The award winners, selected from a field of 172 nominees, included Genevieve (Mrs. T.M.) Caldwell of Clarendon.

Keynote speaker at luncheon was Corinne "Lindy" (Mrs. Hale) Boggs, US Congresswoman from Louisiana, who spoke on women and volunteer service.

More than 600 women were present at the luncheon held on the WTSU campus.

Al Morrah Shrine Club sponsoring "Give the Gift of Life" blood drive

"Give the Gift of Life" that's the cry of Clarendon's Al Morrah Shrine Club members.

Club President, Emmett O. Simmons is urging all residents of Donley County to participate in a blood drive scheduled for May 2, 1979. The drive will begin at 2 p.m. and continue to 6 p.m. Clarendon College will be the drive location.

Donley County Shriners hope that those giving blood will designate the Shrine as the recipient of their blood. Shriners support 21 hospitals for burned and crippled children and blood is often in short supply.

Should donors prefer, they have the option of not specifying where their blood will be used. Should that option be their choice, they will receive an insurance policy guaranteeing blood should their family need it at anytime within one year.

Clarendon Shriners suggest that entire families turn out for the drive and that all but one member designate the Shrine as the recipient. The family member not designating the Shrine would be the owner of the family blood insurance policy.

The technical aspects of the May 2 blood drive will be handled by personnel from Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Amarillo.

Al Morrah Shrine Club is a unit of Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo.

Club members hope that all

eligible blood donors will participate in the upcoming drive.

Census work begins

Workers for the U.S. Census Bureau will begin compiling house-by-house address lists within the next few days in Donley County.

"The purpose of the address listing program is to compile a complete list of households in the county for use next year when the 1980 census questionnaire will be mailed to each residence," said Ms. Kelly Epperson, census office manager in Dallas.

Census workers will be walking or driving on streets and roads in the county to prepare the address lists. They will be

knocking on doors and asking householders for a correct mailing address.

Ms. Epperson said residents can identify the census employees by a red, white, and blue census identification card which all will carry. Census workers also will carry 11" by 16" books, or addresses registers, in which the addresses are written. These address lists will play a vital role in the nationwide 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaires. Census Day is April 1, 1980.

Bronchos win district in track

The Clarendon Broncho track team put together an impressive combination of depth and "overall competitiveness" to capture the 2-A district track championship Wednesday in Shamrock. The Bronchos built a 34 1/2 point lead from the field events going into the finals. They battled the Wellington Skyrockets point for point in the running finals to take a 149 1/2-142 point victory. The Bronchos depth in each event seemed to be the margin of victory. Coach Allen stated, "Our young men all gave outstanding performances. I can't say enough about how competitive they were. We really hurt Wellington when we went 2-4-5 in the high hurdles, 1-3 in the 100 yd. dash, and 2-3 in the 220 yd. dash. They weren't planning on that. We ran Wade Porter in the mile and he got up there and placed 4th for us to go along with William Thomson's 1st - so we outpointed them 14-6 in that race. This is what we had wanted all season - to win district."

The Bronchos qualified 7 individuals in 8 events and the 440 yd. relay team to the regional meet in Odessa April 27-28. Those earning regional

berths were Mickey McGuire in the shot and discus, Keith Floyd and Lance Thornberry in the high jump, 440 relay (Billy Gardener, Dean Hawkins, Gary McClellan, and Bobby Weat-

herthon), Gary Thomas in the 1200 yd. dash, Billy Gardner in the 220, and William Thompson in the Mile.

Dog Obedience training

Class time began early with warm-up exercises on the grass at the old high school gym conducted by Bob Andis, with sixteen participating handlers and their dogs.

The group reconvened inside the gym dividing into two groups for review practice. Mary Beard with her Irish Setter Bonnie acted as instructor from the Amarillo Obedience Club with Kathy Berry assisting with the beginner section.

With three class sessions remaining enthusiasm runs high when everyone claims he has the best dog in the class. Graduation night might tell part of the story when a judge will grade each individual and their dog.

Ranking second in registration and breed popularity only to the Poodle, the DOBERMAN PINSCHER has a fine representation in this obedience class. A family of Dobermans are owned and being trained by members of the Bell and Wood families.

Mother-daughter; Father and son are enthusiastic participants in this undertaking. Beautiful specimens of this breed are represented by Mrs. Paul Bell with Bell; Mrs. Farris Wood with Swatson; Mr. Guy Bell with Dutches and Mrs. Guy Bell with Fritz. Fritz is out of Dutches by Sir; Bell is out of Belle Star by Swatson. Their handlers are related, Vada Wood being the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bell. They are certainly a handsome and exciting addition to this class. One other Doberman is enrolled in the class: Dobie being trained by Doug Hawkins who is a student in the local school.

The breed originated in Apolda, in Thuringen, German around 1890, being officially recognized in 1900. It's predecessors were the old short-haired shepherd-dog stock with the Rottweiler, Black and Tan Terrier and smooth-haired German Pinscher. From the beginning it has been a working dog devoted to serving mankind. At first it's main purpose was to guard the home but it's qualities of intelligence and ability to absorb training brought it into demand for

police and as a war dog.

The official standard as to general conformation and appearance, height, temperament, head, eyes, teeth, ears, neck, body, tail, forequarters, hindquarters, gait, coat, color and markings were approved October 14, 1969.

SHOPLIFTING FACTS

The National Retail Merchants Association found these facts about shoplifting: --Many people don't see shoplifting as a crime and don't believe they will be punished--but hundreds are every day. --One out of 12 shoppers is a shoplifter. --Shoplifters come from all income levels and are both male and female, but women shoplift more than men. --The average shoplifter is female and 14-18 years old with a family income over \$10,000.

WHY SHOPLIFT

Reasons for shoplifting are as varied as shoplifters, Miss Taylor continues.

Compulsion, desire for attention, kicks, peer acceptance, revenge against the establishment, drug habit support, psychological problems, or because they don't think it's a crime are some reasons.

Need is rarely an actual reason for shoplifting, the specialist points out.

In fact, 99 percent of shoplifters have more than enough money on them to pay for the stolen item.

OTHER CRIMES

However, shoplifting is not the only crime. Removing labels or switching price tags is also theft.

In addition, buying shoplifted or stolen items from friends is against the law--possession of stolen goods, too, is a crime, she adds.

WHO'S RESPONSIBLE

Parents of minors are responsible for shoplifted goods.

Also, when a teen is over 16 years old, he can be arrested, prosecuted and have the crime on his permanent record.

Following the film, we learned that the High Plains Eyebank had received nine eyes this month, fifty-four eyes since July, 1978, and been involved in 396 transplants since it was founded in 1961. They currently have 9795 donor cards on file.

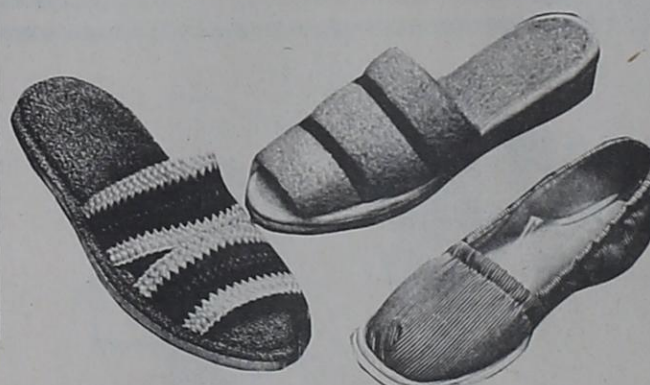

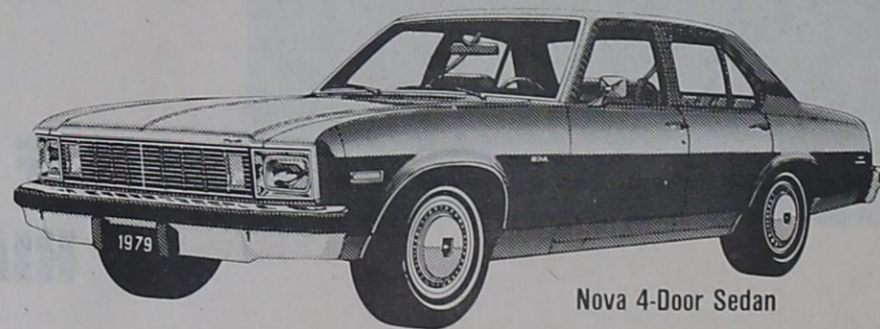

News from State Comptroller office

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday ordered tax relief measures for tornado victims in the Wichita Falls and Vernon area.

"Residents in that tornado-ravaged area are too busy pulling their lives together to have to worry about meeting state tax deadlines," Bullock said.

"Many businesses simply do not have records because they were destroyed in the devastation that hit on Tuesday and they need all the help and assistance we can give."

Bullock said he intends to waive any penalty or interest payment on late tax returns from businesses and individuals affected by the tornado.

He also said that in the coming weeks his office resources will be made available to those merchants who want to reconstruct business and tax records from data on file in Austin.

Bullock also advised Wichita Falls-Vernon residents to disregard computer-generated tax delinquency notices until recovery is made in the area.

"The last thing someone who lost a home or a loved one needs now is a dun notice from the tax collector. These folks deserve the biggest break they can get and I'm going to give it to them," he said.

A special tax task force was activated in the Comptroller's Office to provide continuing help to tornado victims on tax-related problems and that representatives of the Comptroller's Office would be in the tornado-damaged area in the coming weeks.

Laura Hill pen and ink artist

Laura Hill, fresh young talent with the time-honored pen and ink medium is making a name for herself while she is still in school.

A native of the Canadian vicinity and a freshman student at Clarendon College, Laura is an ardent outdoor enthusiast who does her art work 'when the mood hits me' in true artistic style.

By her own admission some of her earlier classroom time was taken up with 'doodling' when it should have been used with a text book. By the time she was 13 or 14 years old she was offered \$10 for one of her pen and inks, if she would do an old barn scene. So it was that Laura's first work was commissioned and she earned the \$10.

Many of the scenes she portrays so vividly on paper come entirely from her mind while others are remembered times and things which she recalls. She also does pen and inks from photographs and recently she completed one for her father. It is an abandoned country schoolhouse he once attended.

Laura is a detailist and this is one of the qualities which set her work apart. Links of a chain, a frayed rope and delicate grass stems, barbed wire and sturdy fence posts. Knowing her subject is evident in all the pictures she does for the same nimble hands which wield the pen also can rope a calf and control the reins of an arena horse.

Her growing up years had lots of happy times spent alone roaming over the country side in out-of-the-way places. These expeditions were usually profitable for she is a collector of Indian artifacts and generally she found at least a fragment of something. As a matter of fact a fragment was what started the collecting in the first place.

On an outing with her family once she suffered a cut on her foot from a sharp object which had to be pulled out. Later her father studied the retrieved object and discovered it was the point of an arrowhead. The incident had such an impression it launched Laura on her hobby of collecting.

Describing herself as a solitary person Laura Hill is content to spend extended lengths of time alone or with a girl friend who, like Laura, enjoys horseback riding and camping out.

She prefers working alone in her room at home, and the time it takes to complete a pen and ink depends on her mood. If it is going well she is stimulated and may work long hours and finish at one sitting. On the other hand at some point if she has difficulty putting her mental view on paper she may become disenchanted with her subject and lay it aside for days, weeks, or even months. There are times when she does several quickly and at other times the

urge to create is dormant for a while.

Talent comes naturally to Laura as does the creative dexterity for her family members have this same gift. Her grandfather, Vance Stickle, is a cabinet maker and in many of the lovely old homes in Canadian are examples of his art. In the newer ones his cabinets and other work testify to his years of crafting.

Laura Hill is a member of a pioneer family in Canadian. C.C. Stickle, first of the clan to come to Texas from Virginia brought his fathers profession, funeral directing, with him and Laura's father who married into the family is continuing the business.

The early Stickleys were

ranchers and large land owners also and Laura inherited their love of the land and spaces around Canadian, which to her is an ideal place to live and raise a family.

Laura finished Canadian High School in 1976 and entered Clarendon College as a Freshman student in 1978. She took art under the direction of Elizabeth Ellerbrook for the fall semester and Mrs. Ellerbrook encouraged her to continue her art work. She had some of her pen and ink drawings in the Bob Marris Gallery, in Amarillo and they sold during Christmas time to a purchaser from California.

She is currently working to build up her stock and sells most of her things locally as she finishes them.

Laura is studying art under James Ivey Edwards this semester and loves it, says she would not miss a class. Edwards has encouraged her to continue her career in art. Other activities in which she is involved are the annual staff, and the drama production. She is a director of the Sportsman Club and lives on campus in the dorm.

Laura Hill is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Hill, of Canadian, one of four children. She has an older brother and two sister, one younger than she is. Her youthful years were spent riding horses, rodeoing, hiking and generally enjoying the life she lived. The future at this time is just indefinite-according to Laura.

Texas and tourism

Amarillo and the area ranked 9 in the top 40 cities in Texas last year in tourism for the state while the panhandle area itself came in last with the number of tourists who visited here.

Panhandle tourist numbers are figured at 2.1 million while the Dallas-Ft. Worth-Wichita Falls and Lake Texoma area ranked highest with 84 million persons who visited.

Total spending from auto tourism in the state amounted to \$3,313,054,000 for 1978 and amounts were divided as follows: per dollar 25.6c for food; 24.5c for lodging; 21.2 auto expense; 9.3c for entertainment and 19.4c for other expenditures.

A total of 25.8 million out-of-state visitors -- 11 percent more than 1977's total -- visited Texas last year, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation reported.

The department's authoritative 1978 Report of the Texas Visitor Industry said visitors from every state and dozens of foreign countries spend \$4.3 billion while here, about one percent more than in 1977.

department's Travel and Information Division, said. Spending did not keep pace with the increase in total visitors because automobile travelers spent less per person than in previous years.

"The tourist who comes here in private vehicle is just not spending as much," Taylor commented. "This could be partially attributed to the fact that more people seem to be vacationing together and splitting their expenses."

"Also," he continued, "they're not driving as many miles, an indication that they are taking less fuel-consuming routes to their destinations. Travel counselors staffing 11 tourist bureaus assisted more than 2 million people last year in planning their tours in Texas."

California woman wheelchair athletic

'Knowing you're not alone, knowing there are others like you makes it 100 times easier.' Greene has a son who suffered similar injuries and is interested in the young California woman's work.

The following article was written about her at Huntington Park, Calif.

Like many 23-year-olds, Marian Schooling enjoys tennis, water skiing and a good jog once in a while.

Also like most young people her age, she is busy preparing for the career she will launch after her graduation from college this spring. She intends to become a health educator.

But Miss Schooling is paralyzed from just below the arms due to injuries from an automobile accident four years ago. She achieves her athletic feats with slight alterations of her sports.

For Tennis, the court is shortened and the ball is permitted two bounces instead of one. (There are no arms on her wheelchair to get in the way of the racket.)

Miss Schooling, who played tennis competitively before her accident, recently won a trophy in a wheelchair tournament.

For water skiing, she sits on a knee board. And her version of jogging is wheeling her chair a mile or more around the park.

Why all this activity despite the difficulties involved for her?

"I was always athletic," she explains. "I didn't see any reason not to be involved just because I was in a wheelchair. I wasn't going to stop doing the things I enjoyed." Despite her traumatic experience in an automobile, she knew driving was the ticket to getting out in the world without having to

depend on others. She has a car equipped with hand controls and a hand brake.

"The only thing that hinders me is having steps someplace," she says.

A major problem was getting to the car from the two-story house where she lives with her parents and two sisters. Her solution was to install an elevator.

She wheels out to a porch, rides the elevator down to the car, wheels over and slides onto the seat. She then collapses her wheelchair and neatly pulls it into the backseat. It's no simple task.

Her one concern about the outside elevator was the noise it created. She didn't like coming home late at night because she feared the sound of the elevator might disturb the neighbors.

She discovered the reverse was true. She installed a new, quieter model but found her neighbors worried about her until they heard the elevator and knew she was home safely.

When Miss Schooling received an internship in health education with the Red Cross in Washington, D.C., last summer, she decided she wanted to take her car. No one was available to drive her, so she made the cross-country journey by herself.

She had some car trouble on the trip, but found people more than willing to give her a hand.

Miss Schooling does a lot of public speaking and is active in a number of organizations, including the Los Angeles County Commission on Youth and the student government at California State University at Long Beach.

"A lot of people see the wheelchair and don't see me as a person. This is one of the biggest things I try to impart," she says of her speaking engagements.

"The main thing," she adds, "is that people who are handicapped or impaired have the same desires and drives as anyone."

Miss Schooling uses what she has learned about dealing with the world from a wheelchair to help others with the same problem.

As a volunteer at a nearby hospital, she works mainly with women providing moral support and instruction in such basics as how to make a bed or put on a pillow case. She also advises them on leisure skills - social adjustment, dating, even such valuable hints as calling ahead to a theater to see if it can accommodate wheelchairs.

"I talk about how I felt," she explains. "Knowing you're not the first one going through it helps."

"I had so much emotional support from my family and friends. Knowing you're not alone, knowing there are others like you makes it 100 times easier."
