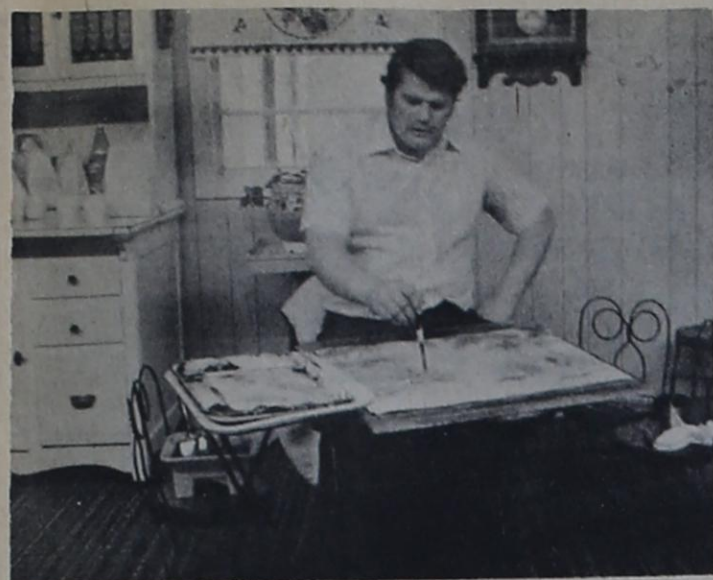

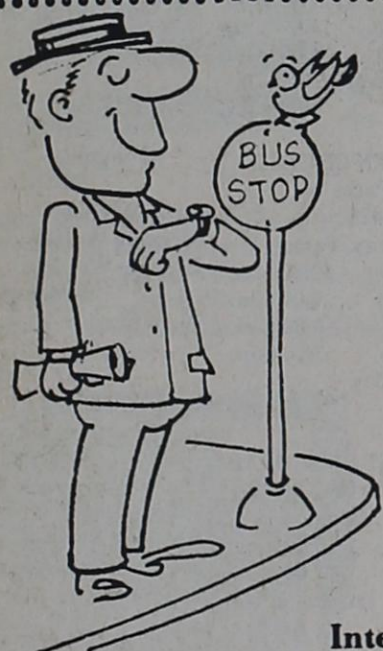

## Legislators take crack at helmet law

Helmetless motorcyclists are costing thousands of dollars and hundreds of lives, often their own, by refusing to wear helmets, the Texas Medical Association says. When heads start cracking on the pavement, the public often has to pay for treating long, expensive treatment. The study showed most riders are between 18-25 years of age. Costs of care ranged from more than \$192,000 to \$520 per case. These figures do not include rehabilitation, funeral, property damage and other expenses. Because of the safety and economic factors, several Texas legislators are sponsoring bills to once again require helmets for people age 18 or older. Legislators are using studies from Texas A&M, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), the National Traffic Safety Board and others that show helmets increase safety and cut health care costs. For instance, the DPS statistics show deaths more than doubled in the first four months after the mandatory helmet law was repealed in 1977. Motorcyclists usually provide the opposition to legislation requiring helmets. But having an accident changes their minds. The Texas A&M study said 75 percent of accident survivors started wearing helmets after their accidents.



The Annuals were handed out in Class Meetings following the assembly.

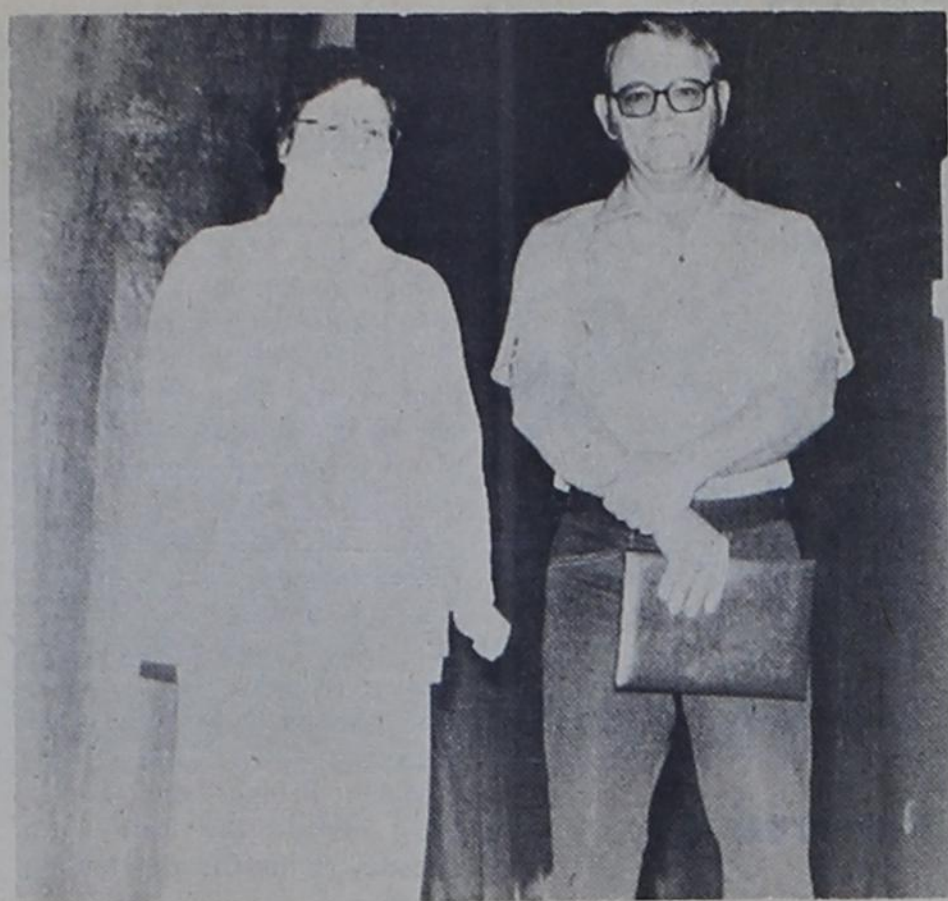

### Letter to the Editor

Dear Mr. Rhode:

I appreciated receiving the petition you sent opposing legislative steps which would implement the Panama Canal treaties which the Senate ratified last year. I believe by this time my opposition to the ratification of the treaties and the ultimate transfer of the Canal to Panama is well known. Had the House been able to vote on the treaties themselves last year, I would have voted against their going into effect. Of course, as you know, we did not get that opportunity. However, now that the treaties have been ratified and the Congress is being asked to implement them, the situation is even more complicated.

Many who have contacted me about this issue apparently have received the impression that the House could have blocked the treaties if it had voted to do so before March 31. This is not the case. The arrangements made at the time the treaties were ratified by the Senate specified that the treaties could not become effective earlier than October 1, 1979 unless the Congress passed implementing legislation before March 31. Had such legislation passed before that date the treaties could have become effective earlier. On the one vote that had been taken thus far in the 96th Congress affecting Panama, I voted with a majority of the House on March 29 to drop from the Foreign Military Assistance Bill all arms sales credits for Panama for fiscal year 1980. One of the unknowns in this situation is what would happen if enabling legislation is not passed and if Congress appropriates no funds to implement the treaties. An administration white paper alleges that the treaties will go

into effect on October 1 whether or not the Congress has passed implementing legislation by the date. In the meantime several standing committees in the House are busy examining all of the issues relating to implementing the treaties and I hope that the series of hearings that will be held will aid in clarifying what our options are and what approaches we can take. My position is that I am opposed to the treaties. I am strongly supporting HR 1958, a bill which would require approval by both House of Congress for any change in the status of U.S. property in Panama to occur and I am opposed to appropriating any funds to be given to the government of Panama.

I hope this summary gives you some sense of the current confused state of the issue and of my continued concern that our national interest be protected in this situation. After the several hearings provide more information, I will be in a much better position to discuss specifics and to indicate whether keeping the treaties from becoming effective is within the realm of possibility.

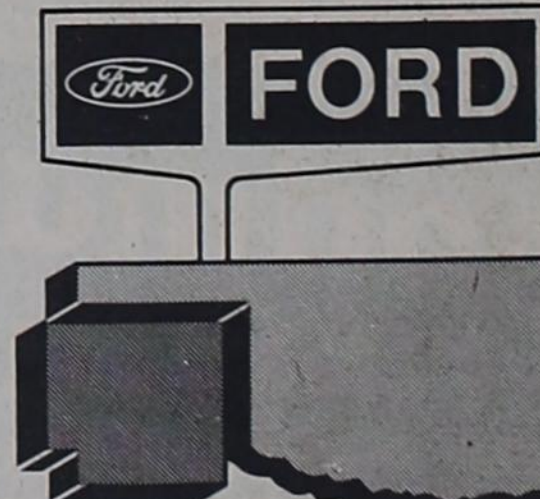

The bag and possession limits of all fish and the means and methods of taking fish shall be governed by the proclamations, rules, and regulations issued from time to time by the Parks and Wildlife Commission; provided however, as to the means and methods of taking fish, [a] no trotline in any form may be used and the use thereof is prohibited, [b] fishing from the rip rap on the dam shall be prohibited, and [c] any person fishing from or wearing a device commonly known as a "floater" shall also wear a United States Coast Guard approved type life preserver.

The penalty for violating the provisions of said Paragraph 1 aforesaid shall be the same as provided in the original Rules and Regulations, and all other provisions of such Rules and Regulations shall remain unchanged.

The effective date of this ordinance amending the Rules and Regulations of Greenbelt Lake shall be June 1, 1979, after proper publication thereof.

The Board of Directors of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority hereby finds and declares that the adoption of the aforesaid ordinance to amend the Rules and Regulations of the Greenbelt Lake is an urgent public necessity and creates an emergency, and that reading the

ordinance at more than this one meeting is waived, and that such ordinance shall immediately be adopted.

**Dog Obedience training**

Class began promptly at 7:30 with Bob Andis calling out the exercises which were done outside on the grass. Handlers put their charges through the "heel, sit, down, stand, stay, come front, and finish" with the ease of a pro.

Arriving from the Amarillo Obedience Club, Mary Beard and Kathy Berry took charge of the class for review and new techniques. Dividing into two groups the serpentine and figure eight were practiced with both handlers and dogs learning new associations at close quarters.

After the usual break the class continued inside the gym, working on the mats. Two members are receiving advanced beginner instruction while the regular session is carried on. Some interest has been shown that there will be another class held when this one graduates. Two lessons remain.

A very fine example of the rough-coated Collie is receiving her obedience training with the present class: Jo Co's Miss Shasta. Joanne Copelin is her

teacher. The Rough Collie of modern times probably dates back to the 1700 period in Scotland. The reason for the indefinite date being that until fairly recent times this was solely a working dog, pure in strain but usually without written pedigree.

When the first organized dog show was held in England in 1859 the Collie was one of the first breeds for which classes were provided.

Queen Victoria did much to promote the popularity of this breed after her visit to Balmoral in the early sixties.

The start of Collie popularity in the United States dates from about 1880. The Collie was one of the first pure-bred dogs imported to the United States when the sport of exhibiting by dog lovers began to take an organized interest.

The official standard for the Collie was approved in March 1959.

### 4-H winners named

High Plains 4-H'ers from 14 of the 20 counties in Extension District I today (April 28) qualified to compete in the state 4-H Roundup at College Station, June 5-6 by taking top honors in district competition.
