Someone forgot to tell the coach and players of Clarendon College that they were 7th seeded and not favored to win the Region 5 Girl's Basketball Tournament this past week at Abilene.

The Bulldogs, under the direction of first year coach, David Land stunned the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd seeded teams as they drove their way thru the tourney and earned a berth in the National Tournament at Kansas City, March 13-18.

In the opening game on Monday (Feb. 27th) McLennan, (seeded 2nd) of Waco found the Bulldogs to be true as they were defeated 80-76. Denise Ashby of Fritch destroyed the MCC defense as she knocked the bottom out of the nets for a total of 32 points.

On Tuesday night, 3rd seeded South Plains expected to send the Bulldogs home from Abilene. The Plainsmen had defeated the Bulldogs twice previously in conference competition but found the going uphill as the Bulldogs pulled their "second upset" by the margin of 56-50. Again, Ashby led the attack for the Bulldogs with 16 points. Balance scoring by Tammy Bates, Teresa Wright with 10 points and 11 points from Cindy Stork made defense on the Bulldogs impossible. Beverly Bryson controlled the boards with an amazing 23 rebounds.

It was now in everyone's mind that the Bulldogs were "for real" and that they had a chance of being the team to beat. Once again, they were to play a team that had beaten them twice in regular season. The championship game on Wednesday night put the Bulldogs against number one seeded Howard County. Past records meant nothing as the two teams battled to a 22-22 half time score. At the start of the second half the Bulldogs, under the "quarter-backing" of Cindy Stork, hit from every angle to gain a 9 point advantage. Howard County never gave up and went ahead of the Bulldogs in the fading minutes of the game only to see Clarendon battle back and win the Championship 60-58.

The Bulldogs are going to Nationals. Not only are they going, but this is the first time in the history of Clarendon College that a team in any sport has won such an honor for the college.

"Never has a team played so unselfishly" remarked Coach Land. "I am so proud of these ladies who gave their all as a team. We knew we weren't picked to win so we went down there relaxed and very excited about having the opportunity to represent Clarendon at regionals. This is great experience for the girls. We will have all of them back except Ashby next year," stated Land.

The team will leave Clarendon on Sunday, (March 12) and play their first game on Tuesday, (March 14).

A chapter of history was written in the book of Clarendon College on Wednesday, March 1, 1978 when the Lady Bulldogs of Clarendon College won the Region Five Women's Basketball Tournament at Abilene.

The Championship is the first ever for any team in any sport of Clarendon College and will provide the Bulldogs with their first trip to a National Tournament.

Under the direction of first year coach David Land, the Bulldogs defeated the top three seeded teams in the regional tournament, McLennan 80-76; South Plains 56-50; and Howard College 60-58.

Learning Center is community asset

For an output of \$8,836.70 in local money, coming from a variety of sources, the Donley County Learning Center Inc. gives back \$64,232.19 to the community. This money purchases quality child care services from the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the Texas Department of Human Resources. These dollar amounts are figured on a per annum basis.

Staff for the Learning Center is comprised of ten persons. Seven women work with the children and other personnel include a cook, a Green Thumb grandmother

and one in-schooler who works four hours a day.

Broken down, the figures read like this: personnel salaries, \$40,879.80; fringe benefits personnel, \$3,482.78; travel-personnel \$250.86; consumable supplies, \$8,250.00; rental lease or purchase of equipment, \$1,854.99; other (utilities, insurance, etc.) \$9,514.06.

Of this amount \$38,728.90 is reimbursable from Title XX and \$25,503.29 comes from: 1. Texas Panhandle Community Action Corp., 2. Donley County, 3. City of Clarendon, 4. Private do-

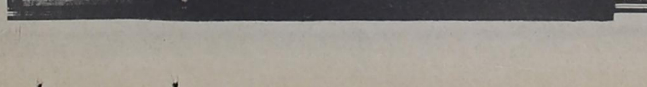
Goldston Quilting Club has meeting

She was descended from a long line of American pioneers who came to America in colonial days as early as 1620. She was a descendant of the Ingram, Powell, Rice, Harris, Burnett, Slaughter, and Koger families who came to Jackson County, Missouri in the early 1830's from Virginia and Tennessee. She moved with her parents to Clay County, Texas in 1894. It was there that she was married to Charles Henry Keeter in Henrietta in 1905. The couple moved to Armstrong County, Texas from Oklahoma Territory in 1906.

Hannah Keeter was a resident of the Malden Community east of Claude for 14 years until the family moved to Claude. The family became residents of the Salt Fork Area of Armstrong County in 1935. She passed away at her ranch home on March 3, 1978.

Mrs. Keeter is survived by her son George Benson Keeter of the home, a step-daughter Mary Keeter of Huntington Park, Calif.; five daughters, Edith Ballard of Claude, Verena Puckett of Springer, New Mexico, Mary Lawson of Lubbock, Ruth Frazine of Amarillo, Hannah Overstreet of Floydada. She was preceded in death by her husband C.H. Keeter in 1938, and by her daughter Roxielea Hall in 1964. She is survived by 12 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. 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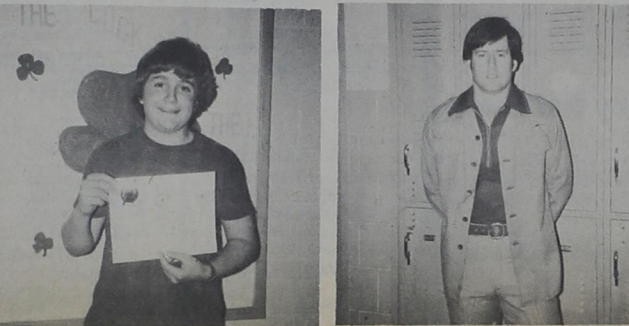

Texas DPS recruiting applicants

The Texas Department of Public Safety is actively recruiting applicants to fill the ranks of its uniform services. Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the DPS announced that the cut off date for applying is April 1 for the training school which will begin May 23. The Major said that the DPS has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from Minority groups, and efforts in this direction will continue. The Department is an equal opportunity employer. It should be pointed out that qualified female applicants are now being accepted.

General qualifications for DPS Officers are these: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age; good moral character; excellent physical condition; visual acuity of 20/40 correctable to 20/20; and a minimum of 60 semester hours of college credit.

While training in the Homer Garrison Law Enforcement Memorial Academy in Austin, the student officer will participate in 850 hours in a variety of Law Enforcement subjects. The training program will consist of criminal law, traffic law, human relations, accident investigation, boxing, judo, marksmanship, physical training and defensive driving, and other law related subjects.

The pay during recruit school is \$848 per month, and upon completion, the commissioned officer will draw \$968 per month. Other benefits are uniforms and firearms furnished, insurance benefits, and per diem allowances while away from an assigned duty station. Social Security benefits are provided aside from the regular trooper retirement plan. Annual paid vacations, sick leave and all holidays provided by the State Legislature are among the many benefits that the troopers enjoy.

Eat out - stay slim

How to 'Eat Out' and stay slim, too
Restaurants offer "stay slim" meals when their customers follow a "no fats" rule of thumb and eat according to The Daily Food Guide.

The guide recommends eating foods from the four Food Groups every day. Groups are milk, meat, fruit-vegetables, and bread-cereals.

For stay-slim menus that include these, the secret is to eat only the recommended amounts of each and focus on low-calorie items.

As a general guide for amounts, adults should drink two or more cups of milk, and eat two servings of meat, four servings of fruits and vegetables, and four or five servings of breads and cereals - every day.

A "no fats" rule-of-thumb includes several "stay slim" ideas:

- Ask that fat be trimmed from chops, steaks, chicken or fish and request that meat be broiled without fat.

- Ask that vegetables be prepared without fat, and avoid those that are buttered, creamed or prepared with sauces that contain fat.

- Select gelatin and fruit salads without cream cheese, sweet or sour cream.

- Limit the amount of margarine, salad dressings and other fats.

- Select skim milk, fruit juice, vegetable juice, coffee or tea as a beverage, but pay close attention to only the recommended amount.

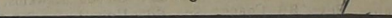
- For dessert, choose fresh or unsweetened fruit, fruit ice or gelatin-type desserts, and pay strict attention to amounts of these.

Seven men make up school board

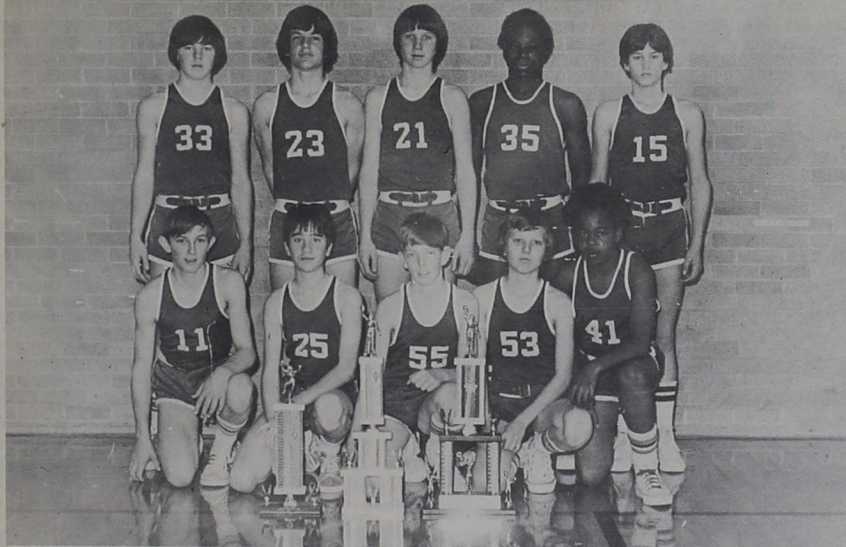
Seven capable men make up the governing board of the Clarendon Independent School District. These men, all local residents, have helped make this school system the fine system that it is.

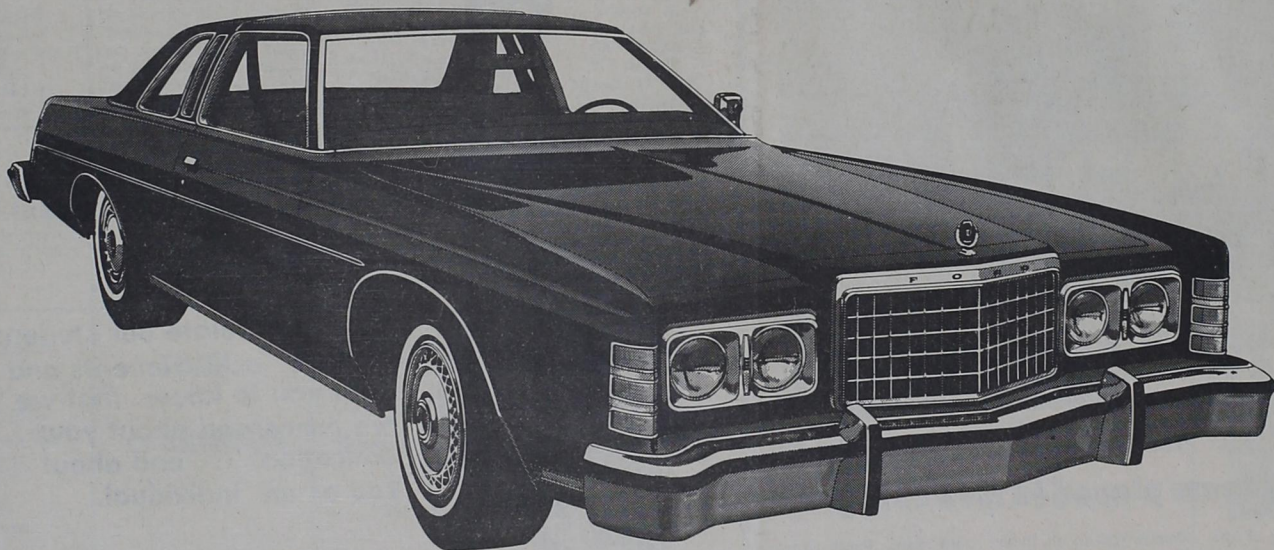

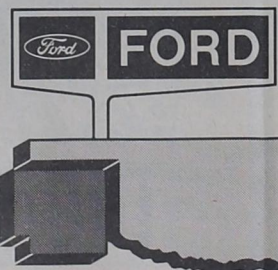

FmHA emergency loans available

Emergency loan funds are available from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county office in Clarendon, W.H. Pieratt, FmHA State Director, announced today. Mr. Pieratt authorized the loans following a request from the Commissioners' Court of Donley County and the Donley County Emergency Board.

The request for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration came as a result of losses sustained by local farmers hit by hailstorms. The disaster did not effect a large number of farms, but those who were stricken have suffered severe losses.

Farmers can apply for assistance at the FmHA county office at Clarendon, Texas, until February 28, 1979, for production losses. To be eligible for a loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of

five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability. Loans beyond actual losses can be repaid in various periods, depending upon the purpose of the loan. The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is eight percent. Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of eight percent.

Emergency loan funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. A farmer can use the money for essential operating and living costs, Mr. Keown said.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to make major adjustments in the farming operation for greater efficiency and productivity.

Foster Whaley speaks to Lions Club

Foster Whaley, Democratic candidate for State Representative, spoke at the Tuesday, March 7th meeting of the Clarendon Lions Club on the topic, "The Farm Unrest."

Whaley related that much of today's farm problems can be credited to what the Government has done to farmers as well as what they have failed to do for them. He cited the fact that we have had almost three decades of a bi-partisan cheap food policy.

The Government price freeze on live cattle by President Truman created the worst price disaster in the early '50's this country had seen at the time. Then the Nixon freeze on beef prices in 1973 triggered more bankruptcies in the cattle business than this nation had known to that time.

Whaley cited the fact Secretary Butz had encouraged fence row to fence row planting—then Nixon placed an export embargo and sent grain prices into a tailspin. All of this was an effort to appease consumers.

Whaley pointed out the grain reserve Government program to place three hundred million bushels in storage will pretty well assure the fact that wheat prices will go no higher than \$3.83 per bushel as long as the loan rate is only \$2.25. This is slightly over 70% of parity. Whaley said, "If our wheat and other grains were sold in the World Market at parity, farmers of this nation would stand to earn five billion dollars more for their grain products. Farmers could stand to earn as much as \$3.00 more per bushel for wheat."

He cited government figures that showed the U.S. sold over sixty-three percent of all the feed grains and 41% of all food grains that went into World Trade in the last marketing year. He stated the fact that the U.S. has the power to set world prices.

Bad trade agreements with the European Common Market permits Volkswagens to be shipped into this country at only three percent of their wholesale price as import duty. But the import duty on our wheat being shipped to Europe is now \$3.45 per bushel.

The U.S. is the only exporting nation that does not have a government or grain marketing board to set the outgoing price.

The Japanese government buys our wheat direct and resells it to their millers for \$2.00 per bushel profit.

Whaley said a grain exporting board run by farmers should be the one spokesman to achieve fair prices.

Cold weather - high electric bills

February, 1978, has proved once again that cold weather and high electric bills go hand-in-hand, according to a spokesman at West Texas Utilities Co.
After analyzing February weather data, Ray Hartt, a WTU space engineer, said, "Both in degree days and in average temperature, we experienced one heck of a cold month."
Bills currently being issued by WTU are mostly for electricity used during the extreme cold weather, and are producing a flurry of inquiries to WTU local offices.
Hartt said electric usage probably would have been higher if heavy winds had accompanied the cold fronts during the month and if many customers were not practicing conservation.
Fuel costs for February were slightly lower than in January, which also helped take some sting out of the bills.
The "heating degree day" is the net difference between the average outside temperature, over a 24-hour period and a base temperature of 65 degrees. This past February there were 729 degrees in Abilene, compared to 393 in February, 1977.
Hartt said this is about average for WTU's entire service area, which stretches from Shamrock on the north to Persidio on the south with Abilene about in the center.

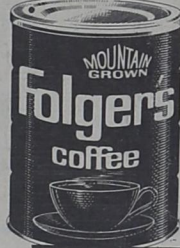
