

We continued on to some native rangeland. Moreman rests his range during the growing season and utilizes it as a standing hay crop. This rest is necessary for range improve-

ment. Proper grazing use or take half leave half is Moreman's key to good grazing management. His rotation grazing system allows him to graze each pasture to proper use then move on to the next. Despite the hot dry summer Moreman continued his grazing system. However, he had to

move from pasture to pasture sooner than planned, putting him ahead of schedule. The shorter rest periods were still beneficial as the grass were able to utilize what rain we did receive.

Most of the rangeland toured was in high good condition, that is its composition consisted of many climax species such as yellow Indiangrass, big bluestem and switchgrass. This reflects good management and rest.
