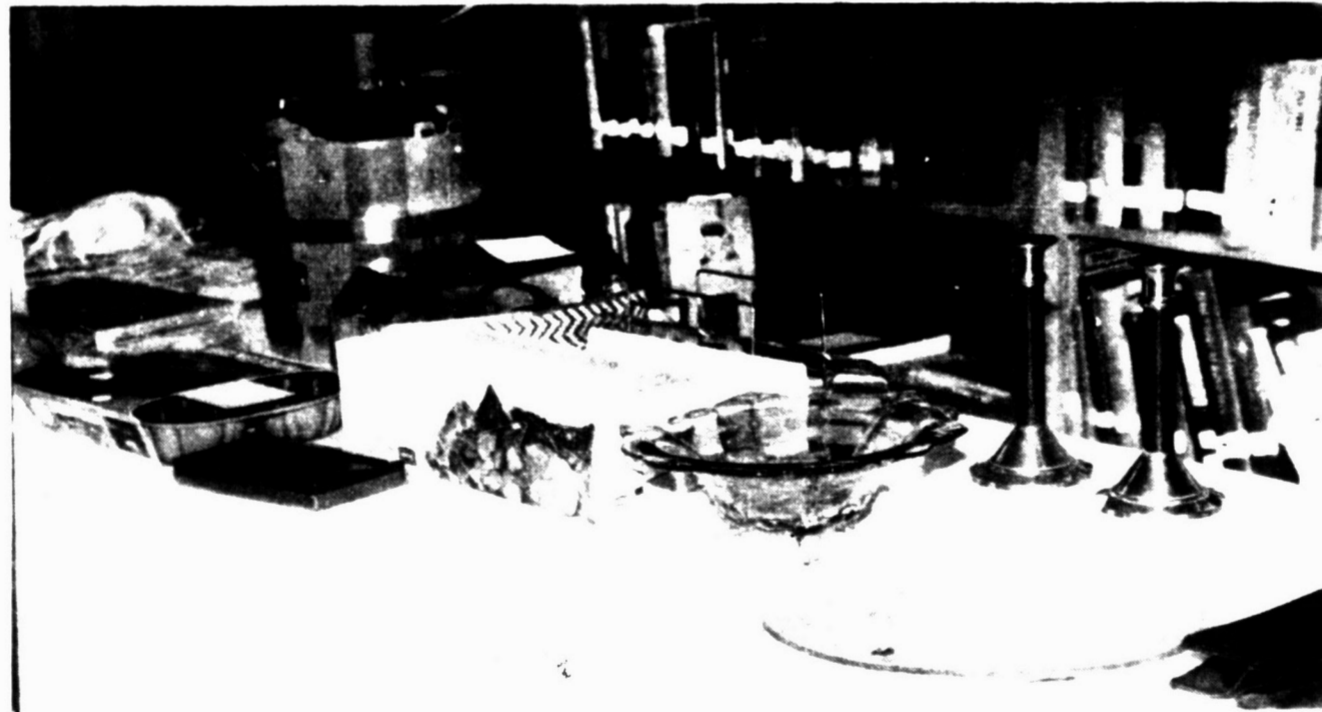
library for sale, include both hard cover and paper backs. There are fiction, reference, children's books, crafts, etc. A number of magazines will be on sale for 10c.

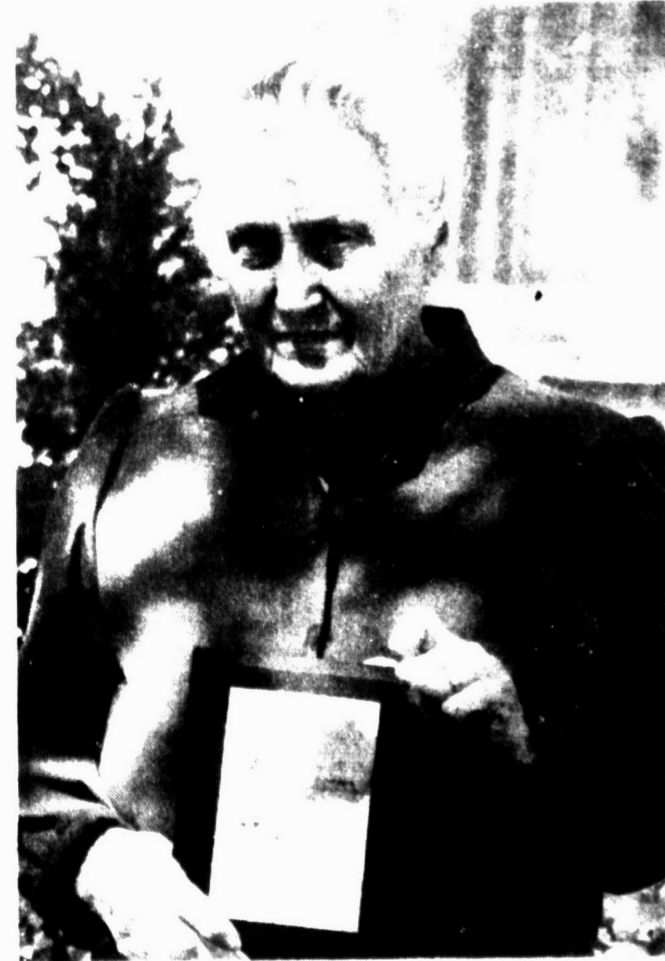

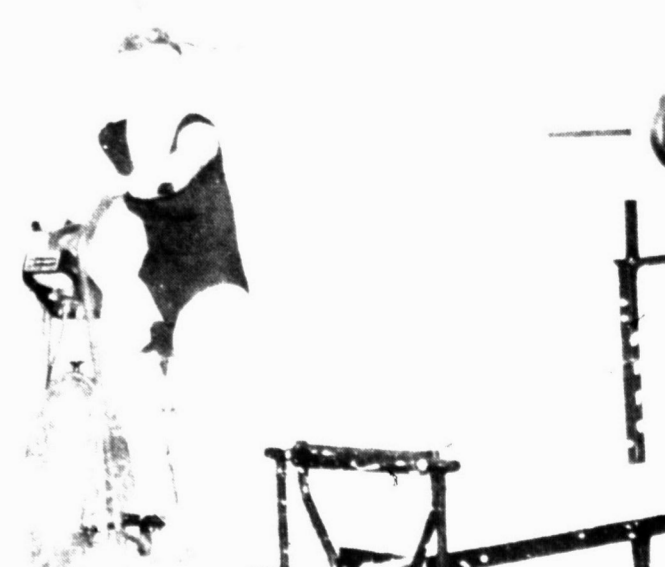
Janice started teaching aerobic classes about three months ago at the Community Center, as well as nutrition, exercise, and weight training. She is currently dieting and working out where a lot of people come

Check all windows and doors, install weatherstripping and caulking where needed. It will save on both heating and cooling costs. An almost invisible 1/4" gap at the base of a standard 36" outside door is equal to a nine-square-inch hole in the side of your house. There are a number of easy-to-install felt and foam rubber products on the market to draft-proof doorways.

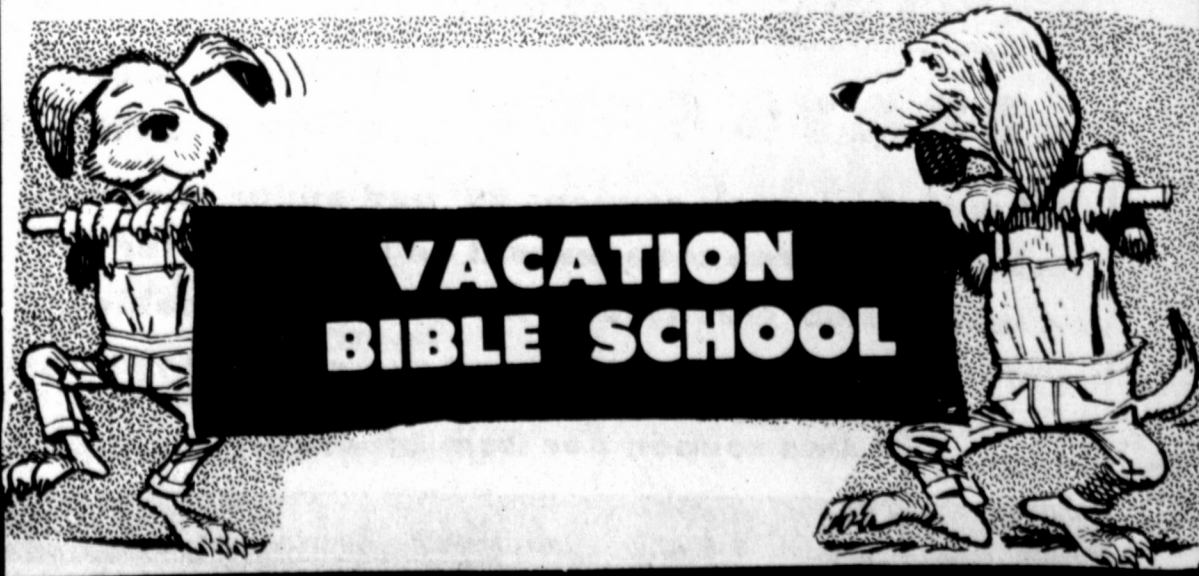

### G.T.E. directory assistance charge now in effect

Changes approved by the Federal Communications Commission on May 25, 1984 will affect General Telephone customers using interstate long-distance directory assistance, customers using

AT&T to make long-distance calls, and businesses with more than one line.

An interstate directory assistance charge of 50 cents per call with a two-call allowance for each billing

period was approved for AT&T, the nation's only provider of interstate directory assistance service. To obtain the two-call directory assistance allowance, the customer must

make at least two interstate calls during each billing period. If the customer makes one or not interstate calls, the allowance would be one or zero respectively. The FCC also ordered

AT&T to reduce its interstate long-distance rates by approximately 6.1 percent.

At the same time, the FCC approved interstate end user access charges of \$6 per line for businesses with more than one line.

All of the changes became effective May 25.

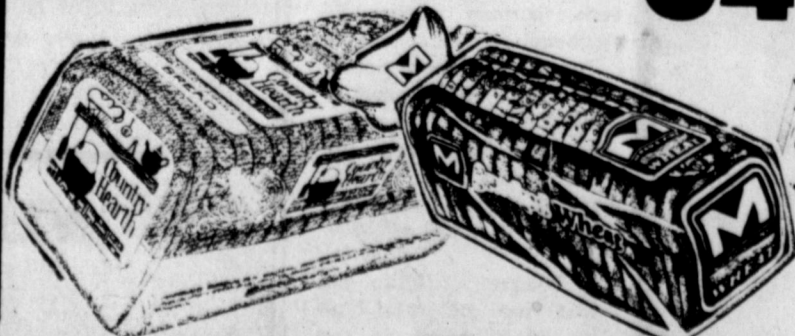

#### Poison Ivy Medicines

There are more than 50 different plants believed to be capable of producing contact dermatitis - the red, blistered, and itching skin with which so many of us are familiar. Poison ivy is often believed to be the culprit when contact dermatitis occurs - and many times it is. But regardless of the plant that causes this skin problem, treatment is usually similar.

Most poison ivy medicines are applied to the skin. The antihistamines are an exception, however. Antihistamines such as diphenhydramine or chlorpheniramine may be taken by mouth to help reduce the itching associated

with contact dermatitis. Also, some antihistamines are present in medicines which are intended for application to the skin.

Poison ivy medicines may also contain:

\*local anesthetics such as benzocaine and dibucaine to block nerve impulses and reduce itching,

\*steroids such as hydrocortisone to reduce redness, swelling, and itching,

\*antiseptics such as phenol to help prevent infection, or

\*astringents such as the ferric oxide in calamine lotion to dry wet, weeping areas of skin.

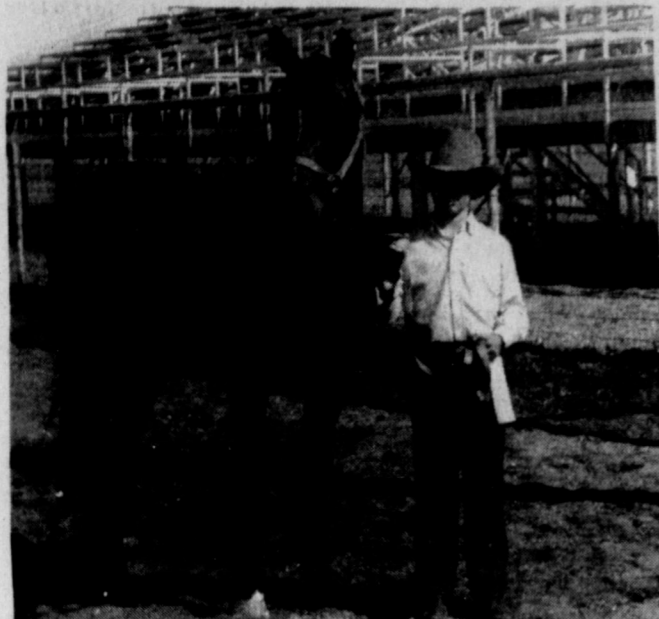

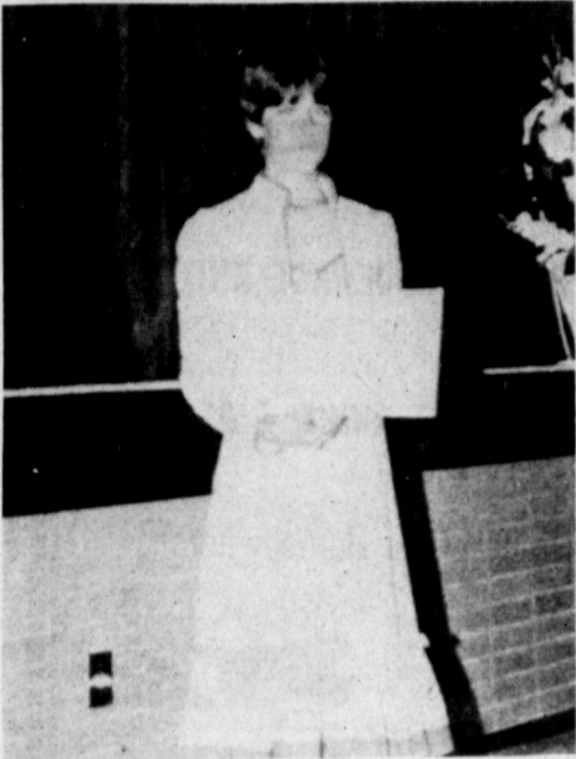

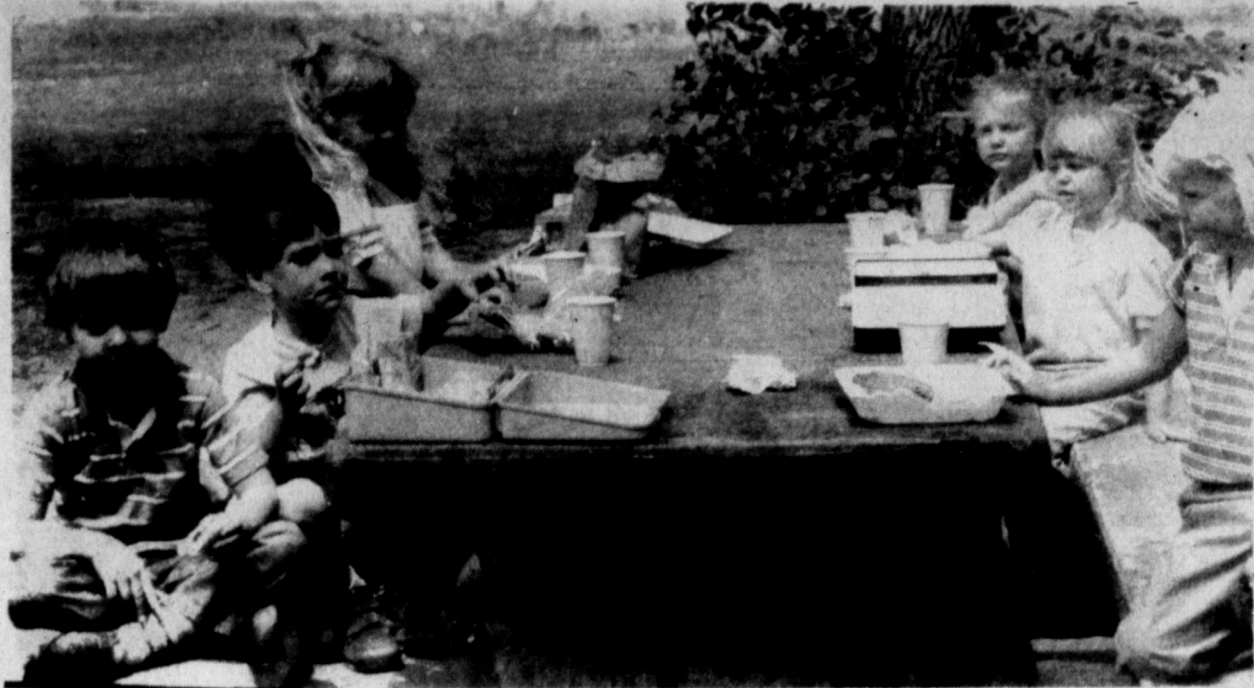

who is now disabled by one of these conditions may qualify under the law for VA disability payments without the need for additional proof. It will be presumed, in the cases of former POW's, that the conditions originated in, or were aggravated by, military service.

Any former POW who was detained or interned for 30 days or more, and who became disabled by one of these conditions at any time after his military service, will be presumed to have incurred the condition during his military service unless there is evidence of some other cause. VA Administrator Harry N. Walters urges all former POW's to register with their nearest VA office. Information on disability compensation and other benefits, including medical and dental care, will be provided along with assistance in applying.
