March 6 incident.

Mistrial was declared because a witness was reported discussing his testimony to another as-yet

unheard witness. Earlier, following regular court proceedings, Judge Montgomery cautioned all witnesses not to discuss the trial among themselves until a verdict had been reached. The witnesses were sequestered away in a separate room of the courthouse during trial proceedings.

Bill Austin of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, a witness scheduled to testify later, volunteered the information that he had overheard two other witnesses discussing the trial. He later identified these as Steve Wilson and Rickey Rowe, another witness for prosecuting attorney Charles Darter.

Upon hearing Auptin's statement, defense attorney Thomas Kendrick of Amarillo immediately moved for a mistrial.

The case against Kimbrough is unaffected by the mistrial, according to Judge Montgomery, and he can still stand trial for the charges. Penalty for aggravated assault is a 2 to 10 year prison term or a fine up to \$5,000.

The jury had been released by Montgomery before the evidence leading to the mistrial declaration was revealed. The trial was scheduled to continue Friday morning with the remaining witnesses to testify.

Both Wilson and Rowe

were reprimanded by Judge Montgomery for their actions. Both could have faced contempt charges from the court.

No new trial date for the assault charge has been set.

Hospital conversion reported prompting favorable comments

Plans to convert Donley County's Hospital District's now vacant 20 bed hospital facility into a nursing home have met with "a majority of favorable comments," according to Hospital Administrator at the facility Jerry Knight.

Knight said board members reported at their monthly meeting last week they had been receiving favorable comments from county residents concerning the proposed changeover.

An application to the Texas Health Commission for changeover approval is almost complete, Knight said, and would probably be submitted before June 1.

Earlier comments from Hospital Board President Ernest Barbee pointed out the changeover was not "to leave it (the facility) a nursing home." Board plans are to open the now vacant wing of the building to nursing home patients in order to bolster the district's financial status. Knight has said the nursing home, without money assistance from a hospital, is currently operating at a "break-even" status because of its patient capacity. Both Knight and Barbee speculated convert-

ing the hospital wing would start the facility operating at a profit rather than breaking even.

Clarendon lawyer for the Hospital Board, Mike Saunders, said he foresees no legal problems in the conversion. The legislative statute which created the district outlines fairly broad powers for board members, Saunders said.

Sec. 8 of the bill states, in part, "The board of directors is hereby given complete discretion as to the type of buildings, both as to number and location required...to maintain an adequate hospital system may include facilities for...geriatric domiciliary care, convalescent home facilities."

Saunders also pointed out that conversion back to a hospital facility could be done quickly.

The Texas Health Commission has 90 days to make their decision concerning the application, Knight said. If approved, this decision is not binding legally for the district, however. "All an approval would mean is that the board could go ahead and convert to a nursing home," Knight said. "The final decision would still be up to them and the taxpayers of the district."

There have been many rumors in the past few weeks about the future of the Donley County Learning Center, Inc. (Day Care Center). Let us assure you that we are open and plan to continue in operation for as long as the working parents need us.

There will be a few changes in the next few days though. The two ladies, Doris Gardner and Doyce Swearingen, who are employed have reached the end of their training program and must be replaced. At this time we are paying our own way except for salaries. The help is paid through the Comprehensive Employment Training Act and have only a certain time to be employed. This is the reason there have been several turnovers in staff during our operation.

We have been open since Feb. third, 1975 and the rumor that we were closing has cropped up at least once a month. We are in the process of getting enough local support so that we can be completely self supporting. We will be open as long as you the citizens of Donley County stay behind us and support us.

Contrary to rumor our aim has never been to close the other baby Sitters. We only want to take care of the children who are not now under the care of existing baby sitters. In fact, in the past year of operation we have referred cases to them and kept their children for them while they were on vacation or ill. We have tried hard to dispell the first thoughts about us and to prove we are an asset not a liability to the community. An interesting thing to remember that while the local sitters are being investigated for state license, we are also being investigated for the same license and then we will then be investigated for federal license who standards are even harder than those imposed by the state licensing people.

Thank you very much for your interest and prayers. We would not have been able to continue as long as we have without the local citizens who have brought items of food and equipment through their churches and individually and without the faithful parents who allow us to keep their children.



Summer jobs available here

Ten and possibly 20 jobs will be available to Donley County youths this summer through Clarendon's Community Action Center and the Texas Panhandle Employment and Training Alliance (PETA).

Clarendon College offers new fall program

A new program has been announced for Fall, 1976, by Clarendon College. Electronic Organ and Electric Guitar Amplifier Service and Repair has been added to the Radio and T.V. Repair program of the college.

This program furnishes both the theory and practice required to qualify a person for employment in the electronic organ and electric guitar amplifier service industry. Successful completion of this program leads to the Associate in Applied Science Degree or Certificate of Completion based on the curriculum chosen by the student. A student may enter into this one year program upon successful completion of the first two semesters of the Radio and T.V. Repair

curriculum. Technicians who can furnish evidence of successful bench experience in electronic service and repair may enter upon recommendation of the instructor.

The new program will specialize in repair and maintenance of Lowery Organs. Lowery Organ Company will supply musical instruments and literature to be used by the college. Clarendon College joins only three other schools in the nation to offer such a course and the only college in the southwest. Other schools are located in California and Michigan. Future plans are

to add other national name brands of electronic instruments to the curriculum.

The program, under the instruction of Lee Roy Jackson, will include:

BASIC ORGAN: Organ familiarization. Tone Generators vibrato, dividers, upper and lower diode keying, wow, percussion, slow attack drive, flute filters, automatic rhythms, bass pedals, AOC, power supplies, reverbs, volume regulators and amplifiers, rhythm clock, instrumentation, chorus modulation, Leslie speakers, and etc.

BASIC AMPLIFIERS: Am-

plifier familiarization. Tube amplifiers, transistor amplifiers, DC coupled and transformer coupled amplifiers.

SHOP PRACTICES AND MANAGEMENT: Introduction to managing a shop.

MUSIC: Learning keyboard and basic notes as outlined in Music 102.

ORGAN GENERAL ADVANCED: Troubleshooting and servicing of electronic organs.

AMPLIFIERS GENERAL ADVANCED: Troubleshooting and servicing amplifiers, electric guitars and electric pianos.

Clarendon's 1926 Book Club also presented their annual Citizenship Award to Jay Lindley and Lisa McAnear.

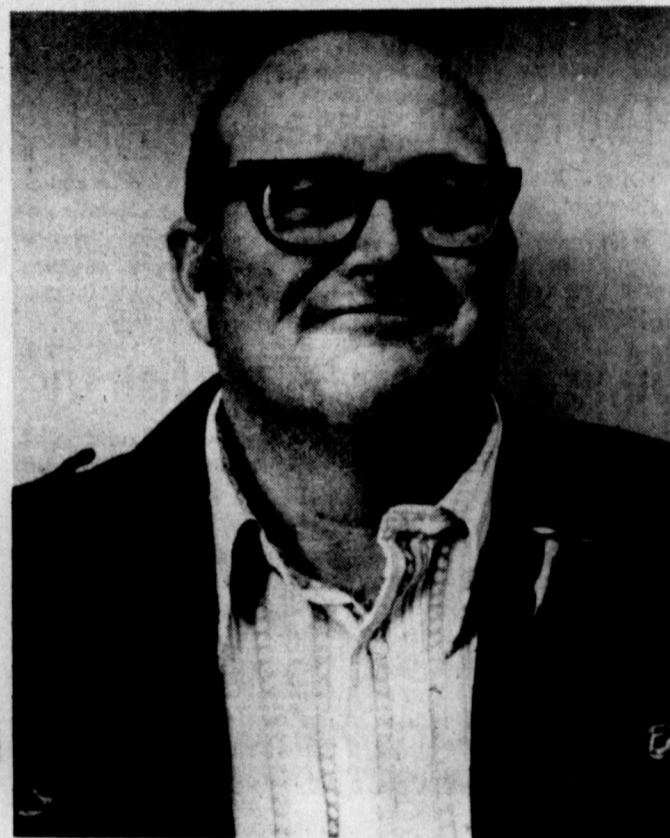
