If the crop has not been planted, then it would not be failed then it would not be failed acreage. So, if any acreage of wheat, barley, corn, milo, or eotton is damaged by a disaster and you choose not to harvest the acreage, you must have the crop appraised by a representative of this office before you make any other use of the land. If the crop is destroved without an

crop is destroyed without an appraisal, you may be ineligible for program benefits.

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

The simplest way of ridding your home or apartment of mice or roaches is the use of insecticides and pesticides. But if these highly toxic products are not used and stored safely, they can create a serious hazard

can create a serious hazard for children and pets. A 5-year-old opened the garage door, unscrewed the lid on a jar of weed killer, and then fed it to his 3-year-old brother. An 8½ month-old girl who had been suffering from a cough for a few weeks died five days after her room had been sprayed by an had been sprayed by an exterminator. A 4-year-old girl was poisoned after eating a small quantity of rodent killer left under the

kitchen sink. klichen sink. Many people store these products where they can reach them quickly. A favorite storage place is the area beneath the kitchen

area beneath the kitchen sink-within easy reach of small children. The U.S. Consumer Pro-duct Safety Commission estimates that some 8,500 children are treated in breakiel your children. hospital emergency rooms every year after being poisoned by insecticides,

poisoned by insecticides, pesticides, or similar pro-ducts. Many of these accidents could have been prevented had a few simple precautions been taken. --Keep all such products locked up when not in use. --All insecticides and pesticides are poisonous. Always read the warning labels. The labels indicate the seriousness of the danger and list all hazardous ingre-

Be sure to: --Keep insecticides and pesticides in their safety packaging. --Close the containers properly after each use, re-securing the safety feature. --Remember that most children cannot open poison-prevention packages, but some can. Safety closures will help, but they can't do the whole job of protecting your children.

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
