Back to School Safety

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety at Lubbock, said today, "There are hundreds of thousands of good reasons why Texas motorists should use caution while driving near schools this month."

"Many of our youngsters will be going to school for the first time and will not be aware of the many hazards existing on Texas' busy streets and highways."

Precautionary measures, such as traffic signs and signals, safety zones and pedestrian crosswalks, are virtually useless if your children have not acquired good pedestrian safety habits."

Children's responsibilities to and from school include: observing all traffic signs and signals, walking against the flow of traffic when no sidewalk is present, crossing streets at designated crosswalks, and maintaining orderly conduct while enroute to and from school.

"As parents, we must be absolutely sure our children have a clear understanding of traffic dangers. In addition, as drivers, we must always be on the lookout for school children. It's our responsibility -- as a parent -- as a motorist -- as a citizen," said Major Bell.

Dove season opens Friday

Gun blasts and rapid influx of doves into towns are simultaneous effects of hunting season for the birds.

Reports from area game wardens would indicate that the number of migratory birds is expected to be somewhat smaller this year than in the past several years. The absence of wheat stubble, plowed uncult wheat and general lack of seed of various kinds, because of drought or a change of farming habits means feeding grounds will be fewer.

Watering places will provide hunters with easy targets when the fowl come in for water.

Traditionally the best hunting is found in the eastern counties of the panhandle off the caprock.

A split season will be hunted this year with the first period running from September 1, to October 21, and the second period running from January 6, to January 14.

Hunting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. Hunters should consult weather reports for the time of official sunrise and sunset for days they expect to hunt.

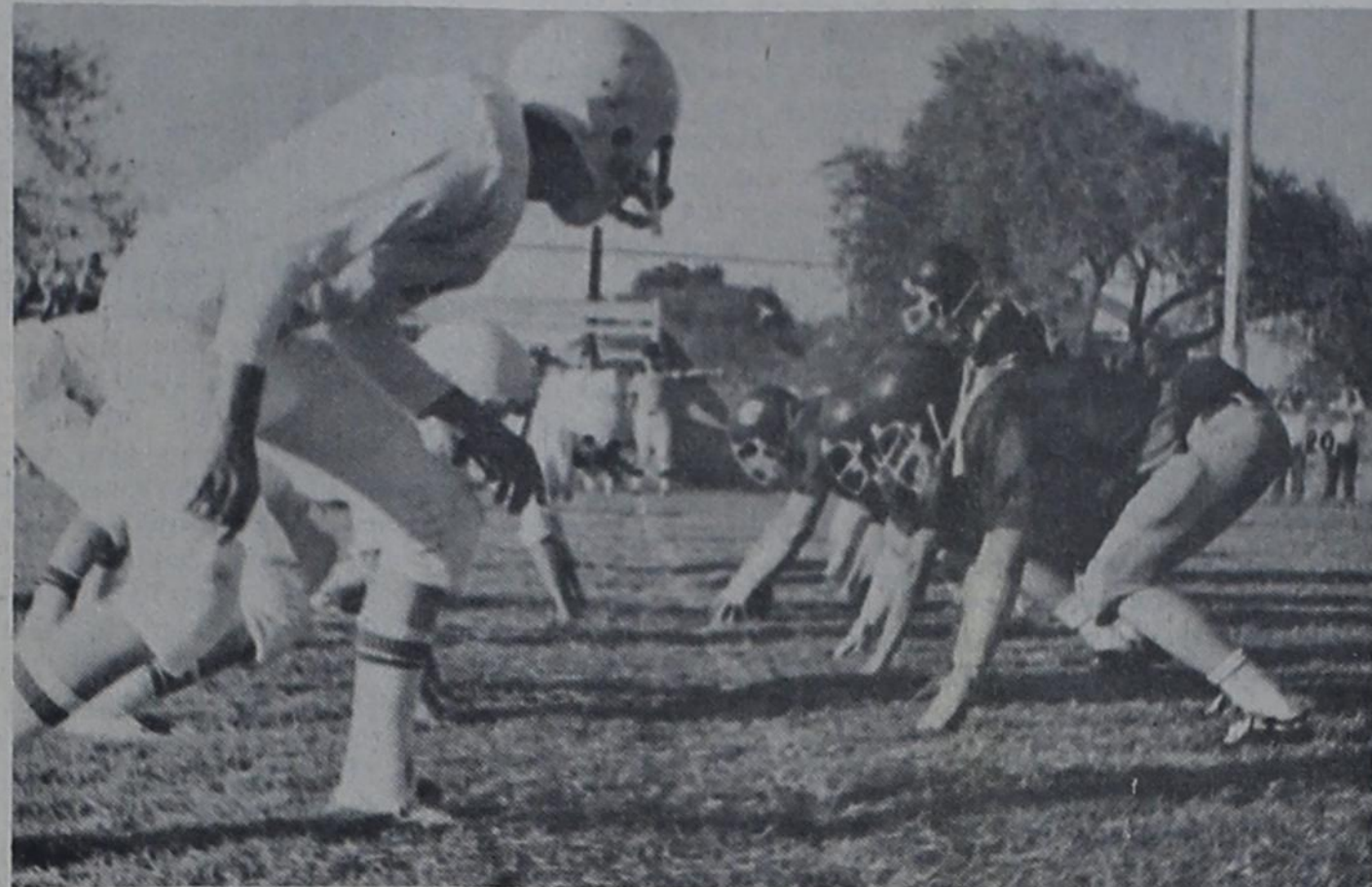

Bronchos look good in scrimmage with Claude

The Clarendon Broncos and the Claude Mustangs met Thursday night in a controlled scrimmage. Each team ran a 20-play series three times. The Broncos showed signs of an explosive offense at times. Claude, however, drew the first scoring blood with a 50 yd. TD pass down the center of the field from the quarterback to the tight end. The Broncho defense stiffened after this and turned the ball over to the offense. On the first play of the Broncho first series senior halfback Billy Gardner took a pitchout from senior quarterback Gary McClellan, cut back across the field for a fine 70 yd. TD run. Gardner again later in the scrimmage added a 60 yd. TD.

The Broncho secondary intercepted 2 passes. Sophomore linebacker Jeff Topper intercepted 2, 1 of these for a TD. Cornerbacks Billy Gardner and Bill Cornell each added one.

The second unit of Broncos also figured into the scoring. Mark Jack, Lynn Thompson, and Bobby Weatherthon also contributed TD's. Freshman QB Brad Thompson and Randy White connected on a beautiful pass and run for a TD also. The Broncos missed a couple of other scoring opportunities with a fumble on the goal line and Gary McClellan being brought down on the 2 yd. line on the last play of the second series. The Broncho offense had two fumbles (losing one) and no interceptions during the scrimmage.

Claude added another TD late in the scrimmage but the Broncos had already scored seven times. The Broncho defense managed to contain the Mustang ground gain pretty consistently at times. Most of Claude's yardage came through the air. Coach Allen pointed to Mark Wilson, Gary Thomas, Mickey McGuire, Terry Cole, and Brad Hayworth as showing potential to be good defensive linemen.

Coach Allen expressed a so-so attitude of the scrimmage. "There were some good points and some very bad points. This is what scrimmages are for, so we can see the personnel in game situations. Claude stunted in the scrimmage and it gave our offensive line some problems because Claude had told us they would go with a straight 5 man defense. So, our kids weren't ready for this alignment. We will get a little tougher test this week against Groom. We will be physically ready for them because we suffered no injuries with Claude."

527 students enroll in schools

Early enrollment figures for the Clarendon public schools were released Tuesday, August 29, with 527 students total.

The figures when broken down by grade levels are: K-34; 1st-33; 2nd-43; 3rd-42; 4th-36; 5th-36; 6th-43; 7th-29; 8th-48, for a sum of 344 for these eight grades.

In high school the figures for the four grades are: seniors-44; juniors-50; sophomores-30; and freshmen-59 for a high school total of 183 students.

These figures are about the same as last year's with enrollment expected to continue until after the Labor Day weekend.

Clarendon College enrollment and classes are early this year but incomplete figures show 450 students already enrolled and date is 560 and if the trend already begun continues it will surpass the 560 figure and reach an anticipated 600 students for Clarendon College.

Most Clarendon businesses will be closed Labor Day

As Monday, Sept. 1 is Labor Day, all state, county, city and federal offices will be closed. Both the Donley County State Bank and the Farmers State Bank and Trust will be closed along with most of the main street merchants.

Allsups, Gibson's and Cliffords will be open but Bylow will be closed.

Most of the eating places will be open along with several of the service stations.

Extra safety precautions for motorists are words of advice from all law enforcement personnel for the last summer holiday weekend, traditionally one of the largest volume traffic weekends for Americans, September 4.

Regional Commander, Major C. W. Bell of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region 5, comprising of 60 counties, is optimistic for a safer Labor Day Weekend 1978. Last year, Texas lost only 27 in fatal crashes on the highways. This is the lowest number killed in traffic accidents on a Labor Day Weekend since 1966, when the death toll was only 23. Major Bell said, "Holiday traffic will be heavy near recreational areas such as lakes and camp grounds. The Texas motorist should be extra careful for children playing and for motorcycles. Both are difficult to recognize by the motorist in these crowded places." Bell said that the drinking driver still poses a problem in traffic. He urges the motorists to cooperate with all law enforcement agencies in helping to reduce loss of life by being especially alert for the drunken driver.

What are these signs of fall '78? A few of them, gleaned from the New York collections, are:

---Longer Hemlines. In fact, skirts are down to just about that "midi" look that sparked so much fashion controversy. But don't feel that anything has to be any one prescribed length. Yves St. Laurent shows skirts just a little below the knee. Other designers have skirts that end a few inches above the ankle. Formal gowns can be above the ankle, ankle length, or sweep the floor. Select the hemline most flattering to your legs and feet.

---Slits. This is part of the hemline story. Designers have slit skirts, for such practical reasons as walking room, and such esthetic reasons as showing a great pair of legs.

---Shoulders. The silhouette broadens at the shoulder line, narrows through the hips. Shoulder pads, leg o' mutton sleeves, enhance the illusion of

width.

---Narrow pants. The straight, jeans-type leg predominates in pants for day and evening. Designer jeans are a reality. They are cut in the traditional jeans styling in denim, corduroy, soft shiny leather--especially black leather and black satin. They are rolled up at the cuffs to reveal high heel sandals. The rule this fall is the reversal of the previous rule. Now you wear high heels with the sandals. The alternate to the jeans cut is the Fred Astaire trouser with pleats, man-tailoring, and cuffs. For evening, look for the tuxedo for women with a black velvet jacket, crepe tailored pants. Other alternatives are straight leg pants and jackets in such luxurious fabrics as charmeuse, a low-gloss satin, and straight leg pants under dress-length tops of jewel colored embroidered silks.

---Softened pants. For women with a figure that can get by with anything, there is the new gathered pant with fullness through the hipline. These pants taper to the ankle. Included in this category is a tweed version of the classic riding pant--cut much like the pants Texas A&M seniors wear with those boots.

---Straight skirts. The newest skirt is straight and narrow, worn with an oversized long sweater, a zip-up jacket, smock jacket, blazer jacket, shrink cardigan--a la Perry Ellis, spencer jacket, bubble top chenille sweater, or a tunic type V neck cashmere sweater with pockets, the way Calvin Klein shows them.

---Suits. The classic suit returns, but in a new guise. Many of the suits combine a tweed jacket with a velvet skirt and a crepe de chine blouse, or a velvet jacket with a tweed skirt. Plaids, usually in soft heathery tones, are also favorites. These suits often are doubled belted in leather. Sometimes the belts are worn over the jackets. This is part of the new defining of the waistline. Look for the return of the formal dinner suit, and for ballgowns in two pieces--jacket and skirt, to mimic suiting.

---Hats. You probably will wear them this year. Daytime millinery includes flat crowned felts reminiscent of World War I, caps, worn flat down over the forehead, small knitted caps, berets, for late day, the tiny dark hat often with veiling, worn tipped down on the forehead. Hair and hats are moving forward onto the forehead.

---Boots and shoes. The leather boot with high top often has a high heel this fall. Watch for the new low top boot, and if you own a pair of cowboy boots, get them out and wear them anywhere short of a formal dance. Shoes have higher heels, and dresses are shown with high heeled pumps rather than boots in many collections. Those strappy sandals on skyscraper heels continue, but there is an alternate--the ankle strap ballet shoe.

---Black is back. A new generation will discover what mother meant by the little black dress. Designers have rediscovered it and redesigned it in velvet and crepe. Look for oversize pieces of rhinestone jewelry and long, long, dangling rhinestone earrings to light up the black dresses.

---Western influence. If you put your western gear in mothballs every year after the Fat Stock Show, get it out. Ralph Lauren showed everything from fringed suede jackets to jeans and cowboy boots as fashion--not western fashion, but fashion.

---Dresses. Plaid shirtdresses for daytime; exaggerated blouses and dolman sleeves for late day and evening. Short swinging dresses, some of them in brilliant colors, for disco dancing.

This list gives you an idea of what is coming. A fashion trend is like a pebble in a pond. New York or Paris or California or Italy may be the first ring, but the third and fourth and fifth reach women in the Amarillo area in the form of not only the original collections, but patterns, designs "inspired by" top designers, designer accessories, glasses, cosmetics, and even bed linens.

Runaway youth hotline

Need help use the
Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today that the Operation Peace of Mind runaway youth hotline will extend its service to Hawaii and Alaska beginning September 1, 1978. By doing so, the unique hotline will offer service to

runaway youth in all fifty states. "This hotline was created by Gov. Briscoe in September 1973 because of the tragic slaying of twenty-seven young boys in Houston, who were believed to have been runaways. Since that time volunteers answering the free incoming WATS telephones in Houston have responded to nearly 241,000 calls from all over America; of that number, more than 75,000 were actual runaways needing the kind of help we are prepared to offer," Governor Briscoe said.

runaways were reported in Texas. Many of these young people turn to crime as a way of gaining needed resources to survive. Runaways in Texas can call 800-391-3392. The national number is 800-231-6946. (The Hawaii/Alaska number will be 800-231-6762). All numbers are toll-free to the caller.

"The hotline continues to allow a young runaway to call from any telephone in America, toll-free, and know that any information is handled by our hotline volunteers in a confidential manner; no locations of the caller are ever revealed. The hotline is not a detective service, but rather a human service to offer a means of relaying a message from a troubled runaway to an anxious parent," Governor Briscoe concluded.

Operation Peace of Mind also maintains lists of halfway houses and other services for youth in all fifty states, which are available to each runaway needing help. It has been estimated by the federal government that as many as two million youth run away from home annually. The Texas Department of Public Safety says that last year 14,000

Q - If I purchase a home financed by a VA guaranteed loan, must I occupy this property as my home?

Early day publisher Joe M. Warren family

Coming to Clarendon with his family about 1911, Joe M. Warren engaged in the newspaper business by purchasing the Clarendon News from the A.M. Beville interests.

The first paper under the Beville management was November 3, 1909 when the name was changed from the "Chronicle" to the "Clarendon News."

The Warrens moved to Clarendon from Newcastle, Texas where he established that newspaper.

The move was made by train, in freight cars, since card board boxes were then unknown. No ten tubs were used to pack their worldly effects.

Joe M. Warren came to Clarendon for educational reasons, as there were four children to educate, Leta, Harry, Monteith and Lucile. All attended Clarendon College. Monteith graduated and later attended and graduated from Emory University, Atlanta, Ga.

Leta came to Clarendon some time before the family and boarded at the Dorm, beginning in the Elementary Department of the College with Miss Mamie McLain as her teacher. Each dorm room was then heated with a bachelor stove which burned coal. Dr. Burkhead, Stuart Condon with Miss

McLain were much remembered teachers. Dr. Slover was then President of the college and Bro. O.P. Kiker was the pastor of the First Methodist Church of which the family were members.

Joe M. Warren depended on Leta and Harry to help with the newspaper business following their school day. The "Clarendon News" was outstanding because it printed so much local news. Since transportation was so limited during this era of Clarendon's early history, it was really an event when people went places so it was important that their names were in the paper. For instance, G.W. Antrobus and his interesting letters to the Clarendon News when he made his trip to the Old Southern States; and when Mrs. Adair came from England for her visit to the famous JA Ranch.

As well as printing the paper other printing was done at the office such as circulars for Homer Mulkey which were distributed over town telling about the Featured Movie of the Week. Death notices were printed on white paper with a black border which were distributed to the merchants. In those days ladies used

Calling Cards which were beautiful in their Old English print.

The paper, in the early days, was all hand set. It was some years later that Mr. Warren installed one of the first linotype in the panhandle. Ed Boliver was editor for the "Clarendon News" and was a member of the "newspaper family" and considered by the Warren family as a part of their family. Mr. Warren and "Miss Leta" as she was familiarly called were both members of the Panhandle Press Association as well as the Texas Press Association.

Mrs. Warren was from the pioneer J.W.C. Mullins family of Brown County Texas. She was a member of the First Methodist Church Choir when R. Dean Shure was director. He was then head of the Music

Department at the college. She was also a Bible Scholar. She passed away in 1965 at the age of 93.

In 1917 Harry Warren joined the Company H, of the 36th Division which was sent to France in 1918. He was seriously wounded, shot thru the right lung, from which he suffered the most part of his life. After returning home from war he married Alta Long, daughter of R.A. Long, a Clarendon druggist. Alta was at one time governess or teacher at the RO Ranch. Harry passed away in 1959. Alta in 1978.

Leta and Harry were both ardent tennis players.

In 1919 Leta Warren married Earl C. Beck of Dalhart, who was a well known cowboy boot maker of Beck Brothers. Leta and Earl had two daughters

born in Clarendon. He passed away in 1943. Leta lives in Amarillo.

After Mr. Warren sold the Clarendon News in the early twenties and moved to Fort Worth, he engaged in real estate and extended it to oil promotion. He passed away in 1935. Monteith travelled the Pacific Northwest several years selling fine china and glassware. He was married to Pat Caldwell. He passed away in 1934 with brain tumor. Lucile lives in Fort Worth.

Joe M. Warren, with a brother Charlie Warren, served their apprentice as printers and learning the newspaper business under the guidance of Will Mays of the Brownwood Bulletin, who later founded the School of Journalism at the University of Texas.

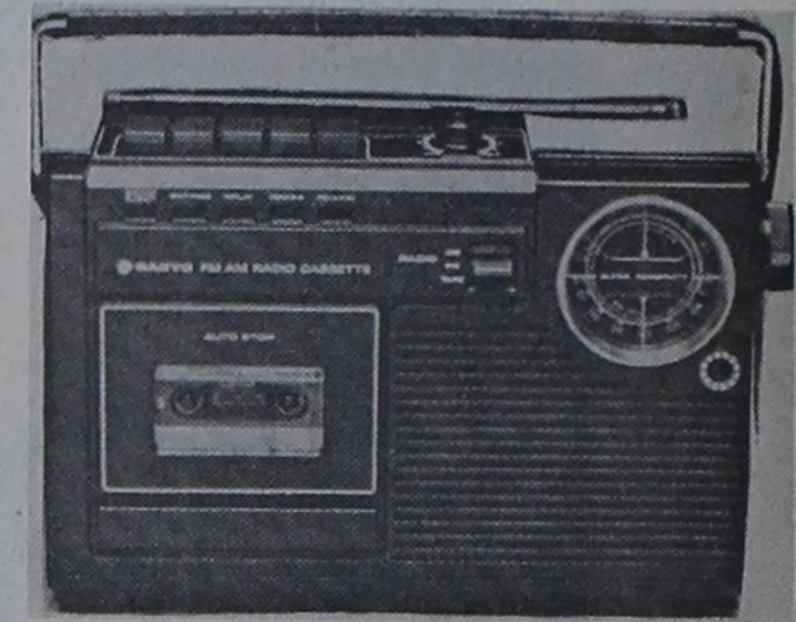

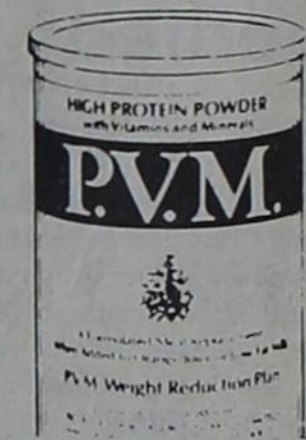
