County banks assets up 14 million since 1980

Bank assets at Donley County's three banks have steadily increased since 1980. At the end of the fourth quarter, which would be Oct., Nov. and Dec. 1980 the banks had a combination of \$43 million 614 thousand dollars. In 1981, \$50 million 148 thousand dollars. 1982, \$56 million 038 thousand dollars. At the end of the same period for 1983... they were up another \$2 million, 026 thousand dollars for a total of \$58 million, 064 thousand dollars.

Individually the First Bank and Trust has increased their assets 8 million 311 thousand dollars from third quarter 1980 to fourth quarter 1983. Donley County State Bank increased their assets same period 4 million, 934 thousand dollars, while Security State Bank in Hedley increased theirs 1 million 205 thousand dollars.

One reason for the growth indicator in the county was deregulation of banking laws, which allows the banks to be more competitive with savings and loans and offer depositors a variety of higher interest bearing certificates.

Lightning was the cause of a grass fire on Cotton Nelson's farm Friday night. The fire burned only a small patch, as heavy rain fell shortly after the fire started. The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Dept. had the fire under control in short order.

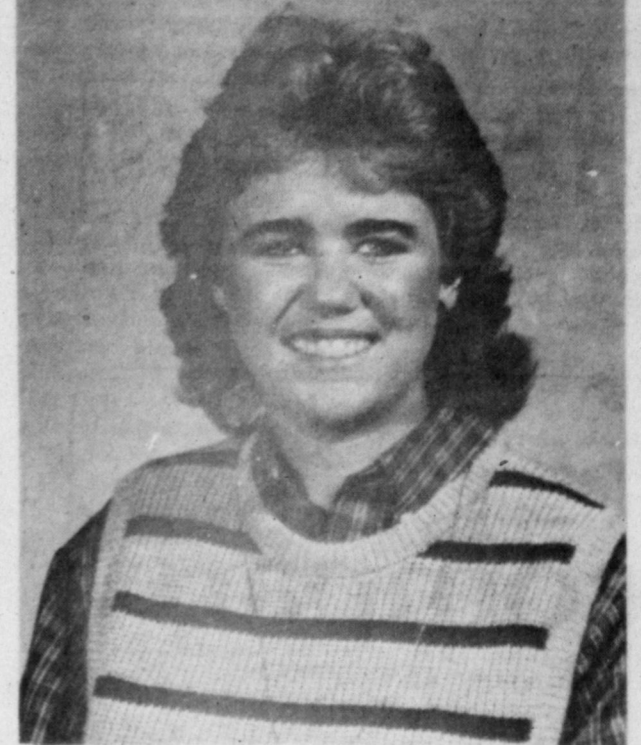
The Howardwick Fire Dept. was called back four times Thursday and Friday as high winds rekindled the flame.

FTA attends 35th Annual TFTA Convention

T.F.T.A. held its 35th Annual Convention February 17-18, 1984 at the Lester E. Palmer Auditorium in Austin with over 3,000 members and advisors in attendance.

The Clarendon F.T.A. Chapter consisting of 10 members, Annette Watson, Arlis Thomas, Kim Formway, Sheri Chamberlain, Tim Cole, Mitch Johnson, Lynn Alderson, Renee Kuhn, Tish Robinson, Tammi Deen and their advisors, Miss Betty Veach and Peggy Anderson, left early Thursday morning for the long bus drive to Austin. The Clarendon F.T.A. was supporting Annette Watson, candidate for State T.F.T.A. President. The Clarendon chapter had previously worked hard on campaign material and a skit that was presented at the state convention.

Friday morning was registration at the Palmer Auditorium. At 11:00 Annette Watson and Miss Betty Veach attended a meeting for candidates for state office. She drew her place for her booth and was told of the ethics of running a campaign. Also at 11:00 Tish Robinson took the Clarendon chapter's local scrapbook to be entered in the scrapbook competition. Profit about 10:30 to 1:00 the Clarendon chapter campaigned for Annette Watson, meeting with delegates and handing out campaign material to some 3,000 F.T.A. members.

The First General Session started at 2:30 p.m. with Nita Fields, president, Brady, presiding. T.F.T.A. Tomorrow's Future, Today's Adventure was the theme for the state convention. Mrs. Linda Gail White, First Lady of Texas, gave the keynote address. Karl Travis, 1981-82 TFTA president from District XVI, Tulsa also gave a short address. Angel Edwards, 1983-84 State TFTA Parliamentarian from Tulsa, District XVI, gave the invocation.

District meetings (20 districts) were scheduled from 3:30-5:00. Annette Watson made All District Caucus meetings except 2 (they adjourned before she got there). District XVI (of the Panhandle) met at 4:30 with Gary Glenn, Canyon, District President, presiding. Schools represented were Canyon, Clarendon, Happy, Childress, Canadian, Panhandle, Borger.

There were 16 candidates for state office. Skits and speeches for state office candidates highlighted the Second General Session at 6:30 p.m. in the Main Level Auditorium. Annette's skit theme was a western melodrama. It was taped on a cassette.

Tim Cole played the Sheriff leading a posse, Arlis Thomas with Sheri Chamberlain as the deputy. The cowboy, Lynn Alderson, had captured Annette, the heroine. The sheriff and posse go to saloon looking for Annette. Mitch Johnson played the villain who had Annette captured. Convention entertainment from 9:00 p.m. to midnight included a disco dance and lightshow by Brent Green of the Green Agency of Austin and a hospitality suite for advisors.

convened at 1:30 p.m. for the purpose of electing state officers. 195 delegates were certified. District XVI had 9 delegates with Kim Formway being a delegate from Clarendon. Each candidate was asked to respond to a question asked about their office. Annette did well with her question and answer. There were 2 candidates for State TFTA President - Kim Steadman from Gladwater and Annette Watson from Clarendon. Annette won with 104 votes to Kim's 91. Four candidates ran for the office of Vice President - Cindy Kilcrease of Cleburne H.S. won. Four candidates filed for Recording Secretary Cathy Baker of Huntsville

Collect soil samples now for 1984 crops

Farmers are concerned about ways they can improve the efficiency of nutrient use by crops and therefore should pay close attention to soil testing. Soil tests show which nutrients are actually present and which ones are lacking.

Fertilizer efficiency deals with the amount of a nutrient in fertilizer used by the crop to increase yields and profit, says Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent. If no increase is obtained, then the soil's nutrient level was inadequate to meet the crop's requirement. Therefore, knowing the level of available nutrients in a soil is fundamental to fertilizer efficiency.

Soil tests have been developed to measure soil nutrient levels, explains Gooch. These laboratory tests use methods that have given good correlations with crop responses. Soil nutrients must be considered for sound and profitable decisions about fertilizing 1984 crops.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock can test your soil samples and provide you with information for more efficient use of fertilizer, says Gooch. More information about collecting and mailing samples

Collecting soil samples and getting them tested now will help you avoid the spring rush and will allow you more time to plan your fertilizer needs for the coming crop season. Fees for testing soil samples will increase on March 1, 1984, to \$6.00 for a regular soil test and to \$10.00 for a regular test with Micro-nutrients.

The Staff College is part of the National Defense University operated under the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

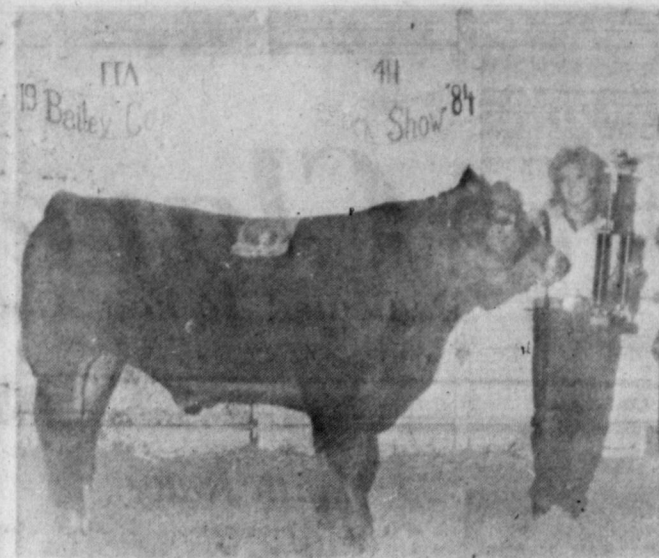

DPS taking applications for trainees

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander in Lubbock says DPS is now taking applications for the position of recruit trainee. DPS says Yes! To Those Who Qualify. Basic requirements are 20 to 35 years of age, sound physical condition, weight for males is not less than two pounds per inch of height nor more than three pounds per inch of height, weight for females is not less than one and three-quarters pounds per inch of height nor more than two and one-half pounds per inch of height, visual acuity must be correctable to 20/30. Applicants must have a minimum of six semesters college hours, or two years military, or two years law enforcement experience. Applicants must be a citizen of the United States. They must possess a valid Texas drivers license.

Each applicant must obtain a satisfactory grade on physical examinations, oral examinations, interview and other portions of the screening process. The starting pay for recruit trainee is \$1,428 per month. Major Cawthon also states that an application can be obtained from any State Trooper or at any DPS office.

Fruit trees need "lube" job

Have you given your fruit and nut trees their annual "lube" job? This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects, points out Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Why control scale insects? The answer is simply to save the tree. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets started, it could kill your tree.

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the tempera-

ture is between 40-70 F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely within 48 hours after application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out, cautions Gooch. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop.

Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your tree will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil, suggests Gooch.

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BLOOD DETECTION KITS

For many years, tests for the detection of blood in the stool have been used in hospitals and in the offices of physicians. Such tests for hidden (occult) blood are valuable in screening for cancer of the rectum and colon. Similar screening kits are now being made available for use by individuals at home. The new kits will be provided through several commercial outlets, including many pharmacies.

One consumer kit uses a test paper that is treated with a chemical to make it sensitive to hemoglobin, a major constituent of blood. The test-user smears a small stool sample on the paper using an applicator. A developing

solution is then dropped on the stool sample. If even a small amount of blood is present in the stool, the paper turns a characteristic color.

A "positive" test result does not always indicate the presence of cancer, however. Blood from any source (including a small, bleeding stomach ulcer or a rare steak eaten the day before the test) will be detected by the test. Kit manufacturers inform the test user that test results should be discussed with a physician, and that the test does not eliminate the need for visits to a doctor for periodic examinations. The kits have been released in the U.S. and may soon be available in Canada.

Warden Academy applications taken

Law Enforcement officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will accept applications during February for the next Game Warden Training Academy which will convene in Austin in the fall of 1984.

Officials stressed that applications will be accepted only during the month of February 1984.

Completed applications forms must be received by 5 p.m. Feb. 29 to be eligible. They may be obtained from Parks and Wildlife Department field offices, Austin headquarters at 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744, or by calling toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

Extensive interviews and background investigations will be conducted before the successful applicants are announced. The exact number of cadets to be accepted will not be announced until later, but enrollment normally is limited to approximately 35, officials said.

Applicants must be at least 21 years of age upon commissioning, be in good physical condition, be a high school graduate or have passed a GED equivalent, have vision correctable to 20/20 and have a record free from driving while intoxicated, driving under influence of drugs or felony convictions.

After completion of four and a half months of intensive training, the graduates may be assigned to duty anywhere in the state.

longer neighbors or friends anymore, but react to each other on a must basis," replied Edwin. He feels we lost something - lost what it means to be humane, but this is not an irreversible process. It is just very suspect.

With negative thoughts interacting the next question would most obviously be, what good has happened since the 1960's? Dr. Manning responded to the positive question that science is a major attribute of today. The advancement in manufacturing products will greatly enhance the future generation," replied Dr. Manning. Since the generation is approaching the turn of the century many obstacles stand in the way of advancement in the culture of the people. Dr. Manning stated, "The major obstacle in the foreseeable future is to control man's apparent lethal attempt over destruction which means controlling the hydrogen, nuclear and atomic bomb. If we control them there is some hope; if they are not controlled we are all about to die." He further went on to say that he is against the proliferation of all bombs.

"Any sane person must be against it," replied Dr. Manning. This scholar is a man of deep thought which feels strongly about what he believes. He releases some of his tensions of the day and emotions through poetry. Dr. Manning, minister of the Presbyterian Church, observes, "Hope is to life what steel is to a foundation, without hope everything makes sense without it everything is senseless."

Roger Myers attends TMEA convention

CHS Band Director Roger Myers attended the annual TMEA Convention Feb. 1-4. Many various clinics and

workshops were offered in all areas of music education.

Mr. Myers attended workshops dealing with specific band instruments, band booster organizations, techniques of successful directors, motivating students, and band performance, entertainment and education.

The Texas Music Educators Association, the nation's largest state organization of music teachers, held its annual clinic/convention in Ft. Worth February 2-5, 1984. At the convention, plans for a Symposium entitled "Music is Essential to a Quality Education" were announced. To be held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin July 11-13, 1985, the Symposium will involve more than 200 delegates in detailing the role of music as a basic component of a child's education.

Highlighting the convention was the presentation of the six All-State performing groups under the direction of some of the finest conductors in the United States. The 812 students in these honor organizations were selected in a series of rigorous tryouts which initially involved more

than 30,000 Texas high school students.

A survey conducted at the convention revealed that the academic achievements of the All-State performers are equal to their musical accomplishments. 38 National Merit Scholarship Finalists and Semi-Finalists performed with an All-State organization. Although membership is open only to juniors and seniors, disqualifying the significant number of underclassmen all-staters, 40 per cent of the 812 all-staters have attained membership in the National Honor Society.

The most significant measure of the academic achievements of these gifted musicians is their average score on the SAT test:

1984 Texas All-State Performers: 1134

1982 Texas average: 868

1982 National average: 893

The breakdown by performing group is as follows: All-State Jazz Ensemble: 1154; All-State Symphonic Orchestra: 1150; All-State Philharmonic Orchestra: 1139; All-State Choir: 1137; All-State Symphonic Band: 1125; All-State Concert Band: 1100; 80 per cent of the students indicated that they were college-bound.

Retire Military

Pay changes

According to the 1984 Department of Defense Authorization Act, the "one year look-back" has protected members who reign on active duty longer than 20 years from receiving less in retired pay than similar members retiring up to one year earlier. Over the years, sits protective features have been replaced lasregely by the "Tower Amendment," repealed in '83, the "One year look-back" still has application until Sept. 86, for service members eligible to retire/transfer to the fleet reserve before 24 Sept. 83.

Rounding down of retired pay means that gross retired/retainer pay after 1 October 83 will be rounded down to the next lower dollar. As an example, a retired service member eligible for \$742.99 per month will be paid \$792.00 per month. The largest annual loss to any retiree,

therefore, will be \$11.88 (12 X 0.99) with most losses lower than this figure. This change was made as part of a government-wide program to aid in reducing the federal budget deficit.

City Sales and Use Tax Allocation

A report from Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts shows that city sales and Use Tax Allocation summary thru period ending January 27, 1984 for Donley County is down -19.72 per cent from the same period last year. Clarendon's net payment this period was \$12,416.96 down from \$18,783.04 from the same period last year. This is down 24.28% from the same period last year.

Hedley and Howardwick fared better than Clarendon and both show an increase over last year. Hedley was up 23.17% and Howardwick a whopping 92.1%.

The surrounding counties, Collingsworth, Hall and Armstrong all are down. Memphis is down by 2.26%, Lakeview down 49.98% but Estelline was up 54.92% and Turkey was up 4.60%.

Wellington was down 7.88% and Claude down 23.56%.

This is the first down in over two years that Donley County has shown a decrease on this report.

Veteran Health Care approved

Expressing his "strong commitment to the welfare of America's veterans," President Reagan has signed legislation expanding the health care benefits available to the nation's veterans.

Entitled the, "VA Health Program Amendments of 1983," the law extends the veterans' center program, authorizes the provision of preventive health services for certain veterans and call for the establishment of an advisory committee on women veterans.

Among the new programs will be an adult day health care program and a community residential care program.

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From the Pen of Pastor Pinion

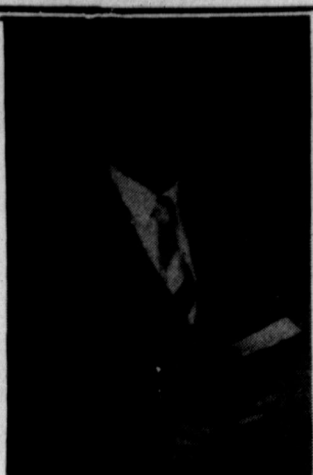

And after all these things are his, add, I pray, enough of a sense of humor, so that he may always be serious, yet never take himself too seriously. Give him humility so that he may always remember the simplicity of true greatness, the open mind of true wisdom, and the meekness of true strength. Then I, his father, will dare to whisper, "I have not lived in vain." Douglas MacArthur.

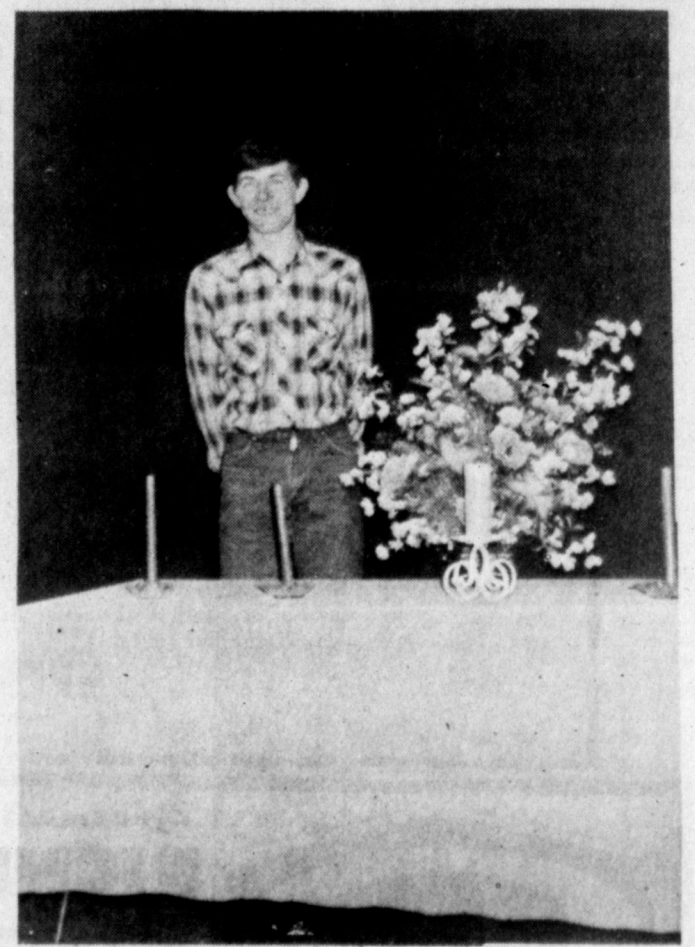
