SWCD still has a few trees

Each year, the Donley County SWCD sponsors a Tree Program. These trees are useful to Donley County citizens and conservation in many ways. Cottonless Cottonwoods, Golden Willow and Honeylocust are some of the trees that can be used for home beautification purposes as well as windbreaks to aid in stopping soil erosion. Shrubs such as Honeysuckle, Manking Cherry, Sand Cherry and Plum may be used for home beautification, windbreaks along with food and cover for wildlife habitat.

Over 1,000 trees were ordered by the District this year. The plum is an

improved domestic variety that is less susceptible to insect damage than the Native Plum usually found in this area.

There has already been a good response to the program however, there are still some trees available.

All of the trees and shrubs mentioned are still in stock and available for 75 cents a piece. They would be happy to aid you in some type of program to improve your home, ranch or wildlife land. Please feel free to come by the SWCD office, look at the trees and see what they can do for you.

New Business The Grocery Store will open April 16

"The Grocery Store", locally owned and operated by Jack Clifford and Vonna Tunnell, will offer competitive prices and person service.

The store will be open for business Monday, April 16. The store hours will be Monday through Saturday from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. The Grocery Store is located in the building where Fred and Jack Clifford ran the Clifford Grocery before selling in 1979 to Charlie DeMoss, at the corner of Kearney and Highway 287.

The store has been remodeled. New metal shelf fixtures replace the old wooden ones. The aisles have been made wider and a new freezer box installed. Two new check stands have been installed and the store has been painted and rearranged for customer convenience.

Stock began arriving Saturday, April 7. Monday morning, scores of salesmen arrived to help Jack and Vonna and their employees stock shelves and set up displays.

As soon as the big bold block letters "The Grocery Store" appeared on the side of the building, customers began to arrive, both local

and travelers. Although the store was not open, they did sell a few items.

The two owners are well known around the community for their years of experience in business in Clarendon.

Jack Clifford was born and raised in Clarendon. Jack graduated from Clarendon High School and attended Clarendon Junior College for two years. In 1954 he received his Associate of Arts degree. Christian Television comes to Clarendon

The First Baptist Church installed a satellite receiver this week in order to make available to our city the American Christian Television System (ACTS).

The Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention is the originator of ACTS and will provide 16 hours of quality programming each day.

ACTS will be carried over our local cable system on channel 8.

ACTS will be inaugurated on June 5th at the Southern Baptist Convention in Kansas City, Missouri. This project has been a major concern with the Radio and Television Commission since August of 1981 when they signed a contract with Southern Pacific Communications for a satellite transponder on Spacenet I.

The ACTS network was created to offer quality television programming as an alternative, not just to the secular, and often morally- unacceptable programming of today's television, but also to the kind of religious programming now in the marketplace.

Producing quality with diverse audience appeal will result in a variety of formats. These include direct preaching, Bible teaching, Christian growth, children's programs, family programs, talk shows, music and variety shows, situation comedies, drama, sports, and educa-

tion.

One of the reasons the banquet was created 10 years ago was to honor the

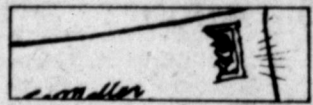

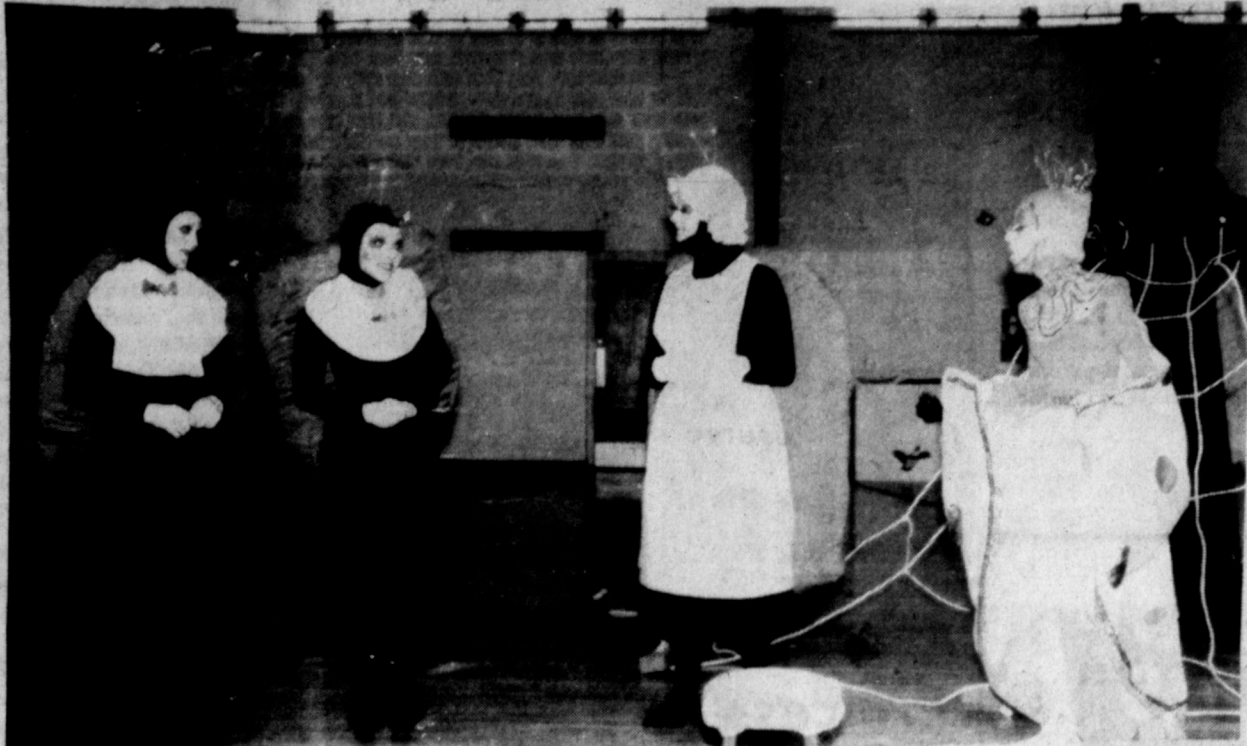

The drama department of the Clarendon College Fine Arts Center will be making its final appearance with the production "The Butterfly",

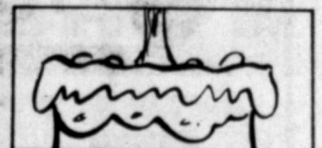

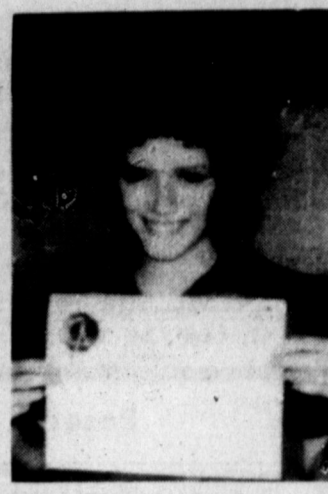
FFA competes in WTSU Judging Contest

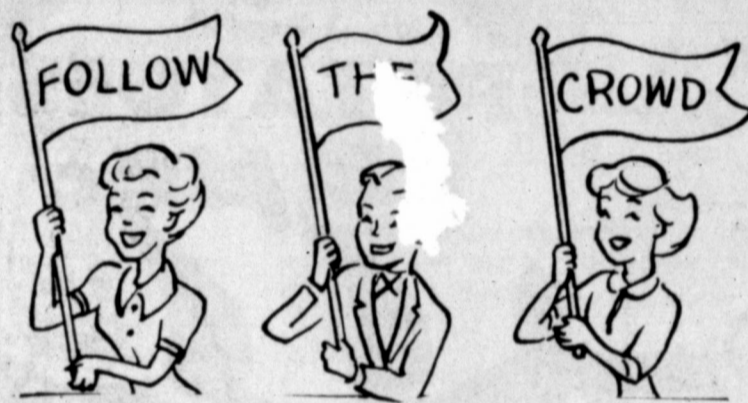

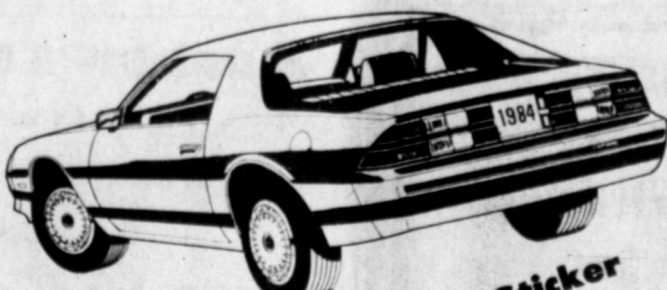

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world", (James 1:27)

In the forests of Northern Europe lives the ermine, a small animal known best for its snow-white fur. Instinctively this animal protects its glossy coat of fur with great care lest it become soiled.

TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS, REMEDIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES!

TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS, REMEDIES, RESPONSIBILITIES!
Charles SoRelle, chief appraiser for the Donley County Appraisal District, has announced the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

"Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings available to property owners.

The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to

property taxes collected by all types of local government, including counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as hospitals and municipal utility districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by various taxing units including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of

their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze, or ceiling, on the tax bill from the school district on his home and yard," SoRelle added. "This ceiling is based on the taxes assessed when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption for the first time."

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that homeowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year need not apply again this year. Only those who became 65 during 1983 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must

apply for 1984.

Homeowners may also be eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption for county tax purposes. This exemption is granted on the portion of county tax for farm-to-market roads and flood control.

Additional exemptions are available upon application to disabled veterans and to other disabled citizens or those aged 65 and older.

Owners of agricultural land which was taxed for 1983 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to re-apply unless requested in writing by the appraisal office to do so. However, applications must be filed before May 1 for land to be

taxed for 1984 under 1-d-1 open-space provisions, and by landowners who have not previously received productivity valuation.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax reductions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personnel as well as in the pamphlet," SoRelle said.

He said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making a protest to the

ARB and ways to prepare and present the appeal.

Another section deals with the process of initiative and referendum by which voters are able to petition for an election to limit the amount of tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and to make any applications required, in order to get all the tax relief to which they are entitled. Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office before May 1," the chief appraiser said.

The pamphlet and other information is available from the Donley Appraisal District office in the Courthouse Annex in Clarendon.

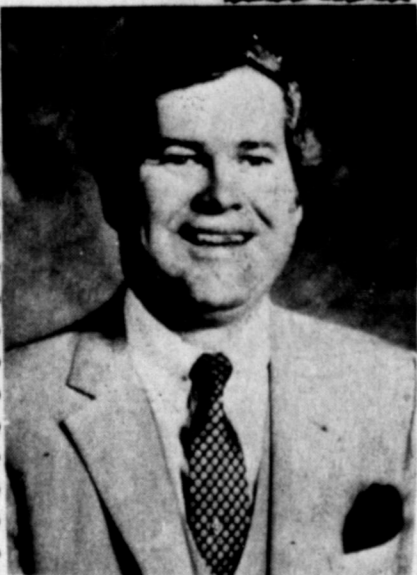

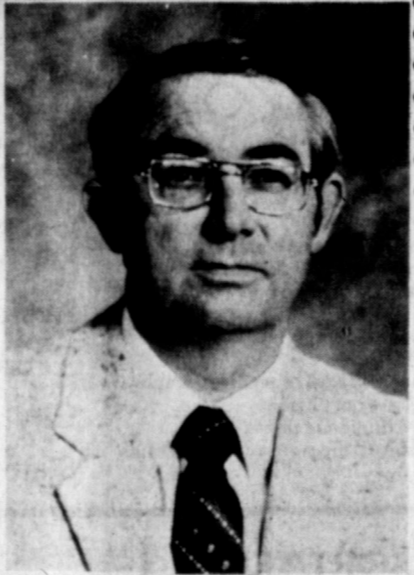

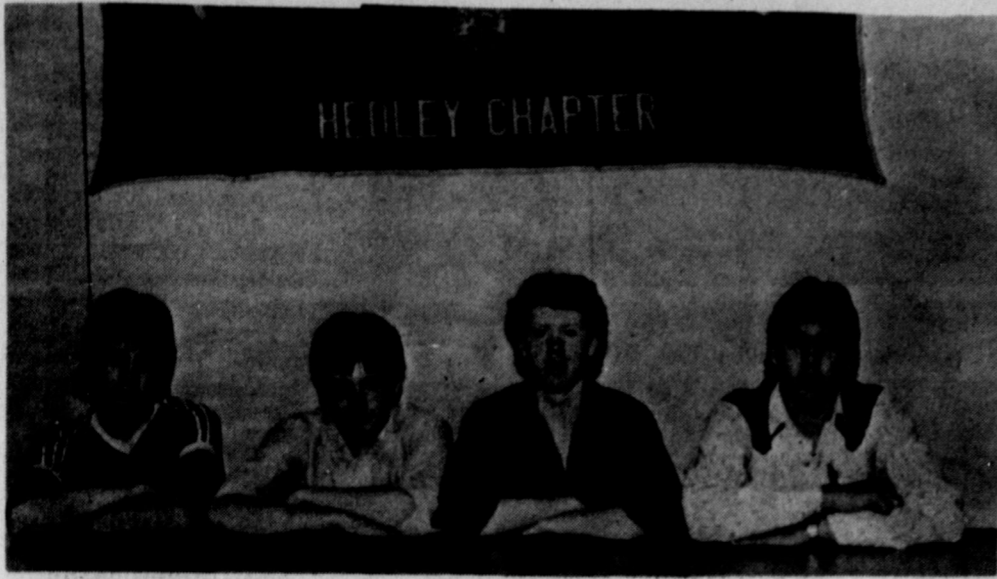

Furrow Diking Irrigation gaining popularity

High Plains water conservationists constantly take time to sell the notion of "cost effective" irrigation systems as spiraling energy costs drive up the price of watering crops.

One irrigation system gaining favor among conservationists is furrow diking, a method of placing blocks along crop rows that will hold precipitation on the ground. By capturing the precipitation, moisture from the rain is given time to soak beneath the soil and be stored in plant roots.

Editors of the Cross Section, the official publication of Lubbock-based High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, devoted a quarter page to the system in the newsletter's March edition.

Cost effectiveness was emphasized. Dikers can be purchased for between \$175 and \$200 per row, depending on financing costs. The article went on to say that in limited water situations, at least one additional inch of water could be saved each growing season.

According to the article, that inch could mean increased yields of 30 to 50 pounds of lint cotton, 300 to 400 pounds of grain sorghum or 400 to 500 pounds of corn. Multiply by additional yields by the average price of those High Plains crops, and it is easy to see where the dikers could save money.

Enthusiasm for furrow dikes within the water district is not limited to the newsletter staff, either. In a recent interview, district agriculturalist Kenneth Carver was quick to extol the

benefits of the system.

"Dikers can be used in all soils found on the High Plains, from sandy to really heavy," Carver said. "And, best of all, it can be used in conjunction with other irrigation methods."

He said the system could be used with alternate-row irrigation, another popular conservation method. Carver said there is a potential for substantial water savings by watering every other row and placing furrow dikers in a similar pattern.

Farmers apparently agree. Carver said an informal survey conducted by his district, the North Plains Water District and the Panhandle Water District, indicate a significant increase in furrow diking in the region. He said no accurate estimate would be available until after this growing season, because government acreage-reduction programs and severe weather in the Lubbock region have curtailed the amount of farmland in use.

"PIK (the agriculture Department's payment-in-kind program) really wiped us out on our survey. We just didn't feel it was fair to go with any numbers until we had more normal growing season. Maybe after this year we'll have something," Carver said.

In spite of all the excitement, Carver was quick to warn farmers against rushing out and buying furrow diking. He said they should study the contours of their land and make sure they are implementing the right system for their farm.

"It's not that I wouldn't recommend this to anyone," he said. "But if you've got to much slope you can't get away with just implementing furrow dikes."

"You could still put it on hilly land, you'd just need to make some provisions. Furrow dikes would work fairly well in conjunction with parallel terraces or bench rows (that flatten out he the land)," Carver said.

bock. The District Meet was supposed to be run Tuesday (April 3) but high winds caused postponement until Friday (April 6).

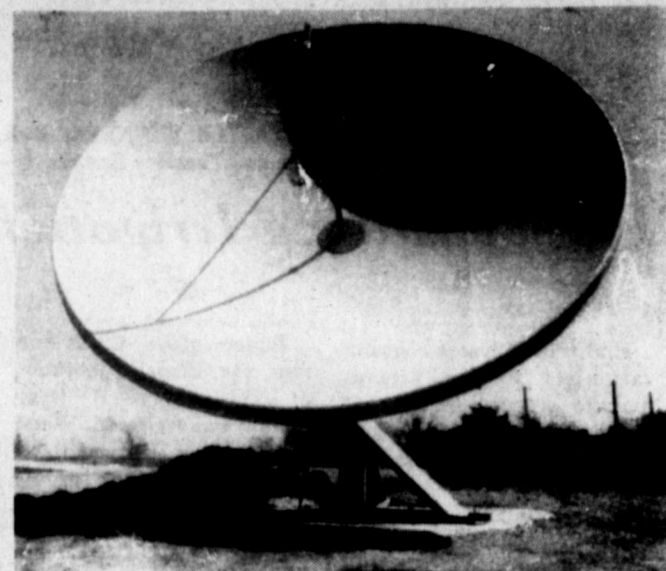
