Grasshoppers threat

Although Donley County infestation of grasshoppers has not reached the severe proportion more northern panhandle counties are experiencing, they are a definite economic threat as hot dry weather renders vegetation near the nesting places unpalatable and the hoppers move on to cultivated areas.

Rangeland and old house sites are the usual high infestation areas of grasshoppers but in times of drought or during extremely hot and dry periods they are forced to move on to fields for green food.

Heat and no moisture dry the existing grasses and weeds and with anything else to feed on the grasshoppers will not eat on the dry

The migration of the grasshoppers is speeded up in their move to croplands by the prolonged dry hot weather as it takes its toll of fresh green vegetation.

With sprays and bait likely to have been in use it would be wise of any one to check with the grower of any crop likely to be harvested and eaten on the spur of the moment, such as melons, corn etc., to protect health and life.

Report from Texas Farm Bureau

A move by the Carter Administration to cut agricultural trade attahces from the U.S. Department of State has been labeled "false economy" by Carrol Chaloupka, president of Texas' largest farm organization. The agricultural attaches, in several countries whose job includes negotiating trade agreements with other

nations, would be eliminated in a budget-trimming move initiated by the President.

"Export of our farm products plays a crucial role in balancing the huge flow of money Americans pay to other nations for oil and other imports," said Cha-

In calling the proposed reduction of agricultural attaches "false economy", the Farm Bureau president stressed the importance of exports of farm products not only to farmers, but the

economy as a whole. Government figures show that well over a million full-time civilian jobs depend on farm exports, generating an estimated 24-billion dollars in the U.S. economy in addition to the money

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the Quanah Tribune-Chief, Thursday, July 15, 1965.

A tiny, inconspicuous cemetery 4 miles north of Clarendon is the resting place of a handful of Old Clarendon Colony settlers (1878-1886.) A state marker pays them tribute, but the legacy they and other Panhandle pioneers have left will be reflected more majestically in the waters of a nearby 2,000-acre lake.

Second in size in the Panhandle only to the Canadian River Dam, the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority reservoir will begin to take shape sometime this year on the Salt Fork of he Red River, 4 miles north of Clarendon and just west of the State Highway 70 bridge.

The reservoir, only 80 miles from Quanah and 60 miles from Amarillo promises to be one of the Panhandle's key recreation areas.

Dr. Shell Townsend, president of the authority,


from the creek, siphoned back to the steel reservoir and enters the aqueduct for servicing water-short Childress and Quanah until the main reservoir is built.

Completion of the westward extension from Childress to Lelia Lake Creek and also the 18-inch line from Childress to Quanah was completed last week.

Later and possible during construction of the main reservoir, other aqueducts will be laid from the dam at Clarendon, and pick up at Quanah and extend to Lake Pauline and to Crowell.

A remarkable feature of the aqueduct system will be gravity flow from the dam source to Crowell a distance of about 120 miles with a 1,100 foot drop in elevation. Engineers predict more than

pointed out Clarendon stands to profit more from the reservoir than any other member city becarse of its proximity. Construction personnel trade and the subsequent increase in tourist trade is expected to substantially boost the Conley County economy.

The dam and its 120mile long aqueduct system, on the brink of reality after more than 20 years of bold vision and planning by water-interested citizens of seven counties, will provide a reliable water supply for at least five cities, several communities and many individuals along its route. Its completion should serve as a welcome sign for industry to locate throughout the area which the authority serves.

How far along is the project and what does it constitute? Nearly \$9 millions has

been state authorized and is available for:

1. Construction of the 120-mile aqueduct, extending from the dam site at the northwest end to Crowell at the southeast terminal. Cities to be served are Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah and Crowell, as well as some small communities such as Kirkland and many individual farmers along the route.

2. Construction of the Dam at the Highway 70 site. It will be 5,800 feet long and 110 feet high. The earthen dam will back up water over 2,000 surface acres and will contain 60,000 acre feet. The maximum depth will be 88 feet with an average depth of 301/2 feet.

3. Construction of a filtration plant at the Highway 70 site.

4. Building of a 2 million gallon steel storage reservoir near Hedley.

The above four phases constitute the essentials of the Greenbelt project and upon completion would place the authority in a position to service the area with water.

have not been let pending further study and analysis. Dr. Townsend, Childress physician, who has been president of the authority since its inception in 1957, said work is expected to begin on the reservoir sometime this fall. Childress and Quanah will

be the largest customers consuming about 70 per cent of the supply.

Dr. Townsend pointed out that the state is using the Greenbelt reservoir as a pilot project, implementing for the first time a new program of buying water rights from a privately financed dam. Texas has agreed to buy \$2,100,000 worth of water from Greenbelt solely to enable the authority to construct a dam of maximum capacity. The state's share of the water may be sold by the

authority and customer receipts used to reimburse the state for its cost of the

original water rights. No federal funds are being

used in the Greenbelt project. The state is underwriting bonds for both the first phase amounting to \$4,100,000 (mostly for the aqueduct) and the second phase of \$4,850,000 (mostly for the dam and filter plant). Interest charged the authority on the first phase is a nominal 3.6840 per cent, while the interest rate on the

second phase is 3.6515. The bonds are expected to be paid out in 35 years, Dr. Townsend said.

Besides Dr. Townsend, other officers include Carroll Knorpp of Clarendon, vice president and Bill Lowe of Clarendon, secretary. Dr. Townsend, Knorpp and Lowe are also directors along with Clifford Johnson of Hedley, Merle Kincaid of Crowell,

Only one phase, not included, is the long range Lelia Lake reservoir project which would be built when the water supply is needed. Progress on the overall project, thus far, includes laying of 10 miles of 21-inch aqueduct pipe from Child-

ress to 10 miles west and the laying of about 9 miles of 18 inch pipe out of Childress east. R.H. Fulton Co. of Lubbock is the contractor.

The northwest pipeline extension passes through Memphis and northwest to a gigantic steel reservoir which will soon be completed on the Mrs. J.S. Hinds farm, a mile east and one-quarter mile south of Hedley. The aqueduct then proceeds from the steel reservoir west to the Lelia Lake Creek, about 4 miles northwest of Hedley.
