## Greene Dry Goods Co. sells to Jimmy McElroy

As of January 1, 1984 Greene Dry Goods officially changed possession from Bill Greene to Jim and Kathy McElroy. The Greene family has been sole owners of the store for approximately 60 years. First Bill Greene's father, W.J. Greene, on September 1, 1924 bought the store. Bill returned from war and in 1946 began working fulltime by his father's side. Eventually he took over the family legacy to become owner of Greene Dry Goods.

The business prospered over the years and success prevailed for Bill. After many years of hard work and stress (associated with any business), the opportunity arose for Bill to sell. Two sharp and aggressive individuals returned to Clarendon and offered to buy the establishment from Bill and they are, of course, Jim and Kathy McElroy.

These two individuals are no strangers to this area. Jim spent most of his life here with his family, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McElroy, and two brothers, Kent and Jack. Jim attended Clarendon Public Schools and graduated from high school in 1968. Upon graduation he furthered his education at Clarendon College for 1½ years in which he met Kathy.

On February of 1971 Jim and Kathy exchanged vows at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon with the Reverend W.R. Lawrence presiding.

The couple lived in Clarendon until 1976. At this time the two moved to Amarillo seeking job opportunities. Jim became associated with B.B. Lumber while Kathy diligently furthered her career in the FHA organization. February of 1979 FHA transferred Kathy to Monte Vista, Colorado where she assumed the position of County Office Assistant. The first three years at Monte Vista Jim worked at Crow's Radio and T.V. in electronics. "I don't suppose there's anything in electronics we either didn't sell or work on," stated Jim. The last year, before moving, Jim was employed by Stober Irrigation.

The McElroys heard Greene Dry Goods would be up for sale. Immediately, each knew this would be an ideal opportunity to establish themselves and obtain a long desired dream of owning the store. January 3, 1983 the

two became general managers of Greene Dry Goods in order to help prepare themselves for the eventual take-over a year later.

The change of ownership has been relatively uncomplicated except for the excess paper work which is present with any business transfer. Jim stated, "The main reason I felt compelled to buy Greene's is the fact that I wanted to keep it (Greene's) going. The store is good for Clarendon by generating revenue and supplying jobs."

Besides Jim and Kathy, the store has three full time

employees with one part time employee. Carolyn Lowe of Hedley is one of the employees. She has driven to Greene's from Hedley for 7 years and looks forward to many more years of service at Greene's. Ella May Trout is another salesperson of 4 years and recently Jerome Campbell was hired as a part time salesman. Not to be forgotten is a very special lady, Ailene McElroy. She has spent 17 years on the store's staff. Ailene, mother of Jim, is as exhilarating as her son about the purchase exchange of Greene's. Ailene's two other sons are

currently out of the country, one on missionary training in Switzerland and the other is on business in Central America. She feels fortunate to have Jim and Kathy so close to her.

Jim and Kathy would like to welcome the surrounding area to stop in and visit. Come by and experience the personal touch Greene's offers its valued customers. "We want to continue the 60 year tradition of quality and service that Greene Dry Goods has had and will continue to offer. We have that personal touch. It's what we strive for. Thank

you for the support. We're (Kathy and I) are going to be for the dry good business what the Washington Redskins are to football," Jim conveyed. Maybe Jim should say L.A. Raiders or Dallas Cowboys, but everyone gets the point that they are eager and ready to serve the public.

## Several file for County offices

Saturday, January 7th was the first day one could file their intentions to run for one of the offices open for election in the May 5 primary. Billy Ray Johnston, Democratic Chairman said several had called and stated they intend to run, but only two had paid their filing fees as of Monday, January 9. There were Buford Holland, the incumbent commissioner of precinct 3 and Don Springer who has filed for the same position. Both men are from Hedley.

Jimmy Thompson has stated he will run for re-election as sheriff, David McCoy as District Attorney and Wanda Smith as tax assessor/collector. John Knorpp, Donley County At-

torney, told the Clarendon Press that he will not seek re-election. John Forbis will seek the office of District Judge for the 100th Judicial

District. A filing fee for most offices will be \$300, however constable and justice of the peace fees are only \$200.

## February 7 first filing day for City, School, College and Hospital elections

Saturday, April 1 will be the election day for Hedley and Clarendon school boards, Clarendon College Board of Regents, and aldermen for Hedley, Howardwick and Clarendon and Board of Directors for the Donley County Hospital District.

February 7 will be the first day you can file and there will be no filing fee for any of these positions. You may file for these positions at the offices of the school superintendent, administration office, Clarendon College or city hall of each of the cities.

Clarendon School District has two places open as board members, Bob Cole and Don Robinson, terms expires.

Hedley School District will have four places open when Cheryl Wiggins, Bob White,

Ben Carson and Henry Stephens terms expire. Henry Stephens replaces resigned board member Larry Helms.

Billie Christal, Bright Newhouse and Dr. Gilkeys terms will expire as Regents at Clarendon College.

Gene White, J.G. McAnear and Lloyd McCords terms as Clarendon Aldermen will be up for election as will Howardwick's Pat McAnearney, Charlie Boren and Leon May. Howardwick will also elect a mayor, as their mayor LeRoy Jackson resigned.

We do not have a list as yet as to how many seats will be open for election in the City of Hedley and the Hospital District but will print them at a later date.

## Water everywhere, but not a drop in my house

Melting ice left a mess around the county as Hedley, Howardwick and Clarendon city employees work continually to repair breaks in the city water lines. Temperatures were at a record breaking level for a week and a half throughout the state and most of the nation. Tommie Saye, Clarendon weatherman, registered a -2 degrees as the lowest temperature in Clarendon. As the temperatures warmed, untold numbers of water mains and frozen meters burst leaving residents without water and broken pipes leaking water over the city

streets. Hedley had several city valves to freeze, causing the city water to be cut off a couple of times to make the repairs. O'Neal Weatherly has worked for the city 32 years and he stated, "I never saw anything like this since I have worked for the city."

Clarendon City Secretary Donna Edwards said they had a long list of frozen meters and workmen have been working long hours trying to restore service back to all the residents and stop the leaks causing the loss of water and low pressure. Howardwick had several broken lines but stated they just about got service back to normal.

A water break at the LaRue's Restaurant caused them to have to close for over two weeks. All three cities have expressed their appreciation to residents making the best of a bad situation.

## New rates for West Texas Utilities

New rates for West Texas Utilities Co.'s retail customers have received final approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are now in effect.

The rates are designed to provide an annual revenue increase of \$11.97 million. The company, in its rate request filed last June 10, had asked for \$26.5 million.

Although the change means a 5.2 percent increase in total retail sales, the current effect will be a decrease for customers who have been paying temporary rates the past 2½ months. WTU had started collecting interim rates, as allowed by law, on Oct. 22 from all customers except those in 30 towns whose cases had been appealed to the PUC.

Because the final rates approved by the PUC are lower than the temporary rates,

## EMS delivers baby Saturday

On Saturday night January 7, history was made by Clarendon EMS when they delivered their first baby ever in the ambulance while enroute to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

The baby, a boy, was born to Glenda Wilson, age 22 of Clarendon. It weighed 6 lbs. 13½ oz. and was 20 inches long. This was her second child. At last report, mother and child were both doing fine. The transport team which delivered the baby consisted of Connie McAnear EMT, Mark Winsor EMT, Phillip Vargas Paramedic, and Pat Robertson Paramedic.

At 10:36 p.m. the call was received through the Sheriff's Office Dispatcher that a woman was in labor at her residence in north Clarendon. The ambulance arrived at 10:42 p.m. and after the initial evaluation it was determined that the mother was in fact in the early stages

of labor and preparation for transport and the possibility of pre-hospital delivery was made. The ambulance left Clarendon at 10:54 p.m. An IV was started and a cardiac monitor applied while enroute. It soon became apparent that delivery was imminent and they would not make it to the hospital before the baby was born.

The team was in contact with a physician at AERC throughout the entire transport. The birth began after the ambulance had entered the Amarillo City Limits. There were a few tense moments when the baby was born still enclosed in the amniotic sac, a phenomenon which is relatively rare. When this happens, the sac must be removed quickly or the baby will literally drown in the amniotic fluid. After the sac was removed and the baby suctioned, he soon began breathing on his own and crying and his color improved. The birth was fully completed just as the ambulance arrived at the hospital at 11:43 p.m. The baby was wrapped in warm blankets and moved to a specially prepared incubator and then the mother was taken to labor and delivery. After it was determined that the baby was not in any distress, he was transferred from AERC to the infant nursery in good condition. The time of birth was officially recorded at 11:41 p.m.

One of the team members stated, "We were very proud and excited to be part of this. Although this was our first delivery, emergency childbirth and complicated delivery are taught as a part of all EMS courses so we knew what to do, we had just never actually done it before! Except for the amniotic sac not breaking spontaneously, there were no problems with delivery. We felt very confident knowing we had infant

resuscitation equipment on board had we needed it. Until a few months ago, this equipment was not available to us. All of it was donated by or purchased with donations from county citizens. Had the baby been in any acute distress, it would have made the differences between life and death for this or any other infant. We appreciate everyone who has made all of our equipment possible and those who continue to support us every day in many ways."

Buford Holland has announced his candidacy for a third term as Commissioner Precinct 3. Mr. Holland and his wife, Geraldine, have two sons, Darrell and Glyndol both of Hedley and one daughter, Mrs. Johnny Hill of Clarendon. He is a stock farmer at Hedley and a life long resident of Donley County and has lived 59 years in Precinct 3. He has served on the school boards in both Lelia Lake and Hedley.

He and his wife are members of the First Baptist Church and he belongs to the Hedley Lions Club and Farm Bureau.

"If re-elected, I will continue to work for Donley County to the best of my ability. I appreciate the vote of confidence the people in Precinct 3 have given me in the past and your vote and influence will be greatly appreciated," Holland stated.

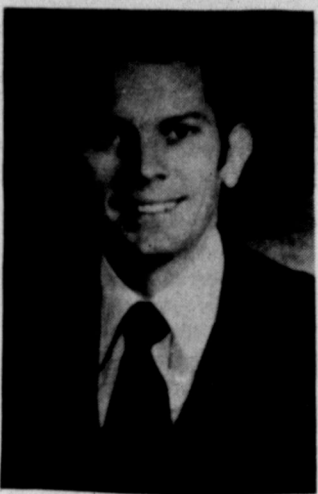
# Malta, New Guinea, Germany and Kenya Missionaries to be at Calvary's Annual Missions Conference

The Rev. Gary L. Pinion, Pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church has planned one of the greatest Stewardship and Mission Conferences in the history of the church. Rev. ## Milam and the Alamo

Jim Milam of Howardwick, Texas did some research on a fourth cousin, Col. Benjamin Rush "Ben" Milam and on returning from San Antonio, Texas brought this heroic era of history back with him along with a letter that Ben Milam wrote this to his brother James Milam, from New Orleans, La. on May

20th 1828, before sailing to England and a riding quart that Col. Milam used. These historic relics are on display at the First Bank & Trust of Clarendon.

The name "Milam" is not mentioned in The American Peoples Encyclopedia but it does tell about the group of Texans that went in and captured San Antonio in 1835. This group of Texans was the three hundred that Col. Milam led. They won but lost their lives in doing so. It left a historical and heroic era of Ben Milam for kinsman Jim Milam and others.

The beautiful Milam Building in the Alamo City of San Antonio, Texas erected on the bank of the winding San Antonio River, a fitting tribute to one of Texas's bravest and greatest heroes, Col. Benjamin Rush "Ben" Milam. A thirty-five foot granite shaft monument in honor of Milam on "Milam Square" was unveiled by the hero's kinswoman, a great grandniece, Mrs. J.B. Privatt of Birmingham, Alabama and the sculptress of the statue, Miss Bonnie MacLeary. The statue shows Milam with gun in hand. The unveiling took place in September 1938 near where he died December 7, 1835. This monument will keep alive the memory of Col. Milam, who led a group of three hundred Texans into San Antonio to free it from a Mexican army and who died in the successful attack, did receive imperishable tribute on that day in 1835 with the unveiling of that monument in his honor. He was killed while moping up at the Alamo. It was in the old Veramendi House that Ben died and there his faithful men buried him in the doorway where his body remained until later removed to Milam Square also named in his honor.

Mrs. Privatt, whose grandmother was Annie Milam Doom of Kentucky, came to San Antonio for the unveiling. Her grandmother's grandfather was James milam, Ben's brother. Ben was a soldier in the war of 1812 and was never married.

Col. Milam's death was described by United States Senator Tom Connally as one of the most heroic and daring endeavors of all the Texas Revolution. Connally traced Milam's career from the time of his birth at Frankfort, Ky in 1788 including his adventures, business and military activities in South America, Mexico and Texas to victory in death.

Ben Milam was a native of Kentucky, born to humble parents. He received a very slight education but had a strong mind which was unfettered by the hand of circumstance. He was forceful and enterprising to the highest degree and soon distinguished himself in many ways.

Milam aided Mexican revolutionists against Spain and was imprisoned in Mexico before he returned to Texas to assist on capture of Goliad from the Mexicans and finally to lead the battle which won San Antonio for the Texans, although it cost his life, in one of the most heroic and daring endeavors of all the Texas Revolution, inspired and thrilled his followers to supreme achievement. He led the three hundred men who volunteered to his call to take San Antonio. As a result of his brave charge on San Antonio the Alamo was taken in the capture of the town and was held by Neill and later by Travis, until finally captured by Santa Anna in the terrible massacre known as the "Fall of the Alamo". He was arrested by the government

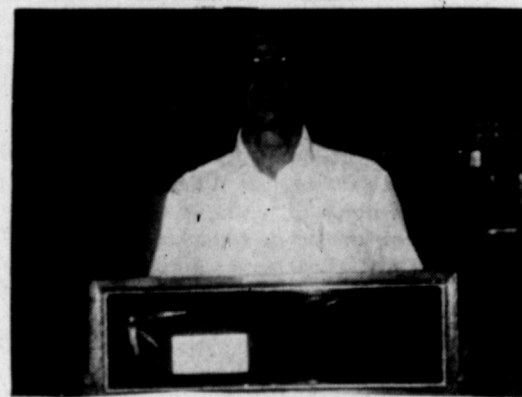
of Mexico in 1835 and thrown into prison. He soon escaped and eluded his pursuers in his long journey back to Texas, traveling more than six hundred miles without a road. Traveling by night and hiding by day until in early October, 1835, he arrived near the town of Goliad, where he joined the Texas army and became a private in the ranks. Although he had been raised in the army of the United States and had rendered distinguished service for the cause of liberty in Mexico, he willingly took the rank of a common soldier. But no man of Milams spirit and training could be kept in the rank of a common soldier. He demanded leadership and called for volunteers. His faithful three hundred men responded and he led them to

victory and to death and through his death to immortality in Texas history. The battle lasted three days. Mexicans surrendered and left town.

Milam is remembered because he had courage but particularly because he had personality and leadership, and the power to quicken within the soul of other men, a courage that had been hidden timidity and indecision and was only waiting for a leader.

The Centennial Celebrations may fade and pass into history but these enduring monuments will serve all the years to come as reminders of the dramatic and heroic chapters of the "History of Texas" and an era which will make kinsmen proud.

"We will begin accepting applications for the 1984 farm programs on January 16th," Edwin Campbell, CED, said. The 1984 acreage reduction programs were announced last August for wheat and during the fall for

corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, cotton and rice.

Campbell said to be eligible for loans and target price protection farmers must sign up and comply with the acreage reduction program requirements.

To emphasize the conservation aspects of the 1984 programs, land removed from production will be put into an acreage conservation reserve (ACR). "We encourage farmers to place their more erosive land into the ACR while continuing to balance supply with demand.

For reducing their wheat acres by 30 percent of their base, farmers will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.45 per bushel, price support loans at \$3.30 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for a payment-in-kind at 75 percent of their program yield, according to Campbell.

Farmers who reduce their feed grain, acreage by 10 percent of their base will receive federal target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 a bushel for oats. They also will be eligible for loan rates of \$2.55 a bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 per bushel for oats.

The upland cotton program offers farmers a target price of 81 cents per pound and a loan rate of 55 cents

per pound for reducing their cotton acres by 25 percent of their base. Farmers who reduce their extra long staple cotton acres by 10 percent of their base will be eligible for target price protection of 99 cents per pound and loans at \$2.50 cents per pound.

"The 1984 crop of extra long staple cotton will be the first covered by new farm legislation, making the program similar to the upland cotton program," Campbell said.

For reducing their rice acres by 25 percent, farmers will be eligible for target price protection of \$11.90 per hundredweight and a national average loan rate of \$8.00 per hundredweight.

The ASCS official said participation in the acreage reduction programs is a way in which farmers can control over-supply situations.

"The programs also will provide a degree of insurance for farmers against price fluctuations and adverse weather conditions."

Contracts signed by program participants will be considered binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program requirements. The sign-up period ends February 24th.

## Sales Tax payments sent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$44.6 million in local sales tax payments to the 980 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax. These checks are up a whopping 39.5 percent over last January's payments, Bullock said. "A big part of that increase came because 15,000 taxpayers who previously only paid taxes four times a year started paying every month and we got their money back to the 980 city halls that much quicker. But some of the increase is due to the economic recovery we're seeing in Texas."

Groom received \$1,070.71 this period compared to \$1,437.79 collected during the same period last year resulting in a 25.53 percent reduction. Wellington's net payment this month was \$3,281.50 up from the same period last year of \$2,274.21 giving them a 44.29 percent increase.

Clarendon was up 24.36 percent with \$4,615.22 this period and \$3,711.17 for the same period the previous year. No percentages were given for Hedley and Howardwick this period.

Memphis in Hall County received the largest percent in the area with a 106.83 percent increase. They received \$4,642.63 this period and \$2,244.64 in the same period last year.

January checks were for taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the Comptroller's office by December 20.

Edwin Campbell today urged Donley County farmers to report any changes in their farm operations which could affect farm program benefits for 1984.

"In order for us to help producers get program benefits, farm records must be up-to-date," said Campbell. "Therefore, producers should contact our office if a farm will have a new owner effective for 1984, or if a change is made in the operation of an existing unit."

He said plans to combine farms or divide a farm should be requested as soon as possible because reconstitutions require special processing as well as county committee approval.

"Likewise, farmers who want to establish proven yields for 1984 feed grains or wheat should assemble proof of production records for this year's crop."

The ASCS official said production evidence must be kept separate for each year and for each farm. Farmers will be given the opportunity to request a proven yield until the final sign-up date if production evidence so warrants.

Save Your Heart

During an interview with Senator Claude Pepper, Time Magazine's Washington Correspondent Hayes Gorey was a passenger in the Senator's car. The engine was sputtering, said Gorey, and finally stalled as they arrived at a main thoroughfare. Gorey jumped out to push, suggesting that Senator Pepper remain at the wheel and guide the car to the curb.

But the indomitable 82-year-old Senator hopped out too, pushing and steering at the same time. He later explained he thought Gorey needed help.



Pushing a car can be risky business for someone who has a heart problem, as does Senator Pepper (he has a pacemaker). It's dangerous, too, being stalled on a main thoroughfare.

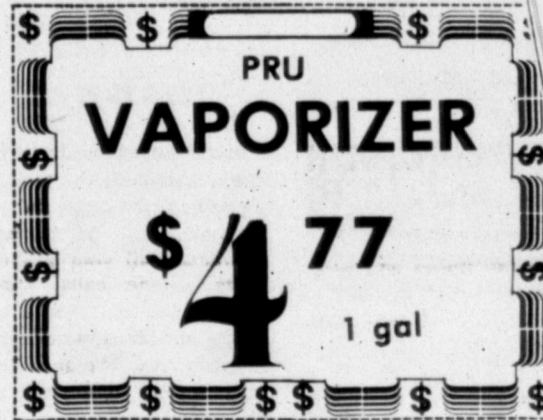

Cash refunds will be mailed to customers who have moved off WTU lines or transferred to towns where the interim rates were not in effect. These checks will be sent to the customer's last known address.

If these customers have not received refunds by April 1, they should contact their former local WTU office.

Amount of refunds will vary according to the size of the customer bills. For example, for a customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, the difference would be \$4.34. At this rate, his refund for the entire period would amount to about \$12.

Refunds will be made to all customers served by WTU during the period from Oct. 22 to Jan. 6, except those who live in the city limits of the following towns:

Alpine, Aspermont, Balmerhea, Bronte, Clyde,

Cross Plains, Dodson, Estelina, Hawley, Irran, Jayton, Junction, Lawn, Lueders, Marfa, Memphis, Menard, Merkel, Miles, Presidio, Putnam, Quitaque, Rankin, Santa Anna, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Turkey Tuscola and Valentine.

None of the rate changes apply in the City of Vernon, where WTU's rates are kept the same as those of the city's municipal system and already are higher than those in the remainder of the system.

**Two merging Utility Co save \$15 million in taxes**

State Comptroller B ob Bullock said Tuesday he hopes the next time Texas Utilities Electric Company seeks a rate increase from the Public Utility Commission, the PUC will remember the company is already enjoying a \$15 million windfall it got at the expense of other Texas taxpayers.

Bullock said the company took advantage of an obscure loophole in the state's 25-year-old utility gross receipts tax law to save \$15 million in state taxes when Texas Electric Service Company merged with Texas Power & Light and Dallas Power — & Light.

"The tax law says that since these companies merged I have to treat them as a brand new firm and only charge them a minimum tax of \$50 for the first quarter of 1984," Bullock said. The firm will still pay an estimated \$45 million for the remaining three quarters of 1984, Bullock noted.

"When the PUC approved this merger, they said they didn't know how it would affect the company's customers. I don't know either, but I do know the rest of us Texas taxpayers have taken a \$15 million poke in the eye with the sharp end of an accountant's pencil."

"The last time I issued an estimate of available state revenue, I predicted we would have enough to cover state spending with about \$15.9 million to spare. Thanks to this merger, most of that margin is gone."

"The chairman of the Utility Commission has expressed concern recently over what percentage of electric company dues to their national trade association ought to be charged to ratepayers. Well, those dues are only a drop in the bucket compared to this \$15 million and I hope he'll keep that in mind the next time this company asks for

higher rates." Bullock predicted the \$50 minimum tax provision will

be repealed next time the Legislature convenes in January 1985.

**Changes in tax reporting deadlines**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that changes in tax reporting deadlines and new Metropolitan Transit Authority tax in the Dallas areas have had Texas taxpayers calling the Comptroller's toll-free tax hotline in record numbers.

"This hotline lets a taxpayer anywhere in Texas reach out and touch the Comptroller's office without charge to get a quick answer to any state tax question," Bullock said.

"This Wednesday, 2,264 Texans did just that, the largest number ever to call us in a single day."

Bullock said Wednesday was the second such record-breaking day this week. "On Tuesday, we received 2,171 calls. Before that, the record of 1,972 calls had stood since January 31, 1983."

"We don't expect this record to hold long, either," Bullock said. "This coming January 20 is the new deadline for Texas sales taxpayers. Whether they pay monthly, quarterly or annually, everybody will have sales tax reports due that day and we expect another record number of calls to answer last-minute tax questions before the deadline."

Bullock installed toll-free incoming WATS lines to answer taxpayer questions shortly after taking office in 1975. During 1983, a total of 357,364 calls were received on the 20 incoming WATS lines now used by the Comptroller.

In addition to answering tax questions, the tax experts who answer the hotline also routinely refer callers to

other government agencies for help with non-tax problems.

Bullock said any taxpayer who still has questions about taxes can get answers by calling the hotline at 1-800-252-5555.
