Glenn has a message for his audiences drawn from personal experience six years ago.

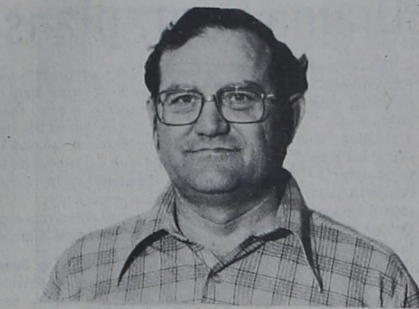
Since that time he has testified before many groups to give to his listeners the story of his renewed feeling for a great life.

I was born in Clarendon in 1930 and have lived here all my life. My wife and I own our home in Donley County and plan on living here permanently.

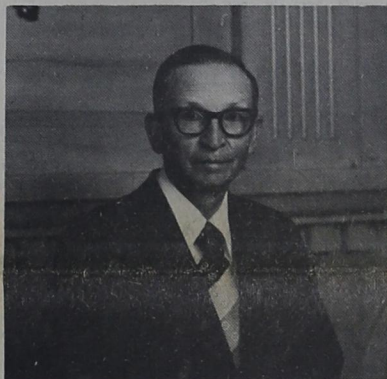
I attended Clarendon College and have been engaged in farming and ranching and also in business here for approximately 30

College's Phi Beta Lambda named most outstanding in state

At the Phi Beta Lambda State Leadership Conference held at Fort Worth, the PBL chapter of Clarendon College took first place honors in 13 categories.

Competing against PBL chapters from across the state, CC won the first place honors for the following achievements: **March of Dimes activity:** Project HELP - "Health Education Leads to Progress" is designed to both education of students on birth defects as well as raise funds for research to conquer birth defects.

The Clarendon chapter was responsible for the March of Dimes drive conducted in Donley County this year. As a result of the Mothers' March, a dance and a dance-a-thon, the chapter raised over \$1,000 representing an excess of \$.50 per capita in Donley County. In February, the March of Dimes honored ten members of the Clarendon Chapter by selecting the members to attend the State March of Dimes Youth Conference in Dallas.

Amaco Award of Business Advocacy: sponsored by the AMACO Corporation, the award is dedicated to honoring

outstanding chapters of Phi Beta Lambda that participate and make outstanding contributions to the promotion of the American Free Enterprise System.

The chapter participated in several projects that made the award possible. Included were: owning and operating a school supply store under the name of Phi Beta Lambda Enterprises, Inc.; developing a free enterprise library for the college's business department with free source materials supporting the free enterprises system; and presenting a series of films and speakers to the students of the college. Speakers included professionals and representatives of unions, industry, oil companies, bankers, insurance companies, lawyers, and other areas of business.

The chapter was recently recognized by the National Office of Phi Beta Lambda and featured the organization's publication in the National Magazine - "Tomorrow's Business Leader". In addition, a private firm has contacted the chapter and requested the right to consider the activities for a feature in either Time or Newsweek magazines.

Most outstanding project: The PBL chapter of Clarendon College initiated and conducted a recruiting drive for new students. Contact was made with hundreds of outstanding business major prospects throughout the nation encouraging and inviting them to become involved in the business department of the college.

In addition, the chapter also developed a system where PBL membership could enroll in a course at the college, Human Relations in Business Organizations, and receive up to three (3) credit hours of work in the Business Department. This is the only such program in the state and is currently under review by several other colleges as a possibility at their institution. The project EDUCATE was designed to make students of the business program at Clarendon College become aware that they must be involved in their educational program for it to be successful.

Gold Seal Chapter Award of Merit: awarded to the top 5% PBL chapters of the state. Chapters must complete all forms and reports accurately and on time to the state office.

Community Service Project: awarded to Clarendon College chapter for the chapter's work with Clarendon's Head Start Day Care Center. The chapter has been active in working with the youngsters and in working on fixing park and recreation playground equipment for the center.

Chapter Installation: awarded to the chapter that installed the most new chapters during the year. Installations by the Clarendon PBL chapter included Future Business Leaders of America at McLean High School, and Sul Ross State University's Phi Beta Lambda Chapter. Members of the installation team were Roy Monroe, President; Sandra Veal, Secretary; Pam Dallas, Treasurer; and Kathy Butler, Reporter.

Vernon Payne Award: presented to the newest outstanding program in the State of Texas.

The Phi Beta Lambda Chapter of Clarendon College will compete for national honors in San Francisco in July. The chapter is under the sponsorship of Mr. Randy Sims and Ms. Peggy Sproul, instructors of business at Clarendon College.

The chapter has a series of events planned to raise approximately \$2000 to send these delegates to the National Leadership Conference.

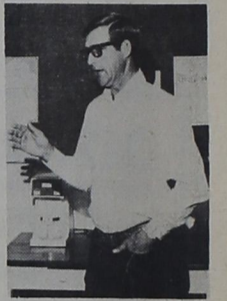

Mr. Lacy speaks to youth

Denzil Lacy, Wellington cotton farmer, was guest speaker of the Cooperative Youth Group of the Methodist-Presbyterian-Episcopal and Catholic Churches of Clarendon at its regular meeting at seven o'clock on Sunday evening, April 16, at the Episcopal Fellowship Hall. Mr. Lacy has been active in the American Agriculture Movement since its inception in the fall of 1977, and has participated in several AAM strike actions, including two trips to Washington D.C., the march over the bridge at Hidalgo and the "Bergrland egging" at Amarillo.

The high school youth and their sponsors heard Mr. Lacy give his explanation of the cause of the present economic plight of the farmer and his reasons for the AAM push for 100% parity, which Mr. Lacy defined as "cost of production plus a reasonable profit." Mr. Lacy explained that violence is not the object of the AAM, but that they seek to gain the attention of the American consumer and our elected officials and to educate them concerning the distress of the American farmer.

Mr. Lacy sees House defeat of the flexible parity bill sponsored by Kansas' Republican Senator Robert Dole as a major setback to the AAM and blames the Carter administration and the elite Trilateral Commission opposition for the defeat. Having failed in its attempt to get government sanction for 100% parity, Mr. Lacy said that AAM would have to concentrate its immediate efforts on educating the consumer.

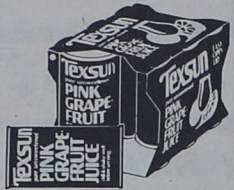

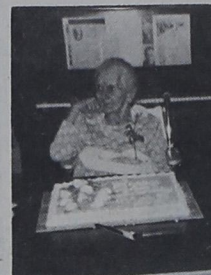

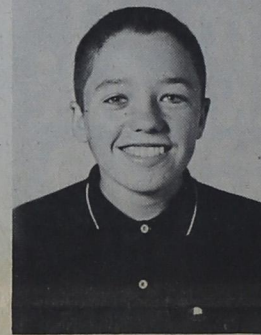
