QUEEN CANDIDATES -- Seven area girls are now vying for votes to be elected Rodeo Queen of the Saint's Rodeo July 1-3 in Clarendon. To vote, donations are placed in candidate's ballot boxes located in area businesses. Each cent is worth one vote. As of Monday, June 14, candidate voting tallies were Nancy Johnson, 6,138; Tammy Blackburn, 1,284; Angie Morgan, 896; Dink Slater, 821; Cyde Swinney, 579; Ellen Green, 414; and Marsha Terry, 331.

New faculty members were approved at the Clarendon School Board meeting Thursday, June 10, including the appointment of a junior high principal, a new high school head basketball coach and a special reading teacher for grades 1-8.

Faculty members include Floyd Guinn, named new Junior High Principal; Dean Overcast named Broncho Head Basketball Coach; and Gail Brown, new special reading instructor.

Guinn has served as counselor for Clarendon College for the past five years. Before coming to Clarendon, he was a coach and physical education instructor for the Canyon Public Schools.

Overcast, 28, brings an overall win loss basketball record of 69 wins to 32 defeats to Clarendon. This past season he coached and taught at Holdenville, Okla.

Overcast's coaching experience includes serving as coach for an Army team while in the service at Warrington, Virginia; coaching the junior varsity at Fort Lewis College; and public school teams at Ava Junior High School, Ava, Missouri; and Moss High School, Holdenville, Okla.

He has also been active with basketball summer camps during school breaks. While coaching in Ava and Holdenville, Overcast also instructed physical education.

He received his BA degree from Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colo. He and his wife Donna have one son, Monte, aged 2 yrs. They are

currently members of the Baptist Church in Holdenville.

Gail Brown, 27, has taught fifth grade in three public school systems before moving to Clarendon last December with her husband Donny.

She received her BA degree in Education from Texas Tech in 1971. Her first teaching assignment was with the Arlington School System. She later taught at Gatesville in Central Texas and in the Lubbock Public Schools.

Superintendent Jeff Walker said the board is still considering applicants for a high school English teaching position next year and a girl's basketball coach.

Other school business conducted at the board meeting included the approval of several supply contracts for the upcoming school year; appointing a school tax equalization board; and granting raises for auxiliary school em-

ployees. Supply contracts were awarded to local Borden Milk and Mead's Bread outlets for the 1976-77 school year. Both contracts were renewed from the past year.

All Clarendon school cafeteria workers were also rehired for the coming year along with being granted a 10 cent an hour raise. Custodial workers were also awarded an across the board 15 cent per hour increase.

Clarendon School's tax equalization board was also appointed at Thursday's meeting. Board members, set to meet sometime in July, include George Shields, Elmer Dishman, J.S. Hines, Mac White and Walt Knorpp.

In other board business, they approved a bid of \$900 for a school owned 66 passenger bus. Bids submitted for a 63 passenger were thought too low by board members and none were accepted.

Court to complete tax equalization soon

Donley County's Commissioner's Court were unable to complete the adjustment and equalization of county property taxes at their regular meeting Monday, June 14.

Court members adjourned at 5 p.m. Monday until June 28 to complete the equalization. The court was unable to set an earlier date to meet because of conflicting

schedules of the various commissioners.

Monday marked the third day the court had considered the county tax equalization. They met in called session Monday and Tuesday of last week to begin the equalization work.

Monday, June 14, was the regular meeting of the court. In other county business

Monday, the court voted to allow precinct commissioners Gene White and Olace Hicks to purchase a used bulldozer to be maintained and paid for jointly by precincts 1 and 2.

The type bulldozer needed was determined and, according to law, must now be advertised and bids accepted for its purchase. The court agreed to open all sealed bids for the dozer's sale at

their called meeting June 28.

Type of bulldozer needed is a crawler type tractor equipped with direct drive transmission, 24 volt direct electric start, hydraulic straight bulldozer with hydraulic tilt cylinder, enclosed cab, drawbar, minimum engine of 90 horsepower, weight not less than 24,000 pounds and a newer model

than 1964.

All bids should be submitted to County Judge Billy Christal.

Approval was also granted for the purchase of a washing machine for the Donley County jail. The court had instructed County Sheriff Frank Lindsey Jr. to buy the washer at their last regular session. Cost for the machine was quoted at \$259.

In final county business, Bill Price of General Telephone met with the court. Price attended in response to a request by the court that the telephone company, in the future, place all marker posts indicating where sections of under-

ground telephone cable connect beside county ditches rather than in the ditch. The telephone company agreed to do this.

Markers in the ditches interfered with motorgraders grading county ditches.

'Press' fish contest entries updated

Several fish were entered this weekend in three categories of the fishing contest sponsored by the "Clarendon Press" during the month of June. No pike, however, have been entered.

Leading fish entries as of Monday, June 14, were a 5 pound 9 ounce entry in the Bass category, turned in at Moorings Marina this week-

end by Lanny Tucker; a 1 pound 9 ounce sand bass entered in the pan fish category by Joe Bounds of Clarendon, again at Moorings; and in the catfish category a 5 pound 6 ounce channel cat weighed in at Milam's Canteen by George Winegeart of Pampa.

The contest is set to run through June 27 with over \$250 worth of prizes at stake

in four fishing categories.

Fisherman bringing in the largest bass by weight will win a Garcia Ambassador 2500 C reel with a Fenwick 1155 rod valued at over \$90. Prize for the largest pike caught will be a Garcia Ambassador 5000 reel with a Fenwick 1460 rod, estimated value \$75.

Fisherman catching the largest panfish will win a \$35

Plano Tackle Box model 727 and winner of the largest catfish, a \$25 gift certificate from the Boat Dock in Amarillo.

There is no charge to enter the contest and all Lake Greenbelt fishermen are eligible. To enter take your fish along with a Greenbelt fishing and recreation permit to either Moorings Marina on Greenbelt's south shore; Jim Milam's Canteen on the north shore; or Barney's Marine on Hwy. 70 just outside Clarendon.

Warehouses robbed here over week-end

Thieves broke into six Donley County businesses over the weekend, but only four area businessmen reported loss of merchandise.

In Clarendon, the Mobil Warehouse, Gulf Warehouse, Conoco Warehouse and the Texaco Warehouse were all broken into along with Foxworth - Galbraith Lumber Company. In Hedley, the Conoco Warehouse was broken into but nothing was reported stolen.

Hardest hit wer the Mobil Warehouse, which reported nine automobile tires stolen; and Foxworth - Galbraith, losing 16 rolls of fencing wire. Nothing was reported stolen from the Clarendon Conoco Warehouse. The Texaco warehouse had nothing reported stolen from the building but a CB radio was taken from a truck parked outside.

According to the County Sheriff's office, the thieves apparently gained entry to all the warehouses by prying padlock hasps from the doors

with some type prying tool. Tire prints and footprints believed left by the thieves were noted by county law officers at each location.

The Texas Rangers along with city and county law enforcement officials are currently investigating the crimes.

Three other incidents of theft were reported to the Donley County Sheriff's office during the later part of May, first of June.

Several guns were reported stolen from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gerry Knight May 27 sometime during the afternoon. Weapons taken in the burglary included a .22 cal. pistol; a .38 caliber pistol; a .32 caliber automatic pistol; and a .22 caliber derringer.

Also reported stolen in that burglary were two watches; a ruby ring; and an AM/FM radio. Knight valued the loss at approximately \$300.

The theft of a starter from a Donley County motorgrader was reported June 3 by Pct. 3 Commissioner Junior Hill.

V.C. Waddell of Hedley also reported his barn had been broken into June 6 with several items of machinery taken. Items stolen included an acetylene cutting torch; a portable hand grinder; a chain saw; and an electric drill.

Hospital District Board meets

Possibility of using a Physicians Placement Service was discussed by the Donley County Hospital District's Board at their monthly meeting June 8.

Such a service, if used, would supply doctors for the district's Medical Center.

According to Administrator at the center, Gerry Knight, the board discussed the measure and instructed him to write the service, World Wide Health Consultants, for more information.

Basically, when the service places a doctor in a facility, the facility's administrators agree to pay \$4,500 to World Wide, approximately 15 per cent of the physician's first year's base salary.

Knight said the board discussed several questions

including what type physician might be obtained through such a service and would this \$4,500 be repaid to the district.

In the letter of inquiry the board instructed Knight to ask specific questions including what guarantee the district would have concerning length of time the physician would stay; if the amount of money paid for the service was negotiable; and the possibility of having more than one physician placed.

"No major action was taken on the issue," Knight said. "Its just one of the things the board is looking into."

Currently, the board is reviewing the possibility of converting the now closed

hospital wing of the Medical Center into a nursing home facility and the formation of a county wide committee to work towards recruiting doctors for the area.

Knight said the first meeting of this recruiting committee would be held shortly. Thus far, county organizations pledging members to the committee include Howardwick's Lions Club and Clarendon's Chamber of Commerce and Lions.

In other board action at the meeting, tentative members to serve on the district's tax equalization board were named. These individuals will now be notified and asked to serve on the board.

The equalization board will meet sometime in July.

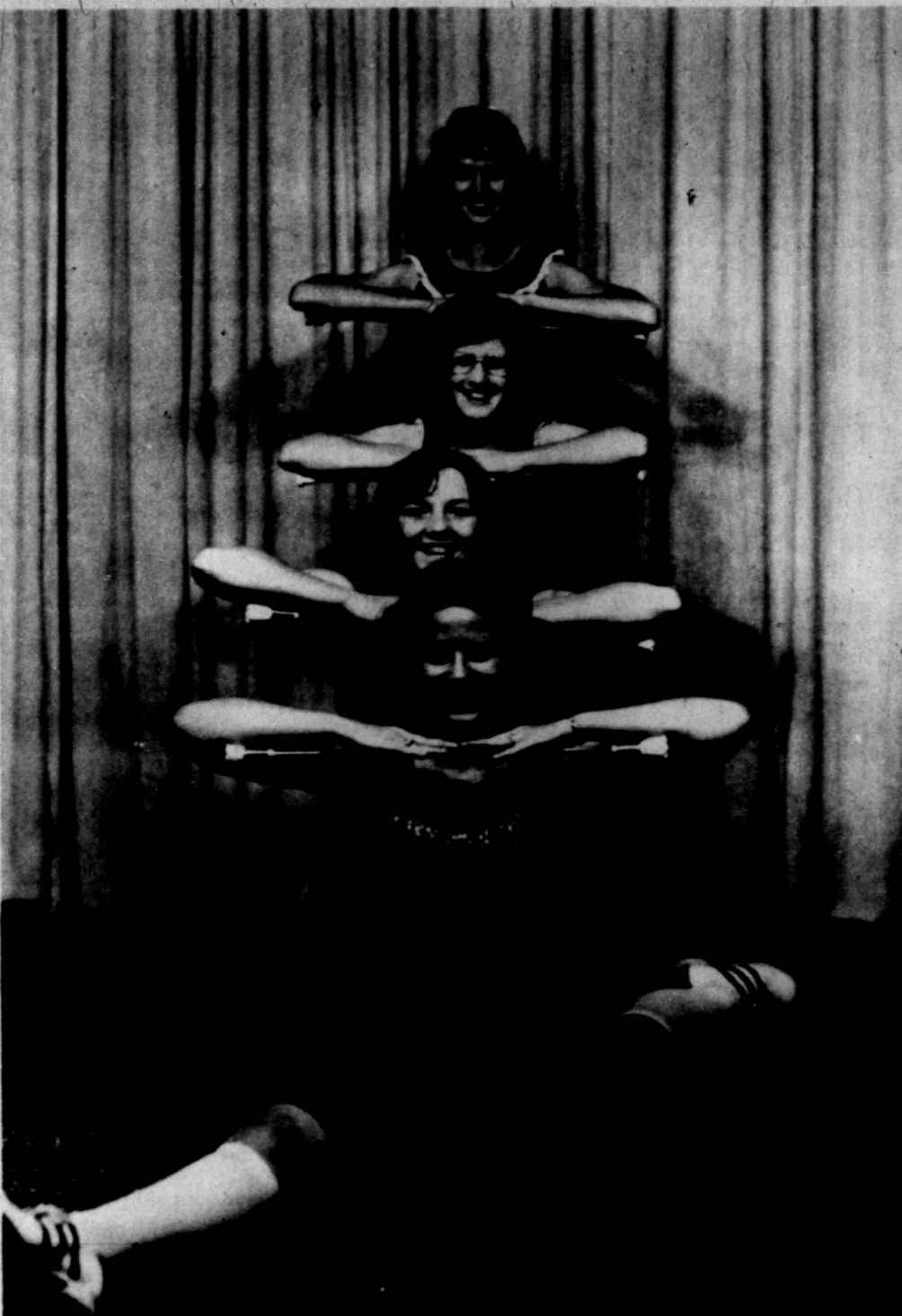

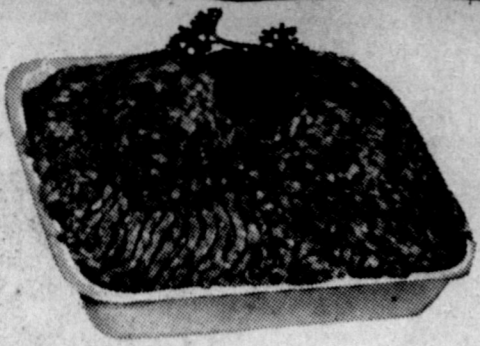

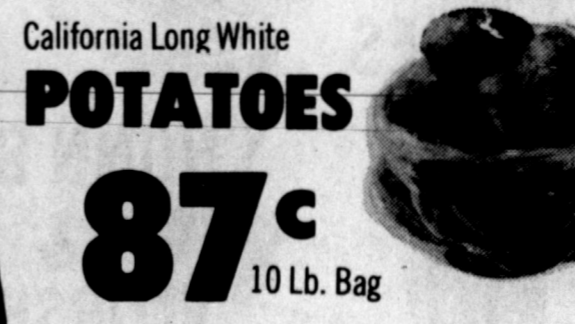

Greenbelt water to supply 'Thirsty Water System'

A \$3 million extension to the Thirsty Water System, including major expansion of the rural water program in the Four Winds area, is nearing completion this week.

Announcement of the Phase Five project has been made by Fred Parkey, executive director of the Red River Water Authority of Texas with headquarters in Wichita Falls.

The ambitious project will be financed with a 50 percent federal grant and a 50 percent loan from the Farm Home Administration and will include 350 miles of rural water lines.

The lines will be constructed in 11 north central and west Texas Counties including the Four Winds counties of Hardeman, Foard, Cottle and Childress as well as Hall, Motley, Donley, Collingsworth and Wheeler counties to the west and Knox, Wilbarger and Montague counties to the east.

Included in the plans are 15 new pump stations and six new water wells to be drilled at Gilliland in Foard County, Estelline in Hall County and Ringold in Montague county.

Some 80 percent of the water to serve the new customers, however, will

come from the Greenbelt Water Authority's Lake Greenbelt near Clarendon in Donley County.

When the system is complete the rural water patrons along the Thirsty Water system will be the largest group of water users from Lake Greenbelt.

Final plans for the new rural water extension are being completed this month by Biggs and Matthews, Engineers of Wichita Falls. Bids will be advertised by mid-summer with construction expected to get underway by shortly afterwards.
