

the early summer of 1938 Clarendon, Was on the agenda for a whistlestop appearance of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President of the United States, in for another term of office.

Roosevelt was the only president whose political tour had brought him to Clarendon and the area residents responded with high interest and practically per capita intent to be on hand for the event.

There must have been those who were less than enhanced with his performance in office but to the majority of these rural Texas panhandle residents it was evident that the worst years of the depression were past with his leadership and there was a lessening of the dust bowl damage with

implementation of new government conservation programs. Clarendon, collectively if not individually, was going to welcome Roosevelt's brief visit. On the appointed day of the presidental visit excitement rippled about town like an elusive breeze. Merchants and clerks had plans to close stores and offices long enough to get a glimpse of President Roosevelt. 

As a member of the Donley County Learning Center, Inc. Donor Board I would like to share a few facts with you about our day care center.

We have been in operation since February 3, 1975. We were housed in the old grade school until May of 1977. At that time we moved downtown to the Steve Rogers Garage Building. We had been trying for two years to get our State and Federal License, so that we would be able to apply for title XX Purchased Day Care Ser-

We were finally okayed by State and Federal representatives and received our Quality Child Care Requirements in November 1977. Our Title XX year started on February 1, 1978 and ran through January 31, 1979. We have just begun our second year.

To qualify for Title XX Purchased Services, the local match is 30%. When we mail the check for 30% to Austin they return a check for 100% to us. The 30% is sent by the Donor Board to Austin, when the money is sent back it is to reimburse the general account for money already spent for wages, rent, supplies, utilities,

Our total budget for 1979 is \$61,984.17. Of this amount

Other \$12.295.26 comes from the Food parent homes, 9 come from one Care Program for food and cook parent homes, and 1 from C.E.T.A., one paid by Texas salary, \$6,986.18 from Texas grandparents home. Panhandle Community Action

Program, \$300 donated toys. and \$174 water bill donated by owner of building. Title XX is responsible for \$36,136.20 a year. Local match is \$3,466.70. In other words for \$3,466.70 we will be receiving \$61,984.17 back into our community. Now the problem lies in the donor part. We have tried to raise funds by having trap shoots,

bar-B-Que suppers, pancake suppers, bake sales, etc. Another way is through donations, a one time donation or as some are doing, either \$5 or \$10 per month. Another way is through County, City, or private organization donations. Oh yes, we are a non-taxable organization and any donation is tax deductable off of your income tax.

There has been much talk and several letters written with ideas of ways the county could use Revenue Sharing monies. If Michele, is one of the lucky ones the County and the City, who also gets Revenue Sharing monies would set aside \$1,733.35 a year we would not be continually asking for funds from people who have enough others asking for donations.
