Historical marker for United Methodist Church

An Official Texas Historical Marker for First United Methodist Church of Clarendon will be erected by May 28, 1978, it was announced today by Clarence L. Hamilton of Clarendon, Chairman of the Donley County Historical

Commission.

The marker will be placed at 420 S. Jefferson at 5th Street.
Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.
Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by Donley County Historical Survey Committee. The inscription of the marker reads:
FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH OF CLARENDON

When the Rev. Lewis H. Carhart, a Methodist minister, founded Clarendon, he envisioned it as a religious and educational center. The town was established in 1878 near the junction of Carroll Creek and the Salt Fork of the Red River, six miles north of its present location. Local cowboys nicknamed the settlement "Saints' Roost" because it had no saloons. The first building erected was a combination church and school. Until the turn of the century, there was a Northern Methodist Church in the community.

When the railroad arrived in 1887. Clarendon moved to its

present site. The Rev. James T. Hosmer, a circuit rider, conducted Methodist services in private homes. In 1888 the Rev. Isaac L. Mills and 15 charter members organized the Methodist Episcopal Church South. In 1890 the fellowship erected a frame church building on the southeast corner of Kearney and Fourth Street. Membership increased significantly after the founding in 1898 of Clarendon Methodist College, forerunner of Clarendon Junior College.

To accommodate the growing congregation, this large clasical revival structure was built in 1910, during the pastorate of the Rev. O.P. Kiker, The original roof was replaced in 1950.

After a pasture is grazed briefly, it receives a rest five to ten times as long as the grazing period. If soil moisture and growing conditions are favorable, choice forage plants make rapid regrowth due to the high vigor developed during the rest periods. This improved vigor allows the better plants to reproduce and gradually to reproduce and gradually crowd out the less palatable

But short duration grazing systems require careful planning and close super-vision," Donaho warned. Livestock must be moved when the desired degree of when the desired degree of forage has been used. Some systems require more cross-fencing and a few producers have found that they need more livestock watering facilities.
"Most range scientists are convinced that short duration

grazing is the system of the future," Donaho stressed. The problem is to plan each system carefully so it can be

Quarterly tax return

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income 1978 by Monday, May 1. If the quarterly liability (re-duced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

Persons who have de-osited the entire quarterly Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until May 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office.

Pantex, a large number of vans or a vanpool. For the vanpool commuter the most desirable type vehicle is a 15-passenger van with dual air conditioning, power steering, automatic transmission, cruise control, fully trimmed interior, AM-FM radio-tape deck, CB radio and a coffee service,

radio and a coffee service, using an airpot strapped to one of the front seats.

In most instances the vanpool offers door-to-door pick-up and has a common pick-up point for others. Substitute drivers are a part of each vanpool. With a 15 passenger vehicle a daily average of 10 riders is easily accomplished and this num-

average of 10 riders is easily accomplished and this number will pay for the expense of the van and its operation. With the present 24 vanpools operating at Pantex the average is 13.5 passengers per van and 190,080 gallons of gasoline saved per vegr

year.
Persons instrumental in organizing the Pantex van-pool program were: Dan Deaton, Director of Conservation and Energy Re-source Development, of Dallas; Stan Stokey, Ten-nessee Valley Authority, Knoxville, Tenn.; George Tyson, Social Security Office, Baltimore, Md. and Lew Pratch, Office of Trans-portation Programs, Wash-ington, D.C.

Loans were procured from the Pantex Federal Credit Union with a 9% interest rate for 48 months. For those who would participate in the vanpool program the credit union made 100% loans available.

Insurance for the program was readily accepted by the State Farm Insurance Company. Several companies were totally disinterested at the time the program was initiated but after some success has been enjoyed many companies have called announce they would be happy to insure Pantex vans. Owner-operators have a free choice of companies with which to insure their vans, as long as the coverage of the policy is adequate.


