Rodeos and the Fourth of July go hand in hand in Clarendon and with the exception of a two-year hiatus during World War II it is believed that the rodeo is as old as Clarendon, supported by the same indomitable spirit that built Clarendon and sustains it today.

This year the rodeo is dedicated to three men who contributed much to many of the performances as a tribute to their effort in behalf of a Clarendon institution. They are W.C. Thornberry, Bill Greene and Frank Wootten.

When a free barbecue dinner was part of the attraction for the 4th of July, local ranchers donated the beef. The crowd grew each year and until beef prices had left the rancher in a bad spot and the size of the crowd was too large to handle, men like W.C. Thornberry gave their beef and other help each year. Mr. Thornberry worked with the rodeo when it was held on the football field some years ago.

Frank Wootten served on the board of directors for the rodeo for 12 years as secretary and treasurer and whatever needed doing. He was able to cope with each emergency situation as

it arose somehow. A list of things he did would be impossible to come by, but those who worked with him for the rodeo will sorely miss him.

William J. Greene always donated a saddle for the rodeo in addition to other things like serving as president for two terms and for many years as a director. He was one of the main backers for the rodeo change of location to the present site and continued to support it when his help was needed.

That no one has yet been able to count all the different ways that -disposable foam drinking cups can be used? According to the Foam Cup and Container Division of the Society of the Plastics Industry, just about every time a count is completed, several more uses are discovered.

Popular in volume feeding operations because they are light, inexpensive and sanitary, foam cups are now finding even greater acceptance in the home. They're available everywhere, and simplify meal and snack time clean up.



Leave it to the ingenious American consumer, however, to take a product designed to be used once and thrown away and turn it into something he can use again and again.

The cups are often used to package fine crystal stemware for storage, to protect and store lenses in a camera safely, as unbreakable parts containers in a home workshop/garage, and as disposable paint and glue mixing dishes.

Commercial nursery owners use and reuse foam cups by the thousands as individual plant starters. The cups insulate well, retain moisture and prevent roots from spreading to adjacent plants. Transplanting's a breeze and the plants are sturdier, too. This is a good idea to remember for next spring.

Fishermen fill foam cups with bait worms and store the covered cups in the refrigerator. Then the cups are simply packed with other fishing gear and taken to the favorite stream. The worms stay livelier and are ready to go when needed.

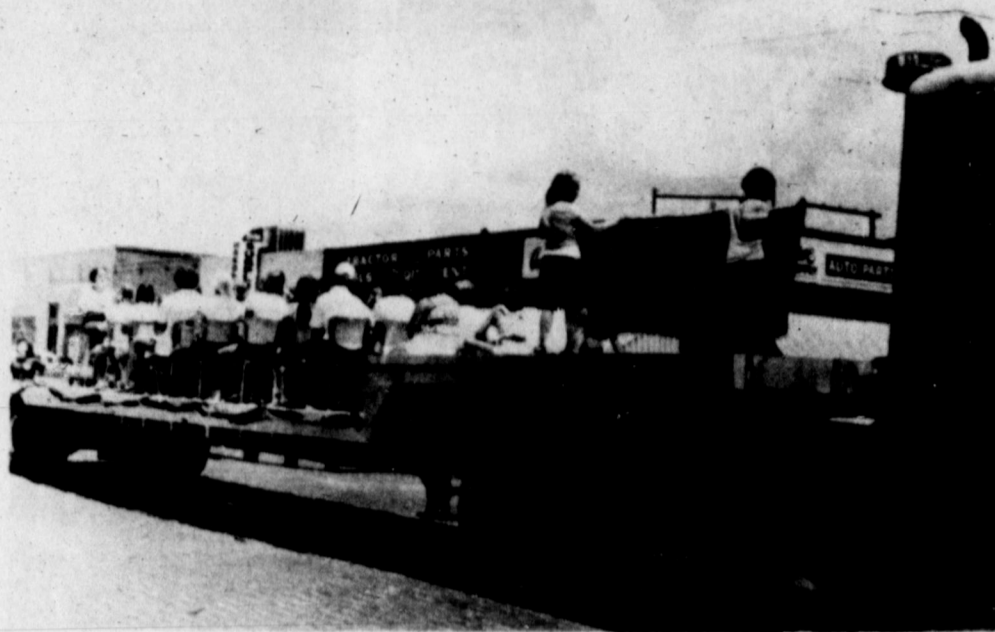

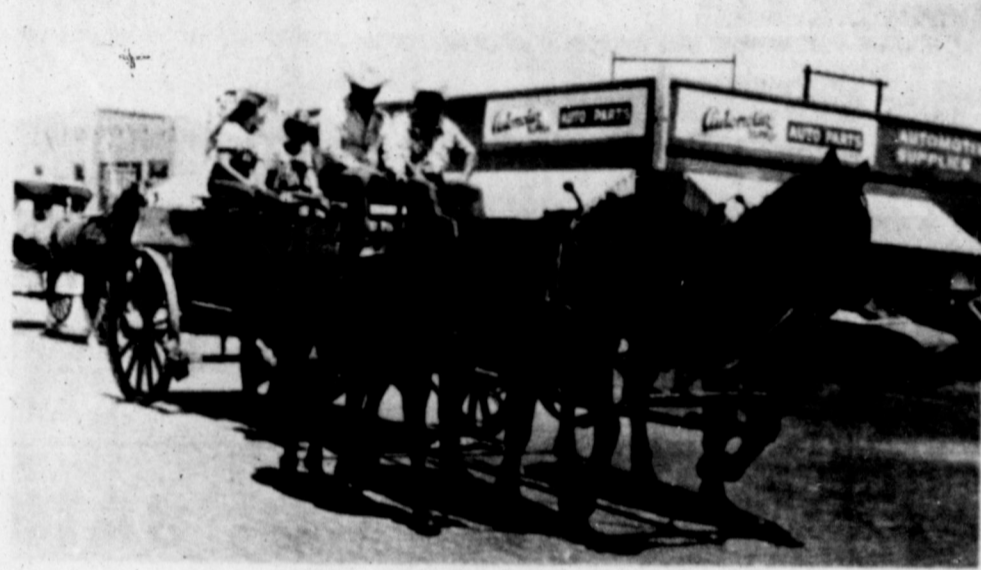

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Give your rangeland a check up

Periodically we all go to the doctor for a check-up, especially when we feel bad, feel run down, feel listless, or feel as if we simply cannot "get going." The same is true for your cattle.

If their production is not up to "par" or they look sickly, a veterinarian is called—a professional. This involves a professional opinion and analysis. The same thing can and needs to be done with rangeland.

An annual check-up should be included in your ranching plans. Every year you should analyze your range and determine its "blood pressure and heartbeat." This is accomplished by determining what grass species are present in your native pasture and what the

composition is as compared to the climax plant community. You have all heard the old timers talk about "the grass stirrup deep". This is the climax plant community.

If given the chance, most rangeland in Donley County has the potential for optimal use. By determining the condition of your range plans can be made as to how it should be used.

The "heartbeat" of your range can be considered as the trend your rangeland is following. Is its heart getting better or worse over the long run? For example: Given a five year period and one wet year may be such a good year that you feel that you "cannot graze too much". However, the remaining four

dry years of over-use take their toll and result in a negative trend. The trend should always be positive.

The cure for negative trend is very simple—"proper grazing use". Rumors have it that you cannot afford to graze only half of your grass or that grazing is much better for your pasture than rest may prove to be. These rumors often tend to contribute to negative trend, thus preventing your range from producing to its fullest potential.

With proper use over a few short years your range will produce more with improved "health". The bad years will not be as bad and the good years will be better.

At the Soil Conservation Service we do not claim to know all the answers but we would be glad to help as best we can with your "range check-up". We might even "prescribe" some alternatives to improve your range health.

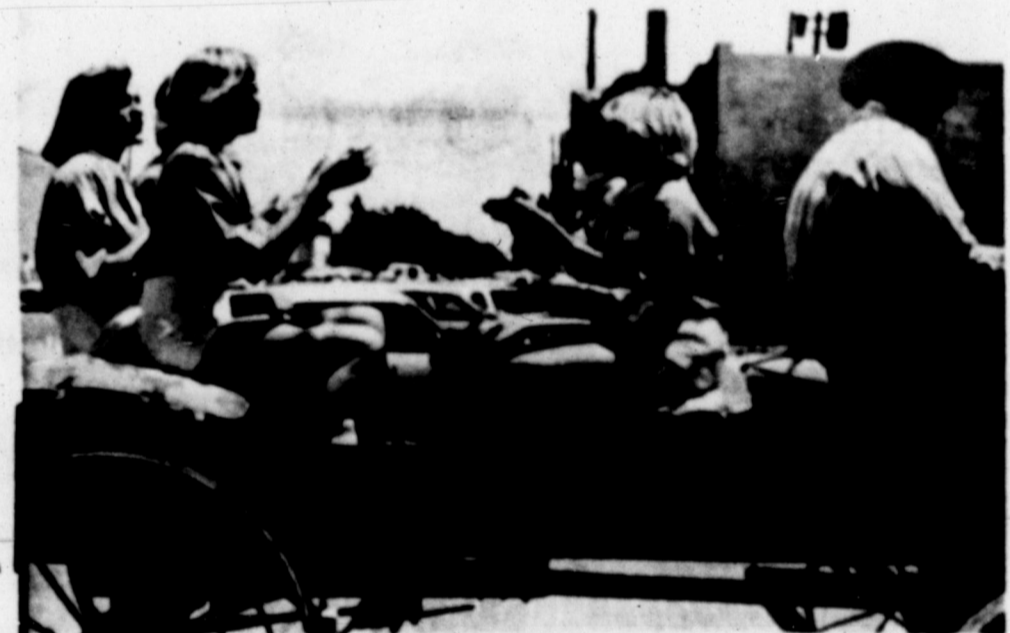

FmHA has new insulation standards

New insulation standards for housing in rural areas financed by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will be put into effect, County Supervisor Robert A. Keown announced today.

Implementation of the standards, first scheduled for March 15, had been held up during federal court consideration of a suit by the National Association of Home Builders challenging the new code. After FmHA prepared additional environmental material and a further hearing on the case was held, U.S. District Judge George L. Hart, Jr., dissolved a preliminary injunction. While certain aspects of the lawsuit remain to be resolved, the new insulation standards can now be implemented.

The new thermal standards are designed to provide for heavier insulation and other measures to make FmHA-financed housing less costly to heat or cool, and to conserve energy. They will apply to newly-built homes and apartments financed by FmHA, and, insofar as is economically feasible, to existing housing purchased or repaired with FmHA loans. Details of the standards, which vary by climatic zones, are available from Donley County FmHA office, 416 S. Kearney, Clarendon.

Housing loans administered by FmHA, a U.S. Department of Agriculture agency, serve all rural areas including towns of up to 10,000 and designated towns of 10,000 to 20,000 that are not in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA) and have a shortage of mortgage credit for families of low and moderate income.

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Texas farmland up 11%

The value of Texas farmland went up 11 percent for the year ending Feb. 1, slightly outdistancing the nationwide increase of 9 percent.

The increase raised the national average from \$450 to \$490 per acre, noted Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, citing figures from a U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

"Although the rate of increase has slowed, land markets still can generally be called strong," said Black.

While Texas surpassed the national average increase, a number of states showed an even greater increase in farmland values. Wisconsin had the steepest gain, 18 percent, followed by South Dakota, 17 percent; Maryland, 16 percent; Louisiana and Mississippi, 15 percent; Missouri, 14 percent; California, Ohio and Kentucky, 13 percent; and Minnesota, Indiana, Tennessee, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Delaware, 12 percent.

Nebraska was the only state showing a decline in farmland values for the year, down 4 percent. Increases of 3 and 4 percent were common in the Southwest, Southeast and Northeast.

Texas farmland is currently valued at \$316 an acre compared to \$285 in February, 1977, and \$195 in February, 1976, pointed out Black.

States with the highest farmland values at this time are New Jersey, \$2,057 per acre; Connecticut, \$1,962 and Rhode Island, \$1,939. New Mexico and Nevada farmland is currently valued under \$100 per acre.

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

