



In the large bowl of an electric mixer stir together the sugar, flour and cornmeal. Add the eggs: beat until thick and ivory color. Add the lemon rind, lemon juice and butter; beat just enough to mix. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in a preheated 350degree oven on rack just below the center until the top is very brown and a knife inserted halfway between center and rim comes out clean — 50 to 60 minutes. Serve warm or cold.

This method may be new to

Rinse 2 very large (each about 3/4 pound) artichokes. Cut off stems at base and discard. Cut artichokes in half lengthwise. Arrange halves, overlapping if necessary, in a steamer with a solid-bottom top or a steamer with a solid-bottom insert pan. Steam, tightly covered, over boiling water until the artichoke hearts are tender when pierced with a fork and a leaf pulls out easily about 30 minutes. With a spoon, remove thistle part from the hearts and the small purplish inner leaves. With a kitchen scissors clip off thorny tops of leaves and discard. Cover and chill. Serve cold with homemade mayonnaise as a dip for the base of the leaves and a dressing for the hearts. Makes 4 servings.
