Soil Stewardship Week, which had its origins more than 1500 years ago, will be celebrated in Donley County and throughout the United States and its territories on May 20-27, 1979, according to an announcement by Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District #127.

The theme for the 1979 celebration is "Interdependence," a concept endorsed by President Carter in his foreword to the descriptive Soil Stewardship Week booklet. The booklet and accompanying Soil Stewardship Week material is distributed by Conservation Districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and individuals interested in participating in the unique celebration.

"Americans have always understood the value of working together to achieve common goals," President Carter said. "We have learned that unity of purpose and mutual dependence are essential to our growth as a society of self-governing people."

"It is especially fitting, therefore, that interdependence... of city and country, of Americans and their resources, and of man and nature... is the theme of Soil Stewardship Week in 1979," the President observed.

"Our nation can be thankful for our progress in repairing the damage we have done to our environment. But that is only a start. To achieve greater harmony with nature, we must continue to seek harmony with one another."

The concept of Soil Stewardship had its origins in the special Rogation Days set aside by the Bishop of Vienne, France, following bad weather and earthquakes that brought crop failures and widespread hunger to much of France some 1500 years ago. The Bishop called upon the people to offer prayers and penance, and to offer humble thanks to their creator "for the priceless gifts of soil, water, air and sunshine which make all living things possible."

While we are not faced with the immediate prospect of famine or hunger in the United States today, the reasons for Soil Stewardship commemorative activities hasn't changed very much, the sponsors believe. We still need to pause each year to express our thanks for the natural resources of soil, water and air which nurture our people and provide us with daily food and fiber necessary to carry on our daily existence.

Soil Stewardship Week has been sponsored in the United States since 1955 by the National Association of Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 Conservation Districts. Clarendon EMT reports

On Tuesday, May 8 at 2:44 a.m., Velma Calloway, 22 of Clarendon, was taken from the County Jail, where he was brought by private car, to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center for treatment of gunshot wounds to the left arm and left hand. Delbert Robertson, EMT and Phillip Vargas and Patrick Robertson, Paramedics, responded to the call.

At 9:58 a.m. on Wednesday, May 9, Opal Tracy, 65 of Clarendon, was taken from her residence to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo for medical treatment. Patrick Robertson, Paramedic, and Delbert Robertson, EMT, made the call. At 7:45 p.m. on the same day, Winston C. Cooper, 35, of Dallas, sustained multiple lacerations and abrasions to his arms, hands, legs, and back, after he was thrown from the motorcycle he was riding. The accident occurred 2 miles west of Clarendon on Highway 287. He was transferred to Hall County Hospital in Memphis for treatment by Larry Doane, EMT and Patrick Robertson, paramedic.

On Saturday, May 12, at 12:39 p.m., Albert R. Sprinkles, 79, of Clarendon received minor lacerations and contusions to his hands and legs, after being involved in an automobile accident at the intersection of Highway 287 and Main Street. He was taken to Hall County Hospital in Memphis by Delbert Robertson EMT and Edie Robertson.

At 12:56 a.m. on Sunday, May 13, two Claude residents were injured in a two car accident after their automobile was in collision with one driven by Billy Price of Clarendon. Price was uninjured. The accident occurred at the intersection of Highway 287 and 70 north. Dennis L. Childress, 35, sustained a possible fracture of the left wrist, lower back injuries, and generalized abrasion. His wife, Belva Childress, 23, sustained an injury to her right knee, neck and ribs. General Manager David Pruitt, in his report, noted that inflation, coupled with expenses tied to ice storm damage, were primary reasons for the expense increase in 1978 as compared to 1977. Pruitt also announced that a rate increase would assist in offsetting the higher

expenses incurred by the system in providing power. "Inflation hits us hard just like it hits everyone else," Pruitt said. "Through good management practices we keep rates as low as possible."

The annual report noted that 33 percent of all revenues collected by the system were paid out to offset fuel adjustment costs charged to the Co-op for power. Another 12 percent went for power costs as part of the base power rate, for a total of 45 percent of revenues which were paid out directly for power supply.

Some 6 percent of revenues in 1978 were expended for interest on debt, 3 percent went for taxes, 11 percent for depreciation and amortization, and 18 percent for office and administrative expense. There was a net operating loss of one percent for the year.

"We will maintain a sound financial condition in 1979 with the proposed rate increase," said Pruitt, "and the Co-op will continue to be a reliable supplier of power to its members."

This is the season for rabies

Rabies a disease all but forgotten by many people, is once again on the upswing. Cases of rabies have increased sharply in many areas

of Texas, points out Dr. Jim Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

There were more laboratory-confirmed cases in Texas last year than any other year since 1961. And 1979 is off to a

quarter, notes Armstrong. He says 80 to 90 percent of the cases are in skunks. However, domestic animal cases are increasing.

Twenty-two rabid dogs have been reported in the El Paso area, possibly due to rabid stray dogs in Mexico, he says. As a result, special immunization clinics have been set up to increase the vaccination level.

Armstrong says intensive stray dog pick-up activities are under way on both sides of the river. The veterinarian says the keys to rabies control are public awareness, pet vaccination (both dogs and cats) and stray animal control.

There are 3.7 million dogs in Texas, yet only 1.25 million rabies vaccinations are given annually by Texas veterinarians, Armstrong points out. A 70 percent vaccination level is considered the minimum necessary for rabies control.

During the first four months of 1979, laboratory confirmed cases through the Texas Department of Health totalled 370, compared to 183 confirmed lab cases for the corresponding period in 1978, representing an increase of over 100 percent.

"Of the 370 cases this year, 139 of them were confirmed in April alone. About 80 percent of all confirmed cases have been in skunks, and the department of Health has announced that 46.2 percent of all skunks examined have been positive," notes Armstrong.

Cases confirmed through the laboratory during the first three weeks of April include: Skunks, 108; foxes, 2; bats 4; raccoons, 2; cats, 1; dogs, 6; horses, 2; and cattle, 7. Although the two horses were confirmed in Brazos County, they were brought here for testing from the Houston and Hempstead areas, the lab report indicated.

OF TRAVEL

Every year, more than seven million Americans go traveling overseas, and some six million people from other countries come here.

The first group can save themselves some money if they heed a few travelers tips, such as knowing what to buy in airports: the duty-free shops can save you lots, but renting a car can cost as much as 40 percent more than it would elsewhere.

The second group can help all Americans, travelers or not, save money by helping improve our balance of payments and so make the money we save worth more.

One company that helps travelers in and out of this country, Pan Am, has a plan that could help shore up our savings, too. If it is allowed to merge with National Airlines, these efficient companies would probably be able to bring even more people from more countries here at better rates and serve travelers within the U.S. better for less, too.

That's good news, even for people who don't travel any farther than their bank once a quarter, and many people are writing to their representatives at the U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510, and the House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515, asking about their stand on this merger.

Bob told us that F.H.A. loans on houses were confined to towns of 10,000 population. The house cannot cost over 15,600 and may not have more than 1300 square feet of living space.

F.H.A. interest on homes is currently 9% except that a

certain part of the interest may be credited back to families with income under \$10,000 per year. There is another type of loan available in amounts up to \$7,000 to remove health hazards with interest rates from 1% to 3%. Eligibility for this type of loan is limited to those with incomes of less than \$7,000 per year. Incertain cases, payments may be spread over a period up to 25 years.

It is very possible that some of our elderly people on social security might benefit from this type of loan.

Mr. Cowen reminded us that the F.H.A. is not in competition with private lending institutions such as banks or savings and loan companies. If you can obtain a loan from these sources, you are not eligible for the F.H.A. loans.

WAYS TO PROTECT YOURSELF BEFORE LIGHTNING STRIKES

Those spring showers that bring the flowers are often accompanied by a not-so-welcome natural force—lightning. Mostly unpredictable, a lightning bolt strikes before the warning thunder and sometimes leaves death and destruction in its path.

Royal-Globe reminds you that there are measures you can take to protect your family and household from danger during a lightning storm.

Lightning killed a total of 441 persons in a four-year period ending in 1976, the latest available figures from the National Safety Council. Between 1970 and 1974, the National Fire Protection Association estimated that a total of 103,600 buildings were struck by lightning causing a total of \$203,935,000 in losses.

Lightning strokes may occur between clouds or clouds and earth. Composed of a number of separate charges, a lightning stroke contains a first "pilot leader stroke" with a speed ranging from 100 miles per second to 20,000 miles per second for the main stroke. In extreme cases, currents can range up to 200,000 amperes, lasting for a few millionths of a second.

Even if lightning does not start a house fire, the force can cause splintering in dry wood beams or blow out windows. If you live in an area with frequent lightning storms, on open land or on a hilltop, you may want to consider having a professional install a lightning protection system on your house. Make sure that any system you choose has

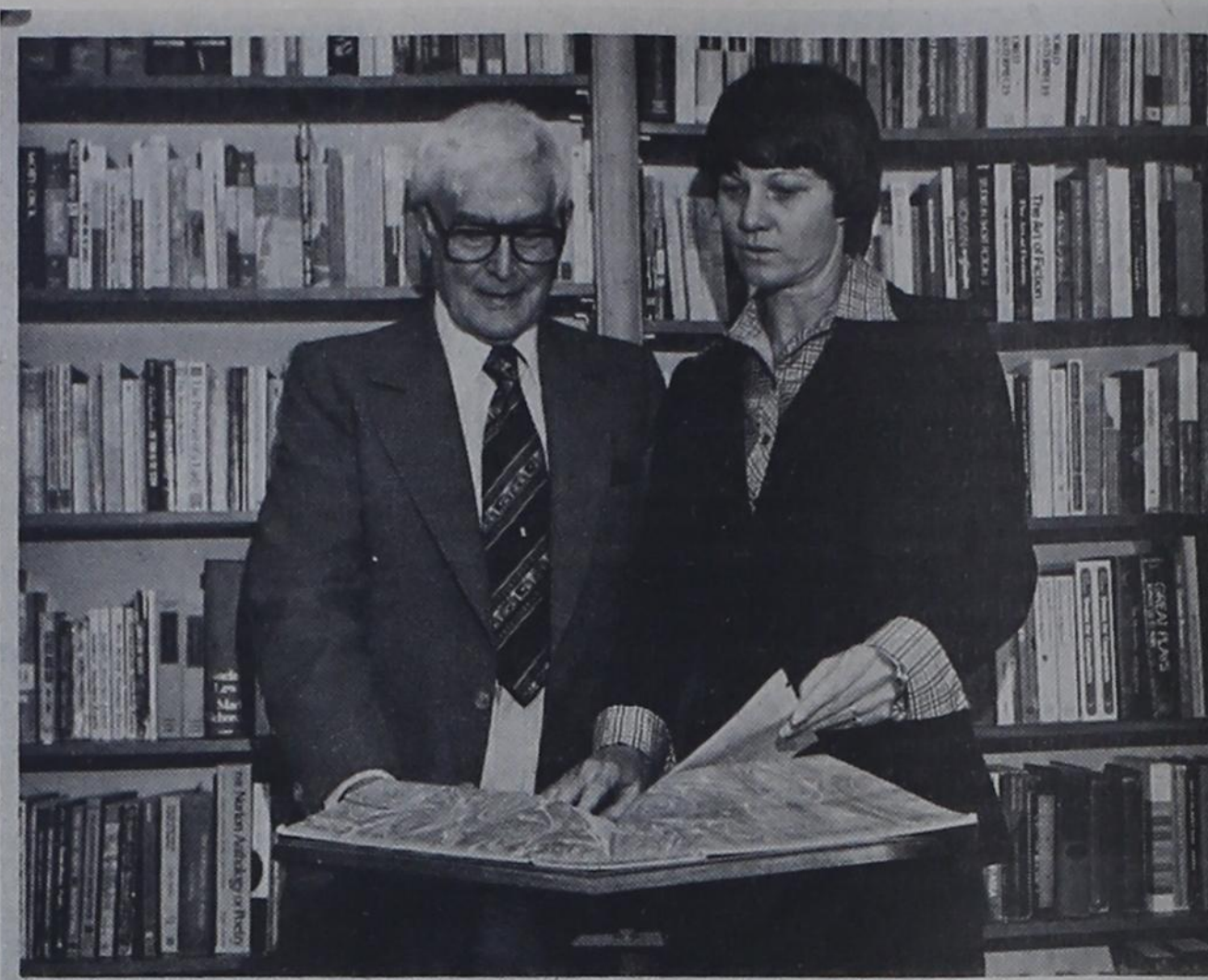


the Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., "Master Label Service" which provides for factory inspection and field inspection of a number of installations. It is also a good idea to have a lightning arrester properly installed on your television antenna to carry lightning induced charges to the earth.

For your own protection during a lightning storm do not stand near an open window or on your porch since the warmer interior air may attract the lightning. Put off using the telephone or television set and don't touch metal objects, such as pipes and electrical appliances, during the storm.

Postpone doing the dishes or taking a bath until the storm subsides. Overcome a reaction to run outside to pull wash off the clothesline or close your car windows. You could become a grounding device for lightning.

If you're outside without the protection of a building when the storm strikes, you should seek a depressed area or dense woods, avoiding hilltops or high places. If you can't find shelter, sit

Peggy Svensson of Rt. 4, Amarillo, was granted \$200 in support of her studies to be a secondary English teacher.

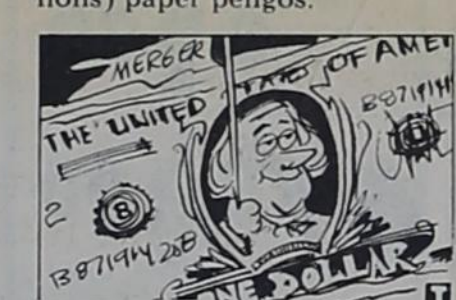

TELETHON TO HELP

Some of the young and not-so-young victims of crippling diseases and birth defects may lead more normal, active lives, thanks to a 20-hour telethon sponsored by the National Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults, on March 24 and 25.

Emmy-Award-winning actor Jack Klugman is national campaign chairman and Don Kirshner, host of "Rock Concert," one of television's most successful rock-and-roll programs, is the co-host. The telethon, now in its seventh year, has raised more than \$25 million to help fund a nationwide network of rehabilitation centers, camps, transportation services, equipment loans, workshops and special education courses.

Organized in 1919, the Easter Seal Society is recognized as the world's oldest and largest voluntary agency offering rehabilitation services to persons with disabilities. In addition, it provides help to handicapped persons through a widespread program of legislative activity, public education and collaborative research projects with universities and medical schools.

What Others Are Doing • How You Can Help

There's good news for people who find the current energy crisis rather chilling. There are some things you, your family and the government can do about it. You can save energy when you cook if you don't pre-heat your oven. Foods that are broiled, or that cook an hour or more, require no preheating.

When getting gas for your car, buy slightly less than a full tank. This will prevent wasteful overflow, allowing room for fuel expansion.

A line of evergreens on the windy side of your house can do a great deal to protect your home's heat from the wind—and so save on heating fuel.

Cork and carpeting can help keep your home warmer in winter. So can wood paneling or metallic wallpaper.

Keep your air conditioner down to no more than 15 degrees below outside temperatures. Even on the hottest days that should feel cool enough by contrast.

The government can help conserve fuel by no longer supporting fuel wasters. According to the experts at the Committee to End Government Waste of the National Taxpayers Union, the government has spent

CATTLE ON FEED UP—The total number of Texas cattle on feed increased by eight per cent as of the first of the year, the Texas Department of Agriculture reports, even though general beef supplies declined due to a smaller number of grass-fed beef available.

Beef Supply Down Despite Increased Feedlot Output

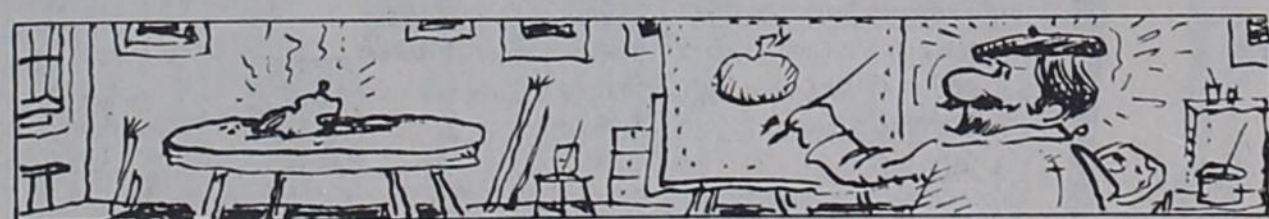
AUSTIN—A sharp decline in the number of grass-fed cattle available has tilted the beef-supply balance, even though an eight per cent increase in cattle on feed has been reported, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said this week.

"It may be hard for many consumers to understand, but beef supplies are down in spite of the larger number of cattle in feedlots," Brown said. "The increased output of fed beef has simply not been able to offset the decline in grass-fed numbers."

As of January 1, there were 2 million head of cattle in Texas feedlots, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is eight per cent above the 1.85 million on feed at that time last year.

Overall beef production in the U.S. declined by four per cent last year, while veal production dropped 24 per cent. In Texas, the December cattle slaughter was down by 27,700 head from a year ago, while the calf kill decreased over 50 per cent. Further declines are expected in 1979.

The reduced supply of cattle has resulted in higher prices, but only after cattlemen endured four years of rock-bottom cattle prices brought on by overstocked herds. Brown noted. Retail beef prices have risen partially because of the higher prices for both grass-fed and grain-fed beef, but also because of steadily increasing transportation and marketing costs due to inflation.

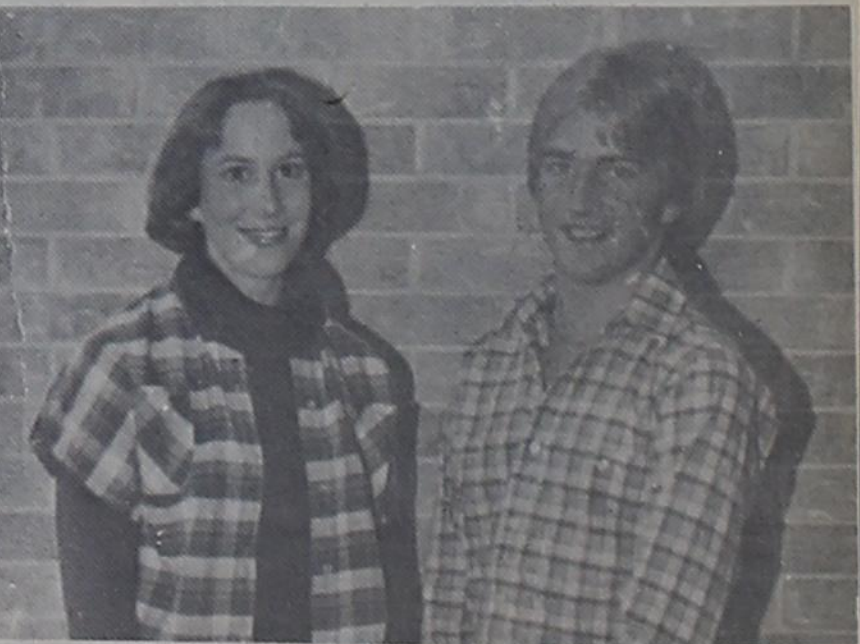

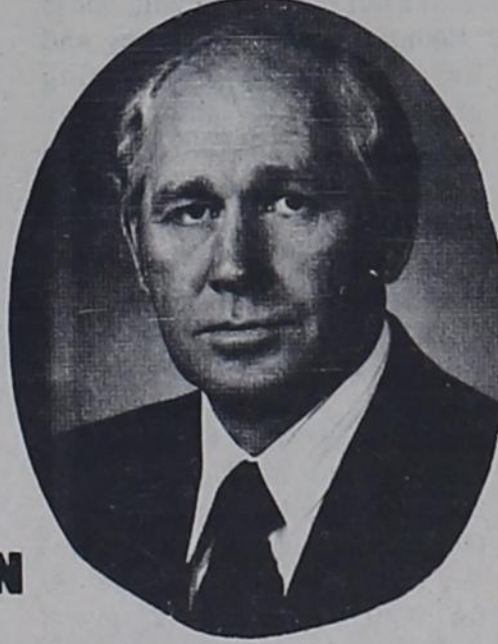

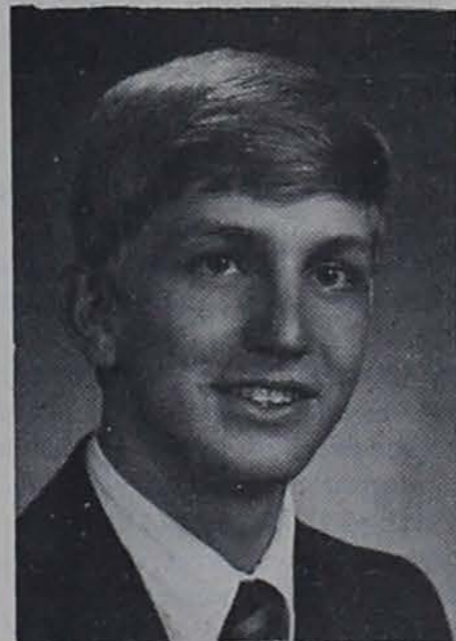
Pre Lab

Merit system jobs

High school graduates or students expecting to receive their high school diplomas this summer might be interested in investigating the possibility of finding a job in state government. The easiest way to accomplish this goal is to apply for examinations through the Merit System Council. The Council administers examinations for over 280 classifications to recruit personnel for ten state agencies.

The examinations are a free service provided by the state and are administered in Texas Employment Commission Offices in 39 cities on various Saturdays of each month.

Among the classifications open for high school graduates are Clerk I, Clerk Typist I, Stenographer I, Secretary I, Clinic Assistant, Home Health Aide, Engineering Technician I, Instrument and Office Machine Repairman Trainee, Laboratory Assistant, Laboratory Worker, Medical Aide I, Messenger, Sanitation Inspector I, Stock Clerk I, Temporary Clerk I, II, III, and Warehouseman I.

High school graduates with experience in the particular field may qualify for the following examinations: Accounting Clerk II and III, ADP Record Control Clerk I, Engineering Technician II, Laboratory Assistant II, Meat Inspector I, Medical Aide II, Personnel Clerk II, Statistical Clerk II and III, Stock Clerk II, and Welfare Service Technician I.

The examinations are administered at the Texas Employment Commission Offices in the cities indicated on the Saturdays listed. Saturday of the month Examinations may be taken: Amarillo - First and Third.

In Austin, the Merit System Council in the Brown Building at 8th and Colorado, offers examinations every Saturday at 8:00 a.m. and every Tuesday and Wednesday at 1:00 p.m. in room S12. In all cities, positive identification is required and late candidates are not admitted.

New from Senator Price

The Texas Senate has passed House Bill 304 which is the enabling legislation for Senator Bob Price's constitutional amendment which establishes the Texas Family Farm and Ranch Security Act.

"With the average age of the American farmer going up every year, there is a real need to help young people buy the land today that will produce tomorrow's food and fibre," said Senator Price.

The legislation will now have to be approved by the voters. "This program enables the state to guarantee loans which are applied for at the local banks, production credit associations, and savings and loans. These loan applications will be screened by the Commissioner of Agriculture and a special board appointed by the Governor and Commissioner. Once approved, the loan will be guaranteed by the state and the transaction completed with the local lender," commented Senator Price.

"This legislation does not actually appropriate money to buy agricultural land but rather allows the state to guarantee the local loans. The program will be

open to persons with agricultural background and a net worth of less than \$100,000," said Senator Price.

"I am confident that the legislation will be approved by the voters," concluded Senator Price.

You Ask ?

TRASH COMPACTORS
Question: With a household of six people, I feel a compactor could save a lot of work. But we don't need anything else in the house that will consume electricity. Just how much electricity will a compactor use?

Head lice increase in U.S.

Despite the highest living standards in history, head lice appears to be increasing in the United States.

Dr. Carl Patrick and Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, say head lice problems increase in Texas' urban areas during late winter and early spring. The tiny pests suck blood, causing skin abrasions that could lead to bacterial infection.

Head lice are grayish, flattened, wingless insects about 3 millimeters long. The adult female attaches 50-100 eggs, or nits, to the hair near the scalp. They spread easily by physical contact. Even under the best sanitary conditions, infestations may occur among school children who are in close, daily contact, point out the entomologists.

Personal hygiene and not using another person's comb,

brush or hat are the keys to preventing lice infestations. Shampooing with soap and water normally will not remove nits from hair since they are attached by a "Cement," explain Patrick and Hamman.

Thorough laundering in hot, soapy water (125 degrees F. or more for at least 10 minutes) or dry cleaning kills lice and nits in clothing and bedding. Personal items (hats, combs, hairbrushes, wigs) can be heat sterilized.

Infested persons should see a physician, emphasize the entomologists. Medicated lotions or shampoos can be prescribed for effective control. Also, report suspected infestations to a physician, local public health authorities or school officials so the source can be located. Prevention is the most important control of head lice, emphasize Patrick and Hamman.

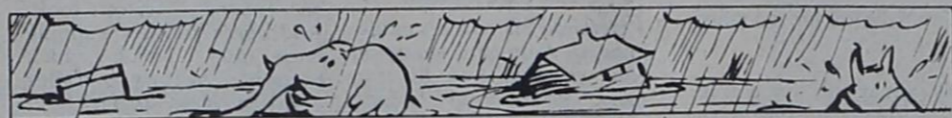
