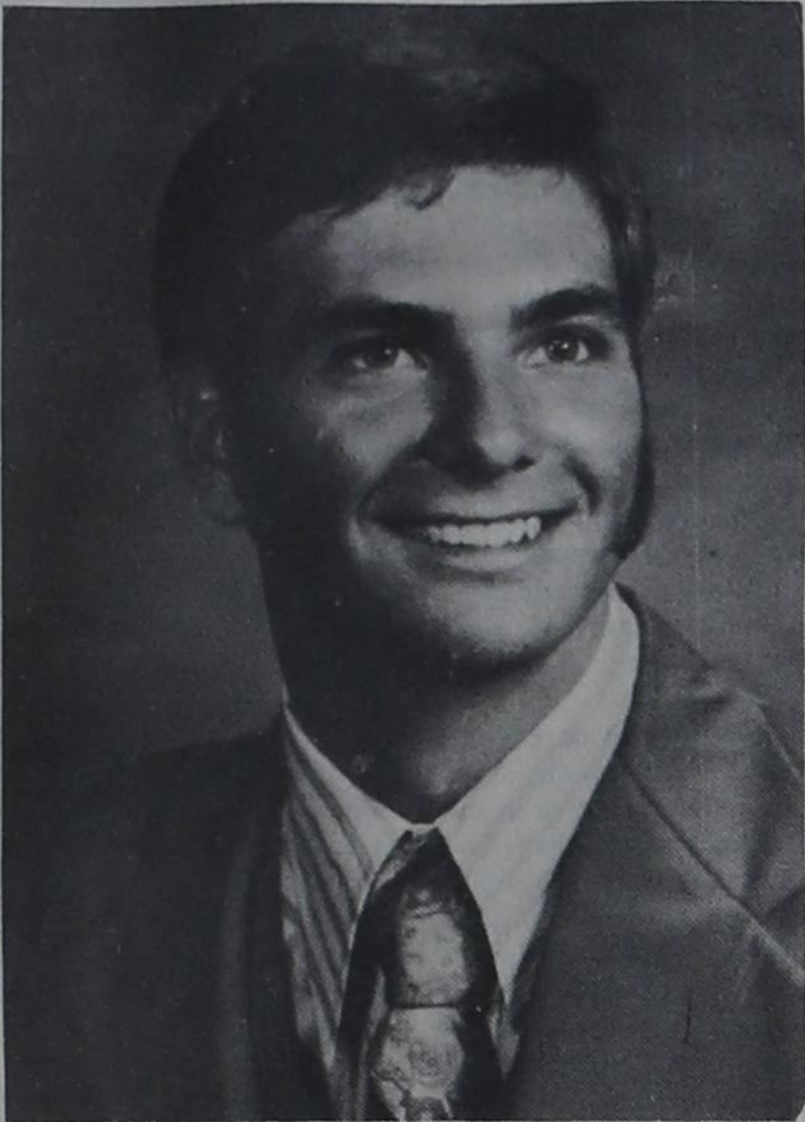

Broncho workouts begin August 14

The 1978 Clarendon Broncho football team will begin their workouts on Aug. 14 and work twice a day, 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. The athletes that are interested must have several items taken care of by this date.

(1) A physical and parent permission form must be completed. This can be obtained at the administration office until July 31, and after that date at the athletic field house.

(2) Each athlete that participates must furnish their own shoes. The cost of the football shoes are \$26.00 a pair. The school has a supply of these shoes.

(3) The athlete must have some form of hospitalization insurance. The school has a policy where the school pays part of the premium and the athlete the remainder of it, or

the athlete's parent has the choice of signing a waiver and using their personal policy.

All of these points will be explained to the athlete when the shoes and socks will be issued officially on Aug. 9 beginning at 8:00 a.m., and all during the day at the field house.

Coach Allen urges all young men to participate that have an interest. He says the Bronchos are going to create some excitement this fall with the type of football that fans like to see.

Official Memorandum

GREETINGS:

Texas farmers and ranchers can take great pride in being leaders within the Nation's first and most important industry--agriculture. Today, the Texas farmer or rancher goes far beyond being a major force within the Texas economy. His produce feeds his family, his fellow Texans, his countrymen and millions abroad.

The position of State, National and World leader in agriculture has been brought about through hard labor and the application of new technology. Modern farming and ranching is a complex and highly skilled profession. However, it is also a hazardous one, ranking only second to construction in the total number of accidental deaths per industry.

Each year, over 100 occupationally-related deaths and 10,000 disabling injuries occur to Texas farmers and ranchers in addition to the occurrence of approximately 100,000 equipment damage-type accidents. These accidents cause pain and hardship for the injured and their families and reduce or even eliminate farm and ranch profits. Although there is no easy answer to the prevention of all accidents, most accidents can be controlled through "good management"--that is, through the use of safe work procedures in combination with safe equipment designs.

To encourage a new emphasis to make rural America a safer place to live

and work, the State of Texas joins the Nation and the President of the United States in the designation of a 1978 National Farm Safety Week.

A week-long, statewide campaign to inform Texas rural residents about farm and ranch accident prevention will be conducted by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System, the Texas Farm Bureau, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers and the Young Farmers of Texas.

Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of July 25-31, 1978, as

Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week

and urge all who live and work on Texas farms and ranches to make accident prevention a part of all activities. Further, I urge persons, organizations and suppliers who work with or serve agricultural producers to assist in this effort with every possible means to reduce the deaths and injuries resulting from farm and ranch accidents.

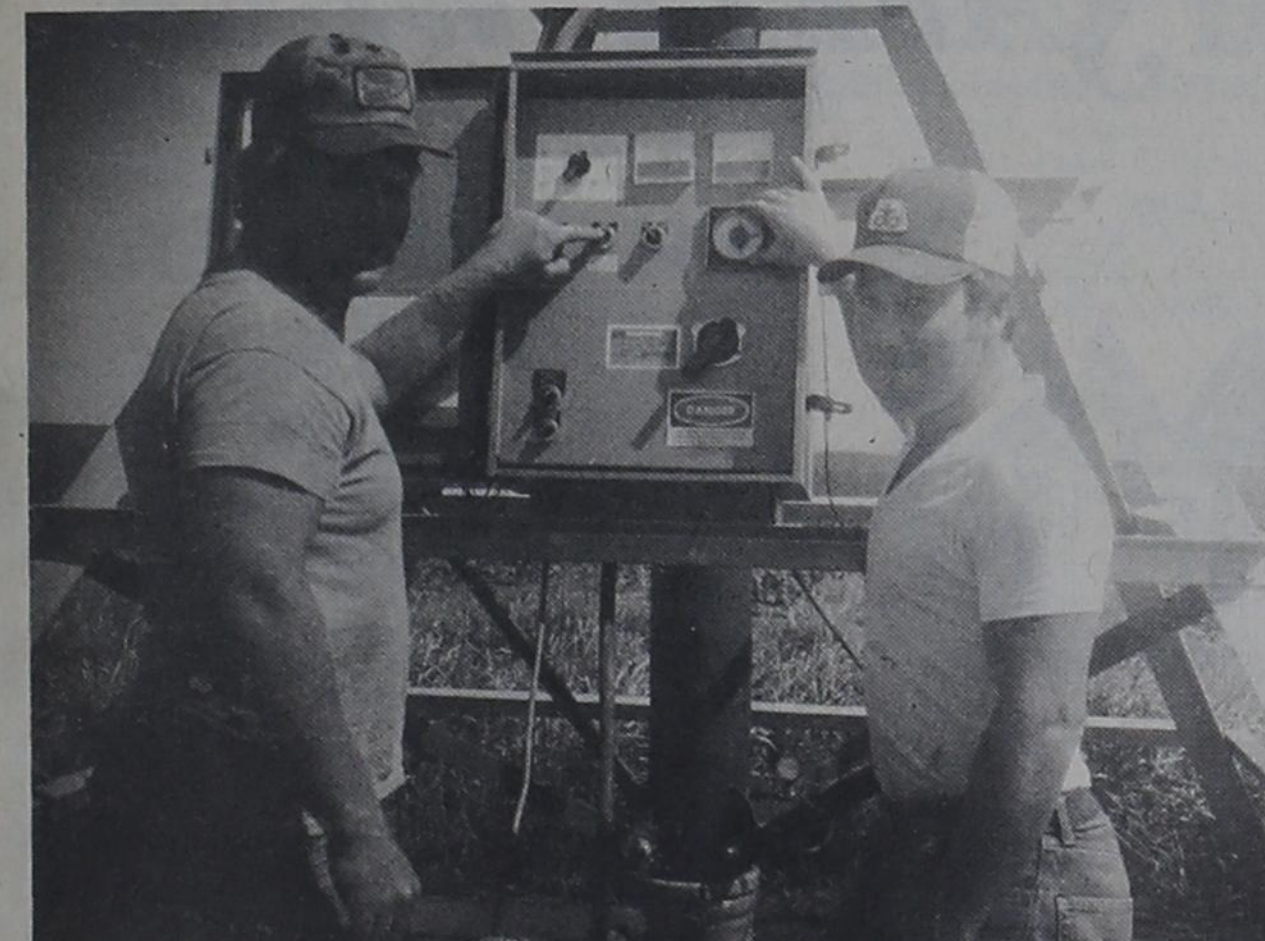

Two and one half years ago the First Christian Church of Clarendon had only five to six persons for Sunday School attendance; one or two men added.

Now a men's class in the basement, averaging twelve to fifteen members each Sunday, meets and often they have refreshments of cookies and coffee.

The women's class still averages five or six and meets upstairs. Coffee is also available.

A second women's class in the church basement is averaging five or six members.

Formed after W. Bernabe came are the two Sunday School classes for children;

none existed when he came. These classes include three in one class and two in another.

This is a success story; the success happened naturally and through suggestions.

"The Lookout", a Sunday School publication, carried an article on Five Star Sunday Schools which surprised the church members who were unaware of the competition for Sunday Schools.

To qualify, the following achievements must be met:

- increased its number of workers by 20 percent,
- increased its enrollment by a number that equalled 40 percent of its 1977 Sunday-school average attendance,

- increased its number of classes by at least 10 percent,
- made as many visits as its 1977 Sunday-school average attendance, and
- increased its March/April, 1978 Sunday-school average attendance by 10 percent over the same figure in 1977.

That's a big order, and those who filled it deserve special honor. The First Christian Church of Clarendon met each of these Five Star requirements and was listed among others all over the United States.

Breath-a-health

Highly poisonous substances lurk in the air within silos, grain storage tanks, manure pits and dusty areas where molds may be present. Most hazardous fumes on farms are created by the decomposition of organic material in an environment deficient in oxygen. Under most controlled conditions, such as in a silo, this process is beneficial. It breaks down a portion of the material being stored and can be quite safe.

Under other circumstances, however, gases produced by this breaking-down process are dangerous to humans in a number of ways. Among these are:

—Ammonia and hydrogen sulfide, which can cause damage to lung tissues and, in great concentrations, can cause respiratory arrest.
—Carbon dioxide, which is produced during the ensiling process, and can either displace or exhaust the oxygen which is needed for breathing.

—Nitrogen oxide, often called silo gas, has a yellow or orange vapor and appears during the first three weeks following a silo filling. Its effect may be delayed for several hours but may become critical if not properly treated.

—"Farmer's lung," although not a gas, consists of certain air-borne molds which can cause severe illness and even death in susceptible persons. Fortunately, the defense for this ailment is the simple inexpensive disposable dust respirator in common use throughout industry.

Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers these suggestions for avoiding contact with such toxic substances: —Always assume that any pit or tank containing organic

Breath-a health hazard

Highly poisonous substances lurk in the air within silos, grain storage tanks, manure pits and dusty areas where molds may be present. Most hazardous fumes on farms are created by the decomposition of organic material in an environment deficient in oxygen. Under most controlled conditions, such as in a silo, this process is beneficial. It breaks down a portion of the material being stored and can be quite safe. Under other circumstance, however, gases produced by this breaking-down process are dangerous to humans in a number of ways. Among these are: —Ammonia and hydrogen sulfide, which can cause damage to lung tissues and, in great concentrations, can cause respiratory arrest. —Carbon dioxide, which is produced during the ensiling process, and can either displace or exhaust the oxygen which is needed for breathing. —Nitrogen oxide, often called silo gas, has a yellow or orange vapor and appears during the first three weeks following a silo filling. Its effect may be delayed for several hours but may become critical if not properly treated. —"Farmer's lung," although not a gas, consists of certain air-borne molds which can cause severe illness and even death in susceptible persons. Fortunately, the defense for this ailment is the simple inexpensive disposable dust respirator in common use throughout industry. Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers these suggestions for avoiding contact with such toxic substances: —Always assume that any pit or tank containing organic

Control tree & shrub pests

Insects of all kinds continue to plague farmers, homeowners and gardeners. Grasshoppers continue to cause problems for farmers and ranchers with heavy infestations around field margins, weedy areas, and on grass land. A bait containing Toxaphene is providing the most effective control of grasshoppers around field margins. Toxaphene bait is intended as a barrier treatment to reduce migrations into fields. Crops already infested should be treated with recommended insecticides to reduce grasshopper populations in conjunction with the bait treatment. Elm leaf beetles, bag-

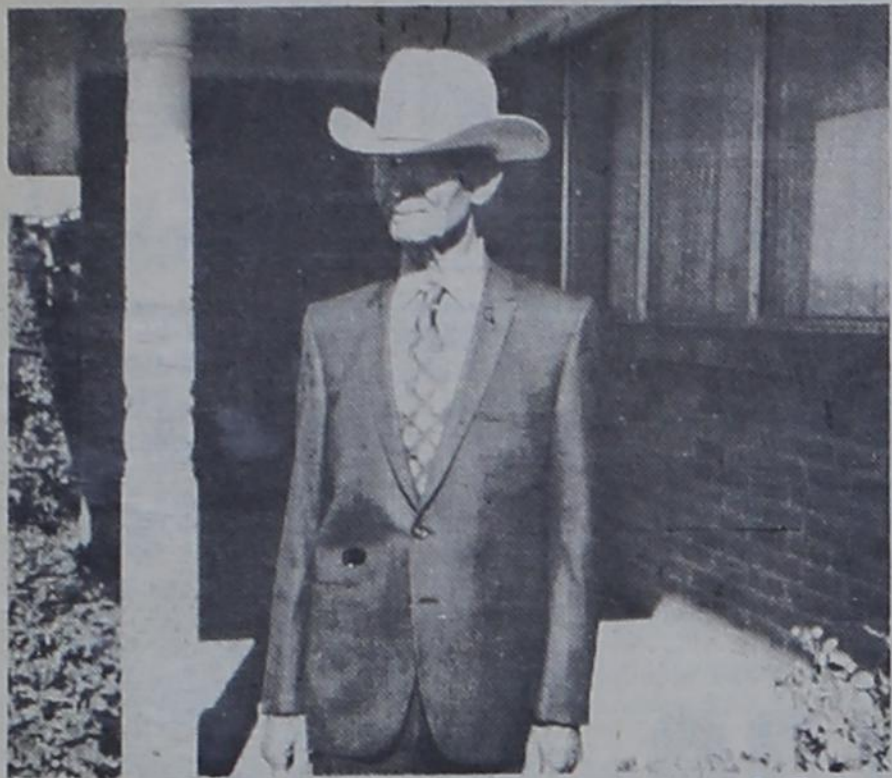

**A delightful book by Augusta Smith
"Solon Love Owens,
Texas Cowboy"**

Solon Owens' family moved from Matador to Clarendon in 1908. He attended public school and Clarendon College there. Frank Collinson was one of their neighbors and Solon loved to hear Collinson talk about his early life and experiences. He bought hot

tamale from Bones Hooks. He got permission to enter the Goodnight Ranch to ride among and take pictures of the buffalo. He tells about the catching of outlaw cows and steers runnin' wild in the cedar breaks; his life and experiences on the ranch at

Turkey, also taking cattle to market at Kansas City on the Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad.

He was born in Indian Territory in 1894. When he was still a small boy the family moved to Llano Estacado where they stayed one year then moved to Matador. He tells about his life as a young boy on the ranch in Matador, traveling to Childress for supplies and staying in the wagon yard and working as stray man, for his father, on the Matador Ranch.

The author describes the early impressions of life in the area which is portrayed so vividly in her book "Solon Love Owens" by Augusta Owens Smith:

When I reach back into history and remember this country from childhood into adult years, it was fresh and open prairie covered with good grass. There were not many trees — mostly big mesquites. You could see for miles and miles. One of the grandest pieces of country anyone could see. There was a sort of loneliness, and in a far off gaze a seemin' emptiness. The lonesome wail of a coyote in the cedar breaks seemed natural.

In the Spring the prairie was covered with wild flowers — wild daisies, a little yellow flower we called amarillus, Indian blanket, wild hollyhock. There were no thistles and no tumbleweed. Yes, rattlesnakes, too.

Killdees at the tank, scissor tails, lots of quail and dove, wild turkeys, quailers, curlews — all kind of birds. I caught some wild turkeys and tried to domesticate them but they didn't make out, all died.

There were very few fences. The ones I remember are the division of the Shoe Bars and the F Ranch and between Matadors and Mill Irons. One fence ran from north of Quitaque on to Red River. On the south side was F Ranch and on the north side the Shoe Bars, this fence was near our Smith Camp. Actually the cattle roamed at large.

The Caprock was a beautiful sight in the early morning sunrise with the sun leaping off its face, leaving a bluish haze. It was beautiful in the evenin' as the sun set behind the rim of the Plains leaving the evenin' shadows.

There was the windmill in the distance, gyp rock, long hours in the saddle, wagons,

mules, horses, sourdough bread, old friends — so many things — as you can see I don't travel like a colt no more.

I went on two of the last big cattle drives in our part of the country to the shippin' pens in Estelline. Dad, J.W. Owens, had grass land leased from the Mill Irons and we drove 2,000 head of steers from this area to the pens in Estelline. The steers were all three years old or older. These cattle were shipped in the early spring of 1917. Dad had sold the steers to Northern buyers and they were shippin' the cattle to grass up North.

I helped with the other drive from the old Mill Iron Ranch to the pens in Estelline, that same year. Lewis and Letts had sold 3,000 head of steers to buyers that were shippin' them to Kansas to finish feeding them out. The steers were two years old. The buyers went with the stock, on the train, to the grassland.

I was a part of this country and the way we lived was the way the country required. Our era is gone. It was an astonishing stretch in the history of mankind, from

pioneer to the nuclear age. What a joy to have been a part of it!

About the Author
Augusta Owens Smith was born in Quitaque, Texas in the home of her grandfather, Dr. Rumph, the country doctor of that community. She was reared in Turkey, Tex. Her father let her ride in the saddle with him when a baby and says: "she cut her teeth on the saddle horn." Her early childhood was spent riding around home and in the pasture. After she was older she helped her father with the cattle. She rode a horse to school until the year of graduation and the school bus was started that year.

Mrs. Smith now resides in Miami, Florida with her husband, a retired Delta Air Lines pilot. Since retirement they have done some traveling including several trips to the Bahamas in their boat.

78-79 Hunting Guide available

The 24-page "Guide to Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations" for 1978-79 is now available at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices across the Panhandle and South Plains with license vendors also furnishing copies for the general public.

These booklets are designed as a guide only and specific questions about each county should be directed to local Texas game wardens or P&WD offices. The new

regulations will become effective Sept. 1, 1978 and will list game and fish regulations for a period of one year ending Aug. 31, 1979.

Texas has such a great variety of hunting and fishing opportunities for the outdoorsman along with different seasons, bag limits, and restrictions that it is necessary to list the basic hunting and fishing rules county-by-county in the guide.

A locator map of the state listing all counties including those with special seasons on antelope, javelina, aoudad sheep, prairie chicken, pheasant, mule deer, and chachalaca is presented in the center of the guide.

Information on hunting and fishing licenses is included along with the correct method of attaching tags and permits to the various species of game that require these special tags.

Special sections on fur-

bearing animals, lake regulations, general saltwater fishing information, protected species of wildlife and tropical fish and aquatic plants are also included.

On the back of the new hunting and fishing guide is a form to be used by persons who witness a game violation and want to report the violation to the P&WD.

Texas is too large and vast for the Texas game wardens working the counties assigned them to catch or apprehend all the game and fish violators. When a game violation occurs, it is the people of Texas who lose, and if the violation is not reported, the violator will

assume no one cares but the P&WD. Only with the participation of concerned citizens and their testimony can Texas game wardens apprehend those who vandalize private property and steal our wildlife resources.

For additional information about hunting and fishing regulations, parks, wildlife, or to report wildlife violations, call the nearest Texas game warden or the P&WD toll-free number 1-800-252-9327.

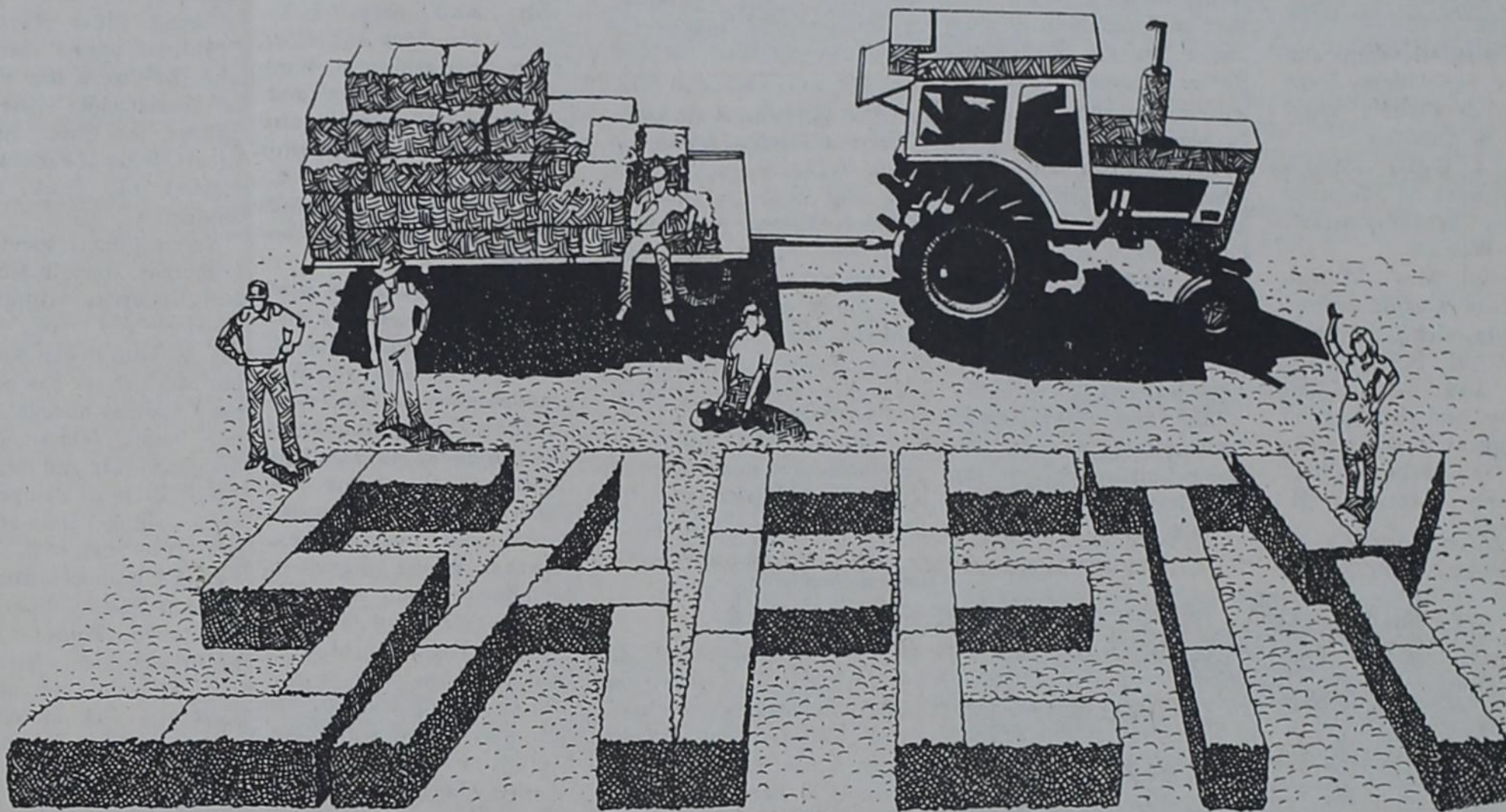

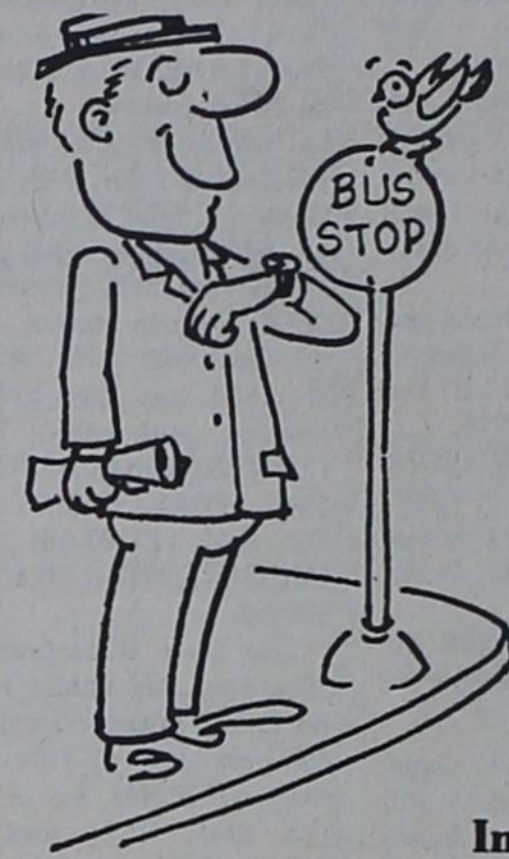
