May 5th Primary voting information

Listed in this article are some dates that you might want to place on your calendar regarding the upcoming elections. I would first of all urge you to make sure you are eligible to vote in the May Primary.

I do hope you will

make an effort to get out and vote in all the upcoming elections this year. I would ask that if you have any questions that I can answer I will be happy to do so. If I cannot answer your questions I will find out where they can be answered and put you in touch with that source. I hope the following will be beneficial to you through the May Primary.

1. April 5, 1984 was the last day to apply for registration as a voter in time to vote in the first primary, May 5th, 1984.

2. April 5, 1984 was also the last day to apply for transfer of registration to another precinct in time to be effective for the first primary, May 5th, 1984.

3. Another important date for voters to remember was April 16, 1984. This date was the first day for absentee voting by personal appearance in the first primary.

The last day for absentee voting by personal appearance in the first primary is May 1st, 1984.

4. Also on May 1st, 1984, an application for absentee ballot must be received by the county clerk not later than close of business on this date. Marked ballots must be received before 7:00 p.m. on election day, May 5th, 1984.

5. Please note also that a voter who becomes sick or disabled on or after April 30, 1984, may obtain an absentee ballot for the first primary, through a personal representative, up to 12:00 noon on election day. This marked ballot must be delivered to the county clerk prior to 7:00 p.m. on election day, May 5th, 1984. Also a voter who will be absent from the county on election day because of a death in the immediate family after April 30, 1984, may vote by personal appearance in the county clerks office through May 4th, 1984.

Please remember that all absentee voting is done at and through the county clerk, P.C. Messer, at the county courthouse annex.

ASTHMA MEDICINES

Those who suffer from asthma take a variety of medicines for the prevention and treatment of the wheezing and other breathing problems associated with this "lung" condition. One of the most popular and effective medicines is **theophylline**. This drug relaxes the muscles in the lung passages (bronchioles) and causes them to dilate. The dilation allows air to enter and leave the lungs more freely and ease breathing. An injectable form of this drug, **aminophylline**, is often given to hospitalized patients having acute asthma.

A large number of drugs referred to as the **sympathomimetics** are used to prevent as well

as treat asthma. These include **epinephrine**, **metaproterenol**, and **isoproterenol**. The sympathomimetics also dilate the bronchioles and are often administered via hand-held inhalers which contain the medicine.

Steroids are also prescribed for asthmatics. These are powerful medicines which reduce the inflammation that often occurs in the lungs of asthmatics. **Prednisone** and **beclomethasone** are two of the commonly prescribed steroids.

Cromolyn sodium is used for the prevention of asthmatic attacks (not for the treatment). Use of cromolyn during an asthma attack may actually make the attack worse.

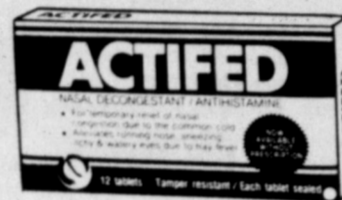
available to serve the public in the future. The Academics continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for the family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

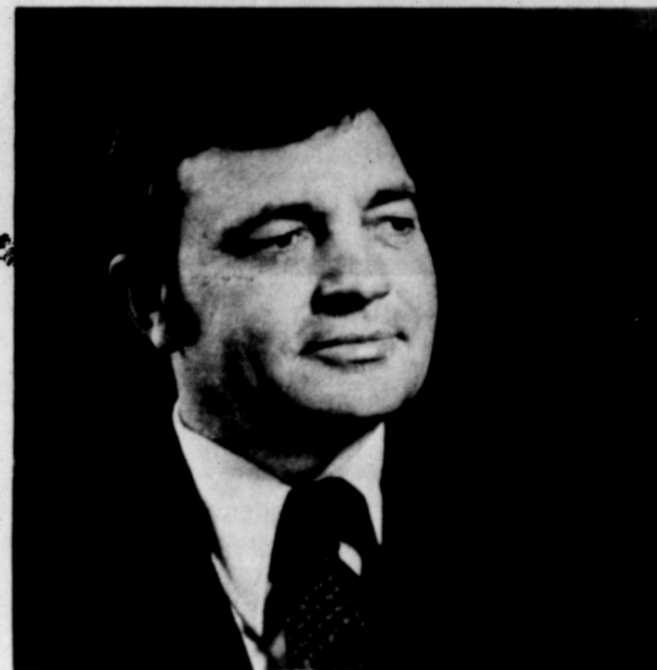
