The ASCS office has been notified by their State Office that Emergency Grazing of set-aside acreage has been approved through May 31, 1978.

If you have cattle on acreage to be set-aside, you may leave them on the land until May 31; However, the

final date to graze wheat for grain is still April 1.

If you have not turned in your 1977 cotton production records, you should do so as soon as possible.

If the ASCS office does not have the records, the production shown for your farm for 1977 will be zero.

## Saturday election results

Voters turned out in good numbers for the elections Saturday and cast their ballots for the candidate of choice from a slate of qualified contenders in most of the races.

In two elections, the Board of Regents for Clarendon College and County School Trustees for precincts 1 and 4, there was no competition. On the county board G.W. Estlack and Billy Ray Johnston were re-elected with 66 and 27 votes respectively. On the college board of regents, Billie Christal 266 and Bright Newhouse 291, incumbents, and Dr. R.L. Gilkey 296, who will fill the position on the board previously held by Frank Phelan, were elected.

In the city alderman election Bob Kidd, incumbent, was returned with 154 votes, Lloyd McCord received 116 votes and Chas. E. Deyhle, Jr. 95, to fill the three vacancies on the board. Other candidates were: B.B. Osburn with 77 votes, and

W.W. Lovelady who tallied 74.

Bob Cole was top man with 180 and Don Robinson a close second with 148, for the two positions to be filled from a list of seven persons for I.S.D. board of trustees. Others were: Stina Cain, 93; Frances Deyhle, 93; Henry Hastly, 96; Jeanice Weatherly, 55; and Cheryl Burch, 24.

Two Donley County Hospital Board members were returned for another term: C.C. Ayers and Bud Hermesmeier. Ayers polled 314 and Hermesmeier 294; R.D. Castner, 246 and Albert Burleson 284, to complete the positions. Dikki Howell received 89 votes. These were hospital district totals.

One official remarked that this was a year when many interested persons submitted their names and an extremely well qualified listing of candidates for all positions resulted. The voters knew who they wanted and the outcome was decisive.

## Cancer Control Month, 1978

By the President of the United States of America

### A Proclamation

Of all known diseases in this country, cancer is probably the most feared. Recent statistics indicate that 700,000 cases of cancer will be diagnosed in the United States in 1978 and that 390,000 Americans will die of some form of the disease this year. Only through continued support of cancer research and control can we reduce these figures.

The Federal Government, in cooperation with non-Federal organizations, is committed to finding the cause and cure of all forms of cancer and of controlling it to the extent possible while that search goes on. Since the inception of the National Cancer Program, we have learned much about the cause, detection, treatment and control of cancer. Today, cancer can often be detected earlier, making more effective treatment possible and saving many lives. Surgical, radiation and chemotherapy techniques have been improved, and research shows promise of adding immunotherapy as an additional method of treatment. Because prevention offers the best hope for ultimate control of cancer, cause and prevention research remains one of our highest priorities for we still have much to learn.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JIMMY CARTER, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim the month of April, 1978, as Cancer Control Month as requested in the joint resolution of the Congress March 28, 1938 (52 Stat. 148, 36 U.S.C. 150). I invite the Governors of the States and the appropriate officials of all other areas under the United States flag to issue similar proclamations.

I also encourage the medical and health professions, the communications media and other interested persons and groups to take this opportunity to educate the people on this subject and to help them to take advantage of available resources to prevent needless suffering and death.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this fifteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy-eight, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and second.

## Fishing license notes

Outdoor activities and enthusiasts are taking full advantage of spring weather and fishermen, who have been ready for quite a while have gone to the lake to try their luck.

For those who live at Greenbelt Lake or near it, or come regularly, the rules and regulations are known; but for those new to the lake and area licensing information and lake regulations are listed below.

All licenses issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, regardless of month issued, are valid ONLY during the period September 1 through August 31 of the following year, EXCEPT GAME BREEDER, and those issued for a specific number of days.

It is unlawful to hunt or fish under the license of another, or allow another person to hunt or fish under your license or to possess more than one hunting license.

**COMBINATION HUNTING AND FISHING: \$8.75.** A single license which is valid for all Texas citizens required to have either/or both resident hunting and fishing licenses.

**DUPLICATE HUNTING, FISHING OR COMBINATION HUNTING AND FISHING:** 50 cents, if original is lost or destroyed.

**RESIDENT FISHING:** \$4.50, required of all persons who fish in the waters of Texas with the exception of those: under 17 years of age; over 65 years of age; fishing in private waters; fishing in the county of residence with trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holder of a \$1.25

Exempt Fishing License available to disabled veterans or the blind.

A defensive driving course will be held Thursdays, April 13 and April 20 at 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Clarendon College, room 102.


This eight hour course is designed to teach people to be better drivers. The course explains where the possibilities of an accident lie and tells the student what to do to avoid them.

## Sarich heads medical committee

At a Friday, March 31 morning meeting members of the medical committee, volunteers from the groundworks Town Hall meeting, Jerry Knight, Medical Center Nursing Home Administrator, and media representatives met in the Hospitality Room of the Farmers State Bank to discuss the possibility of another doctor coming to Clarendon.

Knight acted in liaison capacity for the group regarding the doctor and his communication with Knight.

A committee was organized with John Sarich as chairman, and Joe Wells, Cloe Ann Newhouse and Mrs. Morgan Cox as committee members.

It was decided to invite the doctor to Clarendon for an interview. Jerry Knight has contacted him and he is expected to be in Clarendon on April 17, Monday about 3 or 4 p.m. If all goes as planned, he will stay through Wednesday, April 19.

Dr. Ezgard Quezada, is originally from Bolivia, South America. He speaks excellent English, as does his wife. Dr. Quezada is 33 years old, married and has three children.

He is a specialist in internal medicine and is currently a resident in internal medicine at Mercy Hospital in East Orange, New Jersey. His home is in Buffalo, New York. This is his fourth year at Mercy Hospital.

Knight related observations of his own and of those persons who have interviewed prospective doctors for communities. The response, community reaction, to the doctor is of utmost

importance. After being invited to visit the conviction of being needed and wanted to practice in a particular place is necessary. A doctor who comes to practice comes to make his home and become a part of this community and since he must, practically view the community as a business he needs assurance that his services are in demand.

## Texas and tourism



Dr. Richard Lee Gilkey of Clarendon has been named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a certification examination offered by the ABFP. He is now certified in the specialty of family practice. The intensive 2-day written examination taken by Dr. Gilkey is designed to prove his ability in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics, gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and community medicine. To qualify for the examination a physician must have completed either a 3-year family practice residency or have been in family practice a minimum of six years and successfully completed 300 hours of con-

tinuing medical education approved by the American Academy of Family Physicians. ABFP diplomates also must continue to show proof of competency in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.





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# Clarendon wins April 1 tract meet at Groom

Keith Topper placed in U.I.L. Literary meet

Friday afternoon at Clarendon College the District 2-A U.I.L. literary meet will be held. Students from Clarendon High School and other district member schools will be competing to try and advance to the regional meet in Odessa, April 20-22.

This meet is sponsored annually by the University Interscholastic League for students who show outstanding ability in academic areas. In 1910 at a state teachers meeting at Austin the University Interscholastic League was formed. Its main purpose at that time was to govern the debate programs in Texas high schools. Since that time it has grown to cover the areas of speech, literary, music, and athletics. It is the governing body of these events. Its purpose is to organize and direct, through the medium of properly supervised and controlled contests, desirable school activities, and thereby assist in preparing pupils for citizenship. Last year 2778 schools participated in League contests.

Each May the spring state meet is held in Austin to crown the conferences' winners in the literary meet. 




