Bronchos to meet Roughriders in opening game

The Boys Ranch Roughriders come to town this Friday night to open the Clarendon Bronchos 1978 football schedule. Kick-off is set for 8 p.m. The Bronchos will be trying to average a 21-16 loss to the Roughriders last year. Coach Allen said early in the week, "We will be coming into the game in excellent physical condition with exception of Soph. Terry Cole who has a thigh bruise. Terry has been starting at defensive end for us, but is a definite question mark."

Coach Allen's rundown of Boys Ranch:

Boys Ranch is supposedly facing a rebuilding season with only one offensive and three defensive starters returning off last year's 5-5 outfit. They will probably field a little smaller team than us. However, their split end, No. 88, Lester Goins, is 6'7", 165 lbs. and does a pretty good job catching the ball. Offensively, they run variations of the I with the tailback No. 30, Lyn Bell getting much of the work. They will come at us with a good balanced backfield. The QB, No. 10, Eddie Taylor runs the sweep pretty effectively. Ollie Johnson, No. 25, the wingback, is the only returning offensive backfield veteran and he was not a full time starter last year. He will double at noseguard on defense, that tells you something of his ability.

On defense, the Roughriders will go with a 5-2 defense and Mary Nell McGarity spent the day in the High Plains Hospital on Aug. 27 in order to have oral surgery before returning to school.

The Groom Tigers were host to the Clarendon Bronchos Thursday night in the second scrimmage of the summer for both teams. The Bronchos for the second week showed some consistent drives as they outscored the Tigers 4-1. But the defense of the Bronchos must be given a pat on the back too for its pursuit and containment of the big Tiger running backs. Time and time again the Tiger backs were met at the line of scrimmage by Mickey McGuire, Gary Thomas, Larry Davis, and Shawn Barker. And if they tried to go outside with the pitchout they were greeted by corners Billy Gardner and Donnie Harris. Coach Allen stated all of these as having outstanding defensive scrimmages as well as Mark Wilson and Ronnie Davis, a senior transfer from Claude. Wilson knocked down 2 passes from his inside linebacker spot.

The Bronchos again this week scored on their first possession. A 35 yd. pass to tight end Tim Brown from Gary McClellan set up the first score on a run by Billy Gardner. The Bronchos' second offensive unit hit paydirt on their next possession on a scoring pass from Lynn Thompson to tight end Mark Wilson. With a 2-0 scoring advantage the Bronchos went to the airways utilizing the same pass and run duo of McClellan to Brown for a big gain. McClellan showing his stuff on

the triple option scored from 23 yards out. The Bronchos final score came on a Billy Gardner special, a fifty 70 yd. run. One other scoring drive ended at the 2 yd. line when the offensive plays ran out. This drive was highlighted by the running of Soph. Kelly Tunnell and Gary McClellan from his QB position. Coach Allen expressed his pleasure with Tunnell, "He is really coming along and doing us a good job. He hits the hole and knows how to run when he gets a little daylight. We are tickled to death with his progress." He also noted the offensive play of Billy Gardner, Tim Brown, Gary McClellan, center Ed Bromley, and strong tackle Mickey McGuire. "We ran behind Mickey with a lot of success."

Groom's only score came on a 20 yd. pass interception late in the scrimmage with Groom never scoring on the Broncho defense. The statistics showed the Bronchos as completing 4 of 17 passes for 145 yards and 1 TD, 54 rushes for 326 yards (no fumbles) and 3 TD's. The Broncho defense recovered 3 fumbles and broke up 5 passes.

The Broncho junior varsity scrimmaged the same night in Borger against the Borger Sophs. The two teams scrimmaged to a 0-0 stand off. However, the Bronchos lost their starting QB Drew Thornberry for 5 weeks with a broken left wrist.

School sets budget

At a called meeting of the Clarendon Independent School District board of trustees the budget for the 1978-1979 school year was adopted and the tax rate set for the same period.

The total budget adopted was \$778,459 as compared to last year's budget of \$764,866.

There was no change in the tax rate for this year and it remains as it was last year at \$1.80 per hundred on 40% of the valuation. One dollar and fifty cents goes into operation and 30 cents goes to bond indebtedness.

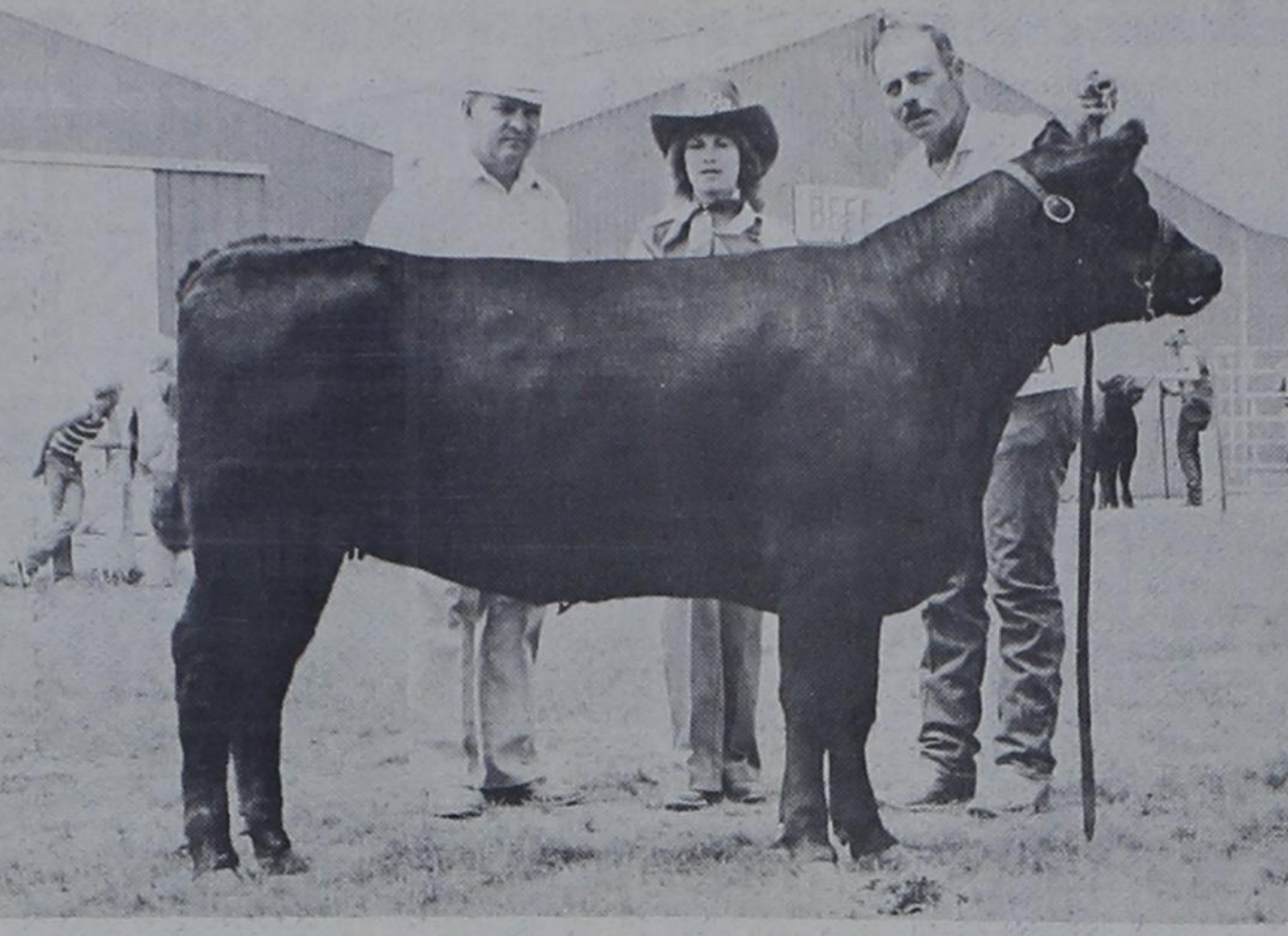

Sept. 16 - Hunting season opens

Recently completed surveys in major breeding areas showed a teal breeding population 50 percent larger than that recorded in 1977 and duck hunters should find ample shooting opportunities during the nine-day season set for Sept. 16-24, 1978.

of ponds in the North-Central United States and Provinces of Canada. Pond and playa conditions in the Texas Panhandle and on the South Plains are rated from dry to excellent by Max Traueck, waterfowl biologist. Several areas through the central part of the Panhandle received heavy rains this summer with most plays holding some water.

The regular season for ducks, geese and cranes will be set in Austin August 31. If you plan to hunt remember to get permission from landowners before hunting.

The higher counts in the northern nesting regions are the results of better prairie habitat and an increase in the number

of ponds in the North-Central United States and Provinces of Canada.

The regular season for ducks, geese and cranes will be set in Austin August 31.

The blue-winged teal is normally the most numerous during the early teal season, but breeding populations for this species were down some three percent. The green-winged teal showed the biggest jump with a 53 percent increase in breeding populations.

The daily bag limit will again be four teal with shooting hours from sunrise to sunset.

If you plan to hunt remember to get permission from landowners before hunting.

Teal hunters will be required a federal migratory waterfowl stamp available at most U.S. Post offices. The stamp must be signed by the holder across the face of the stamp with ink or other waterproof liquid.

Even though the fishing reports for the summer of 1978 are being stopped this month, some of the best fishing in the Texas Panhandle occurs in the fall.

Shotguns used to hunt and bag teal must be plugged to hold no more than three shells in the chamber and magazine combined. Rifles and pistols are illegal firearms while hunting any migratory waterfowl including the teal.

As the water temperatures drop, gamefish move into shallow water where they actively feed and are available to the angler. All species of fish including the walleye, largemouth and smallmouth bass, crappie, northern pike and sunfish become more active prior to winter.

Fishing is more enjoyable at this time of the year with less competition from boaters and swimmers. Fall weather can be good following cool fronts and fish seem to bite better while the barometer is rising.

All persons should take this opportunity to tell the fishery personnel their ideas on the fishing report and include suggestions for other lakes or conditions that might be helpful to them while fishing.

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Fall fishing news

Fishing is more enjoyable at this time of the year with less competition from boaters and swimmers. Fall weather can be good following cool fronts and fish seem to bite better while the barometer is rising.

All persons should take this opportunity to tell the fishery personnel their ideas on the fishing report and include suggestions for other lakes or conditions that might be helpful to them while fishing.

Hunting as a sport

It was a magic moment when you were first allowed to hunt with the grown-ups, but don't let that golden opportunity slip by your own youngster.

America and Texas are fast becoming more urban with less and less opportunity to go afield with a gun. Without a chance to shoot a gun, walk up a covey of quail or even come home empty-handed, young persons could choose other forms of recreation some of which are not good.

It is just as wrong for a well-meaning sportsman to force his or her youngster to shoot or hunt and it is even worse to buy a firearm for the young person without either teaching the fundamentals of gun safety or enrolling them in a Texas hunter safety class prior to any hunt afield.

Many times, a more thorough knowledge can be learned while attending one of these volunteer classes on the subjects of firearms handling, conservation, hunter ethics and outdoor lore than can be acquired during several years of hunting.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suggests you allow the young hunter in your family to acquire several hunting experiences beginning with small game such as rabbits. The young shooter/hunter will probably have several questions concerning the ideas and misconceptions of hunting and you as the parent and sportsman would have the correct answers.

Soil Conservation Service will have a field day



"ALAMO" SWITCHGRASS released this year is only one of many plants developed for certification at the Plant Materials Center in Knox City. A field day for the public will be held September 27, 1978 showing many of the new plants presently being developed at the Center.

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on September 27, 1978.

Jim Donahoe, district conservationist for SCS at Clarendon said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

A.C. Spencer, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker. Spencer will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

A barbecue lunch will be available on a prepaid basis at \$3.00 per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crowover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by September 15.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

More than 1100 strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

About 9,000 pounds of seed were produced at the center last year, mostly for trial plantings across Texas and Oklahoma. Some 5,000 woody plant seedlings were also produced as well as 250,000 rhizomes of plants that have to be propagated by planting underground shoots.

Two new plant varieties - 'Alamo' switchgrass and 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower - were certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center.

Anyone interested can contact the SCS office at 874-2339 for more information. Dave Guill, Jack Moreman and their Range Management classes plan to attend the tour as an in the field study. Ronald Gooch, County Extension Agent, Glen Watly, Soil and Water Conservation District Board member and David Davidson, Range Conservationist also plan to attend.

Health hints for today

This column is written with the hope that it will help you with minor every day health problems.

With fall weather and football, there's going to be a lot of sprains and strains. One question I hear often is whether to use ice or heat. For the first twenty four hours, use ice. If it's an ankle or knee, ice bag it the first day, then use hot moist packs after that. The ice will help the swelling, and the next day the heat will help the pain and loosen the affected joint. An elastic bandage really helps both ankle and knee sprains. Sometimes they are very severe and painful, requiring crutches for a few days. Bruises and muscle strains simply need hot packs. Analgesic rubs also helps muscle strains.

And now a tip for those over the football age. Many of my senior patients are afraid of falling and breaking a hip. Over ninety percent of the time, the fall occurs after the hip is broken. Here's how it happens. A person trips, and tries to keep from falling by catching themselves with their leg. The powerful muscles about the hip are utilized in this process and they are simply stronger than the bone and it breaks and the person falls. This is demonstrated by many of the people with Parkinson's disease. They know they are going to fall, so they relax and fall. They do suffer a few bruises, but very seldom do they break a bone. So, if you trip and fall, don't catch yourself, but relax and fall, and get a bruise not a broken bone.

It's now September and time for Influenza Immunizations. There is one vaccine for 26 years and over and another for 13 to 25 years. The vaccine for the children is not known at present. The Communicable Disease Center recommends flu vaccine for those 65 years and older, those with chronic illnesses, and those in high risk groups. What type of vaccine is it? Not what was used last year. This is a polyvalent (many type) vaccine, which we have used for many years. What do I think? Well, I get a flu vaccination every year. But then I'm in a high risk group. All my staff takes it too. We're exposed to influenza every year. Check with your doctor and get your vaccination. Medicare won't reimburse you for it, but it's worth a few dollars to prevent illness.

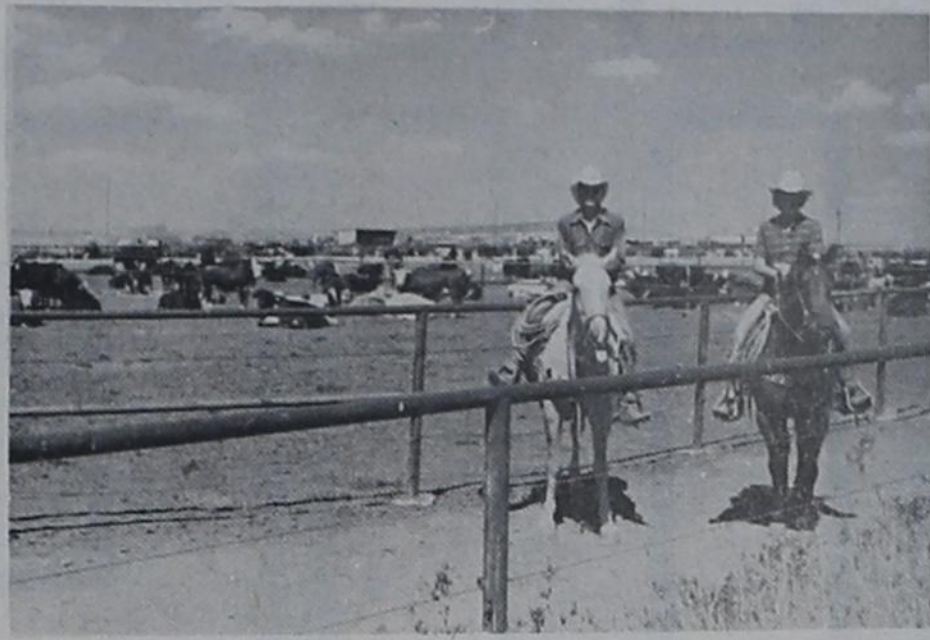

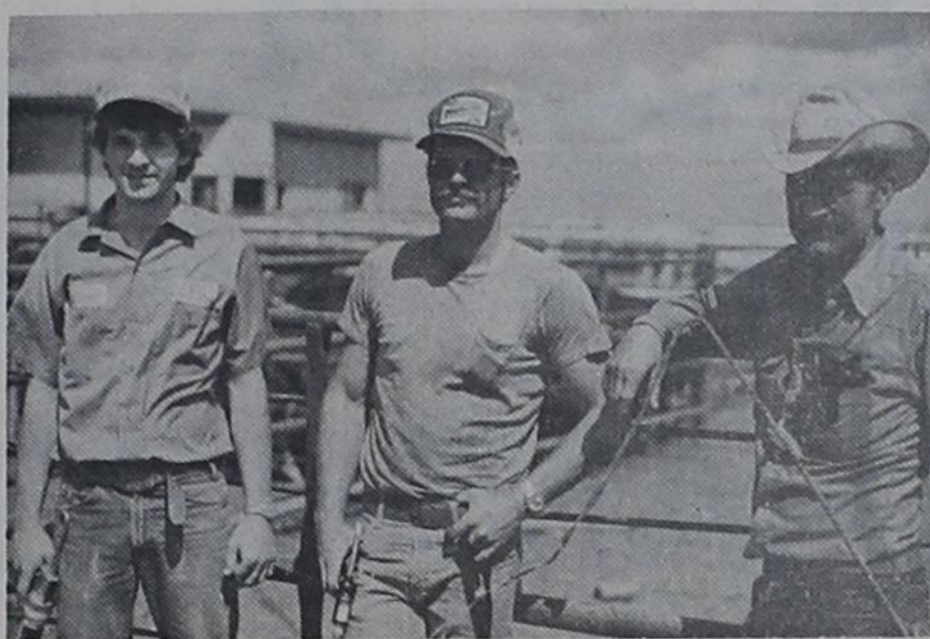

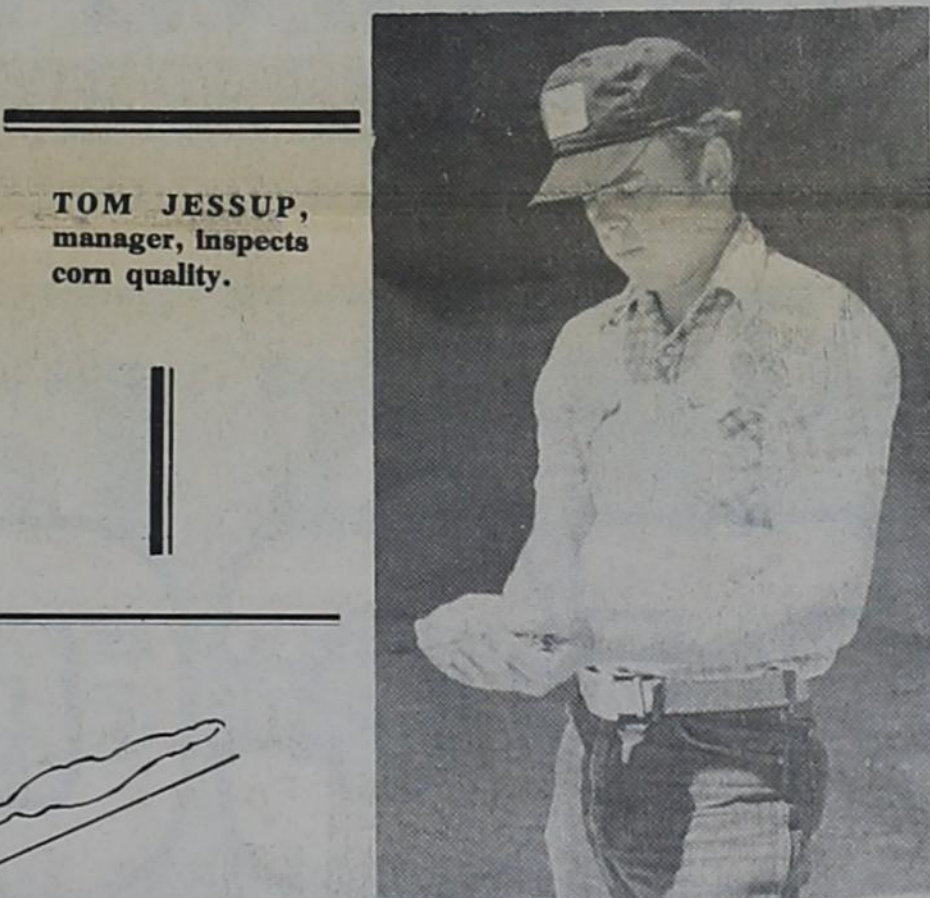

Hedley Feedlot filled to capacity

One of Donley County's few industries is a thriving feedlot at Hedley, Texas. Having survived the economic crunch of the past few years which has brought the end to much custom feeding, the Hedley Feedlot is in good shape and prospering.

"The Hedley Feedlot is running at capacity. It is full and doing fine," says Tom Jessup, manager. A recent visit to the feedlot one hot afternoon last week showed the pens were all visibly full. Several pens had three weight calves in them, perhaps because of the drought in south Texas, but the other fifty eight or so pens were filled with five to eleven weight cattle from as far away as Florida and Nebraska.

Jessup said he is custom feeding 7000 head in sixty pens at the moment. Alfalfa hay, feed corn, and cotton hulls are purchased locally by the feedlot. With these are mixed two proteins and molasses to make an appetizing dish irresistible to the cattle. Jessup said that in the feedlot he takes cattle weighing from 300 to 800 pounds and custom feeds them to between 550 and 1300 pounds. He then sells them to packers. Of this meat, Jessup states, 70% to 90% is choice beef.

Hedley Feedlot sells to a variety of packers. The main buyers are Iowa Beef, Amarillo; Missouri Beef, Plainview and Friona; Glover, Roswell, New Mexico; Swift in Cactus, Texas; Morell in Amarillo; Armour in Hereford; Palo Duro in Amarillo; Wilson in Oklahoma City; Dallas City Packers in Dallas; and various other small southern packers.

The feedlot currently is feeding cattle owned in Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Tennessee, Florida, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas.

Jessup explained that the main problems he has with cattle are getting the cattle started on the feed when they first arrive and various diseases such as IBR, pneumonia, diptheria, encephalitis, foot rot, pink eye, and a small amount of BVD. These diseases are taken care of by Hoss Morris of Hedley, assistant manager, and Steve Allan of Hedley, cattle doctor, with his assistant, Randy Shaw of Hedley. Other employees of the feedlot are Loretta Ham and Nancy Mullins both of Hedley who work in the office; Jimmy Jackson of Memphis, cowboy boss; Jeff Hill and Mike Darnell, both of Hedley, part time help; Mark Brinson of Hedley, cowboy; and John Middleton of Memphis who has recently joined the company as a feed man.

"I would like to interest some local cattlemen in this operation," said Jessup, "we have a

good product, economical, and we provide good marketing for the cattle. Tell them to come see us before they ship their cattle off somewhere."

PSAT/NMSQT exam set

Mrs. Ethelyn Grady, guidance director at Clarendon High School, has announced that sophomores, juniors, and some seniors will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall. The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans.

Scheduled for October 24, at Clarendon High School, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude -- two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. Also, students can use the College Board's College Handbook, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.

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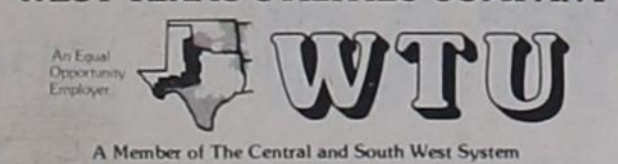

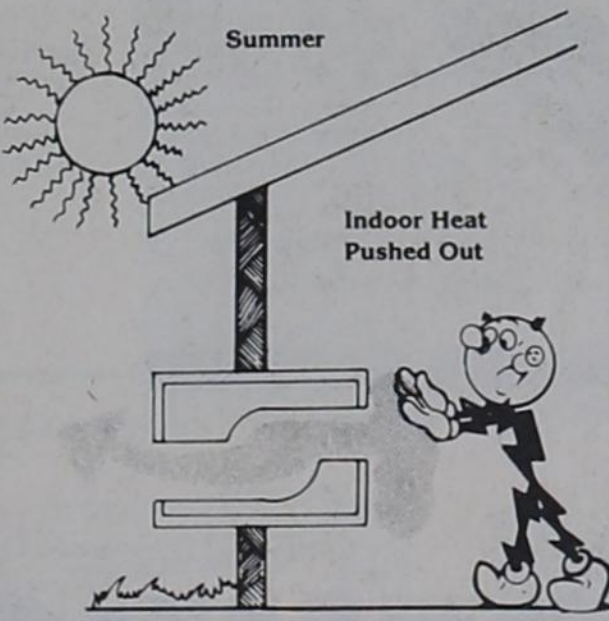
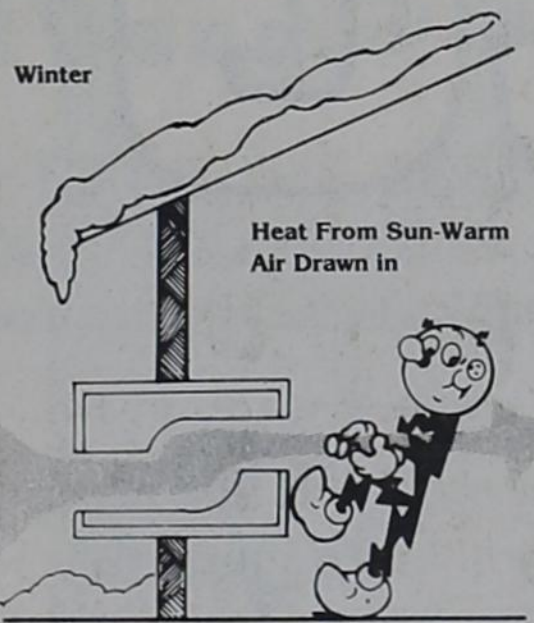

Hedley citizens group meets

In a meeting Tuesday evening, August 29, a well behaved assemblage of about 30 Hedley residents met with county officials in the Hedley Lions Club hall to discuss law enforcement personnel for their town.

Donley County Attorney John Knorrp spoke to interested and concerned townspeople in regard to laws which would govern the law enforcement choice of the Hedley residents, answering questions, pointing out possible weakness or strength in hypothetical cases so they could make a judgement of their own situation.

Two choices seemed open to the residents, a constable or a deputy sheriff for precinct 3. If a constable is the choice he/she will be elected by the voters of precinct 3; if a deputy sheriff is chosen he will be named by the sheriff and work under his department in precinct 3.

Again the county attorney explained such issues as those present asked about.

It was agreed by the persons in attendance that for many of them the psychological need for a resident lawman was of utmost importance.

A show of hands by the persons present indicated by a considerable margin that a constable was their choice. A committee of several persons representative of precinct 3 will meet with the Commissioner Court on September 11, at 2 p.m. to discuss a final choice of lawman.

For either choice the salary

will be set by the commissioners court. It was pointed out by Sheriff Behrens that law enforcement personnel does bring in considerable monies to the county. Also he feels most of the personnel is underpaid.

County Judge Billie Christal gave some figures of salaries and expenses and announced that the county books are open to examination by those wishing more information.

Probably the biggest issue is the availability of a person who is suitable and willing for the Hedley position.

County officials present were Precinct 3 commissioner, Buford Holland; Justice of the Peace Precinct 3, O'Neal Weatherly; John Knorrp, county attorney; Billie Christal, county judge, and Sheriff Behrens.

In the county commissioners meeting of August 14, the commissioners court voted to employ a full-time deputy for Hedley. The action came as a result of a request from that community.

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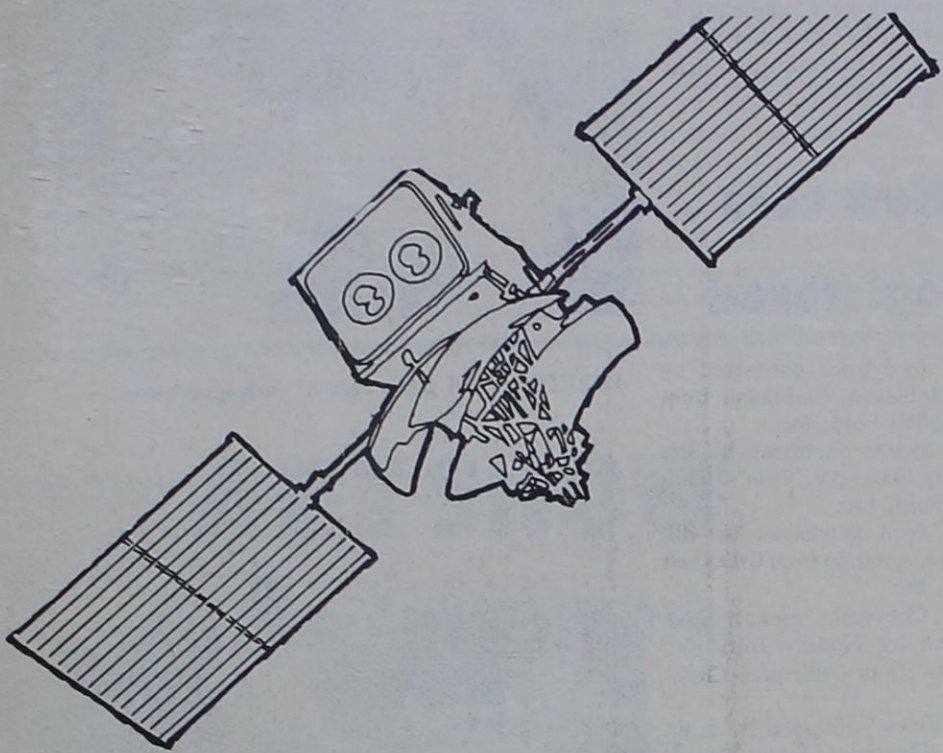

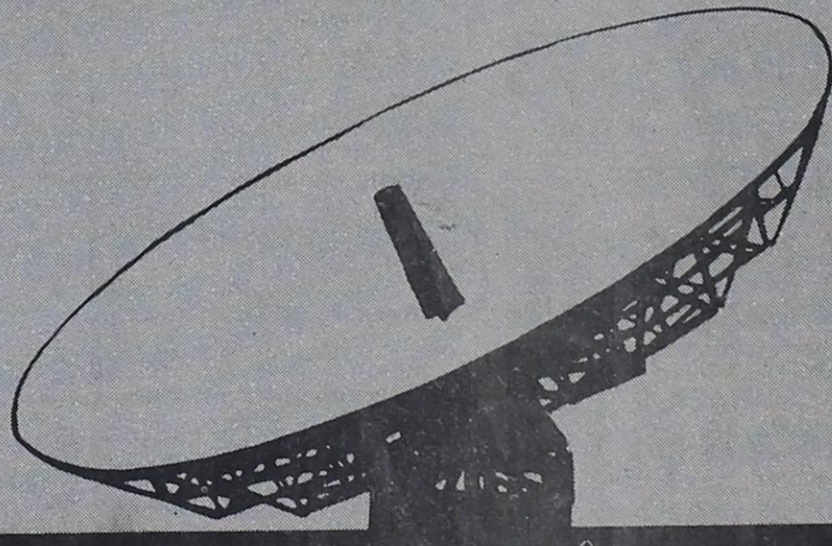




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Field Day

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Texas tax collections up

Figures released by the State Treasury Department indicate a sizeable increase in stamp tax collections for Texas.

According to State Treasurer, Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp tax collections for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1978 amounted to \$289,601,633.42, an increase of \$12,105,664.37 over collections in the previous fiscal year. Collections hit an all-time monthly high in May, 1978

when \$27,071,882.90 was collected. The increase reflected during fiscal year 1978 averaged in excess of \$1 million per month.

Collections from the sale of stamps on liquor, beer, and wine amounted to \$1,836,206.29 an increase of \$70,959.63. This tax is imposed on tourists who bring alcoholic beverages across the bridges from Mexico into Texas.
