Various editions of the "Continental Singers and Orchestra" appear in over 600 local churches and other locations in their 75-day tour covering the United States as well as numerous foreign countries.

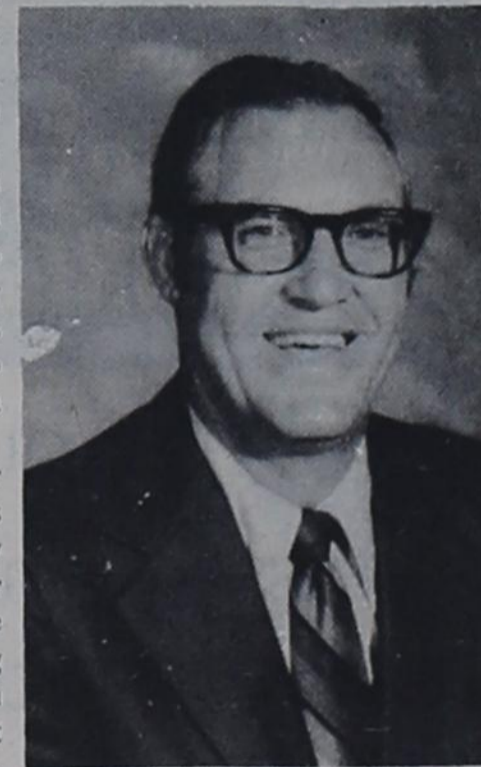

### Picric acid supply disposed of here

Several letters sent out by the Texas Education Agency to local institutions and received last week asked the institutions to check for picric acid which was old enough to be hazardous.

As a result of the inquiries small amounts of the picric acid at the Clarendon High School and Clarendon College were disposed of before becoming dangerous. No stores of the acid were at the old hospital it was found after talking with Dr. R.L. Gilkey, nor was there any at Medical Center or Dr. Gilkey's office.

Picric acid which has remained unused for some time becomes hazardous because of its explosive properties, similar to nitroglycerin. It was decided to dispose of the supply in Clarendon before it became a threat.

Federal officials with the Treasury Department out of Lubbock were responsible for the disposing of the materials and arrived in Clarendon after

other stops in Lubbock, Happy and Amarillo.

On Wednesday, June 6, with a Texas highway Department truck loaded with sand, and a City of Clarendon police escort in the person of Andy Costley, the picric acid was picked up at the college then the high school and taken down the farm to market road to HWY 287 and east to the airport exit and on to the dump ground for disposal.

It was late in the day when the team from Lubbock and the evacuation was done quietly and with no problems.

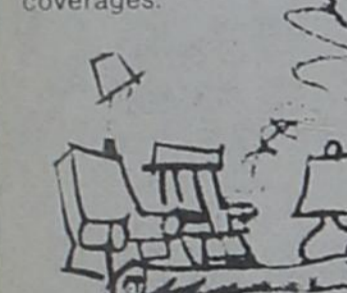

**Man on Moon has 10th Anniversary**

There are presently twelve pairs of human footsteps on the Moon, left there by American astronauts. With no rain, snow or wind to erode them, those first footprints will be visible a million years from now, barring an unexpected catastrophe.

Will there be other footsteps there--and elsewhere? And--When?

The new star program opening Friday, June 15, at the Don Harrington Discovery Center planetarium in Amarillo is titled "FOOTSTEPS," the story of mankind's continual dream to reach the Moon and the significance of that dream realized. 1979 marks the tenth anniversary of man's first step onto a planet beyond the Earth.

"FOOTSTEPS" travels back in time to witness the formation of the solar system and to explore why the Earth and Moon, which receive the same amount of sunlight, are radically different worlds: the Earth teems with life while the Moon remains an almost unchanged museum of the early days of our solar system. Visitors will watch man through the centuries learning about the Moon and trying to guess what he might find there: a world like ours, or a world of fantastic animals, plants and rocks. In addition to "FOOTSTEPS" visitors may see at no charge exhibits from NASA, the American space agency, and from the American Medical Association.

Sunday visitors can view live pictures of the sun including sunspots, coronas and plages through the heliostat when the sun is shining.

Donley County TSTA Scholarship Award of \$100.00 to Clarendon College.

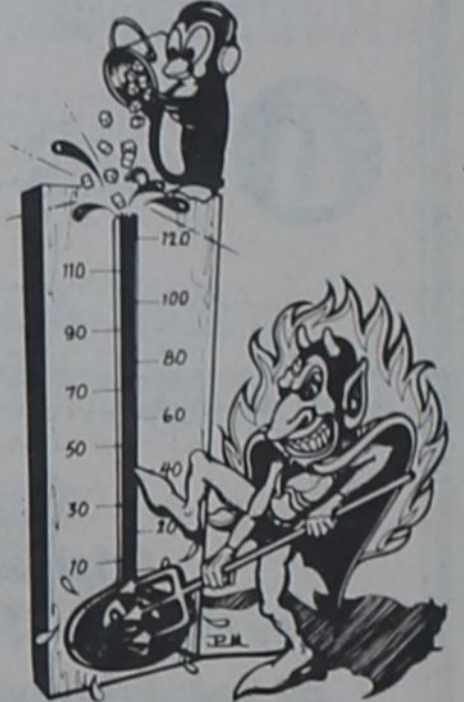

Texas' honey fanciers have received some "sweet and sour" news from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

While the number of bee colonies dropped by 25,000 last year, production per hive increased, bringing 1978 production to within four percent of the 1977 total.

Total honey production during the year was 8.7 million pounds, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

### Avocado Industry Hoping To Catch Britain's Fancy

AUSTIN--The British may be eating avocados with their tea if an export shipment introducing a Texas variety to English diners takes hold.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown announced that 100 cases of Texas avocados, the first export shipment in the small but developing industry's history, left Brownsville for England January 25. The shipment will be sold to English restaurants.

export brokers Dwight and Irene Stomberg to the Texas avocado industry in December," said Brown. "A month later the first shipment was on its way to England."

Fruit was supplied by South Point Nursery in Brownsville, the state's largest avocado grower with 60-70 acres. South Point has been in the avocado business six years, but this is the first for commercial production.

Brown said 400-500 acres of avocados are scattered throughout the Rio Grande Valley. About 25 growers are producing the fruit, but six to eight grow most of it.

The Lula avocado is the only variety grown in the Valley. A large, smooth, bright green fruit which may reach a pound in weight, it is sweeter than varieties grown in California and Mexico. It ripens seven to 10 days after it is picked and must be extremely soft before it can be eaten.

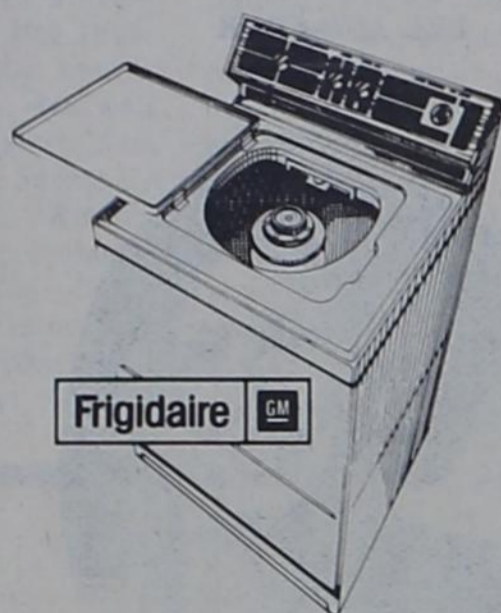

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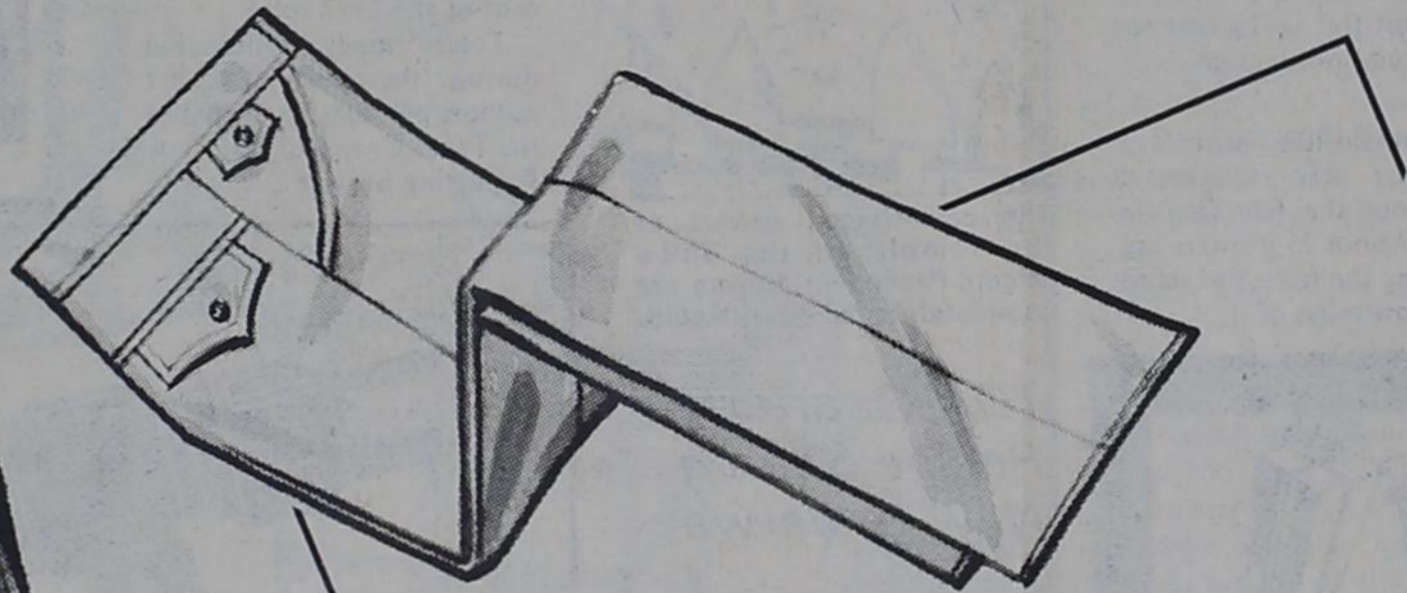

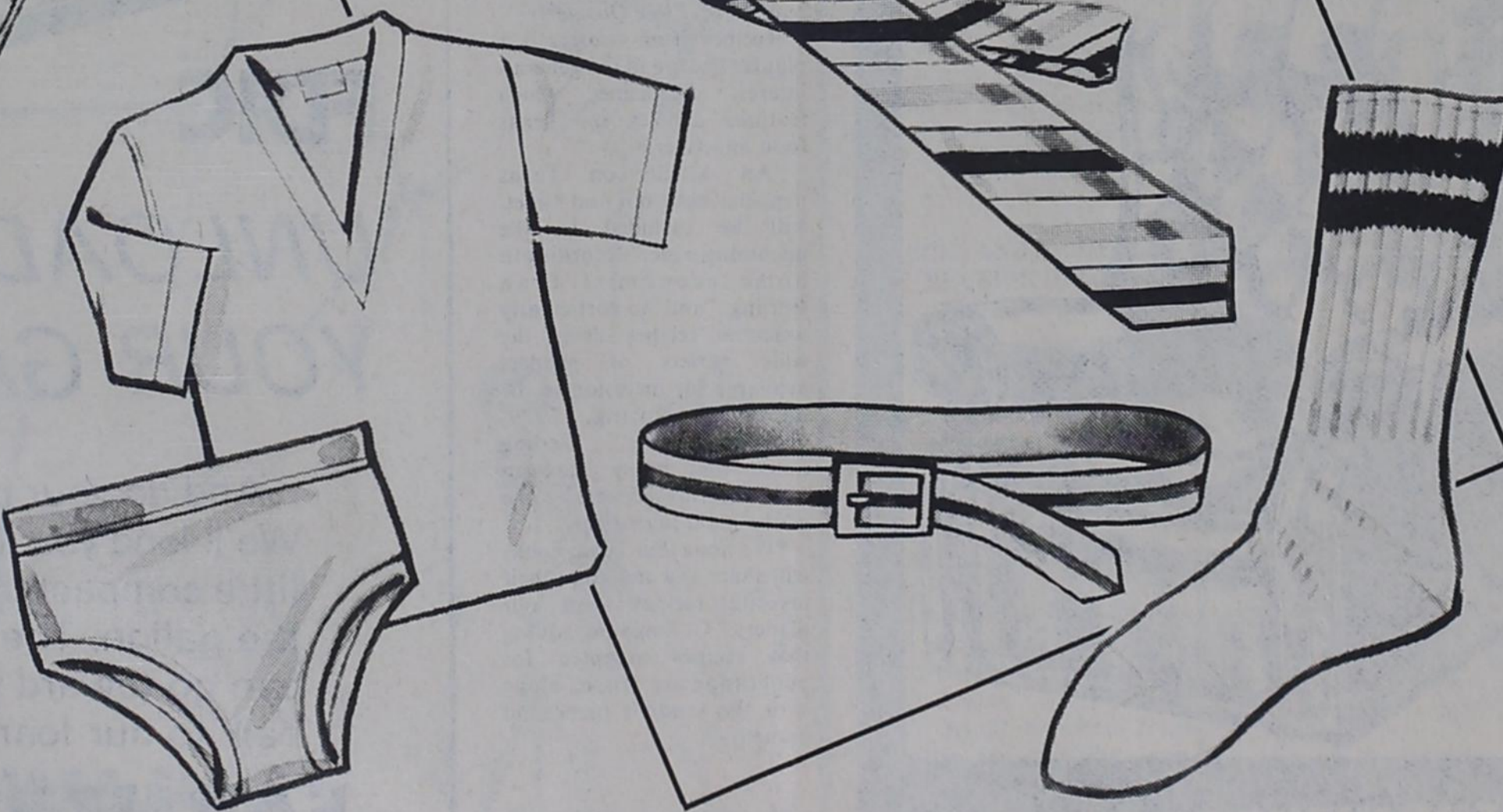

Q: I paid a security deposit when I moved into my apartment. I'm planning to move out next month when the lease expires. Can I deduct the amount of my security deposit from my last month's rent payment?

A: Your security deposit is not a part of your rent payments. If you deduct the amount of your security deposit from your final rent check, your landlord is entitled to bring suit against you for the unpaid rent. The law allows the landlord to sue for three times the amount of your security deposit and for the cost of attorneys' fees.
