WTU receives rate hike

West Texas Utilities customers who paid interim rates the latter part of 1983 will begin receiving refunds this month.

However, all refunds will be small, and some customers won't get them at all, company officials said.

They'll be small because the higher rates were charged for only a short time. Some customers won't be affected, because their rates were not changed during the period.

WTU started charging interim rates on October 22 when it became evident that a requested rate increase filed June 10, 1983 would be delayed indefinitely by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Interim rates were allowed by state law, subject to refund, if after three months the PUC had not ruled on the company's request.

WTU has asked for an increase of \$26 million annually and the PUC staff recommended \$10 million.

The Commission eventually approved \$12 million, with the new rates effective Jan. 6, 1984.

WTU now will pay customers the difference between the interim rates and the new rates, plus 12.83 percent interest. Refunds are being credited to customer bills, while checks are being mailed to those who have disconnected from WTU system.

Amounts to residential customers are averaging less than \$5, including interest.

Customers in the following towns, which had denied the rate request and appealed to the Commission, are not affected: Hawley, Tuscola, Lawn, Merkel, Putnam, Clyde, Cross Plains, Santa Anna, Lueders, Aspermont, Jayton, Marfa, Valentine, Presidio, Alpine, Balmorhea, Rankin, Iraan, Estelline, Quitaque, Turkey, Memphis, Dodson, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Bronte, Menard, Junction and Miles.

level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin. In school, he has been active in both sports and student activities. He attended the 1983 4-H Congress in Austin and was a

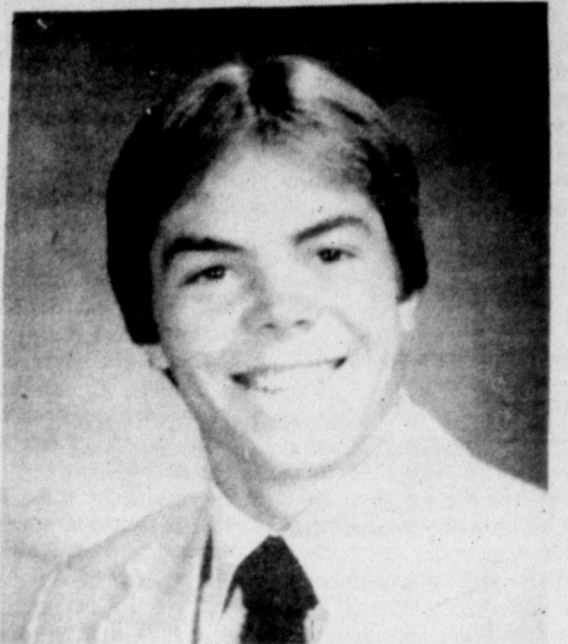
Calvary Baptist Youth to attend rally

EPA issues emergency suspension of EDP

The EPA issued today an emergency suspension order of the pesticide ethylene dibromide (EDB) for use as a fumigant on stored grain and as a spot fumigant on grain milling machinery. This is a followup to their September 30, 1983 ban on the use of EDB as a soil fumigant.

This information should be EDB cannot be used in any form which will affect the food chain for both humans and animals. Farmers should check all containers and carefully read-all labels as EDB comes under a variety of trade names. Some of which are:

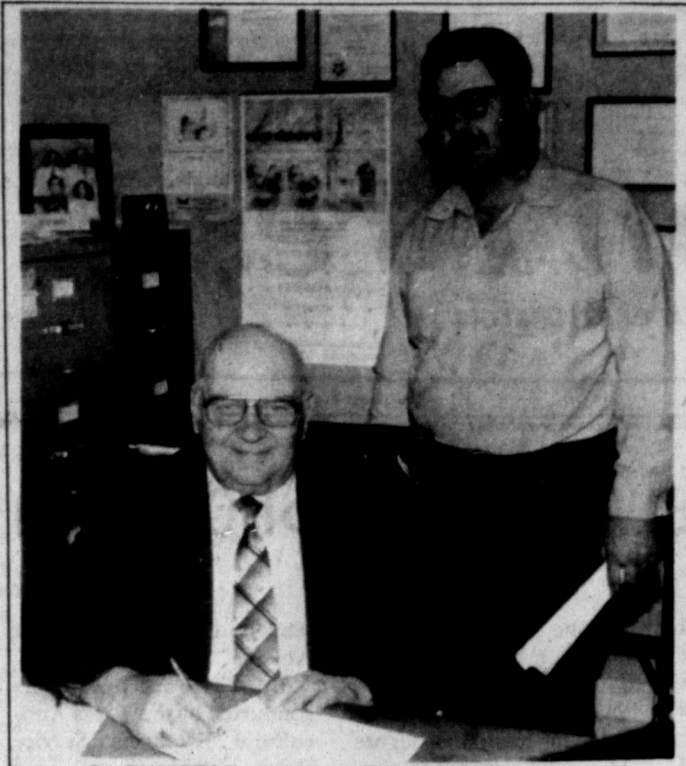

Veterans may soon start applying for home loans

According to Jack A. Moreman, Veterans Service Officer for Donley County, veterans may soon start applying for home loans under the recently passed

Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

Mr. Aubrey L. Bullard, Executive Director of the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission, has announced that the Commission is now ready to accept Requests for Certification from participating lenders. Under the provisions of the Program, the Veterans Affairs Commission will determine the veteran's eligibility to participate in this program based upon the veteran's residence, length of active duty service and honorable discharge.

Mr. Bullard advised that his Austin staff has been increased to handle the expected large number of applicants and that all efforts for expeditious handling of the requests for certifications have been made.

Mr. Bullard further stated that veterans wishing to participate in this program must first have a contract for the purchase of a home and qualify for a loan with a participating lender, which in turn will submit the Request for Certification to the Veterans Affairs Commission. Mr. Bullard indicated that a complete listing of participating lenders should be available during the middle part of January 1984.

After eligibility has been established, the State will authorize the loan and The Veterans Land Board, which is under the leadership of Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, will send the lending institution up to \$20,000 to be applied toward the total amount loaned for the purchase of the home. The current interest rate for the loan from the State has been set at 9.97%.

Texas Saving Bonds up 28 percent

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds during the period January through November 1983 in Texas amounted to \$246,681,983, an increase of 27.6% over the same period a year ago, T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, Texas, announced. These sales represent 109.8% of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

In Donley County, sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$977.00 during November, 1983, Bill Lowe, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total eleven-month sales of \$22,777 represent 35% of the County's 1983 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, January through November 1983 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$3.5 billion, an increase of 21% over 1982 sales, representing 102.0% of the Nation's \$3.5 billion goal. Savings Bonds held by the public amounted to \$71 billion as of November 30, 1983, the highest in three years.
