West Texas Utilities to install special meters and recorders

West Texas Utilities Co. electric demand by each cuswithin the next few weeks will tomer. install special meters and recorders for about 350 customers the questionnaires and the study of electric usage patterns in its service area.

The 350 customers comprise a random sample chosen by computer from throughout the WTU system. Only residential and small commercial customers are included.

"These are the two classes of customers we know very little about, so far as their electric demand habits are concerned." said Darwin Breeding, manager of WTU's Rate and Regulations Department.

Breeding emphasized that the information provided by the special recording devices will have no effect on the individual customer's electric bill, but will provide valuable information about the entire system which eventually could benefit all

This data will improve our decision making." he said, especially in rate structuring. marketing, engineering analysis, and corporate and systems

Probably the most important use of the research results will be in electric loan analysis for future rate structuring. Breeding said President Carter's new Energy Act had made it 'absolutely mandatory" that utility companies take the initiative to form load research programs that will provide issues as well as information to be utilized in the regulatory process. However, WTU's plans were underway before the Energy Act was pased.

State regulatory bodies, including the Public Utility Commission of Texas, also are requiring load research date

from electric companies. The first step in WTU's program will be to make personal contact with each of the 350 customers and to have them fill out questionnaires. The questionnaires will be administered by personnel from

WTU's Customer Technical Services Department, headed by Bill Baxter. The questions will concern such basic facts as size of house, type and number of electric appliances, amount of ceiling insulation, and number of persons in the family.

The special equipment then will be installed at the site of the old meter, and the information recorded by magnetic tapes will provide specific details on

"With the information from accurate load data from the tapes, we'll have a better knowledge of our customers' electric use patterns," Breeding said. 'lt's possible that we can use this information to improve the utilization of our generation and transmission facilities, and this could be beneficial to all customers.

"For one thing, it will enable us to better define the loads that cause our system peak demands," he said. "This can help us decide such things as the feasibility of time-of-day rates for these customer clas-

Time-of-day rates for residential customers are under study by the Texas PUC, and already have been implemented on a limited basis by some companies in the state.

The initial phase of the load research program will last at least a year, and the project likely will continue as a permanent program, involving different types of customer samples. Also initiating such programs are WTU's three sister companies in the Central and South System. The four companies are sharing computer facilities in order to reduce the cost of the operation.

Traditionally cast as a villian, the coyote stands condemned of killing cattle, sheep, goats, chickens and desirable wildlife. However, studies have shown that the coyote is an effective rodent and rabbit control which helps the landowner harvest and store more food and produce

more meat for the table. The abundance or scarcity of the coyote's natural food such as rabbits, rodents, and other prey determines how frequently a coyote will visit a chicken house

or raid a sheep pen. When times are hard, visits by the coyote may be often, but during times of high rabbit or rat populations, the coyote pays

poisoned, shot, runover, chased and harassed for many years. While this attempt to eradicate the coyote has failed to reduce his numbers, it has reduced the old, weak, and foolish from his ranks resulting in a swift and
