Private applicator certification program offered

Donley County producers will have an opportunity to complete a training program leading to certification as private applicators at a program scheduled for Tuesday night, October 11, 7:30 p.m. at the Clarendon College Cafeteria in Clarendon, according to Ronald Gooch, County Extension Agent.

The private applicator certification training program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration, and pests and pest damage identification. The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

vice includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented. The program will require approximately 3 1/2 hours. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for issuance of certification.

The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide act is scheduled for October 21, 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted use pesticides.

It's Cotton Festival time in Hedley!

Celebration begins in Hedley Thursday as the 26th annual cotton festival opens. Events are planned for Thursday, Oct. 6, and will conclude Saturday evening when the Festival Queen is crowned. All activities will center around the Main Street of Hedley.

Donley County residents and area visitors may look forward to many fun filled activities during the celebration days. Some of the happenings to enjoy include the midway, snacks from food booths, bingo and games, the old settlers reunion, an amateur talent contest, a noon barbecue, a downtown parade, a variety of musical entertainments, a display of antique cars, an Old Fiddlers contest and a bango picking contest, a drawing for a bale of cotton, the queen's coronation, and talent each night. The festival is sponsored by the Hedley Lions Club and Don Larver serves as president.

Festival Queen Contestants are now selling tickets for the cotton bale drawing, with the one selling the most to be named the new queen. This year's bale of cotton to be given away weighs 630 lbs. and the current market value will reach around \$300. A "Little Future Queen" contest for younger girls is also planned. Each contestant is competing for the honor by gathering donations at a penny a point. Both winners in the two contests will be crowned during special ceremonies at Hedley High School Gym Saturday night at 8:00 p.m.

Entries close at 12:00 noon on the 9th of October. The tournament is open to all bank officers, directors and permanent personnel, both

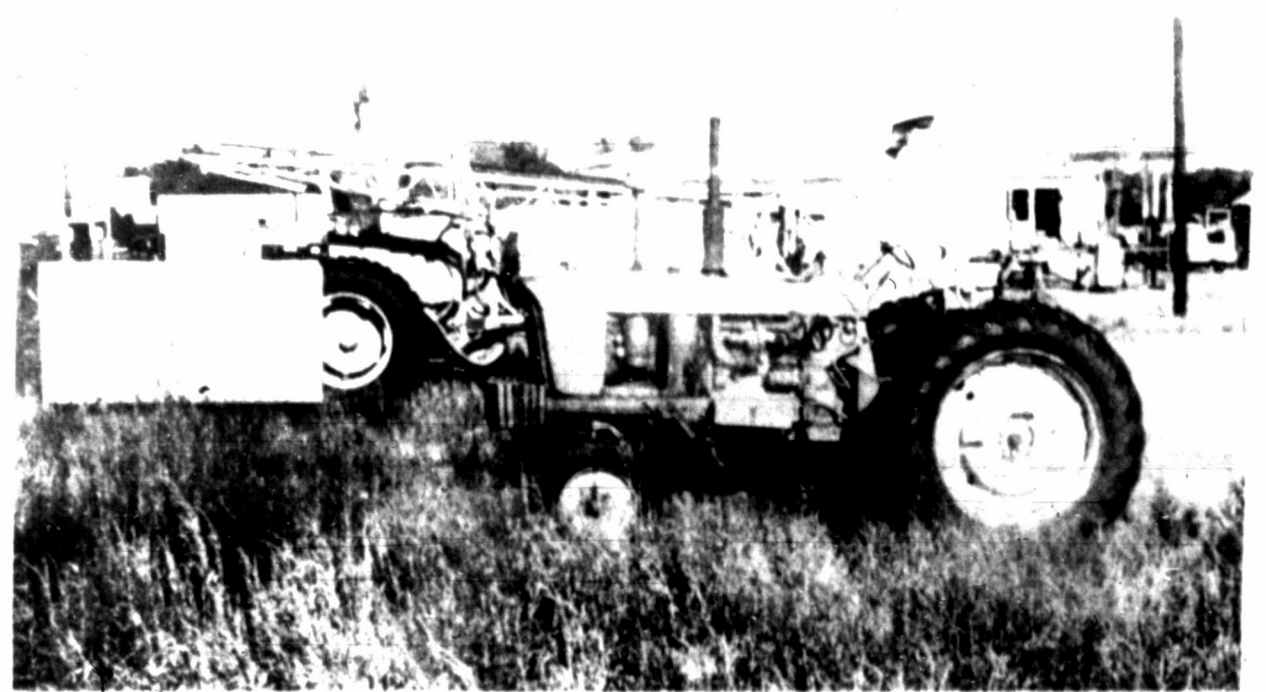
men and women. The entry fee is \$15.00 per person, which includes a big fried chicken buffet and green fees.

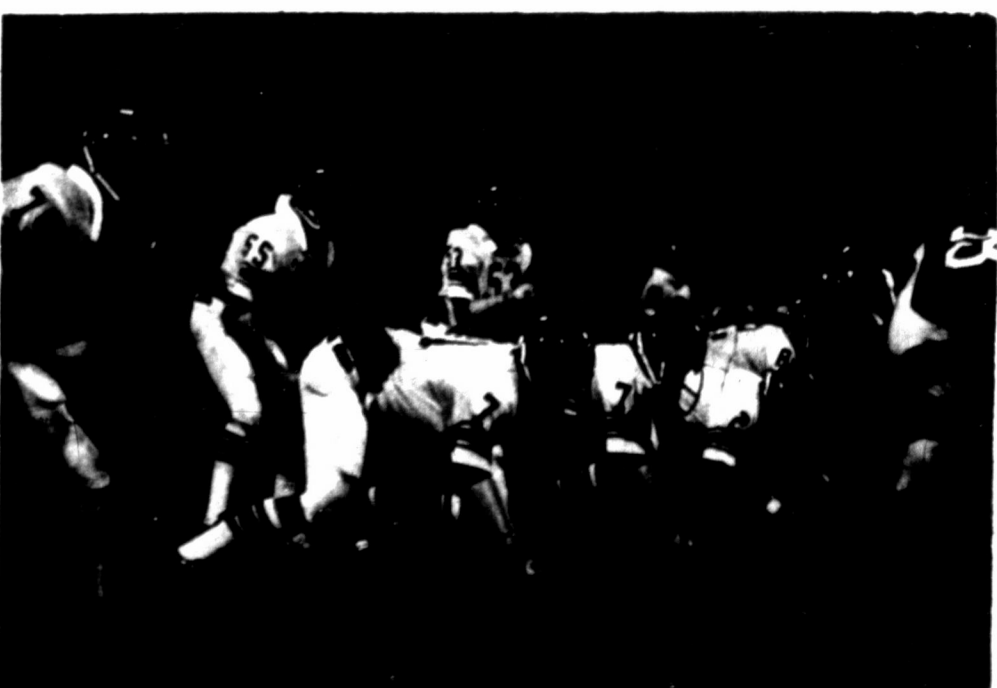
Thursday warmest day

Good kick coverage by Ramon Garcia pinned the Memphis offense deep in their own territory where Billy Perry recovered a fumble. Weatherton scored on the very next play and Hearn once again added the extra point to make the score 24-0.

Right at the end of the half the Colts had a drive going but 2 passes fell incomplete and the score at half time was 24-0. On the second half kick-off the Memphis receiver dropped the ball and the Colts covered it on the Memphis 20 yard line. Weatherton sped in the 1st play and Hearn again got the extra point to widen the lead 32-0.

To start the fourth quarter, Memphis began driving down field but on the 4th and one on the 3rd, Shawn Hall stopped the ball carrier for no gain and the Colts offense took over for the first scoring drive of the game.

Starting on the 3rd line, Weatherton took the middle for 10 yards and a first down. Then Brad Thompson hit Scott Newland for a 35 yard pass to get the Colts out of the huddle. Weatherton took a sweep to the 15 from where he took it on the next play to make the final score at 40-0.

The Bronchos have yet to win a road game

It was a long road home Friday night for the Bronchos and their fans after Childress bested Clarendon, 29-3. The Bronchos have yet to come out on the winning side of a road game. The Bobcats were ready and waiting to give their homecoming crowd a big win. The Bronchos were unable to move the ball effectively against the Cats, but Childress managed to complete 10 passes and took up 172 yards on the turf against the Bronchos.

The wind had died by the time the Bobcats kicked off to the Bronchos. The first offensive play quarterback Dan Brandes connected with end Irven Thomas. This 7 yard pass, which was almost picked off by a Bobcat, was to be the only pass the Bronchos would complete all night. On the third play, Cat Ricky Sims intercepted a Broncho pass and ran it back 23 yards. Three plays later Ricky Anderson scored on an 18 yard sweep around the right side. Perry Morren added the PAT kick.

Childress kicked off to the Bronchos, but the Bronchos fumbled for a 4 yard loss and were unable to make up the yardage plus 10 for a first down. Thomas booted the punt away for about 30 yards. From this point the Bobcats worked the ball down the field for their second TD with 2:09 remaining in the first quarter. Morren again kicked the PAT.

The score staved 14-0 until four and one-half minutes before the half. Childress Anderson fumbled the ball and Mark Wilson made the recovery. The Bronchos drove down to the Cats 8. A delay of game penalty moved the ball back to the 13. With the Bronchos out of downs, Ken Shelton booted a 23 yard field goal which put the Bronchos on the score board for the first time during the game.

Childress came back and scored with 2:53 showing on the clock when Nicky Hardison caught a pass good for 26 yards. The Cats tried for the 2 point conversion but met an unyielding Broncho line. The half time score was 20-6 with Childress on the big end.

The Broncho defense held the Bobcats not allowing their offense to score during the third stanza. The Childress defense scored a safety against the Bronchos when, on a punt snap, the ball slipped through the punter's fingers and sailed out of the end zone.

The last score of the game came early in the fourth quarter when Bobcat quarterback Morren crossed the goal line from a 1 yard out. After his PAT kick the score read 29-3. The last eleven minutes of the game saw Childress threaten to score again only to be held back by the defensive unit of Clarendon.

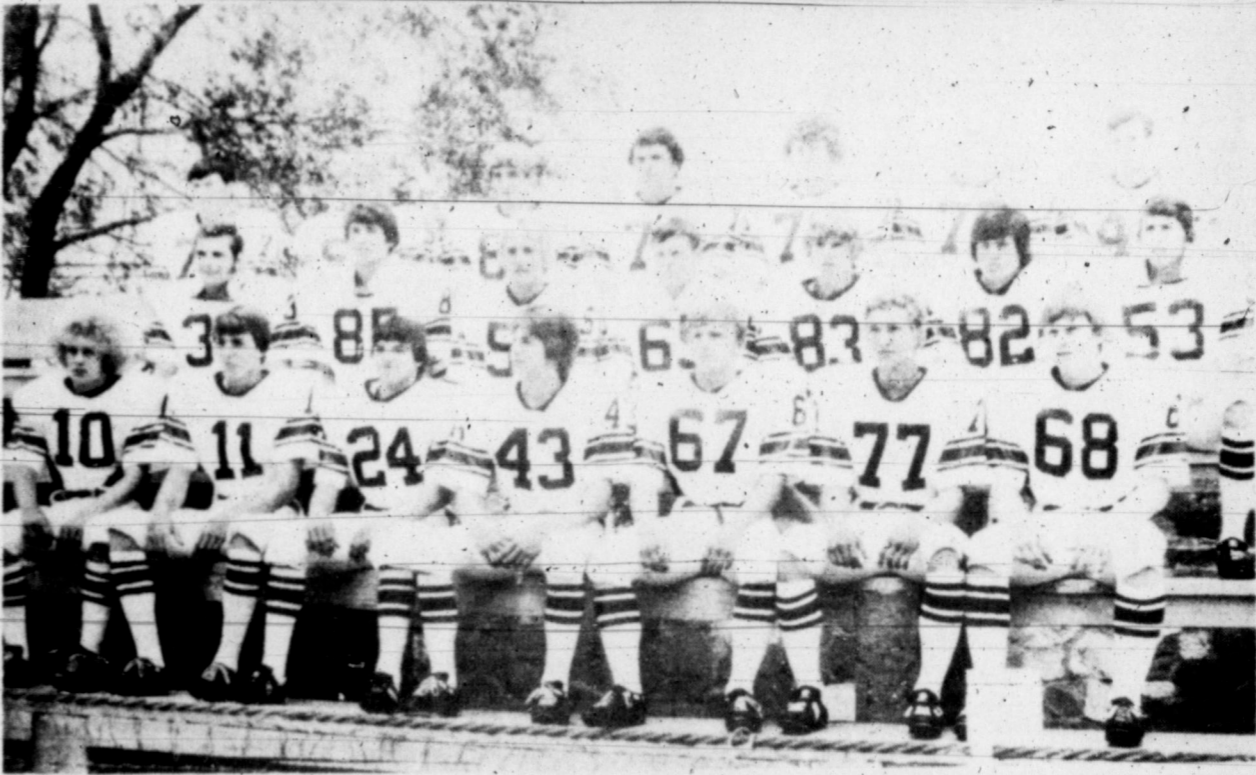

James McAnear has seen farm life change

James McAnear has lived on a farm in Donley County most of his life, and during this span of some thirty-five years has seen many changes take place. In 1941 McAnear worked on a farm receiving \$45.00 per month wages plus groceries. Then in 1942 he started farming on his own by renting land in the Brice community. A few years later McAnear bought a 4 row M. Farmall tractor plus equipment. In those days the equipment which traditionally consisted of a planter and cultivator came with the tractor and the cost for all of this was about \$2,100. McAnear stated a man could make a good living farming on 250 acres of land, and land sold as low as \$50.00 per acre then. Cotton pickers were hired to pick the cotton and would work for as low as \$1.50 per 100 lbs. of cotton. The selling price for cotton was 40 cents per pound, and the crops were generally harvested by Christmas.

McAnear and his family lived on the farm. They raised chickens, hogs, milk cows, and cattle besides crops of cotton, wheat, and milo. In reminiscing McAnear recalls how they sold enough eggs and cream each week to buy their supply of groceries for the next week, how they could buy cotton levis for \$2.50 a pair, how they paid less than 20 cents a gallon for gas and operating fuel, and how he could buy a new pick-up for \$2,100.

For entertainment and a change of pace from the routine chores the family remembers going to town on Saturday afternoons, doing the washing for 50 cents, selling the eggs for 25 cents per dozen, eating a hamburger for 15 cents, drinking a Coke for 5 cents, and going to a good movie for 25 cents. The McAnears recall the

40's as happy days when their children were at home small and growing up. McAnear was making his family a good living for the times, and his family was living a typical life for an American farm family.

In comparison, today, in order for McAnear to make as much profit from 250 acres as he made thirty-five years ago he needs at least 1,300 acres of land, and land comparable sells today for \$200 to \$400 per acre. Tractors, today cost in the neighborhood of \$34,000, an air planter costs \$4,500 and a cultivator \$1,000. These pieces of equipment each are priced separately and are sold separately.

Irrigation, better farming methods, chemicals and fertilizers have made it possible for McAnear to produce more and better crops. However, prices are so poor stated McAnear that the farmer cannot afford to produce even near capacity levels. Today's farmer has no say about what he will get out of his crops. Cotton buyers and grain buyers tell farmers what they will give for their products.

Cotton today, according to McAnear is bringing 40 to 45 cents per pound, the same as it brought thirty-five years ago! Wheat brought \$2.00 per bushel this year on an average, and milo 25 cents per 100 lbs. Prices of farm commodities are all down, while the prices of ginning, farm labor, equipment, and operating expense continues to soar upward.

A few years ago most farmers had a small herd of cattle to fall back on in time of crop failure or in times of poor prices, but today, the cattle market is down. Yearlings bring 36-40 cents a lb. now, and with a calf crop at this rate, McAnear says he

can hardly pay his grass lease let alone expect to gain a profit. So cattle no longer provides a source of security for the farmer. McAnear continued by saying he no longer raises chickens, hogs or milk cows. He said he no longer sells eggs or cream. The high cost of feed and government regulations have made these farm products obsolete to produce and not by the farmers choice.

When asked what the future of farming would be

Crop prices, set-aside to affect '78 plantings--Price changes for wheat, cotton and feedgrains and the new wheat set-aside program will affect 1978 planting decisions, contend economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If the new farm program is enacted, producers will be required to set-aside 20 per cent of their wheat acreage to qualify for price support loan, target price and disaster payments. With crop prices generally under pressure, producers may want to go with the 20 per cent set-aside option unless they need to make adjustments, from above normal plantings in 1977.

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McAnear expressed his concern for all young farmers, and for his sons who follow in his footsteps as farmers. Then he laughingly recalled a question he once asked John Bugbee concerning a small flock of sheep as to whether or not he made any profit from the sheep. John Bugbee replied that he really didn't keep up with it that well, if he had put a pencil to it he guessed he would probably quit raising sheep.

The governing body meets monthly on the second Thursday to help plan and encourage the implementation of a system that will deliver quality health care to every individual in our 25 county area. By volunteering time and effort, Mr. Mills is helping to assure that PHSA remains an organization of Panhandle people serving Panhandle needs. "In an effort to improve public accessibility to quality health care at reasonable prices, the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has designed a nationwide system of 204 regional health planning agencies. The PHSA is one of these agencies," Mr. Mills stated, "and as such is constantly seeking ideas and information concerning health care from Panhandle residents. The PHSA Governing Body believes that by working together as health care providers and consumers, we will be able to improve the quality of health care and maintenance throughout the area."

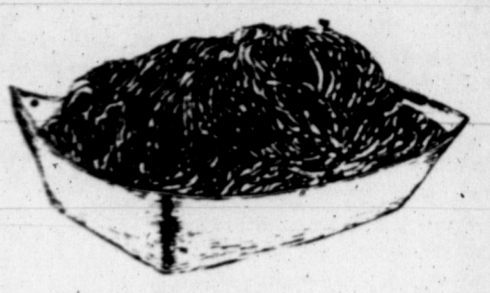

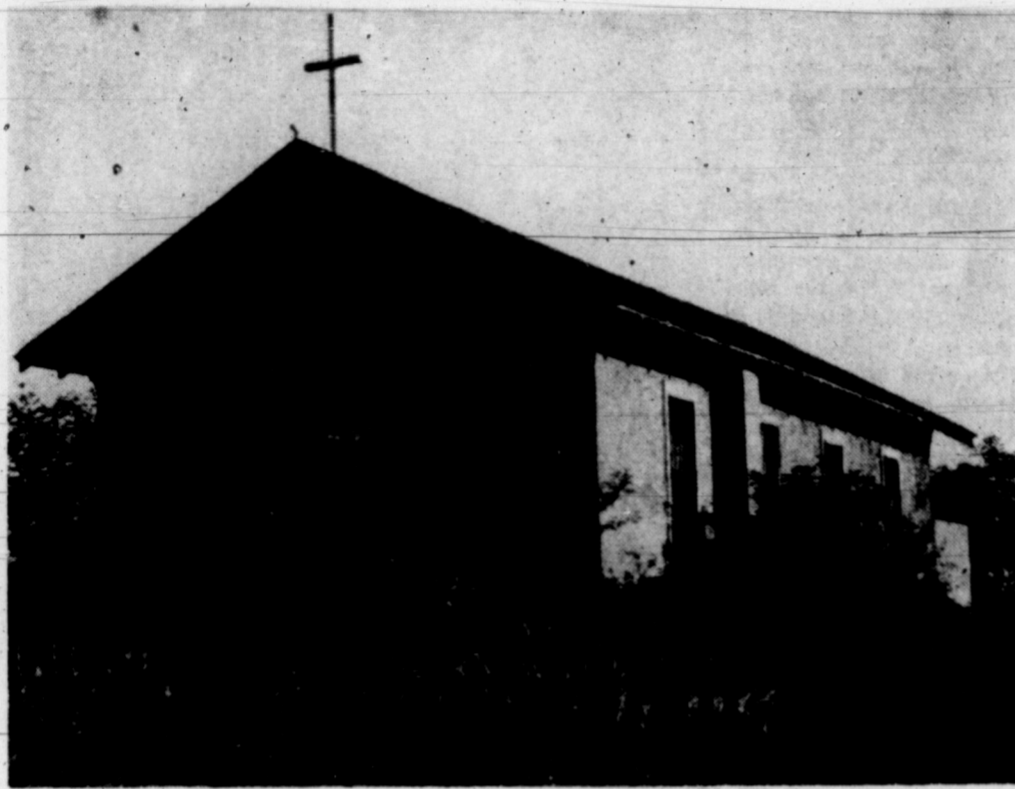

Clarendon's St. Mary's oldest church in Panhandle

ST. MARY'S CATHOLIC CHURCH before it was restored. Built in late 1880's, this church has the distinction of being the oldest in the Panhandle.

In the 1540's Spanish missionaries, who accompanied explorers such as Coronado, were the first to establish the Catholic faith in the Panhandle of Texas. They built the first missions and sought to educate the Indians, explorers and hunters who were the original inhabitants of the plains.

Much later, as the country began to settle, Jesuit priests came into the Panhandle area, and taught the Catholic faith. By 1890 the Diocese of Dallas was erected. In that year Bishop Brennan of Dallas appointed Father J.J. Riordan to care for all missions from Ft. Worth to Texline. According to records Father Riordan first visited Clarendon, June 21, 1891. By this time the town of Clarendon had moved to

the railroad. In Clarendon, he found a rather large number of Catholics. Many of these people were employed by the Ft. Worth & Denver Railroad in shops and round-house, and were of Irish descent. These people were without a place to celebrate Mass except in private homes. Father Riordan persuaded Bishop Brennan to build a church in this pioneer settlement. July,

1892 a little white frame church was completed at a cost of \$1,700. A room in the rear was to serve as living quarters for the priest, however it was not until August 8, 1897 when Rev. John Lenert began serving St. Mary's that it had its first resident priest. Clarendon thus became the first town in the panhandle to have a resident priest.

Rev. John Lenert was pastor when Sisters of Charity of Incarnate Word opened St. Mary's academy, Jan. 16, 1899 in Clarendon.

This school was a two story structure and was located one block west of the church. In 1900 E.J. Dunne administered the sacrament of Confirmation to a class of 17. Thus, St. Mary's academy was the first Catholic school on the Plains of Texas.

In 1899 the priest of the Clarendon parish was in charge of the entire Panhandle. Besides the parish in Clarendon he had 33 stations without churches. Rev. W.H. Dunn in 1900 served Clarendon and its missions, and his parish consisted of 40 counties.

During the peak of the church and academy's history tragedy struck, which reversed the course of events for the parish. In 1901 the round house belonging to the Ft. Worth & Denver burned and the division headquarters and roundhouse were moved to Childress. Since the Clarendon parish had consisted primarily of railroad workers, the little church and school were left almost deserted. The school continued until Nov. 11, 1911 but was closed permanently when typhoid fever swept through the country. St. Mary's Academy was not reopened until Sept. 1, 1913, then it had been moved to Amarillo.

The old bell of St. Mary's Church in Clarendon was taken to Price College in 1936, and is now in the tower of St. Lucien's Chapel, where it continues to summon the faithful to worship as it did in days gone by when it was the only bell atop a Catholic church in an area of some 100,000 sq. miles.

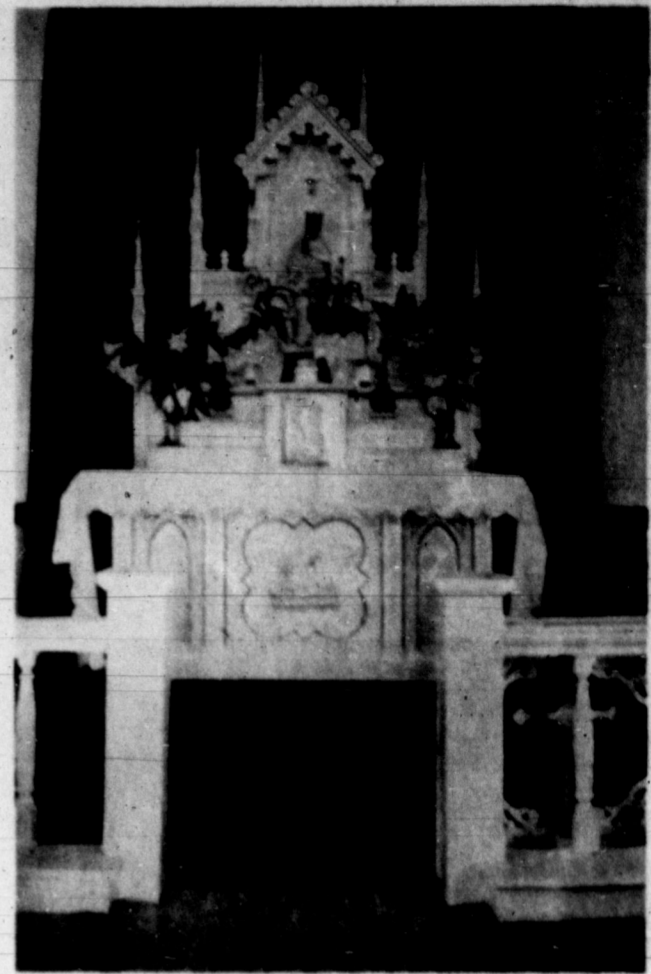
Mrs. Betty Caraway Bell recalls attending Mass as a child with her mother at St. Mary's. In her family there were four daughters and in order to be on time for Mass which met at 6:00 a.m. they had to get up very early to

get the family ready for these early services. Betty recalls how her mother, Mrs. Odos Caraway, cared for the church altar and church linens, and that she always prepared breakfast for the priest, altar boys, and sisters who came from Groom to serve.

In 1941 through the efforts of John Semrad, \$5,000 was raised to make some necessary repairs on St. Mary's Church. Additional repairs were made in the early 50's when a turbulent wind storm struck the church and caused extensive damage by demolishing the belfry and vestibule. During this restoration the building was completely restored and extended fourteen feet to include two sacristies. Gothic windows and electricity were installed, and in 1951 Bishop FitzSimon rededicated the church as "The Shrine to Our Lady of the Panhandle."

Some of the early parishioners who took an active part at St. Mary's Church were Mrs. Odos Caraway, Miss Monica Harvey, Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Stocking, Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Browder, Bess Browder, John Browder, and Charles D. Murphy. Today, Mass is offered at 12:15 each Sunday and at 5 p.m. on Holy Days with Father Carlson of Groom serving as priest to the church.

Now, in its eighty-fifth year, St. Mary's Church stands a monument to the zeal and faith of the early priest-and-Catholics, who came into the vast Panhandle country to found their homes, raise their families, and make a way of life.

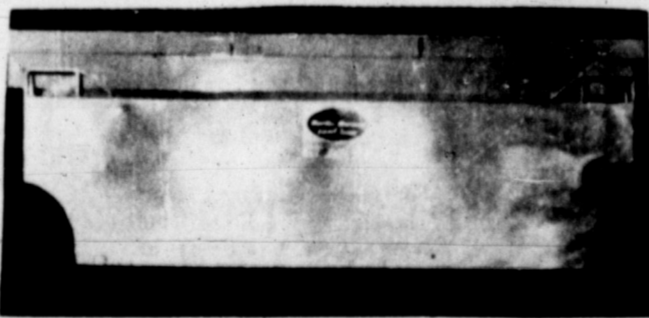

During National 4-H Week, October 2-8, Donley County 4-H'ers are celebrating a successful year in 4-H. Throughout the coming year, 4-H members will be exploring the theme, "Freedom to Be." The 4-H program is continually helping boys and girls grow into self-directed, productive and contributing members of society. It has done this through an informal, learn-by-doing approach to education, in which young people choose their own projects and set individual goals for achievement.

Donley County 4-H'ers have participated in numerous projects and activities throughout this last year. Fall activities started off with the 1976 Awards Banquet on November 6. 49 4-H'ers were presented awards at the banquet for their accomplishments.

Projects which 4-H'ers participated in throughout the year which did not climax with a contest were many. The first project in home economics involved 20 senior 4-H'ers and youth at First Baptist Church. This project was TEPE - or Teens Explore Parent Education, where students studied dating, marriage, and parenting techniques.

Twenty seven 4-H'ers enjoyed a project in automotive during November taught at Chamberlain's Motor Company by Jim Formway and Ronnie Shofner. The two groups learned the basic parts of an automobile engine and chassis. Several boys became very interested in mechanics through this project.

The first stock show of the new 4-H year began at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 17-22. Mark Mann exhibited the 1st place heavy weight and Champion Polled Hereford steer. Other 4-H'ers won honors there.

The Donley County Beef Show was held December 31 with 42 steers and 5 heifers in the show. Grand Champion steer was a 1115 pound Simmental cross shown by Mark Mann. Reserve Grand Champion was Starla Mann's shorthorn and 2nd place heavy weight. Other class winners were: Mark Mann, with an angus-Hereford cross; Lisa McAneaf - an angus, Jay Lindley with a Simmental cross, Jamie McAneaf with an Angus and Gary McClelland with a Hereford. This was the largest county show in 20 years.

At the Sand Hills Hereford Show in Odessa, Phillip Moreman placed 1st with his summer yearling and Melody placed 5th with a winter calf. A Mann entry was again the Champion Hereford steer at the Amarillo Livestock Show in January. His Hereford steer placed 1st in the heavy weight class there.

Lisa McAneaf took honors at the heifer show at the Ft. Worth Livestock Show. Lisa's shorthorn heifer was 1st place junior yearling, Grand Champion of the junior show and also Grand Champion on the open show. Rodney McAneaf placed 3rd with a shorthorn heifer, Phillip Moreman - 1st in junior show and 4th in open show with a summer

yearling. Melody Moreman placed 6th.

While at Ft. Worth, Mark Mann exhibited the 2nd place heavy weight Polled Hereford steer which was also Reserve Champion. This champion steer sold for \$1200.

Mark Mann took top honors at the Southwest International Livestock Show in El Paso. The Grand Champion Steer was the 1st place medium heavyweight and champion cross. The steer sold for a record price of \$6.25 per pound or a total of \$7312.50 to Crowbar Inc. March 1-7 was time for the largest livestock show, the Houston Livestock Show.

Canyon. Cindy Topper and Virginia Clifford placed 3rd in poultry. The senior range and pasture grass identification team received third place. Members of the team were: Lance and Drew Thornberry and Jack Craft. Also receiving third in junior grass team were: Terry Cole, Jeff Helms, Richard Richardson and Ray Lindley. Ben Clifford also, competed in landscape horticulture.

Next up on the calendar in July was the County Dress Revue. Top winners were: Tammi Deen - Junior I; Angela Klinnert - Junior II; and Sherilyn Walker - Senior. At District competition in Amarillo both

Formway, Angela Klinnert, and Starla Mann. Best top five. Sherilyn received a red ribbon at district.

Other winners at the Cotton Garments were: Virginia Clifford, Karen Alderson, and Sherilyn Walker.

District Record Book Judging was held July 29. Blue ribbon winners from Clarendon were: Lynn Alderson - poultry; Tammi Deen - dress revue; Richard Richardson - beef; Denice Richardson - clothing. Red ribbon winners were: Virginia Clifford - bread; Kay Bell - food and nutrition; Phillip Moreman - beef, was alternate to state; 3rd place winner was Starla Mann with a recordbook in swine.

Local winner of the County 4-H Bake Show was Mary Katherine Hayes. She received \$5 and a participant ribbon at the District Bake Show at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo.

Last week several 4-H'ers placed in the Amarillo Tri-State Fair Livestock Judging. Jamie McAneaf had a 2nd place summer yearling heifer; Lisa McAneaf, third place, senior heifer calf; Rodney McAneaf, 5th place with a winter heifer calf. In the Hereford show Phillip Moreman placed 11th and 6th.

Other than contests, 25 4-H'ers participated in a child development project in February. Several individuals also have projects going in poultry, horticulture, home environment, and food preservation.

Donley County 4-H'ers have had a big year. Give them your support as they start a new 4-H year observing this year's theme - "4-H - Freedom to Be."

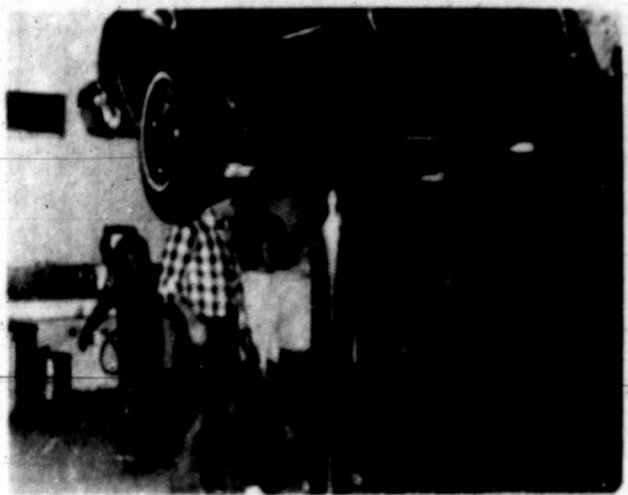

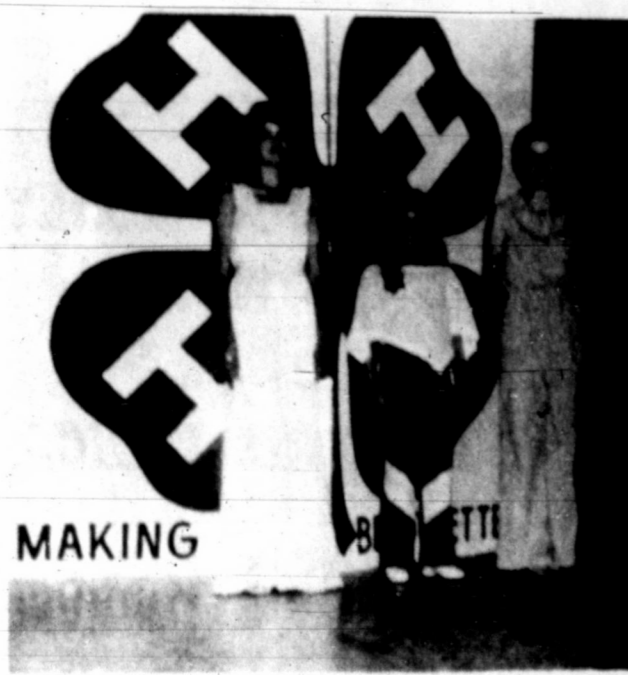
