Lady Bronchos claim third place at state

The Clarendon Lady Bronchos track team ended their 1984 season with a third place finish at the State Track Meet held in Austin, May 4 and 5.

Muzzy Hayes and Linda Weatherton were the only Lady Bronchos who qualified for this prestigious track meet. But these two scored enough points to place third in the final team standings. Clarendon finished with 36 points behind Hamlin and team winner Frisco.

Muzzy Hayes accounted for two of the points by finishing the 100 meter low hurdles in fifth place. She ran a very good race, running with the leaders until hitting two hurdles.

Linda Weatherton ended her track career at Clarendon High School with four outstanding performances. On Friday she jumped to a personal best in the long jump. Linda led the competition until the last round of jumps and was beaten by 3 inches. Jones from Frisco

jumped 18'4" and Linda was second at 18'1". On Saturday she began the day by finishing second in the triple jump with a leap of 37'9 1/2" and a new school record and personal best. Next came the 100 meter dash in which Linda broke the Class AA state record but was again in second place. Jones from Frisco ran 11.8 to win the race while Linda finished second at 11.9, both times under the old state record of 12.6. Not to be denied a state gold medal with only the 200 meter dash to run.

Linda entered her "favorite" event. After running an extremely fast curve, Linda ran uncontested to a first place victory in 25.4. She ended her track career with three state silver medals and one state gold medal.

The Lady Broncho track team had a very successful year and will be strong again next year. Clarendon can be very proud of these young ladies.

Cities receive sales tax payments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$98.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"These payments are running 12.5 percent ahead of last year," Bullock said. "And for the first time this year, we can say that virtually all of this increase came from growth in tax collections and not from changes in our bookkeeping the Legislature made when they moved up due dates for the sales tax last year."

May's checks reflect sales made during March and the first quarter and reported to the Comptroller by April 20. Net payment this period for Clarendon is \$10,934.50, comparable payment prior

year was \$12,470.83. The 1984 payment to date is \$36,636.63 and the 1983 payment for the same date was \$38,361.74, which is a 4.5 percent decrease. Howardwick had a 21.01 percent increase over last year and Hedley had a 42.01 percent increase.

A representative of State Comptroller Bob Bullock will be in Clarendon May 16, 1984 to assist area taxpayers and answer tax questions.

According to Richard A. Shirley, manager of the Comptroller's Amarillo Office, John Lindsey, Enforcement Officer, will meet with Donley County taxpayers in the County Judge's Office at the County Court House in Clarendon from 10:00-12:00 p.m.

Questions about taxes, the filing of tax returns or assistance on returns can be answered quickly and efficiently in these face-to-face meetings, Bullock said.

Taxpayers who are not able to meet with the Comptroller's representative on May 16, 1984 can still get their tax questions answered quickly by calling from anywhere in Texas, toll-free 1-800-252-5555.

WTU trying to obtain cheaper fuel

Efforts to obtain cheaper boiler fuel for its power plants are paying off for West Texas Utilities Co. and its customers.

Through an agreement reached earlier this year, WTU is receiving 20 million cubic feet of lower cost natural gas daily for use at its

Fort Phantom Hill Power Station near Abilene.

The savings in WTU's fuel bill this year will amount to about \$7.7 million, which will be passed along to the customers. The only hitch is that the customers will have to wait until the Company's Cont P 2

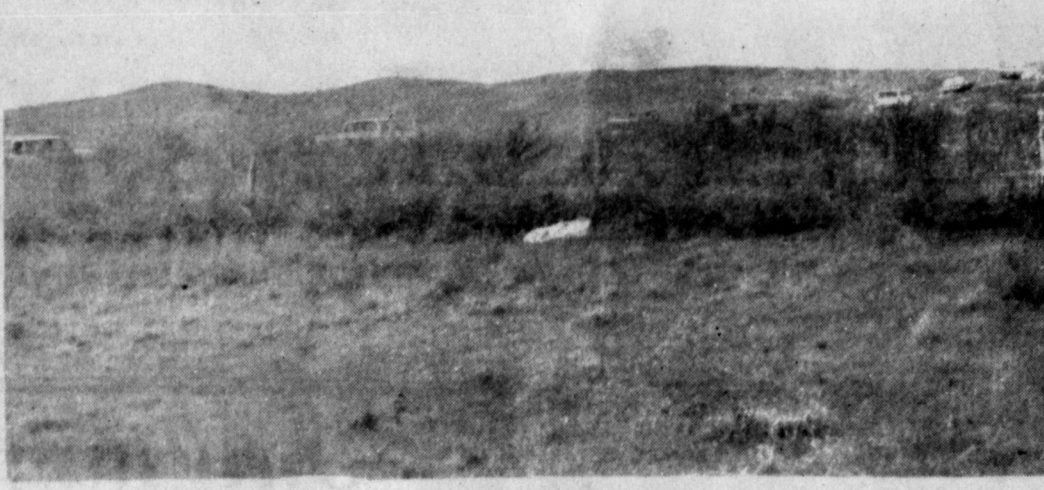

Range Grass, Brush and Weed Control Tour held

The East Panhandle Range Grass, Brush and Weed Control Tour held last Tuesday, May 1, was attended by over 110 area people, according to Donley County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

The tour started at 9:00 a.m. on the Jake Hess, II, Ranch five miles south of McLean where the group looked at a shinnery infested pasture that was treated with Graslan r 20P. The Graslan was aerially applied in October, 1981, at the rate of 1.25 pounds of active ingredient per acre. The pasture has gone through two growing seasons since the Graslan was applied and good control of the shinnery was observed. During the 1983 growing season the control of the shinnery allowed an excellent re-growth of grass. Charles Beers, Elanco Products, discussed the use of Graslan at this stop.

The tour then moved to the Martinez Ranch and stopped at a lovegrass pasture. Dr. Bill Dahl, Texas Tech University and Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent, discussed lovegrass management and the lovegrass situation and die-off.

The tour moved on to a shinnery pasture on the Martinez Ranch that had been treated with Graslan R 20P in the fall of 1982 at the rate of 1.0 pound of active ingredient per acre. This pasture has gone through

one growing season. To get the full effect of Graslan takes 2 to 3 years. Most of the shinnery was showing the effect of the herbicide. Tim Fitch, Martinez Ranch Manager, discussed their ranch operation and the Cell Grazing system being used on the ranch.

The next stop on the tour was a Goldaster Weed Control Demonstration on the former Boyd Meador place north of McLean. Dr. Pete Jacoby, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Vernon, and Joe VanZandt, Gray County Extension Agent, discussed the results of this demonstration. Goldaster is a weed of growing concern to many ranchers in the eastern Texas Panhandle. It competes with the grasses and greatly reduces forage growth on ranges where it occurs. There is evidence that goldaster exudes a chemical inhibitor which reduces grass growth.

Herbicide control of goldaster has been erratic but the most consistent control has been the use of 2, 4-D L. V. E. at the rate of 3/4 to 1 pound plus 3/4 pound of Picloram

and 1 gallon diesel.

The tour then moved to a field of Plains Bluesteam on the Ken Stark farm, east of McLean. Dr. Chet Dewald, Research Agronomist, USDA Southern Plains Research Station, Woodward, Oklahoma, discussed the Plains Bluesteam and other varieties of the Old World Bluesteams such as WW Spar, WW 517, and WW 857.

The next stop was the Gray County Agricultural Barn where Dr. Dewald presented a slide talk on the Old World Bluesteams. A free B-B-Q lunch was enjoyed by everyone, courtesy of Elanco Products.

Following lunch, Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist, College Station, discussed the new brush and weed control chemicals and methods. His discussion included Velpar L, Graslan Brush Bullets 250, Grazon PC, Grazon P+D, Grazon 10K, and Tordon 10K.

The tour was completed by a panel discussion of the lovegrass situation and die-off.

fuel cost factor is adjusted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Under new PUC rules, the fuel factor, which is the amount WTU is allowed to charge its customers for fuel, is set for a 12-month period, or until the utility's next rate case. Under the old system, the fuel factor was automatically adjusted each month to reflect the current cost of fuel.

The cheaper gas is being purchased from Central Energy Transportation Co. and pipelined from Erath County by Lone Star Gas Co., which is WTU's principal fuel supplier.

"This is only a small amount of gas, considering the total volume used at our eight power stations, but we try to take advantage of every opportunity to reduce our fuel costs," said Walter Meller of Abilene, WTU's manager of System Production.

"Deals like this help offset the higher price we must pay under our major contract for a dependable, long-range

supply of natural gas," Meller explained.

The Central Energy contract runs to September 1985. Total savings to WTU through the term of the contract will be approximately \$13.7 million.

For the past two years WTU has been buying a quantity of cheaper low BTU gas and blending it with pipeline quality gas for use at its Paint Creek Power Station.

Fuel costs have risen sharply every year since the Arab oil embargo of 1973 started the world energy crisis. In recent years, fuel expenses have accounted for at least half of WTU's total annual revenue and for a major portion of customer bills.

All of WTU's existing power plants burn natural gas as a boiler fuel. The Oklahoma Power Station, now under construction near Vernon, will be the Company's first coal-burning plant and also will be the largest plant in the WTU system.

Bronchos place 5th in Region 1-AA meet

The Clarendon Broncho Varsity boys track team traveled to Lubbock this past Friday and Saturday to compete in the Region 1-AA Meet. The Bronchos competed very well and finished fifth in the prestigious meet with a total of 29 points. Panhandle won the meet with 76 points.

The Bronchos began their efforts on Friday morning with Arlis Thomas competing in the shot put and Richard Gaines competing in the pole vault. Richard vaulted 12'6" with a fine effort and finished sixth in the very talented field. Arlis threw the shot 52'3/4" to finish third in the event. He was only one inch behind the second place finisher and by this narrow margin missed qualifying to the state meet.

On Friday afternoon the Bronchos competed in the running prelims of the meet. Bryan Smith ran a personal best in the 800 meter dash of 2:05.5 which qualified him for the final on Saturday. This was almost a four second improvement on his best effort and was a fine display of courage against an outstanding field of competitors.

Glenn Weatherston sped to a 49.24 clocking in the 400 meter dash to record the second fastest qualifying time in his event. He later blazed to a 22.29 time in the 200 meter dash to qualify as the third best time for Saturday's final.

On Saturday morning Arlis Thomas began a fine day for the Bronchos by placing second in the discus throw with a toss of 138'4". Most importantly this second place finish qualified Arlis for the state meet to be held in Austin on May 11-12.

Shaun Heil was the next

Broncho to complete and he ran a fine time of 10:52.31 in the 3200 meter run. Although this time failed to put him in the top six finishers, it was a fine effort and represented his second best time in the event for the season.

Bryan Smith followed this with a 2:06.03 clocking in the 800 meter dash. Bryan did not place in the event but it was a strong effort and quite an accomplishment to even qualify for the finals in this very tough meet.

The 400 meter dash was the next chance for the Bronchos to compete and Glenn Weatherston posted a personal best of 49.0 to finish second in the event. This also qualified Glenn to compete at the state meet in Austin on May 11-12. Glenn came back only 25 minutes later to finish third in the 200 meter dash with a time of 22.67, narrowly missing out on an opportunity to compete in a second event at Austin.

All of these young men are seniors and have represented our school and community very well throughout their high school athletic careers. They have served as leaders and have been an inspiration for their fellow team members. Their contribution to the success of the Broncho track team have been immeasurable and they will always be remembered by Broncho coaches and fans with fondest memories.

Arlis and Glenn will leave for Austin early Thursday morning. We are sure that these two find Broncho athletes will close out their career in a blaze of glory as they for one last time have a chance to represent their school and community in their usual outstanding way. Best of luck!

Wheatley read minutes of last meeting March 29th, 1984. There were no corrections or additions and the minutes were approved as read.

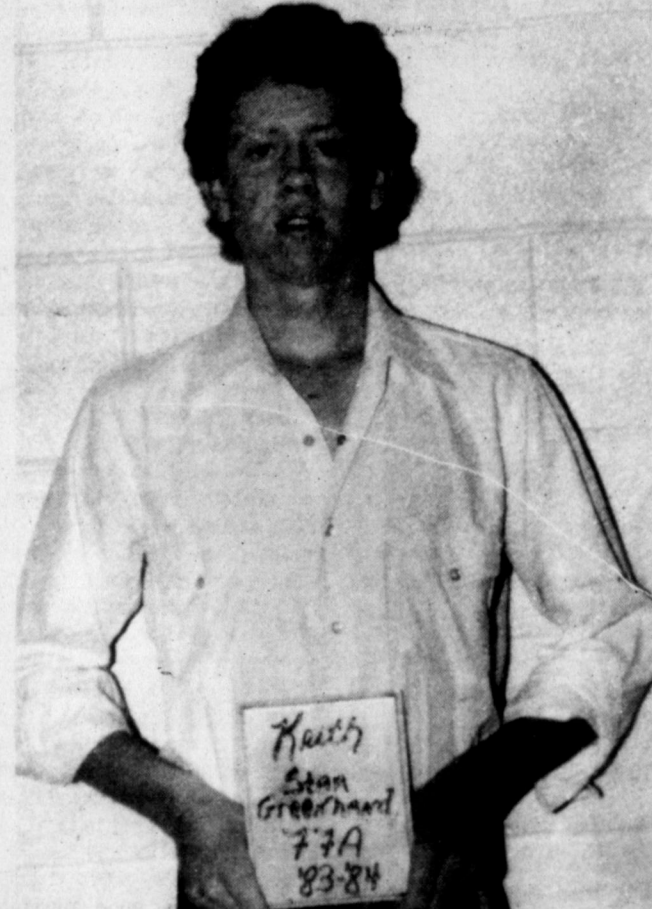
SoRelle explained First Quarter Report of 1984.

IF I FORGET?

"If I forget to take a pill, what should I do?" This is one of the questions most frequently asked by women who take oral birth control pills. The answer depends to a great extent on the individual situation of the person asking the question. In general, the manufacturers of birth control tablets offer the following suggestions:

If just one day is missed, the best thing to do is to take it the next day along with the tablet that was scheduled for that day. Taking two tablets on the same day is not considered dangerous or harmful. The chances of becoming pregnant do, however, increase when a dose is missed.

If two days in a row are missed, it is recommended that two pills be taken each day for the next two days, then continue on the regular schedule. At this point it is wise to consider a second method of birth control to provide "extra protection."

If three or more days are missed, it is sometimes suggested that the pills be stopped and another form of birth control be used until the next cycle begins. A new cycle of tablets may be started the following month.

Specific guidelines as to what to do about missed tablets should come from one's physician. If the physician can't be reached these suggestions may be helpful.

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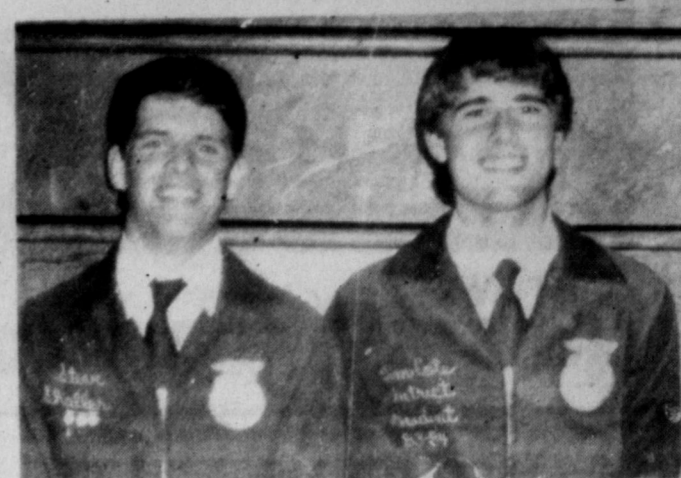
