Three Donley County FFA members were part of approximately 1,200 Future Farmers of America from 91 high schools which competed into the West Texas State University agricultural judging contests April 7, on campus, and placed in the contests.

Three hundred and thirty five teams entered eight different categories, including crops, dairy cattle, dairy products, grasses, land judging, livestock, meats, 49, and range and pastures.

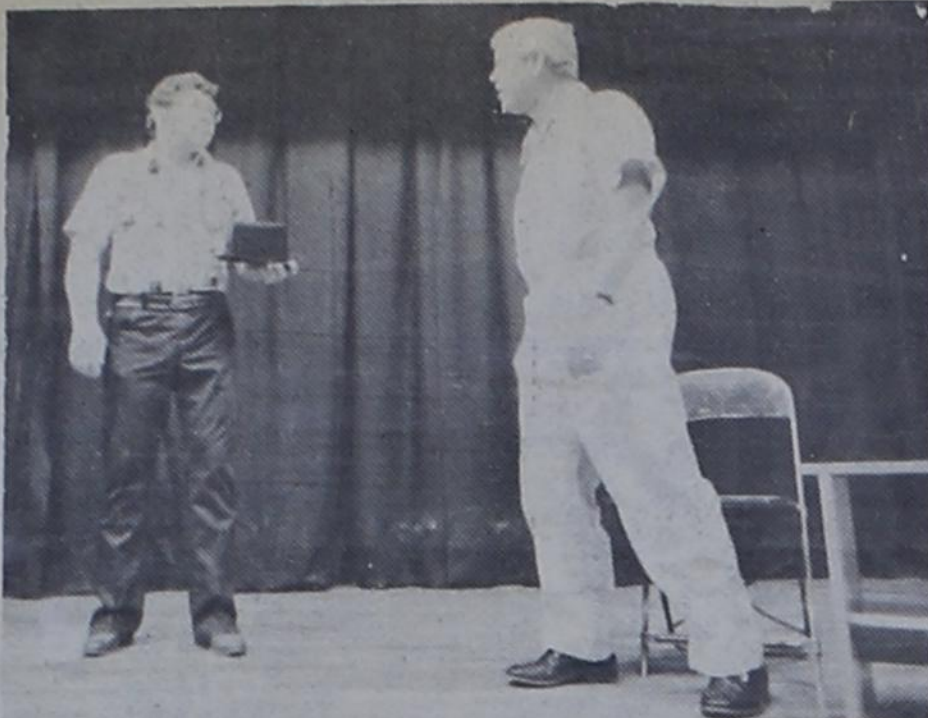

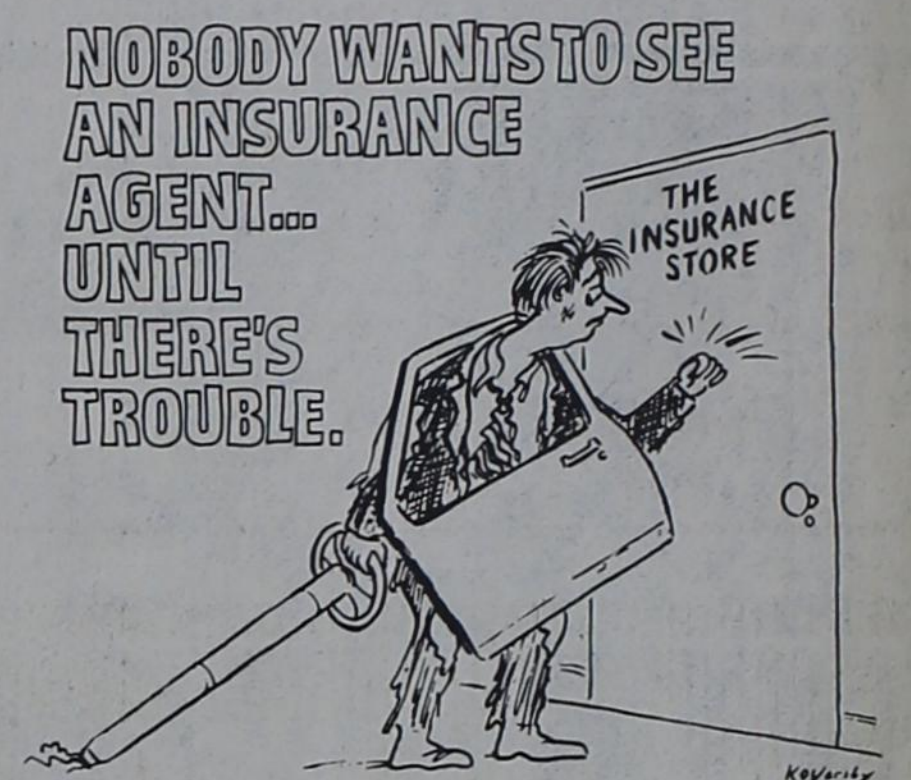

**Sales tax rebate for tornado victims**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said local one percent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year. Bullock said city allocations statewide for April totaled \$34.9 million, compared to \$20.1 million over the same 4-month period last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other tax permit

holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to some 916 Texas cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

For Clarendon and the surrounding towns and cities the figures read like this: Clarendon, \$3,111.62 for this period, for a total of \$18,753.32 for this year up 26%; Claude, \$881.34 for this period, for a total of \$4,806.46 for the year, up 5%; Groom, \$1,212.92 for this period, for a total of \$5,344.58 for the year up 39%.

At Howardwick it was \$1,068.39 for this period for a total of \$2,950.59 for the year and up 71%; Memphis, \$3,727.48 for this period for a total of \$23,572.48 up 2%; Pampa, \$71,748.33 for this period for a total of \$276,323.75 for the year up 18%; Shamrock, \$5,484.50 for this period for a total of \$25,023.94 for the year up 12%; Silvertown, \$831.30 for this period, for a total of \$4,260.50 for this year with a -17% and Wellington, \$2,848.11 for this period, for a total of \$17,590.25 for the year and up for 13%.

The Australian Cattle Dog Club of America's registry shows less than 800 of these purebreds in America. The breed is fully recognized and eligible for championships in Australia; Josh's parents both being champions in that country. Here in America these dogs are in the show case called Miscellaneous being shown in the ring with an Indefinite Listing Privilege number. The Dingo was crossed with the Welsh Heeler after failure with some of the domestic dogs by the pioneer settlers in Australia. The Dingo, according to National Geographic survey has the highest IQ of any breed so the breed's natural intelligence is an inheritance along with his ability to work the stock. Obedience training is vital for control to perfect his usefulness. The breed standards of Australia were written in 1906. A few dogs came to the United States in the 1930's but the main influx after World War II. This dog is an ever-alert animal, extremely intelligent, courageous and trustworthy with an implicit devotion to duty. Its loyalty and protective instincts make it a self-appointed guardian of the home and an eager companion for children. Next class will be held at the old high school gym, 7:30 p.m., April 23. **WASPs now V.A. eligible**

Veterans Administration Chief Max Cleland today extended a welcome to former Women Army Service Pilots, the latest group to join the ranks of the nation's veterans. Known as WASP, the group is composed of an estimated 900 women pilots who ferried military bombers, fighters and transport aircraft during World War II.

Former WASP, who were civilian employees of the military, became potentially eligible for certain VA benefits earlier this month when the Secretary of the Air Force certified that WASP service would be considered active military service for purposes of VA benefits.

The Air Force announced also that WASPs should send applications for honorable discharges to the Air Force Military Personnel Center (HQ AF MPC/MPCDOAL), Randolph AFB, Texas 78143.

The Air Force action followed 1977 legislation which granted former WASPs eligibility for veterans benefits on the condition that Department of Defense issue them honorable military discharges for service between September 10, 1942, and December 20, 1944. Their eligibility would extend to such VA benefits as compensation and pension payments and burial allowances.

The 1977 legislation was necessary because no legal means existed during World War II to enlist or commission women as military pilots.

Cleland said he has been advised by the Air Force that processing of discharge applications from former WASP pilots will require about two months, following which successful applicants may apply for VA benefits.

He said benefits may not be paid to former WASP members prior to November 23, 1977, the date of enactment of the legislation that paved the way for their veteran status. This would preclude payment for such WWII programs as education benefits which have expired for veterans of that period.

The VA Administrator said regulations covering application for VA benefits by former WASPs are now being drawn up and will be forwarded to VA regional offices in each state as soon as possible.
