### A farm census proclamation

Because the economy of Donley County benefits greatly from farming, the county's presiding officials bring to the attention of all county residents the 1978 Census of Agriculture.

Whereas, the farm census is the source of accurate information on the number of farms and farm operators in our county;

Whereas, it is also the source of information about our basic agricultural assets;

Whereas, it also provides accurate data on farm sales as well as farm production costs in our county;

And whereas, many business decisions made by the county's farmers, as well as those who do business with them, depend heavily upon accurate bench-Agriculture;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the county's presiding officials urge all farm operators to fill out and return promptly the farm census questionnaires they have received in the mail and thus help to make the 1978 census the most successful in a series of 21 farm census counts which began in 1840.

# County proclamation supports 1978 Census of Agriculture

The proclamation urges the county's farm operators to complete the census questionnaires accurately and return them promptly to the Census Bureau. Similar proclamations are being issued by officials of other counties and state governors in support of the census, the 21st in a series which began

The current census will update the findings of the most recent farm census taken in 1974. Census figures are needed in making sound economic decisions. Many National and State programs affecting agriculture are designed or allocated on the basis of census data. For example, funds for extension work, research, soil conservation, and other services are based on census data. The more dependent a county is on agricultural income, the more vital census information becomes, Census Bureau officials





For instance, reservoirs at the Tri-Cities storage field near Athens, Tex., are full when they reach a pressure of 3,500 pounds per square inch, the pressure exerted by the original oil and gas in place before the reservoir was first drained.

The injection operation might be compared to inflating a flat tire. As one begins pumping air into the tire, it is an easy process because the tire's St. Andrews Area deterioration of grade. internal pressure is very low. But as the pressure builds inside, pumping in more air takes more effort.

Likewise with gas injection. Injecting begins into a wellspace filled only with "cushion gas" -that amount of gas which continually stays within the storage space. At first the compressors pumping the gas underground work very little, but the higher the pressure in the reservoir becomes, the harder the engines must work to fill the space to capacity.

When cold weather comes and gas needs to be withdrawn, the full storage reservoir operates like a balloon that is filled to the bursting point. When the knot is untied, the first air whooshes out; but as the balloon begins collapsing, expulsion slows. The latter is necessary because large quantities of gas are puchased under "take or pay" contracts, where the buyer guarantees payment for the gas even if it is not needed for immediate usage. Efficient storage operations like Lone Star's enable the company to enter into such contracts which help hold down the cost of gas. At the same time, storage assures dependable, safe service to customers.

Drive at a steady speed and save gasoline, advises Pat Seaman, housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Varying highway speeds by only five miles per hour can cost about 1.3 miles per gallon, Ms. Seaman explains.

The Eyes Have It: Protein

Geothermal researchers are convinced that heat from hot water deep inside the earth could be used to dry waste products from potato crop processings (such as the eyes and peelings) or dewater the end-ofprocess slurries, to convert these wastes into practical high protein food materials.

The resulting product would be suitable as a food for animals, fish or even humans in protein-deficient parts of the world.

But that's just a part of the newly emerging geothermal picture. With the technical and engineering support from the EG&G Idaho division of EG&G Inc., a private research and technical services organization, the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is also exploring the geothermal potential for reducing U.S. dependence on foreign oil and gas.

Under construction at a DOE site in Idaho is a \$6.68 million Thermal Loop Facility that will use geothermal water to drive a \$970,500 turbine generator system. In still another project, test equipment developed

surements Group's Los Alamos Operation is probing the feasibilities of extracting energy from hot dry rock of the earth's crust, in a New Mexico demonstration program being conducted by DOE's Los Alamos Scienti-

fic Laboratory (LASL). This program is based on the concept that man can

create his own geothermal reservoirs by circulating water through hot dry rock whose energy would be used to generate electricity.

Scientists plan to start with a comparatively small thermal heat extraction experiment, then scale up to a larger system, and then possibly to a 100 Megawatt experiment requiring drilling to a depth of 12,500 feet where hot rock temperatures can rise to 250 degrees C. Such a system could conceivably generate about 10 million watts of electricity, or enough to meet the requirements of a medium-sized city.

tigated in Idaho would convert dried potato waste into a high-protein food for animals and fish. Later, the processing system will be

used with sugar beet pulp and alfalfa.

Potato leftovers are now used to fertilize land and feed livestock, but the leftovers are too heavy to be transported far. Dried potato waste weighs only onetenth of its liquid form, making it easier to ship and to market more profitably. Dried potato waste could sell for around \$300 a ton.

The DOE/EG&G program is part of a concerted effort to find other profitable uses for moderate and low temperature geothermal resources.

The project has the potential for stimulating widespread use of geothermal energy. Geothermal waters and rocks have remained virtually untapped as an
