A graduate of A & M University, and with a background of agriculture knowledge and experience, Moore feels he is well qualified to serve Donley County as commissioner of Precinct 2.

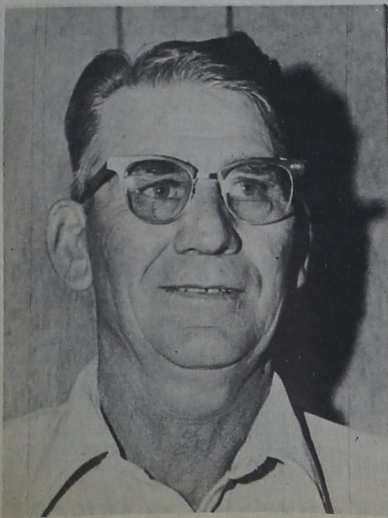

# Clarendon College Drama Department will present a Centennial production

Clarendon College hopes each citizen of Donley County can join the college in the first drama production of 1978 to commemorate Clarendon's Centennial. The killing of Sitting Bull and the massacre at Wounded Knee--events which this play depicts so vividly-- are black-bordered paragraphs in American history. Most of us would like to be able to wave a magic wand and say, "Let these simply be bad dreams which never really happened."

number of historians to have been revenge for the massacre by the Indians of General Custer and his army only a few years earlier.

Who was to blame for these atrocities? The American government? Indian Tribal leaders? Both?

Or was it Fate? Was some larger unseen hand playing a role in this climactic turning point in American history? Surely the mystical, powerful Ghost Dance contributed... somehow.

The Ghost Dance religion gave Indians the hope of maintaining (or restoring) their old way of life in spite of the indifference of the American government, the

interference of religious do-gooders, and the hopeless poverty which resulted when they were uprooted from their lives as hunters and forced to become farmers, an occupation for which they had no respect and no skills.

But the American Government--and especially the army--considered the Ghost Dance to be the beginning of

another Indian uprising similar to the one which resulted in disaster for Custer's men.

This play opens with the attempt of the Indian police to arrest Sitting Bull and ends with the massacre of the sick and starving remnants of the once proud Dakota Indians. History records that the massacre

began when someone fired a shot while the army was trying to disarm the Indians.

Miss Schnauffer quotes, "If you are familiar with the history of the Indian wars and the shady twenty years that followed them, you will not be disappointed in either the accuracy or the portrayal in 'Ghost Dance.' If you are not, you may be astounded

by the subtleties of the situation.

For the Sunday afternoon performance there will be a special reserved section for parents of Clarendon College students and all senior citizens of Donley County. The cost of tickets for any of the three performances is \$1.50. The performances are April 27-28 at 7:30 p.m. and

April 30, 2:00 p.m. A free Art Show and reception follows the Sunday performance.

This production is the South Western premier of "Ghost Dance at Wounded Knee." The cast and director, Miss Leslie Schnauffer has done extensive research in order to support this play with historical documentation. All Indian

costumes are replicas of those found of the Dakota Indians during the late 1890's. The ghost shirts are also replicas of those surviving in museums. Miss Schnauffer has worked very hard to make this a historical re-inactment of one of Americas most dramatic uprisings and massacres of the first Americans--the American Indian.

Clarendon, Davis' team accumulated a 51-64 win loss record.

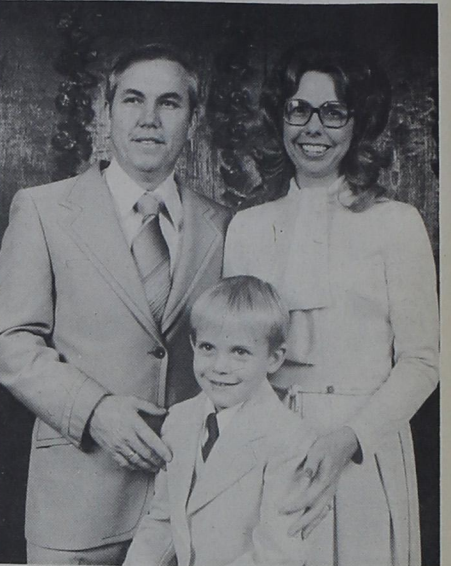

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## Historical marker for United Methodist Church

An Official Texas Historical Marker for First United Methodist Church of Clarendon will be erected by May 28, 1978, it was announced today by Clarence L. Hamilton of Clarendon, Chairman of the Donley County Historical Commission.

The marker will be placed at 420 S. Jefferson at 5th Street. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future. Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by Donley County Historical Survey Committee. The inscription of the marker reads:

FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH  
OF CLARENDON

When the Rev. Lewis H. Carhart, a Methodist minister, founded Clarendon, he envisioned it as a religious and educational center. The town was established in 1878 near the junction of Carroll Creek and the Salt Fork of the Red River, six miles north of its present location. Local cowboys nicknamed the settlement "Saints' Roost" because it had no saloons. The first building erected was a combination church and school. Until the turn of the century, there was a Northern Methodist Church in the community.

When the railroad arrived in 1887, Clarendon moved to its

present site. The Rev. James T. Hosmer, a circuit rider, conducted Methodist services in private homes. In 1888 the Rev. Isaac L. Mills and 15 charter members organized the Methodist Episcopal Church South. In 1890 the fellowship erected a frame church building on the southeast corner of Kearney and Fourth Street. Membership increased significantly after the founding in 1898 of Clarendon Methodist College, forerunner of Clarendon Junior College.

To accommodate the growing congregation, this large classical revival structure was built in 1910, during the pastorate of the Rev. O.P. Kiker. The original roof was replaced in 1950.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Commission's program of preservation activities. These include archeological investigations, history museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. As of 1976 the Historical Commission had erected more than 7,200 official markers.

The name and location of the present marker will appear in the next edition of the **Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers** in order to stimulate tourist travel in this area, to arouse interest in historical tours, and to acquaint the people of this locale with their unique heritage.

presentation of a scholarship to a Clarendon graduating senior girl who plans to attend Clarendon Junior College.

This year the sorority will celebrate Founder's Day on Friday, April 28 at Mrs. Bromley's Dining Room. Awards will be presented to local members, and for the first time, Mu Gamma plans to present an Outstanding Woman of the Year Award to a deserving woman of the community who is not a member of the sorority. After

dinner members will attend the college play, "Ghost Dance at Wounded Knee" which is directed by Miss Leslie Schnauffer, drama teacher and fellow member of Beta Sigma Phi.

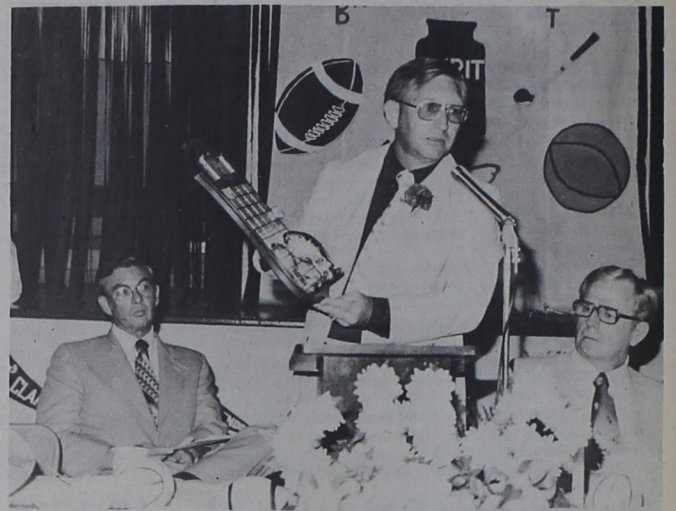

### Hospital Board meeting a success

Tuesday night, April 18, the Donley County Hospital District board of directors met with visiting Dr. Edgard Quezada and interested persons from the district to discuss the business of Dr. Quezada coming to Clarendon to practice medicine, and what the community had to offer him as security while establishing his practice.

Public participation at the meeting was positive and as a result a joint guarantee, representative of the persons composing the hospital district and the hospital board of directors, was made in regard to the doctor financially.

This amounts to a minimum guarantee that insures a net income at a certain constant level for six months. Some of this support was made in the form of pledges which, if they are called in, are tax deductible. In citizen action, apart from the hospital board and district, several persons were named from those present to assist in various ways if Dr. and Mrs. Quezada decide to accept the offer to come to Clarendon. Areas where aid was volunteered were for the moving of personal effects from Buffalo, New York; for the securing of a residence and some assistance, if needed, with rental for the first few crucial months.

At this time the hospital district and citizens of Clarendon, Howardwick, Lelia Lake, Hedley and their communities are awaiting the decision of Dr. Quezada and his wife about coming to Clarendon. The word on his decision is expected before May 15. The many persons in attendance at various gatherings made it clear last week that they want the Quezadas to come here and make their home, and that we will welcome them.

plants are often over-used, become weakened, and may not reproduce. At the same time, other plants are used to a lesser degree, maintaining more vigor than preferred plants.

Short duration grazing breaks this competitive edge gained by unpalatable plants. After a pasture is grazed briefly, it receives a rest five to ten times as long as the grazing period. If soil moisture and growing conditions are favorable, choice forage plants make rapid regrowth due to the high vigor developed during the rest periods. This improved vigor allows the better plants to reproduce and gradually crowd out the less palatable ones.

"But short duration grazing systems require careful planning and close supervision," Donaho warned. "Livestock must be moved when the desired degree of forage has been used. Some systems require more cross-fencing and a few producers have found that they need more livestock watering facilities.

"Most range scientists are convinced that short duration grazing is the system of the future," Donaho stressed. The problem is to plan each system carefully so it can be made to work."

#### Quarterly tax return

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the first quarter of 1978 by Monday, May 1. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until May 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office.

### More profit per acre

More net profit per acre, rapid grassland improvement, and reduced labor needs are some of the benefits of a new method of

rangeland management being used in Texas, a local conservation leader said today.

Jim Donaho, district conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service at Clarendon, said the technique, called Short Duration Grazing, is now being used successfully by more than 400 livestock producers in Texas.

Donaho also said that SCS has published a new booklet explaining the system in detail. Single copies can be obtained free from SCS offices.

"Short duration grazing is producing some excellent results in Texas," Donaho said. "The major benefit is rapid grassland improvement, which leads to more net profit per acre."

Local stockmen using short duration grazing include Ted Shaller, Jack Moreman, and W.D. Altman.

Donaho said that with the technique, livestock that are normally run in several pastures are put into one herd in a single pasture. The other pastures are left vacant. When the forage is grazed to the desired degree, livestock are moved to the next pasture in the rotation. That way, all pastures are deferred from grazing for several months before being grazed for a few weeks.

Under continuous grazing, livestock repeatedly use those plants they like best. As a result, these preferred

### Marvin Thompson - free enterprise and conservation of energy

Free enterprise, conservation of energy and honest old fashioned Yankee ingenuity have sent a Clarendon man, Marvin Thompson, to Washington, provided Pantex employees with transportation and caused insurance companies to reconsider and approach vanpool operators about carrying policies with their companies.

The vanpool was a program designed to conserve energy and as a result of the vanpool conference held in Lubbock in early June in 1977, the Pantex Vanpool was born.

A group of Pantex employees from Clarendon became the initial vanpool with a 120 mile round trip each day. Twelve passengers comprised this first vanpool. Within a month six more vanpools were formed and at this time, eight months later, a total of 24 individually owned and operated vanpools transport 324 persons to work at Pantex Plant.

Organizing the Pantex Vanpool entailed gathering information about other vanpools, insurance, financing and related data. The goal: to replace a great

number of employee automobiles with one van for a group. For a large number of employees, as is the case at Pantex, a large number of vans or a vanpool.

For the vanpool commuter the most desirable type vehicle is a 15-passenger van with dual air conditioning, power steering, automatic transmission, cruise control, fully trimmed interior, AM-FM radio-tape deck, CB radio and a coffee service, using an airport strapped to one of the front seats.

In most instances the vanpool offers door-to-door pick-up and has a common pick-up point for others. Substitute drivers are a part of each vanpool. With a 15 passenger vehicle a daily average of 10 riders is easily accomplished and this number will pay for the expense of the van and its operation.

With the present 24 vanpools operating at Pantex the average is 13.5 passengers per van and 190,080 gallons of gasoline saved per year.

Persons instrumental in organizing the Pantex vanpool program were: Dan Deaton, Director of Conservation and Energy Resource Development, of Dallas; Stan Stokey, Tennessee Valley Authority, Knoxville, Tenn.; George Tyson, Social Security Office, Baltimore, Md. and Lew Pratch, Office of Transportation Programs, Washington, D.C.

Loans were procured from the Pantex Federal Credit Union with a 9% interest rate for 48 months. For those who would participate in the vanpool program the credit union made 100% loans available.

Insurance for the program was readily accepted by the State Farm Insurance Company. Several companies were totally disinterested at the time the program was initiated but after some success has been enjoyed many companies have called to announce they would be happy to insure Pantex vans. Owner-operators have a free choice of companies with which to insure their vans, as long as the coverage of the policy is adequate.

Thompson was invited to Washington, D.C. by the Department of Energy to present the "ride-sharing" program, vanpooling, of Pantex. Many states have vanpools in existence, company owned and financed. The Pantex operation is the only organized owner/operator program in the country at this time. Many inquiries have come to Marvin Thompson from all over the country about forming them elsewhere.

In Washington Thompson

was asked to help the Department of Energy develop a program to be implemented at all DOE sites throughout the country; construct a workshop for DOE personnel to present the owner/operator vanpool system to union leaders in New Jersey who in turn will conduct workshops with their 500,000 membership.

In New Jersey a first estimate of 500 vans carrying 6,500 persons would replace 6,000 cars on the highway and would save millions of gallons of gasoline.

One of the principal objectives of the trip was to encourage legislators to support the addition of owner/operated vanpools to the portion of the president's energy package which gives tax breaks to business owned vanpools.

Thompson was successful in accomplishing the goals he had set out to achieve. His next trip was April 19, 20 and 21 at the National Vanpool Convention in St. Louis where he explained the new concept (vanpooling) in people transportation.

Thompson has put together a concept of energy saving, teamwork, personal ingenuity and effort, with the support and backing of his company, to give an advantage to Clarendon employees at Pantex plant in Amarillo and to blaze the

trail for ride sharing all across the nation.

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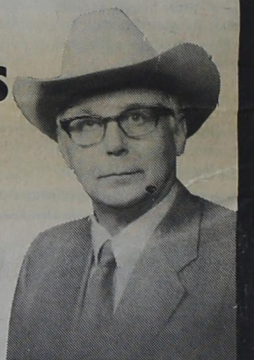
