## Rites for W.C. Thornberry

Funeral service for Carroll Leland Lewis, age 78, a resident of Clarendon and Donley County for 71 years, were held at 3:00 p.m. on Friday, May 12, 1978, in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Paul Heil, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with the arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Lewis died at 2:15 a.m. on Thursday, May 11, 1978, in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. He was born on June 17, 1899 at Stephenville, Texas and came to Donley County from Erath County, Texas in 1907. He married Noma Eva Alvey on August 4, 1918 at Lelia Lake.

He worked as a farmer and stockman until he was elected Donley County Justice of The Peace for Precinct #2, and has served for the past 12 years in that capacity. He was active in civic affairs and belonged to the Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife,

Mrs. Noma Eva Lewis of the home; four daughters, Mrs. LaNelle Lovelady of Clarendon, Mrs. Carol Lane Phillips of Fort Smith, Arkansas, Mrs. Noma Lee Brown of Amarillo, Mrs. Wanda Louise Moore of Adrian; four sons, Ernest Leland Lewis and Floyd Marion Lewis, both of Amarillo, Jack Alvey Lewis of Clarendon, Walter Wayne Lewis of Dumas; six sisters, Mrs. Louise Howard of Anton, Mrs. Ruby Batson and Mrs. Lorene Holland both of Lubbock, Mrs. Alta Lane of Pampa, Mrs. Jewell Robertson of Amarillo, Mrs. Anna Lee Reeves of Canyon; eighteen grandchildren and nineteen great grandchildren.

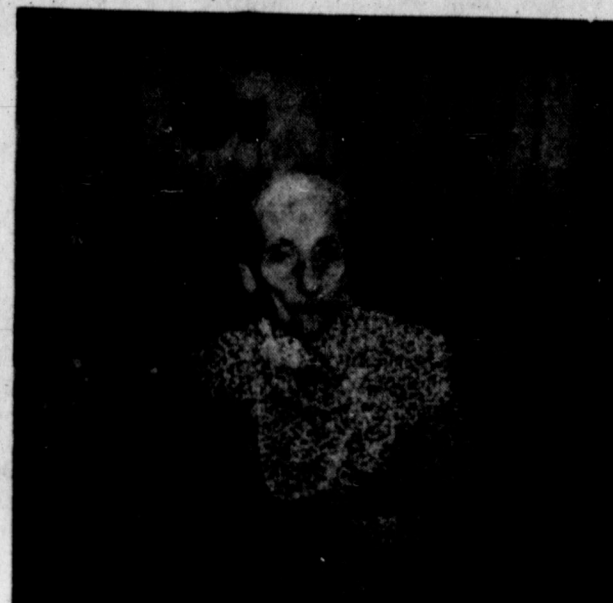

## Three 98 year old Mothers honored

### Dora Adkins

Mrs. Dora Adkins was born Oct. 13, 1880 at Flower Mound, in Denton County, Texas. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. James-Isaac Simmons who were natives of Ruston, Louisiana.

Her father grew up on a cotton plantation which his father owned and farmed, with the help of 40 negro slaves, whom he also owned.

Dora's father served in the Civil War from 1861-1865. One battle at this time was at Vicksburg, Miss. Simmons returned home after the war and found the plantation in shambles, married and decided to move west, traveling in wagons pulled by oxen, and settled in Denton County.

The first Simmons home was a log cabin, with a dirt floor, no windows and one door. Later on he built a house, and purchased the first cook stove to be used in Denton County.

It was a modern day wonder and people came for miles to see it, shook their heads and said it would never work.

Mrs. Adkins was a real Tom-Boy as she grew up, taking part in sports, especially liking baseball. She still enjoys seeing all sports on T.V. While in school she prepared herself to be a music and voice teacher. She

traveled by horse and buggy to each pupil's home, which were scattered for miles around, also serving as organist for the Flower Mound Presbyterian Church. In 1903 she met and married Mr. T.R. Adkins in December, 1905.

After World War One was over, Mr. Adkins heard so

many good things about the panhandle of Texas that he came to Clarendon, liked what he saw and bought a farm four miles west of town.

In February of 1919 he moved his family to Donley County, where the six children grew up in the Martin Community. They still wanted to attend the

Presbyterian Church, so every Sunday morning the whole family piled into a buggy and drove into town, usually being the first ones to arrive.

Then in the afternoon the family attended the Martin Church where Mrs. Adkins was pianist for many years. After her husband passed

away in 1934, Mrs. Adkins moved to Amarillo for several years, then moved back to Clarendon, bought a home, and lived there as long as her health permitted. She has two living children - Glen Adkins and Roberta Pittman Earl (Byrd), T.R. Jr. and Ola May are deceased.

### Maggie Reaves Lewis

Maggie Mae Reaves was born to Mr. and Mrs. Francis Marion Reaves on April 28, 1880 in Palo Pinto County, Texas.

Her family moved to Erath County, Texas where she attended school.

She married Earnest Luther Lewis of Dublin, Texas in 1898.

With their four small children, they moved to Donley County, Texas, arriving at Lelia Lake on December 24, 1907. They remained there, where Mr. Lewis was a farmer and grain dealer until his retirement in 1945, at which time they moved to Clarendon.

### Dogs beware

Calls to the city hall have reported a number of complaints of loose dogs and damage or inconvenience to citizens.

One owner reported a cow killed by dogs running in a pack. Another caller said children could not play in their own yard because dogs frightened them.

A large number of calls reported flower beds ruined and vegetable gardens destroyed by roaming dogs.

There is a leash law in Clarendon, which has not been enforced. The leash law requires owners to keep dogs confined, penned or on a leash. Dogs are required to have a city tag inside the city limits, should be vaccinated for rabies, and city tags. DO NOT ALLOW DOGS TO RUN FREE.

Failure by owners to control dogs will result in the enforcement of the leash law to protect persons and property and animals will be picked up and destroyed.

They had seven children, one son and six daughters. As a young woman, her ambition was to be a professional nurse. Due to her early marriage, she did not receive training in the

nursing field. However, with her large family, she became a competent, non-professional nurse.

Mr. Lewis passed away in 1952. Mrs. Lewis lived alone until her injury in 1974. After her recovery she moved into

the Clarendon Medical Center Nursing Home. Her hobbies were reading, sewing, handwork and, in later years, watching television. She is a member of the First Baptist Church.

### Addie Martin White

Addie Martin White was born Oct. 2, 1881 in Giddings, Texas. In her youth she moved with her family to Cross Plains, Texas where she grew up and attended college for one year at Howard Payne College in Brownwood.

She was teaching school in Cross Plains when she married F.A. White in 1900 and moved to Clarendon that year.

She had six children - four

boys and two girls and was always a loyal member of the Clarendon First Christian Church. In her church she

taught classes for young people and later in life an adult class until her eyesight failed in her mid-eighties.

# Library benefits listed

Beginning in September, Gabie Betts Burton Memorial library will be eligible for full benefits from the Texas Panhandle Library System. Listed is a summary of the benefits for the library user.

- Use of a professional artist, based at headquarters, to design brochures, posters, lists and other publicity pieces that can be reproduced by a hometown printer, with the system assisting in the cost of printing (up to \$200).

- Benefit of system-wide publicity promoting system services and libraries in general.

- Use of a pool of display items at headquarters library.

- Regular visits from system consultant to assist with special needs and problems.

- Free telephone or headquarters consultations with headquarters staff.

including specialists in library administration, group services, audio visual services, reference, selection, processing and cataloging.

- Continuing education opportunities, including workshops, use of professional literature, college extension courses, LTA Classes and conferences.

- Collection enrichment for purchase of printed materials through grants amounting to \$629 for your library in FY1979.

- Centralized purchasing through Major Resource Center jobber at MRC discount for all collection enrichment grant monies. Member libraries may obtain MRC discount if they choose to order from local funds from MRC jobber.

- A monthly inventory of 110 currently popular books available through the McNaughton Rental Plan.

- Free, through the Texas State Library Communications Network, interlibrary loan service, offering free access to materials in major public academic libraries in Texas and Louisiana.

- Free, direct access to all book collections in the system through reciprocal borrowing.

- Free use of all 16mm films in the headquarters library. Patron places order with local library and local library contacts headquarters at no cost.

- Enrichment of local collection through use of area loans. 200 books chosen from headquarters' duplicates and 50 cassettes per library may be checked out at a time.

- Assistance with cataloging problems and opportunity to have cards reproduced at minimum cost if commercial not preferred.

- Opportunity to receive discarded books from the Amarillo Public Library collection as area permanent loans.

But the greatest benefit of all is the knowledge that the people of Clarendon and Donley County are receiving "Better Library Service Through Systems."

Food Safety needs to be stressed daily because there are so many types of bacteria that can make us sick and probably the two we hear the most about are botulism and salmonella. We need to know and learn about all of them and the precautions we can take to prevent any types of food poisoning.

Greenery Can Save Fuel

One item in your landscape can screen out an awkward sight, add beauty instead, and save energy and dollars at the same time. It's shrubbery you plant around the outdoor compressor on your air conditioning unit.

Tests being publicized by the American Association of Nurserymen show that air conditioning equipment runs an average of 3-percent less time for the same cooling effect when the outside part is in shade. And if that shade is created by growing shrubs, a pleasant view replaces the sight of machinery.

As for the money saved - the nursery people point out that a 3-percent saving on summer utility bills might well cover the first year's cost of installing the living plants, and after that they're pretty little money-makers.

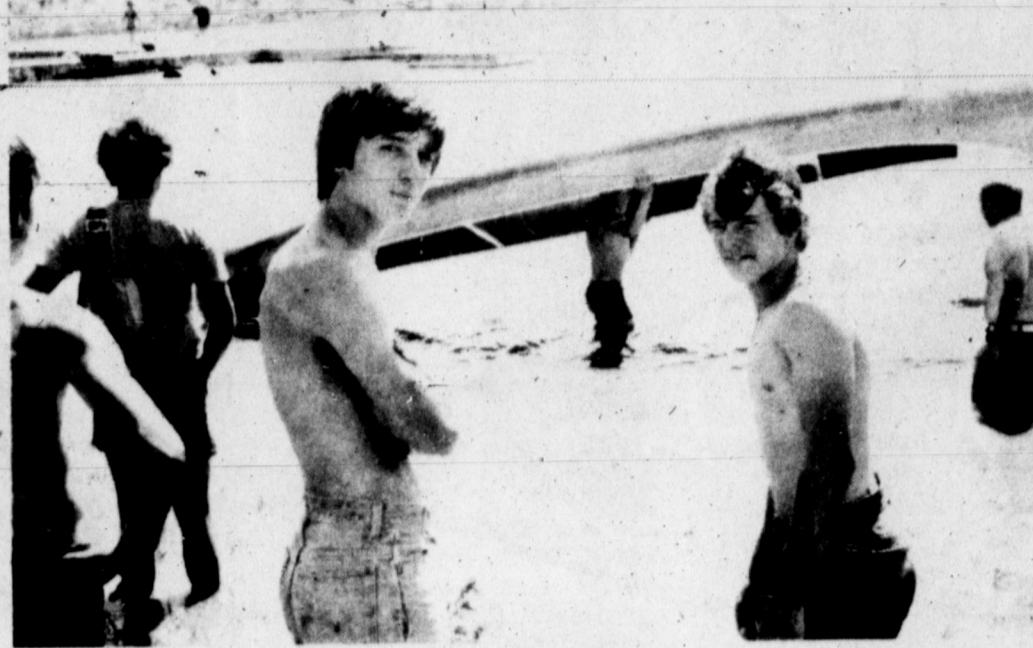

**Mailbox improvement week**

Upholding the tradition that spring is "cleanup" time around households, Postmaster Robert G. McCombs today announced that the week of May 22-27 will be observed as "Mailbox Improvement Week."

Clarendon residents are urged to repair, repaint and make other improvements to all mailboxes, particularly to those located along rural, city delivery curb-line and highway contract routes.

"Customers should be sure their boxes provide adequate protection to the mail and are easily reached by carriers. That helps speed collection and delivery of their mail," Postmaster McCombs said.

"Attractive mailboxes also add to the general appearance of our community," he said.

The annual observance began generations ago in small towns and rural areas.

Rural carriers each day travel approximately 2.2 million miles to serve 14.3 million families along 33,600 regular auxiliary routes zigzagging across America.

Approximately 400 families here in the Clarendon area are served by one rural and four Star routes.

When rural mail service began in 1896, many makeshift receptacles -- including tin cans nailed to trees -- were used as mailboxes.

Postal history reflects that a Kansas resident, Ira F. Collins, was among the first customers to show an

approved commercial mailbox designs are provided for use with decorative posts. Customers who prefer custom-made mailboxes may check with the Clarendon Post Office. Postmaster McCombs said.

interest in improving the appearance and security of the mailbox.

On April 29, 1963, Collins filed a patent application for his invention of a new and improved mailbox described as follows:

"This invention relates to improvements in mail-boxes particularly adapted for use on rural mail-routes; and an object of the invention is to provide a mail-box of simple construction and inexpensive and so arranged as to protect the deposited mail-matter from rain or snow and which can be quickly opened and closed, resulting in a great saving of time in the

collection and delivery of mail."

This he did. The metal, cylindrical receptacle had two basic parts; a mail-receiving unit, shaped like a scoop, which slid in and out of a protective outer casing. A flag, attached to the outer unit, could be raised to indicate when mail was to be collected. By grasping a handle, a person could release the inner unit, containing the mail, from the outer casing. The latter offered protection of the mail from the weather. The mailbox could be attached in a vertical position to a post or any suitable support.

Various forms of cylindrical mailboxes for many years accentuated the pastoral scenery along rural mail routes across America.

## From Cynthia Manning

Within a family group, individuality needs support and encouragement. Mentally healthy, happy individuals contribute ideas, strength and support to the family. Without input from the individual, the family unit ceases to be capable and useful.

"Live and let live" describes the need for mutual support of individual for family and vice versa. The idea that families must "control" the individual members is not in the family's best interest and thus irrational.

The traditional view of families encourages "oneness" or "sameness" of all members. The emphasis is on maintaining the family unit rather than strengthening and encouraging individual growth and development.

Compromising uniqueness or sacrificing for the family brings resentment and a loss of power to the individual and family. Each individual family member's unique contribution can strengthen

and help perpetuate the group.

The happiest individuals are those that believe they control what happens to them, not their families. A family can follow these guidelines to encourage individuality:

- Support each family member in their efforts to develop their personality. For example, listen to a child's ideas and praise the ones that are creative, unique and show thought, not just the ones of which you approve.

- Reinforce the idea that uniqueness is positive.
- Emphasize the family's need for input from individuals.

- Encourage open, free, non-critical communication of ideas, attitudes, feelings, and beliefs.

When there are differences of opinion, evaluate from the perspective of what would be the best thing that could happen and the worst thing that could happen if a certain action or belief were followed rather than being judgmental.

## Pasture planting

Grasses and legumes have established their place as one of the nation's major crops, thanks to farmers' and ranchers' profitable experience in growing improved varieties developed by SCS plant materials centers, agricultural research centers, and commercial seed growers.

Today, after a quarter of a century of conservation farming and ranching, the results of grassland husbandry are reflected in the economy of individual operators and that of communities and some entire regions. The job is not complete however, for much of our present cropland is unsuitable for cultivation and needs to return to grass.

Grasses and legumes have largely taken the place of cotton in many areas. Livestock operations thrive on improved pastures which were once in cultivation. In this area native grasses are protecting thousands of acres of soil which once blew in dust storms and are increasing livestock returns to farmers and ranchers. Expanded planting and profitable management of improved grasses and legumes result in higher hay yields and increased carrying capacities on pastures.

Most grassland farmers started by using grasses and legumes for erosion control. Then they realized that these crops were not only soil savers but were also improvers and moneymakers as well. Ranchers who realized that grass was the base of their livestock production learned to know their plants and to take care of them the same way they did their livestock. The new generations of conservation farmers and ranchers have come to manage grasses and legumes as primary crops on a par with the conventional

row crops and small grains.

The stature of grass husbandry in American agriculture today is being reflected in the grass conservation practices being used throughout the country by cooperators in soil conservation districts and the Great Plains Conservation Program.

## Garden disease control

Since a plant is subject to diseases from the time the seed is placed in the ground until the edible portion is harvested, disease control in the home vegetable garden is a season-long practice, says Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To get off on the right foot toward a disease-free garden, select a site that is in full sunlight to aid in drying of the foliage in the early morning hours. Many diseases are caused by a fungal organism, a small, microscopic plant which requires a certain moisture level to germinate to begin the disease process. Plants in protected, shady areas do not dry rapidly and, as a result, are more subject to disease.

Next, plant garden vegetables on raised beds (8-10 inches) to allow water to move out of the root zone. Poor drainage in the root zone causes many problems, such as the yellowing of tomato plants, points out Gooch.

Many plants require some method of keeping the fruit off of the ground to prevent fruit decay. Staking plants is still satisfactory, but the use of wire cages has become quite popular. Such cages should be about three feet high and about 20 inches across. Tomatoes, pole beans and cucumbers are well adapted to cages. Plants grown in cages are more upright and the fruit is kept off the ground, thus avoiding a number of soil-borne diseases.

When watering the garden, avoid wetting the foliage of plants, especially in the evening, since it will remain wet during the night and provide an excellent area for diseases to develop. Instead, water at mid-day or early afternoon, and use furrow irrigation whenever possible, advises Gooch.

When fertilizing plants, follow a well-balanced program. Excessive levels of nitrogen will make a plant more susceptible to some diseases. Calcium, potassium and phosphorous are important in developing healthy plant tissue which will to some extent withstand disease attack. Plants which are high in potassium and calcium can withstand a light nematode attack compared to those grown in deficient soils. Of course, this does not mean that potassium and calcium can be used for nematode control.

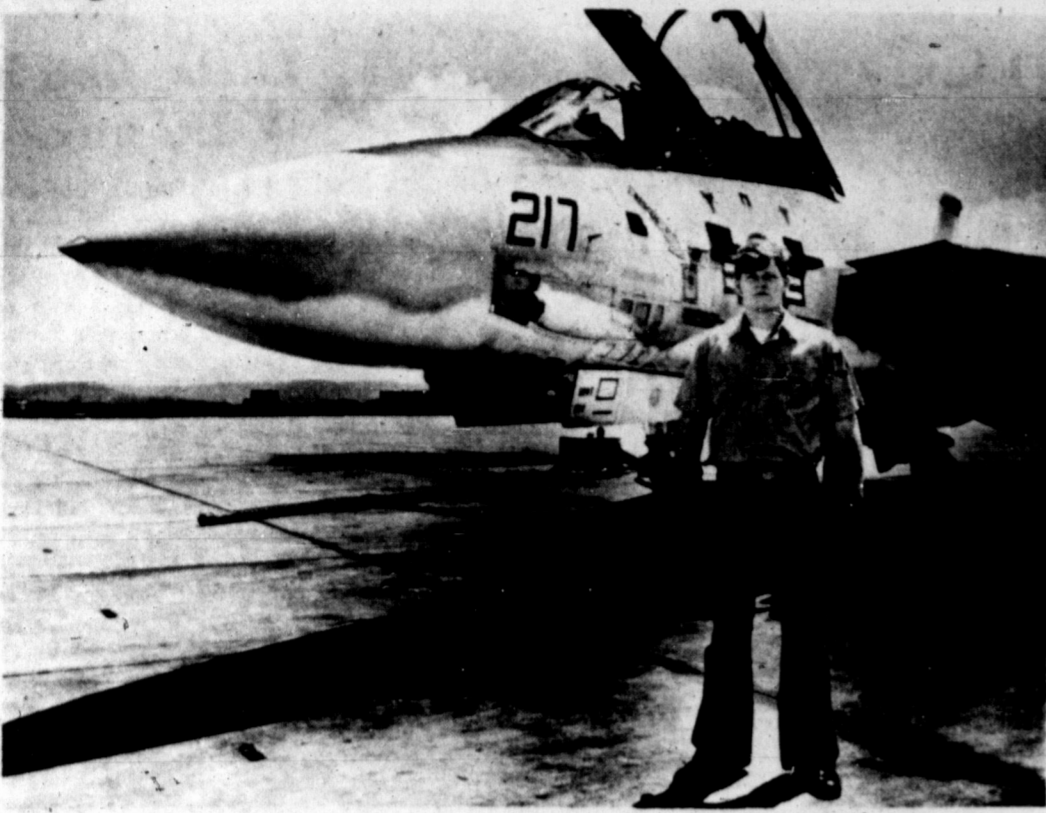
