Leonard Selvidge named Dean of Students

Leonard Selvidge, after a hiatus of exactly four years returned to Clarendon College on July 1, as Dean of Student Life.

Four years ago Selvidge left the college to enter private business and has now returned to a familiar role, working with young persons, one he has found most rewarding in his career years.

Graduating from Southwestern University in Weatherford, Okla. with a bachelor of science in Social Studies and Physical Education and a masters in Guidance and Counseling, Selvidge began his career in education in Spearman in 1958 as assistant coach for football and basketball. He went to Hollis, Okla. after one year and was Athletic Director and coach through the spring semester of 1964.

That same fall, 1964, Leonard, (Tex), Selvidge came to Clarendon High School as the county counselor. He has made Clarendon his home since that time.

When Clarendon College made the move to new facilities at the present site, Tex went with them as registrar and admissions counselor. He added Dean of Students to his other duties at the college in 1970 and worked in that capacity until he left the college on July 1, 1975, and bought John's clothing store.

With his acceptance of the position of Dean of Student life, effective this past July 1, 1979, Selvidge returns to familiar surroundings and the environ-

ment and challenge he likes, working with persons in education.

Tex Selvidge was born in Bismarck, Ark. and by the time he was ready to enter first Grade in Denton, Tex. and entered Stinnett schools in 1948 and was graduated from there in 1954. For two years he was a high school drop out before reentering high school and continuing on to college. During these years Selvidge was interested in sports and he played football with the rattlers.

After completing high school Tex went to Junior College at ranger before transferring to Weatherford, Okla.

Selvidge likes any field of endeavor where he is able to perform a service for someone. He is presently serving his second elected term of office as mayor of Clarendon, a community service. On weekends he is a salesman at Chamberlain Moler Co. with the person to person situation he likes.

During his four years in private business, besides meeting customers and making new friends an added bonus was the chance to work in the store with Nancy, his wife. It was an arrangement they both enjoyed.

Of his return to the college Selvidge said, "I look forward to being part of the continuing expansion of Clarendon College."

Possibility of saving '85 million in tax spending

The possibility of saving as much as \$85 million in tax spending will be investigated by Congressman Jack Hightower during a whirlwind inspection tour of some of the American broadcasting facilities in Europe next week.

Mr. Hightower, a member of the Appropriations Subcommittee on the Departments of state and Agriculture, was asked to make the inspection firsthand by Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.), Chairman of the full Appropriations Committee.

"We believe there may be a chance to make a substantial savings to the taxpayers if Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty Headquarters can be moved back to the United States," Hightower said. This possibility was explored during hearings of the committee earlier this

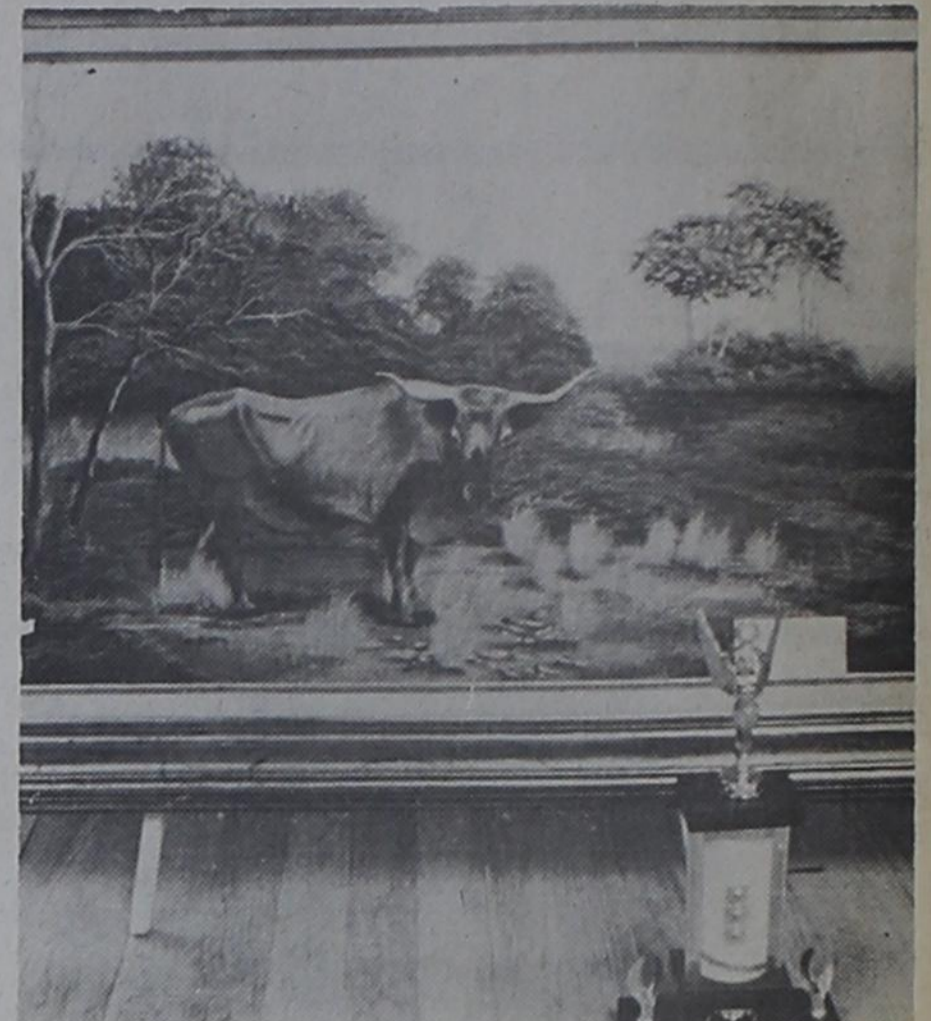

Ashtola Community center adds to fund

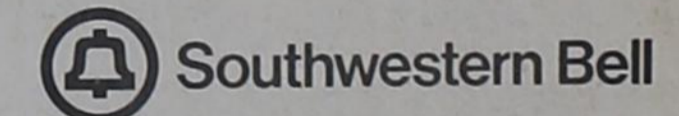

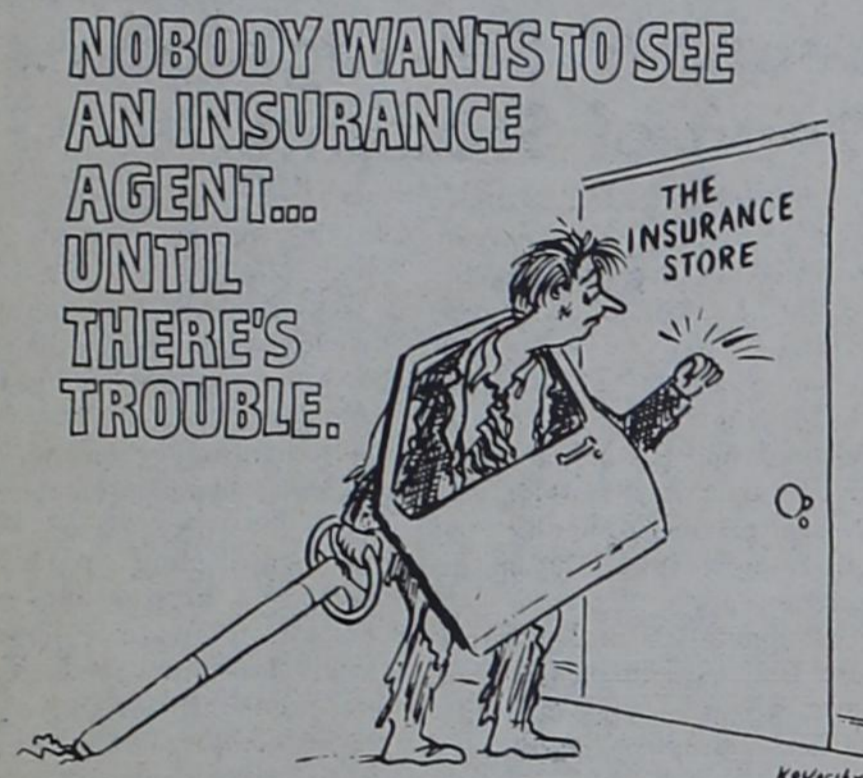

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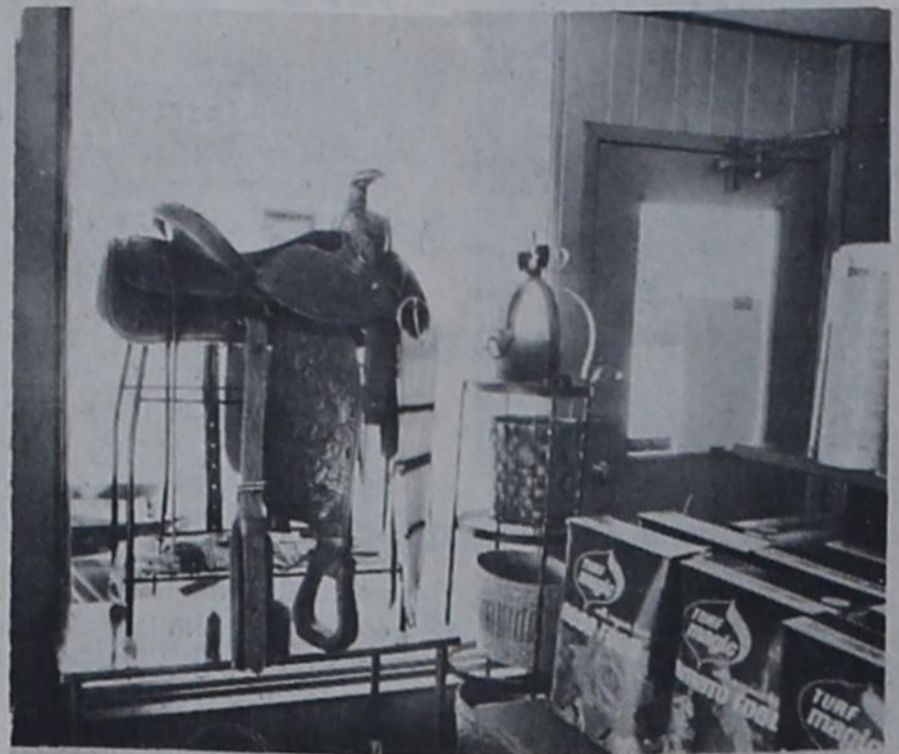

Bagworm

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arborvitae, cedar, and other shrubs is being found now, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be matched carefully at this time of year especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevin, Malathion or Toxaphene. The insecticide applications should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested

Damaging infestations of cotton fleahoppers

Damaging infestations of cotton fleahoppers are being found in some fields of cotton in the early square stage according to county Extension Agent Ronald Gooch. The adult fleahopper is

about 1/8 inch long and is pale green. Both adults and nymphs suck sap from the tender portion of the plant, including the small squares. The injury may be characterized by exces-

sive blasting and shedding of small squares. Squares are subject to damage from the pinhead size through the 3/4 grown size.

Base insecticidal application

on number of fleahoppers present as well as plant fruiting rate and small square loss. During the first 3 weeks of squaring, 25-30 cotton fleahoppers per 100 terminals combined with excessive square loss is considered damaging as plants increase in size and fruit load, larger fleahopper populations may be tolerated with out yield reduction.

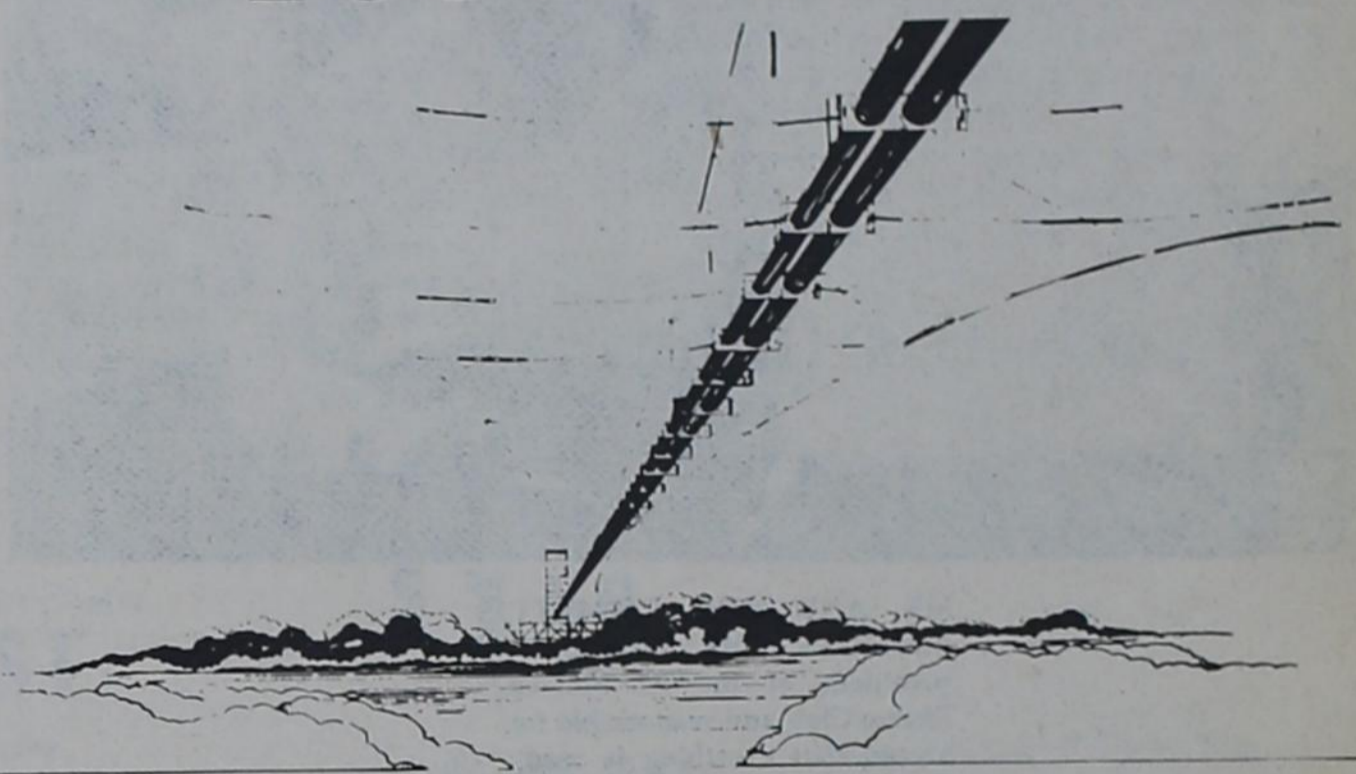

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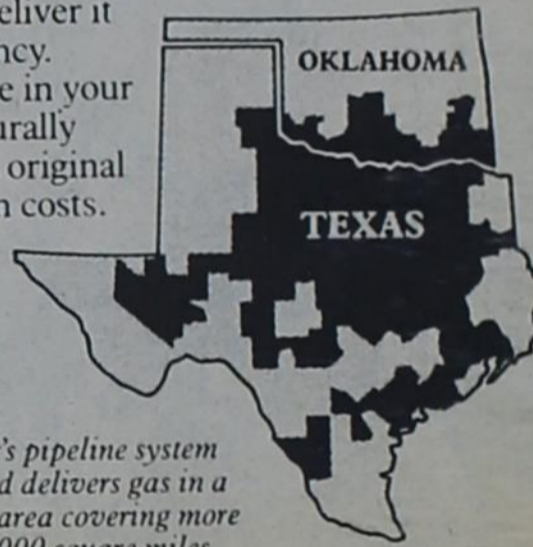



From the Attorney General of Texas

Farmers who purchase interstate natural gas for agricultural purposes will not be eligible for priority use requirements unless they file a request with their local distributors by July 15, Texas Attorney General Mark White said Monday.

White said many High Plains farmers may not be aware that they need to request Priority 2 treatment by that date.

The Priority 2 classification entitles all essential agricultural users of natural gas purchased from interstate pipelines to 100 per cent of their current requirements.

The new classification system is part of a natural gas curtailment plan adopted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The plan is scheduled to go into effect November 1.

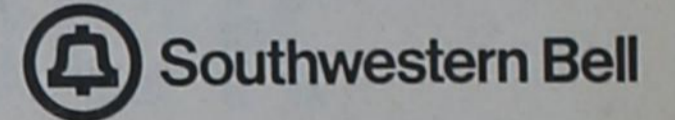
White said that after users file their requests with their local distributors, the requests will be reviewed and forwarded to their interstate pipeline suppliers by July 30.

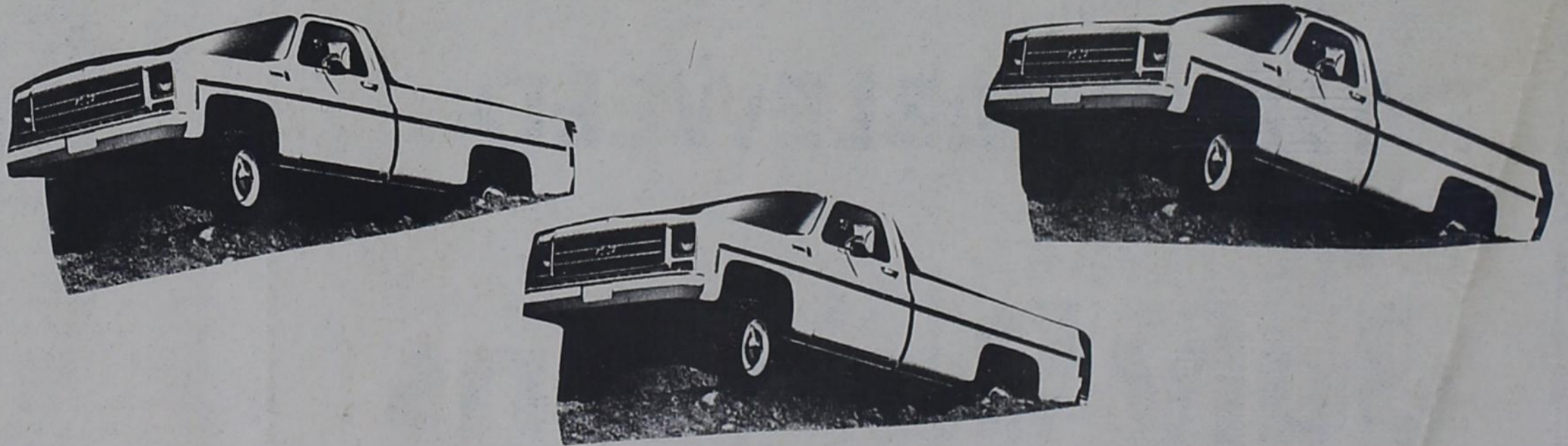

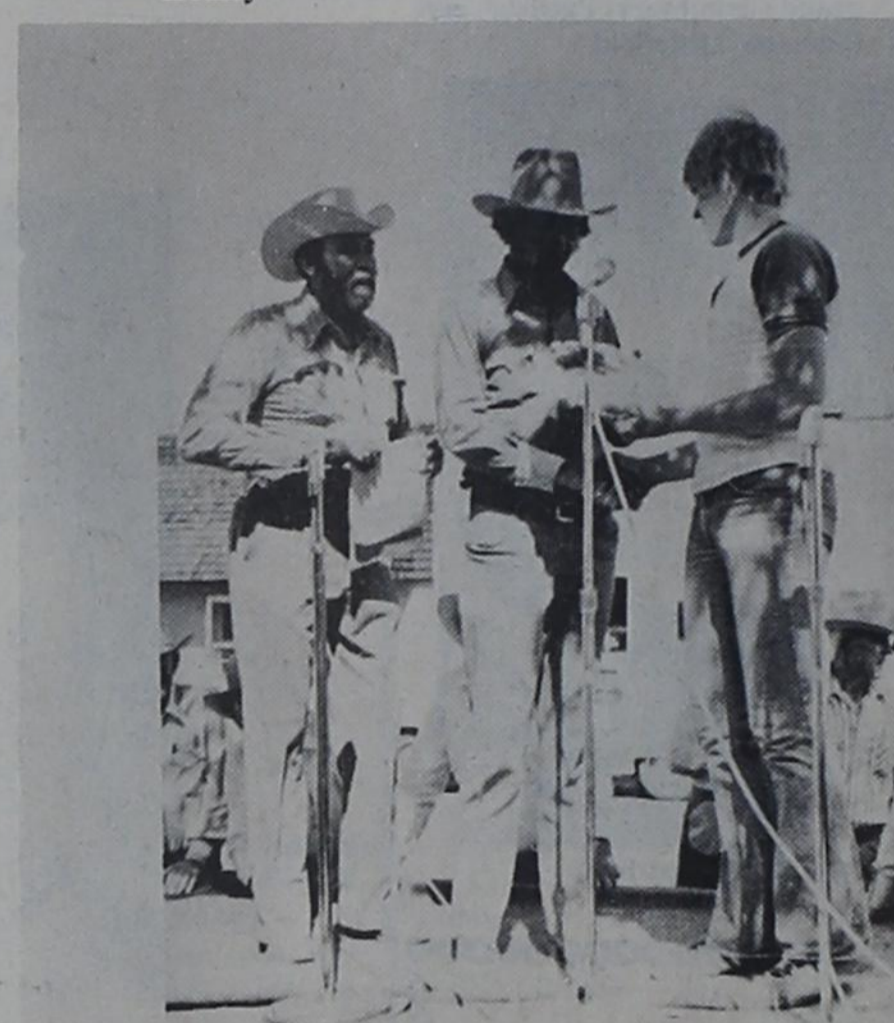
From the recipe files of Naomi Green come a trio of grape frozen desserts for you to enjoy during the hot ol'-summertime.

Grape Ice Cream (freezer) 3c. sugar, 4 c. fresh lemon juice, 1 large bottle grape juice, 1/2 pt. whipping cream, 1 large can evaporated milk.

Fill freezer with whole milk to make 1 gallon, in addition to grape mixture and freeze according to ice cream freezer directions.

Grape Sherbert 2 c. plain yogurt, 1 small can concentrated grape juice, 2 t. vanilla. Combine all ingredients, mix well and place in refrigerator tray to freeze.

Grape Cream Sherbert 1 c. thick sour cream, 1 c. milk, 1/4c. lemon juice, 1 1/2 c. sugar, 1 egg well beaten, 1 c. grape juice. Combine all ingredients in bowl, beat until sugar is dissolved. Pour in 2 refrigerator trays and freeze till firm. Turn mixture out into chilled summer bowl and beat with rotary beatewr until fruffy smooth but not melted. Return to trays and freeze till firm. Makes six servings.

New car prices less than in previous years

Medical Center accepted TNHA

The Medical Center Nursing Home, Highway 70, North, Clarendon, was accepted as a member of the Texas Nursing Home Association by the TNHA Board of Directors at their June meeting in Austin. Billy Ray Johnston will serve as the representative of the home in TNHA activities.

By becoming a member of the Texas Nursing Home Association, the facility has agreed to abide by the TNHA Code of Ethics and to join the state organization in its efforts to raise nursing home standards and to improve patient care in Texas.

TNHA is the professional association of licensed nursing home facilities in Texas. Its Membership is made up of proprietary and non-proprietary homes. All members of TNHA are also affiliated with the American Health Care Association.

The areas of activities in which TNHA engages include information, education, publications, representation, public relations, and many others. TNHA's objective is to work for the professionalism of nursing home personnel with the care of the patient as the ultimate consideration.

New car prices in 1978 went up less - 50 percent less - than in the previous year. The average new vehicle price in 1978 increased 5.7 percent compared to 11.9 percent in 1977, the National Automobile Dealers Association reports in the 1979 edition of its fact book. NADA DATA.

The 1978 average vehicle selling price was \$6,470, an increase of \$350 over the previous year. The increase in 1977 over 1976 was \$650.

Overall, consumer prices in 1978 rose 9 percent, while the new car component of the Consumer Price Index was up only 6.5 percent.

New car sales totaled 11.3 million in 1978, nearly reaching the previous record of 11.4 million set in 1973. Imported cars took 17.7 percent of the new car market, down from the all-time high of 18.6 percent in 1977.

The estimated number of gallons of gas consumed per car continued to go down. In 1977, an estimated 789 gallons were consumed per car annually, while 779 gallons were burned in 1978.

Franchised new car dealers sold an average of 391 new cars in 1978, compared to 385 in 1977. The average dealer's total

service and parts sales were up 9.0 percent over 1977 to \$20.5 million.

The number of franchised new car dealers continued to decrease last year, falling from 29,000 in 1977 to 28,850 in 1978. Of that number, 11,650 handle domestic makes, 12,700 handle both domestic and import makes, and 4,500 handle only imports.

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The distribution of new car manufacturers changed only slightly from 1977, with General Motors capturing the major share of sales at 47.6 percent. Ford had 22.8 percent of the sale market, Chrysler 10.1 percent, and American Motors 1.5 percent.

In the area of new truck sales, a record 4.1 million were sold, beating out the previous high of 3.7 million trucks sold set in 1977. The number of franchised truck dealers continued to decline -- from 23,950 in 1977 to 23,850 in 1978.
