Texas school immunization requirements

Section 209 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following are required in the respective grade or age grouping:

Kindergarten - Fifth Grade:
 Oral Polio — at least three doses of vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

Diphtheria/Tetanus — minimum of three doses with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday.

Measles — One dose of vaccine or history of measles illness. Not required past age 12 years.

Rubella — One dose of vaccine. Not required past age 12.

Grades Six - Twelve
 Oral polio — At least three doses of vaccine provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday. Polio vaccine not required for persons 19 or older.

Diphtheria/Tetanus — Minimum of three doses with last dose in ten years. Booster dose only after initial series.

Measles — recommended but not required.

Persons wishing to assist with the project are requested to call Ms. Brooks at the DHR office, telephone 874-3595.

Any Medicaid recipient under age 21 is eligible for the health screening, known as the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program. Health Department nurses provide the service under contract with DHR.

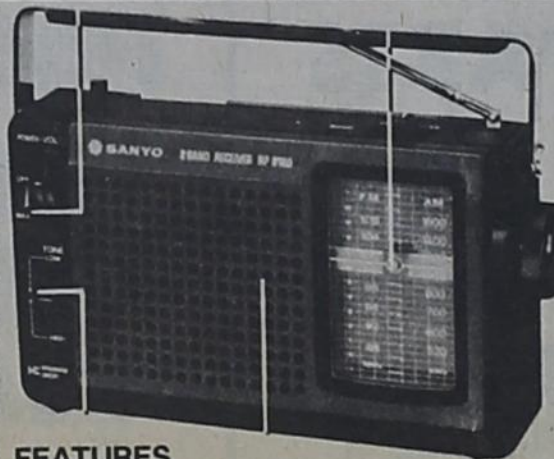

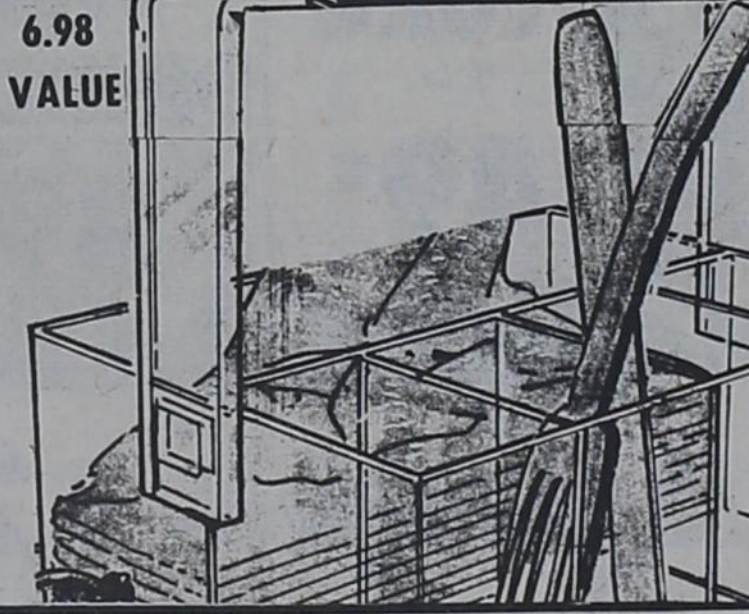

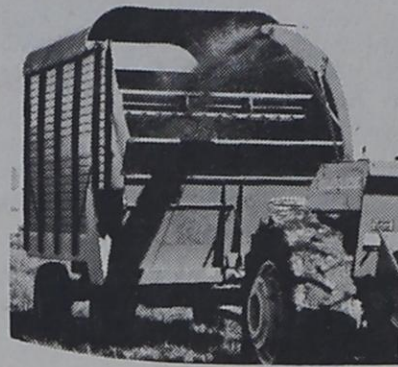

The Elizabeth Lovell Nelson story

Elizabeth Lovell was born October 17, 1900, in Honey Grove, and because of her mother's failing health moved with her parents, a brother and sister to Dopley County in 1912.

On the advice of the family doctor, who thought there was a chance a change of climate might prove helpful, H.W. Lovell, Elizabeth's father, took his family to the Ozier farm, a few miles southwest of Clarendon where the family stayed about two years.

One trip was made in the summer before moving and it was a wet time for the Lovells. They stopped their wagon in the yard of a German family and Mr. and Mrs. Lovell had to hold a wagon sheet over the children all night to protect them from the rain. Next day they found out a bridge had washed on their route and a detour had to be made around the flooded area.

The final trip was made by railroad freight car with all household goods and equipment, including the wagon being shipped by rail to Donley County.

In September, 1914, another son was born to the family and in December of that same year Mrs. Lovell, Elizabeth's mother, died.

The family lived on a place they had bought just west of Southard, (now called Ashtola) during the year of 1915. At the end of this time he returned to Honey Grove with his children, at the urging of his brothers and sister, to take care of his aging parents.

Elizabeth Lovell and Thomas Arthur Nelson

married in January, 1919 and lived at Detroit where they farmed until the fall of 1939.

During this time they had four children, one of whom died at age five and a half years, on May 20, 1930.

It was in 1939 that the T.A. Nelson family moved to Ashtola to live and farm in that community. For Mrs. Nelson it was a return trip to a place where she lived as a child and attended school at the Southard school.

At some time after the Lovell family moved from Southard and returned to Honey Grove, the name was changed to Ashtola and Mr. and Mrs. T.A. Nelson lived in a community which had a gin, postoffice, railway station, three filling stations and two grocery stores.

For many years a teachership was maintained by the Ashtola school for grade school teachers and there was a section house which was occupied.

Mrs. Nelson has her own small house fixed especially for her, attractive and convenient, near their own



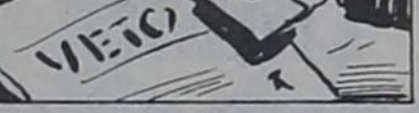

Nitrogen is the key element for winter pastures and should be applied at a rate of 50 to 100 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre at planting and again in late February.

Beef cows need phosphorous the year round-Beef cows need phosphorous in their diets for efficient reproduction as well as overall performance, point out specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This means that a mineral supplement should be provided at all times. The supplement should contain 8 to 15 percent phosphorous and no more than this amount of calcium. Cheap, high-calcium minerals are not beneficial.

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Q: I have been divorced for three years and have custody of our three-year-old daughter. What can I do to see that she is not given to my ex-husband in case of my death? Also, how hard would it be to have my new husband adopt my daughter?

A: At the death of a parent who has custody of a child from a divorced marriage, the other parent has a paramount right to the possession of the child. This right can be denied only by presentation of evidence showing it is not in the best interest of the child to be placed in the custody of the surviving parent. This right of the surviving parent cannot be taken away by a provision in a will. If your second husband wishes to adopt your daughter, a court

must first terminate the parental rights of the child's father.

TRICHOGRAMMA WASPS

The tiny *Trichogramma* wasp is the best-known of the egg parasites. It attacks over 200 pest species in all kinds of habitats, including the eggs of codling moth, bollworms, leafworms, fruitworms, cutworms, armyworms, cane borers, and almost all moth and butterfly eggs that hatch into the worm pests attacking orchard and field crops. The *Trichogramma* parasite lays its eggs in the eggs of the pests. When this occurs, development of the pest worm ceases, and the *Trichogramma* egg hatches into a larva which feeds on the immature pest inside the egg. The larva completes its development inside the pest egg, emerging as an adult. Depending on the size of the egg to be parasitized, the *Trichogramma* may deposit one or more eggs in it, and several larvae may develop inside the same egg. The life cycle from egg to adult varies according to temperature and moisture in the habitat; it may be one week or two months. Adult parasites are free-living, feeding on nectar and ovipositing [laying eggs] in the eggs of pests.

Trichogramma, as an egg parasite, is immediately effective in its action; it kills the pests before they can damage a plant. *Trichogramma* also affects suppression of all other life stages of the pest; a drastic reduction in the numbers of pest eggs leaves fewer insects to survive to adulthood, making their biological control by other insects that much more effective.

Trichogramma releases assist the natural buildup of beneficial insects in the field or garden, through immediate reduction of the eggs of the pest against which they are released, and through establishment of field populations of this important natural enemy. By adding these insects to the field or garden periodically, their presence can be assured when the pests arrive. When the parasites are released early in the season, the minor pest situations serve as their oviposition source, helping build *Trichogramma* populations to control the major pest situations as they develop. A sequence of releases throughout the season is preferable to just one large release. Results depend on timing of the releases and placement of the wasps where and when the moths are laying eggs. Releases should be begun as soon as the first moths are seen.

FLY PARASITES [*Tachinaephagus zealandicus*, *Spalangia endius*, *Muscidifurax raptor* & *M. zepherus*] [*Pachycrepoides vindemiae*] These parasites destroy immature fly maggots in feed lots, poultry ranches, dairies, animal pens and backyard fly breeding sites.

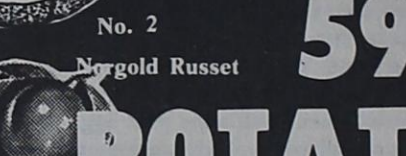
