Soil survey useful management tool

Farmers and ranchers can possibly cut costs and increase their income by using the published soil survey of Donley County, according to a Soil Conservation Service (SCS) official. Jim Wyrick, Area Soil Scientist for SCS, says the survey is a useful management tool and can help a farmer or rancher get the best use of each acre within that acre's capabilities.

"Each soil survey gives the average yields of major crops for each type of soil. The survey also reports how intensively the soil can be used without damage and whether other management practices, like irrigation or various tillage methods, would increase yields enough to pay the extra cost," said Wyrick.

"If a farmer chooses to go to irrigation, the soil survey shows the slope, drainage, water capacity of the soil and the intake rate of the soil. Using the soil survey, a farmer can then decide which can solve a lot of management problems," Wyrick said.

Ranchers can determine the amount of forage an acre should produce from the soil survey information.

"Soil surveys are also good management tools to use in planting trees for windbreak or beautification. By knowing the soil texture, depth, wetness, available water and other information, a person can select the trees which will grow best under the given conditions," explained Wyrick.

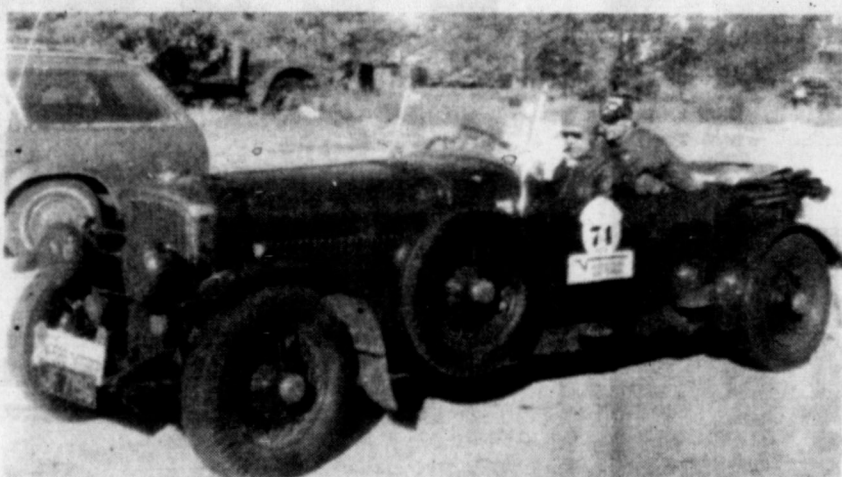
Traffic fatalities are well below the number for the same period last year. This is due to the Texas motorist slowing their speeds and the awareness of DWI on the highways.

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DIAPER RASH

Diaper rash and its cousin, prickly heat, are associated with the presence of urine and waste materials next to the skin. Diaper rash results in materials next to the skin. Diaper rash results in varying degrees of inflamed, irritated skin that can cover the entire diaper area. Prickly heat, on the other hand, appears as tiny red "dots" that result from the obstruction of sweat glands.

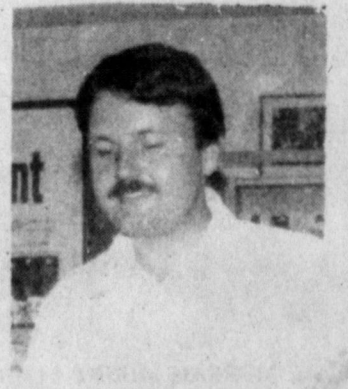
Prevention of diaper rash and prickly heat is superior to treatment. Plastic pants should be avoided. Diapers should be loose, well ventilated, and changed frequently to keep the skin dry. The skin should be kept clean.

Treatment of existing skin problems involves the preventative measures listed above. Cornstarch as a dusting powder should be avoided... it can be metabolized and support the growth of microorganisms. A protectant cream or ointment may be applied to the clean, dry skin to help prevent urine and waste from reaching the skin (for example, white petrolatum, zinc oxide paste, or any of several commercial products). Prickly heat by itself usually responds well to oatmeal baths and efforts to reduce moisture around the rash. Diaper area problems that do not respond to home remedies require a physician's care and, often, prescription medicines for complications such as fungal, yeast, or bacterial infection.

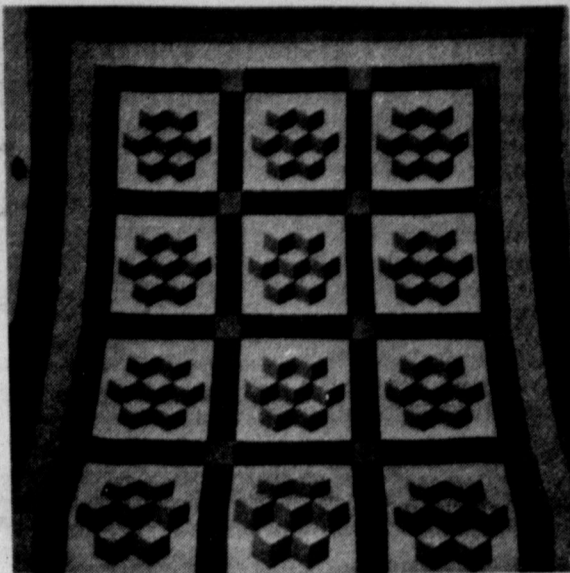
Lakers Homemakers Annual Salad Luncheon held

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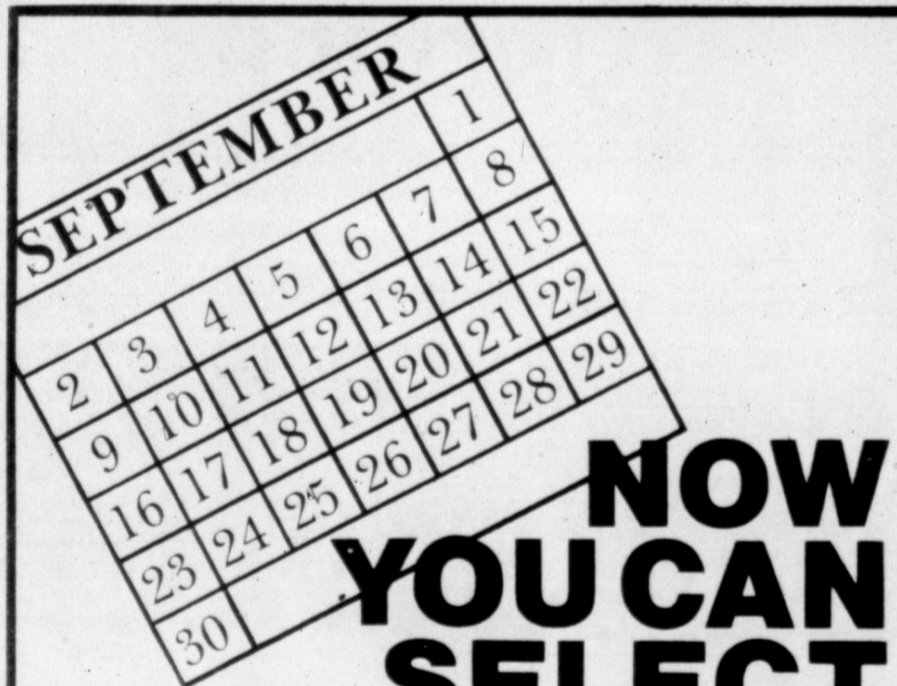

1951. She had been a resident of Donley County for most of her life. She was a member of the Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo.

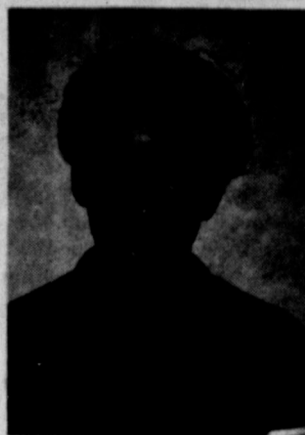

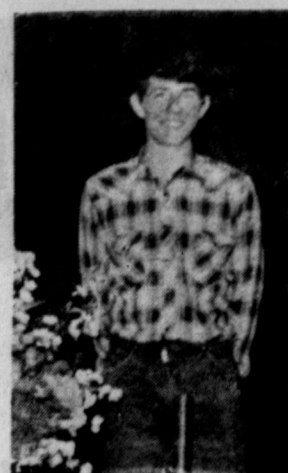

Bryan Smith has an obvious interest in his old house but we're not quite sure what it is--could it be the furniture?

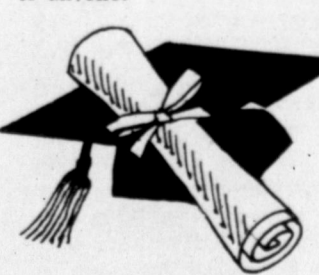
