## 4-H'ers food show Nov. 18

4-H'ers will match foods and nutrition expertise against each other in the Donley County 4-H Food Show Saturday, November 18 at the Clarendon High School Cafeteria.

About 50 youth will compete in senior, junior, and pre-4-Her divisions, according to Cynthia Manning, County Extension Agent. Senior division entrants are ages 14-19, while junior division youth are 9-13. There is a special division for pre-4-H'ers, ages 3-8.

This year's theme is "Cooking Good-Looking Great". For the contest, each 4-H entrant will compete in one of four classes, including main dish, side dish, breads and desserts, or snacks and beverages. The winner of each division will compete in the District Food Show in Amarillo on December 2, 1978.

"Because the foods and nutrition program focuses on nutrition, each contestant will have to demonstrate what she or he knows about nutrition, meal planning, food buying and meal service, as well as preparation techniques," Miss Manning explains.

Judging will begin at 9:15 Saturday morning. Entries will be on display at 12:30, followed by the Awards Program.

The Donley County Food Show is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, and The Morrison Milling Company of Denton, Texas.

## Texas will have first Republican governor in 100 years

In his first bid for an elective office Foster Whaley led over his Republican opponent, Bill Hale, for state representative from the 66th District by a wide margin.

In the United States Senate race only 10 votes separated Bob Kruger and John Tower, with Kruger leading in Donley County.

Democrat Jack Hightower, tallied the most impressive lead over his Republican opponent, Clifford A. Jones, with 921 votes to Jones 266 for a 655 vote advantage.

Republicans looked very impressive with the election of a gubernatorial candidate for the

first time in over 100 years in the State of Texas.

Donley County voters cast two ballots for Mario C. Compean, for governor. Compean was running on the Raza Unida Party platform.

Socialist Workers party candidates Miguel Pendas, for US Senator and Derrick Adams, for state treasurer each received two votes. Jana Pellusch for Railroad Commissioner got five votes.

In the only locally contested race the choice of a constable for Precinct 3 between former Donley County Sheriff, Frank Lindsey and Joe E. Smith gave the victory to Lindsey in a

write-in election for the position.

Total votes cast in Donley County were 1,222 and 48 of those were absentee ballots. This is about average for the time of year when most persons are planning to be at home.

A 2:00 p.m. matinee will be held on Sunday the 19th and the third performance will be at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, the 20th.

"The Odd Couple," a modern comedy by Neil Simon, is delightful for all ages. The play begins with a group of the boys assembled for cards in the apartment of a divorced fellow named Oscar, and if the mess in the house is any indication, it's no wonder that his wife left him. Late to arrive is Felix who, they learn, has just separated from his wife. Since Felix is very tense, all the card players feel he might commit suicide, and so go about locking all the windows. When Felix arrives, he is scarcely allowed to go to the bathroom alone. As life would have it, the slob bachelor and the meticulous fellow decide to live together with hilarious results. The patterns of their own disastrous marriages begin to reappear in this arrangement; and so this too must end.

G.A.S.O. - Health hints today are addressed to just a few of you, the smokers. The American Cancer Society is sponsoring the Great American Smoke Out, today, November 16th. If you are a smoker, please participate. I am.

Although G.A.S.O. was developed by the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, the American Lung Association and many other health organizations endorse it. As few as ten cigarettes a day will increase your chances of a heart attack. If you have asthma, emphysema, or any type of lung disease, even one cigarette will make your breathing worse. If you are a diabetic and smoke, you have a much greater chance of losing toes, fingers and legs from circulatory complications. If you have sinus or hay fever, again the cigarette smoke aggravates these conditions.

If you are a woman and smoke, your chance of lung cancer is exactly the same as if

you were a man. Women over fifty with high blood pressure and taking estrogens are a high risk for heart attacks and strokes.

Now here is some good news. Most of the damage of cigarette smoking can be reversed. Those six and one half years of life that you will lose by smoking can be regained if you stop. Not only can you live longer, but you can live better by stopping smoking. By not smoking you'll be healthier, have fewer colds by 40%, have less allergies, be less nervous, etc.

You say stopping smoking makes you nervous? Smoking is a nervous habit. The more you smoke, the more nervous you become. Smoking actually promotes nervousness. It may take a few days for you to prove it to yourself, but give it a try. You can only benefit by quitting today.

If you're a smoker, join the Great American Smoke Out - TODAY!

"The Smokeout mushroomed into one of the greatest smoking education efforts of all time." This was the statement made by personnel of the American Cancer Society about the 1977 Smokeout.

Great American Smokeout is being used to focus attention on the dangers of cigarette smoking to individual health. It is being done in a humorous manner by showing comedy films, having friendly challenges on a local level, and 'signing up' prominent persons who pledge to NOT smoke for one day on Smokeout Day Nov. 16.

ACS is interested in saving lives which might be taken by cancer and so has devised this approach for GASO 1978, hoping it will be a healthy one for you.

Community cooperation has been great and some of the things planned for November 16 are activities of YAC (Youth Against Cancer) members. The group has set up a barrel on the site of Fourth of July turtle races for the disposing of packs of cigarettes - each pack must have some cigarettes in it, have the person's name and telephone number on it.

At 5 p.m. on November 16, a drawing will be held for four prizes donated to the cause. These prizes and the donors are: Hensons, a \$10 gift certificate; Chamberlains, a car wash; Bivens, a \$10 gift certificate; and Mrs. Bromley's, two meals.

Early Bird, Late Edition and Young Homemakers Home Demonstration Clubs will be providing treats for the abstaining smokers, in lieu of cigarettes, in the form of vegetable sticks, cookies and assorted sweets. FHA members will have candy canes for an especially sweet tooth.

Other GASO activities are the

distribution of ash tray covers to remind everyone to not smoke; T-shirt transfers by the YAC members for a small fee, to be put on your own T-shirt; the distribution of big suckers with the motto "Lick Cancer" added to the eating of the sucker and various other endeavors undertaken by numerous businesses.

Mrs. T.M. Caldwell and Mrs. David Mooring, members of Youth Against Cancer and other members of the Donley County Unit of the American Cancer Society hope the success of GASO 1978 will bring health and happiness to all.

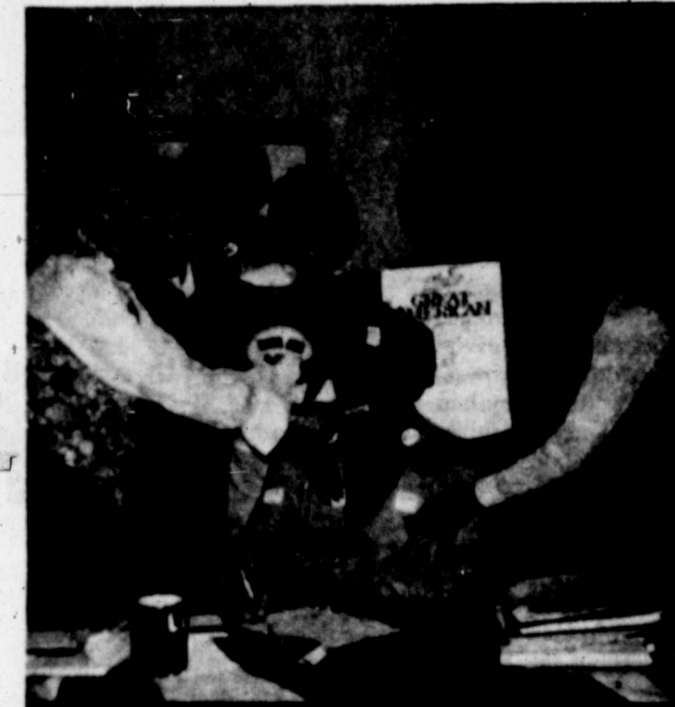

## Memphis spoiled homecoming by beating Bronchos 27-8

The Memphis Cyclones blew into town (literally) and spoiled the Homecoming of the Clarendon Bronchos. The game was played in 30 degree weather with a steady easterly wind causing the chill factor to be much worse. The Bronchos again were victims of their own mistakes that helped Memphis score 13 1st quarter points. The Bronchos' kicking game gave the Cyclones excellent field position on their first two possessions. That produced the 13 points. The Bronchos had at least 3 scoring opportunities - 1st and goal at the 2, the 8, and the 4 - and never could penetrate the Cyclone defensive line. The Bronchos outgained the Cyclones in total yardage 282-193. Gary McClellan's 51 yd. TD run with less than 2 minutes in the game was the first TD scored in the Memphis defense in district play. The Memphis victory brings about the showdown again with Wellington in Memphis Friday night for the district crown.

The Cyclones won the toss and elected to take the wind rather than the ball. The Cyclones kicked off and Gary McClellan returned it to the 20 yd. line. The Bronchos ran 3 plays and could not gain a first down and had to punt. Gary McClellan's punt went straight up in the air and was recovered by Memphis on the 10 yd. line. The Broncho defense really rose to the occasion on a fine goal line stand. Kelly Choate dropped the Cyclone back for a 1 yd. loss on the first play, then Terry Cole, Kelly Choate, and Tim Brown made excellent defensive efforts, and the Cyclones were faced with 4th down at the Broncho 6. Larry Davis and Barry Hightower came in and put the finishing touches on the Cyclones 4th down effort. The Broncho defense once again (several times this year) had defended their goal. Then - on the 1st play from the 4 yd. line, Gary McClellan lost control of

the snap and Memphis had another chance. This time they took advantage of it on a 4 yd. TD run by Tony Richardson. Wesley Johnson's extra point was good and Memphis jumped on top 7-0 with 7:52 left in the 1st quarter.

The Bronchos took the kick-off and began moving the ball as Billy Gardner picked up 8 yds. and a first down. But then the defense tightened up and the Bronchos were faced with another punt. This time #72 Rodney Guy broke through the left side of the Broncho line and blocked Lynn Thompson's punt and the Cyclones had another opportunity at the 15 yd. line. It took the Cyclones two plays to get the needed yardage for the TD with Donald Ray Matthews getting the final 3 yds. The try for 2 points was no good and the Bronchos were trailing 13-0 in the 1st quarter.

The Bronchos again were unable to pick up the necessary yardage for a first down after the kick-off and had to punt. This time Lynn got off a fine 54 yd. punt that put the Cyclones in a hole. On the second play of the possession, QB Scott Vacca lost the snap and Mickey McGuire recovered the fumble at the 12 yd. line. Gary McClellan immediately picked up 8, Billy added 2 and the Bronchos were staring at a 1st and goal at the 2. Billy Gardner couldn't make it on two plays, Gary dropped the snap on third down, and then on 4th down Gary was knocked out of bounds before he could make it to the flag. The Bronchos were again to get another try. Memphis again turned the ball over two plays later with Gary Thomas recovering the fumble. The Bronchos suddenly found themselves with a 1st and goal again - this time at the 8 yd. line. Again the Cyclone defense held on three downs - Billy and Gary couldn't make connection on the 4th down pitch-out and the ball went over on downs. The Broncho defense held the

Cyclones to no points and not much yardage in the 2nd quarter. Shawn Barker had two quarterback sacks. Larry Davis also had a QB hit that caused another fumble with Phil Moreman recovering at the 20 yd. line. Billy made 7 and Gary gained 9 yds. to the 4 yd. line. Then Billy was dropped for a 2 yd. loss, a pass to Kelly Choate was overthrown in the end zone, and Gary was thrown for a loss on 4th down trying to pass. The Bronchos again just couldn't get that momentum to get into the end zone.

The Bronchos received the second half kick-off hoping for a turn of events. However, they were penalized for clipping on the kick-off and started in the hole again. With a 1:30 gone into the 3rd quarter, Gary and Mark Jack missed connection on a pitch-out that went into the end zone that was recovered by #72 Rodney Guy for a TD. The kick by Wesley Johnson was good and the Cyclones led 20-0. The Bronchos continued to move the ball in the 3rd quarter but two fumbles kept them from getting any consistency. Lynn Thompson had a fine 50 yd. run plus 15 yards added on for a late hit by Memphis and the Bronchos were moving again at the 30 yd. line. But again Memphis held on fourth down. Memphis was to score one more time, this being set up on a pass to #80 Wesley Johnson for a good gain. Two plays later Woodrow Richardson took it over from the 1 yd. line. Johnson's kick was good and Memphis padded their lead to 27-0.

## Bobcat pelts must be tagged

A system for tagging bobcat taken in Texas has been approved and implemented by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission as authorized by the Texas laws on non-game animals and the federal Endangered Species Scientific Association.

The ESSA program allows Texas to tag an unlimited number of bobcat pelts during the 1978-79 season which runs from Nov. 15, 1978 through Feb. 15, 1979.

Trappers and hunters who wish to sell bobcat pelts taken in this state are required to bring the pelt/carass with the un-fleshed skull to one of the numerous tagging stations across Texas.

These stations in northwest Texas include by County: Cottle, Matador Wildlife Management Area, Paducah; Hemphill, Gene Howe Wildlife Management Area, Canadian; Howard, 302 N.W. 12th St. (TPWD), Big Spring; Lubbock, 5104 Avenue T, Lubbock; Randall, 4111 S. Georgia, Amarillo; Taylor, 279

N. Willis, Abilene; and Wichita, 100 Fremar Valley, Wichita Falls.

A limited number of bobcat heads will be collected for research purposes and the others marked and returned to the trappers or hunters.

All pelts must be presented for tagging each Tuesday between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. The pelts will be tagged by P&WD personnel and the first tagging date is Nov. 21.

The successful hunter or trapper must present the pelt to be tagged in person and fill out a form indicating such information as his name and address, and the date and county where the bobcat was taken.

Prior to tagging the pelt, the P&WD official will insure the head is from a bobcat, is un-fleshed, reasonably fresh, and that the lower jaw is also attached. All four canine teeth must be intact. Pelts will be tagged on a first-come-first-served basis each Tuesday.

Several modifications should be noted:

August 31, 1978: Pelts taken prior to this time CANNOT BE TAGGED. However, they can be legally sold on the domestic market.

Sept. 1 through Oct. 10: Bobcat pelts taken during this period MAY BE LEGALLY SOLD with or without a tag.

Oct. 11 through Nov. 14: Bobcat pelts taken during this period CANNOT BE TAGGED OR SOLD.

Nov. 15 through Feb. 15: All bobcat pelts taken for the purpose of sale MUST BE TAGGED at stations designated by the P&WD prior to sale.

It is not known how much the tagged bobcat pelts will bring this winter, but estimates indicate the price could go up from 30-to-40 percent over an untagged bobcat pelt. Last year, untagged bobcat pelts were bringing about \$80 in northwest Texas.

Bobcat hunters are reminded that Texas hunting license requirements apply for taking bobcat whether for sale or not.

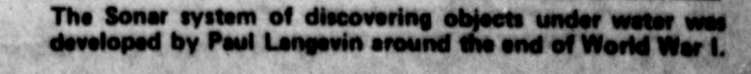

She gave an interesting account of her and Mrs. Earl Alderson's trip to England in August. She said she thought of them as Mark Twain's "Innocents Abroad". London began as one square mile of land; now is made up of thirty-one boroughs...with a population of seven and a half million people. What we know as streets are described as squares and circuses. The American Embassy in Grosvenor Square...the statues of George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and FDR, the latter standing straight and tall; is not depicted as a cripple. They saw the Texas Embassy building, not far from No. 10 Downing St. We sent an ambassador to England when Texas was a republic (1836-1845)...the last King of America was George III; few of us seldom think of our once having a king. Each of our states has a bank in London...this city is the financial capital of the world.

They visited Canterbury, St Paul's Cathedral, second only to St. Peter's, Chartwell, Winston Churchill's home and Blenheim palace, his birthplace and other great palaces - Windsor, Hampton Court, the latter which spreads its gardens in a bright tapestry to the bank of the Thames. Cardinal Wolsey, Lord Chancellor of England, built the original palace on a scale to match his wealth and power. Then he fell from favor, and to save his skin gave Hampton to King Henry VIII. He enlarged it and brought to it five of his six queens...here James I presided over the conference that resulted in the King James Bible. For William and Mary, Sir Christopher Wren added wings and redesigned the grounds. Mrs. Delaney and Mrs. Alderson attended a play about Sir Christopher Wren's life and work at the Mayfair Theater.

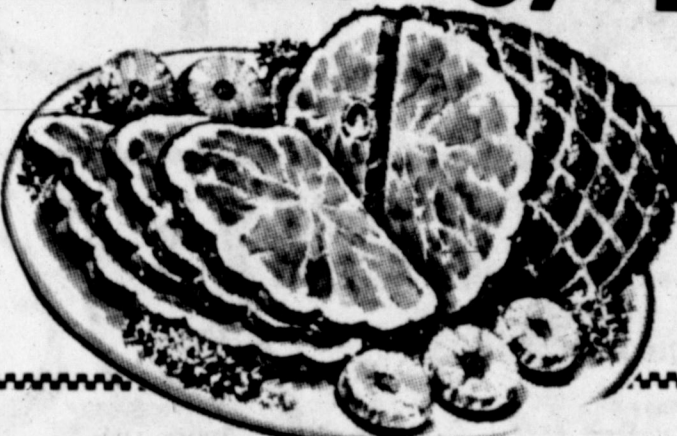

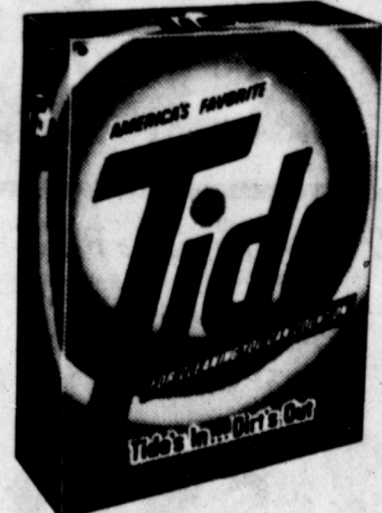

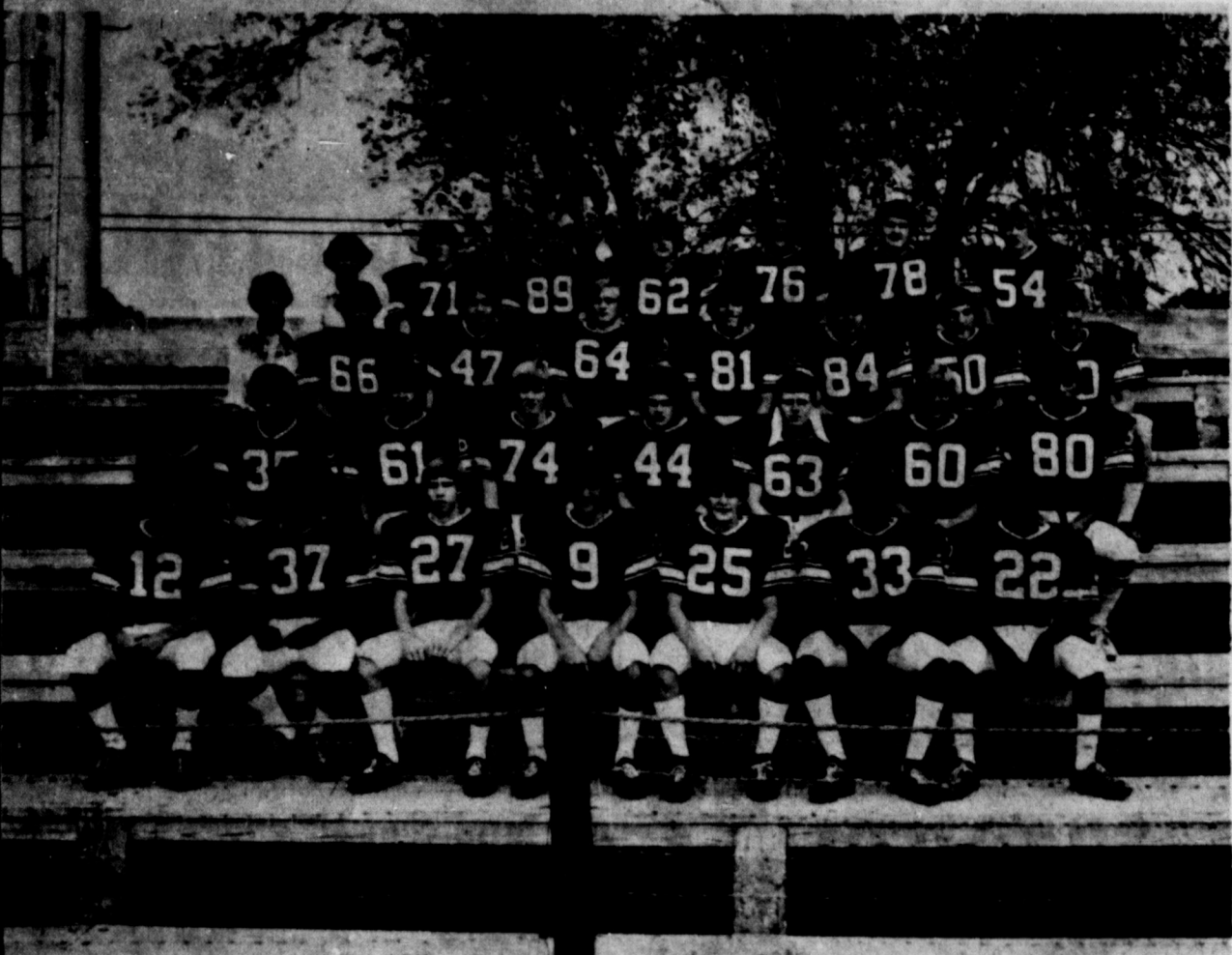

## Demands for furs boost Texas harvest

Increased demands for Texas furs have boosted the furbearer harvest and the 1978-79 season should show a continued increase in the number of pelts harvested across the state.  
Included in this rich variety are badgers, beavers, foxes (gray, red, kit and swift), minks, muskrats, opossums, river otters, raccoons, ringtails and skunks (striped, spotted, hog-nosed and hooded).  
Although not presently classified as furbearers, coyotes, bobcats, weasels and nutria also are market for their furs. The new bobcat season is Nov. 15-Feb. 15.  
Open season for the taking of furbearers for sale include: mink, Nov. 15 through Jan. 15; muskrat, Nov. 15 through Mar. 15; and all other fur-bearing animals, Dec. 1 through Jan. 31.  
A 35 resident trapping license is required of those who take for the purpose of barter or sale, and those who sell or offer for trade the pelts of any furbearing animals of the state.  
A \$200 non-resident trapping license entitles non-residents to take for the purpose of barter or sale the pelts of any furbearing animal in Texas.  
A \$50 Beaver-Otter license is required of any resident of Texas to trap or take beaver or otter outside the county of his residence.  
Total furbearing animal populations is unknown, but based on recent harvest estimates, it could number several million. This, coupled with a reproductive capacity averaging four young per litter, reveals the tremendous economic and recreational potential involved.  
Soaring prices since 1975, brought about by an increased demand for wild furs in Europe and the Orient, have focused national attention on the resource.  
Trapping licenses in Texas increased from approximately 5,000 during the 1972-73 season to more than 32,900 during the 1977-78 season. The estimated number of furbearing animals harvested increased from 277,535 in 1972-73 to 1,026,800 in 1977-78. The value of these furs rocketed from \$1,205,809 to more than \$16 million during these six years.  
Wholesale and retail fur dealers increased from 34 to 106 respectively in 1972-73 to 191 and 448 in 1977-78.  
In addition to the growing army of trappers, there are about 25,000 coon and cat hunters and 30,000 fox and coyote hunters who enjoy pursuing these furbearing predators with packs of baying hounds entirely for sport alone. Their expenditure alone could be in the realm of \$75 million annually for their sport.  
Even though hound men and trappers are the primary users of the furbearing resource, they are not the only Texans whose recreational needs are fulfilled and interests stimulated by these animals.  
Landowners on whose land these animals dwell also have a vital interest in them. The predators fill an ecological niche and maintain a balance necessary for the existence of all living things in a healthy state upon the land.  
Locally licenses may be purchased from Barney's Marine, Riggs Farm and Ranch Supply, in Clarendon, and Mooring Place at Greenbelt Lake.

### Reddy's tips on electric safety

- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.
- ★ Be sure each appliance has the type of cord suited to the job it does — heavy duty extension cords for power tools; moisture resistant cords and plugs for outdoor equipment.
- ★ Have frayed cords replaced promptly.
- ★ Water conducts electricity; never handle electric appliances or switches with wet hands or when standing on a wet surface.
- ★ If an appliance has a separate cord, attach cord to appliance before plugging it into an outlet; disconnect cord from outlet before disconnecting it from appliance. Store cords away from cutlery, heat and dampness.
- ★ Don't place cords where they'll be tripped over or be subject to wear (under a well-travelled rug, through doorways).
- ★ Teach children not to play with or around electric sockets or equipment.
- ★ Don't use an electric lawn mower or hedge clippers when barefoot, or on wet grass or hedges.

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# Day Care Center -- Another milestone

Coming of age is a time of mixed blessings for the Donley County Day Care Center as it begins its 3rd year of operation in Clarendon.

Thirty-four children are regulars at the Day Care Center and their mothers are clerks, students and in some cases the breadwinner of the family. For these persons the cost is rated percentage wise depending on income so that they can afford the services.

Only 70% of the cost is paid by funds which come from DHR-Title XX Provider Service. The other 30%, beginning the first of October, will be coming from local funds. Donley County has had some extra help in its formative years both from Title XX, C.E.T.A. and Texas Panhandle Community Action Corp., Green Thumb, and from those persons who work at the center. Now it is time for the 30% to come from other sources and for the taxpayer to be relieved of the amount.

In hard cash - dollars and cents - the Donley County Day Care Center is a business. It employs 8 persons; the payroll is \$3,840.15 per month with \$5-\$600 per month for groceries and the money comes back into Clarendon's economy by way of the grocery stores, drug store and utility companies in a direct line, and from salaries indirectly into every business in Clarendon.

There is no conflict with individual child care by local persons because many of the children at the day care center would not be in any child care

group if the regular rate had to be met.

Good friends have been helping with donations of money, food and related necessities during the time the center has been in operation and have made this most valued establishment a reality when chances for its success looked slim. Robbie Hill wants each of you to know how very much everyone appreciates the help you have given.

Under the provisions of Title 20, the Day Care Center will continue to receive 70% funding. Robbie knows the other 30% is here; it has always been there when help was needed. She frankly admits she is snowed under with a mountain of paperwork leaving little time to organize money raising projects.

If you could help keep this institution going with a pledge of a dollar a week, five dollars a month or more, perhaps less, you might be helping some young mother take care of herself and her family through education, a struggling young couple get set for a career or help make life easier for a number of deserving persons. They need you.

Two couples who have been extra special and always ready to help in any way are Steve and Helen Rogers and Jean and Fred Chamberlain.

On the Board of Directors are Steve Smith, president; Wanda Smith, sec. treas.; Betty Holmes; Treva Carmichael; Eureka Mays; Patty Chaykin.

# The "other side" of nursing home care

Note: Following is a transcript of remarks by Marilyn Collins, Administrator, Pleasant Manor Nursing Home of Waxahachie during an interview on Radio KBEC of that city earlier this year.

Nursing homes have become a political football and the personnel who work in them are dealing with the public conscience. Politicians who make the laws and regulations have oftentimes never visited a nursing home let alone worked in one. Most of us have a subconscious fear of growing old. To see a home full of constantly sick, feeble, incontinent, or totally senile elderly fills us with horror and fear, for we see ourselves in 20 or 30 years time.

Those who look deeper see the individuals and the character. The senile patient who is so gentle that you are compelled to protect her. The lady who has such a keen sense of humor that it brightens your day—the patient who flays like a wild cat, with such a gleam in his eye that you have to stand back and admire the sheer guts and determination. We see their trials, tribulations and achievements, their fears, pettiness and joys. We work with people and their daily lives are ours.

Let's look at facts: Probably around 80% of our elderly in nursing homes are on the Medicaid program which pays a daily rate of 18.91 per day. Type II patient and \$20.82 per day. Type III patient. The last hotel I stayed in cost \$40 per night. For half this cost, we are expected to supply 24-hour professional care, sufficient personnel to bath, feed, wash and clean, dress and serve meals and snacks, provide specialized diets, food, dietary supplies, housekeeping, laundry, maintenance, utilities, taxes, insurance, medical supplies and equipment, activities, social services, specialized services and clerical and administrative services. Costs are going up continually and as in every industry the first cut backs are usually labor. Add to this the stringent standards that nursing homes have to adhere to, and I am amazed that it is only 4% of nursing home in Texas that are not in compliance. Rules and regulations, if kept to a minimum, are a must, but when you try to handle regulations from County, State, Federal and Life Safety Codes—all with conflicting requirements and interpretations, and the reams of paper work attached, you stifle initiative, lose imagination and, worst of all, make a person afraid to use their own judgment.

A doctor once told me that the American Health Care System was based on the precedent that those with the most knowledge give the least care. This is particularly true in nursing homes. Physicians, consultants and professional nurses are so bogged down in the paper work—writing progress notes, nurses notes, health care plans, reviews, documenting medications and treatments, diets, clothing lists, recording observations, incidents, documentation on personnel, etc. ... ALL required by standards that the time left for PERSONAL care is very limited.

If a patient goes to the hospital, there seems to be an understood rule that the families will help. They sit at bedside day and night, offer fluids, feed, change, call the nurse when needed, manicure, brush and comb hair, turn patients when required and do the laundry, if necessary. Yet these are the most common complaints received from families with patients in the nursing home. I have often wondered with hospital costs being what they are, why a so much higher standard is expected of nursing homes. I don't mean to criticize anyone and am not going to say the system is perfect—obviously there is room for improvement. But, constant decrying of nursing homes and more red tape is not the answer. We need to increase professional care, recruit more trainee aides per patient. We could even serve gourmet meals on a silver platter—but it all costs money and eventually comes out of the taxpayers pocket. Another alternative would be more community involvement—volunteers similar to the "Candy Strippers" in hospitals, who could lend a helping hand. We need to decrease the unnecessary paper work and have a lot fewer and more realistic regulations.

The abuse and neglect law is beyond my comprehension. I have been an administrator for 8 years and can honestly state that I have never seen a case of employees abusing patients. I have seen numerous cases of patient abuse to employees! Patients who are confused and senile will often become violent and hit, fight, kick, bite and scratch. Cut lips, broken ribs, black eyes, bruises, pulled hair and verbal abuse are an occupational hazard.

I believe that the vast majority of people who work in nursing homes discover it is more than a job—those who do not have the interest and patience never seem to last. Benefits and wages are a minimum in this industry and we get our rewards from the affection and confidence that our patients place in us. I have seen employees visit residents on their day off—provide personal items out of their own income, take clothes home to mend, bring presents for birthdays and Christmas—nurses pool their resources to buy insulin or medication that a patient cannot afford. I have seen half a dozen employees stop what they are doing and watch with breath suspended while a patient takes his first step after an illness—the joy of achievement is shared by all. I have seen them cry when a patient dies, and spend their evening off at the bedside of a man dying of emphysema holding his hand. To me these are the positive things of a nursing home—the things the general public never see and never read about and the inspectors never know because we did not sit down and document them!

# Something you should know

It almost goes without saying that you have to find a disease before you can treat it. When you're looking for a dangerous and occasionally fatal disease such as diabetes, the sooner you find it the better off the patient will be.

Diabetes does kill—it was directly responsible for the deaths of 1,645 Texans last year and ranked as the state's number nine killer, according to Dr. C.R. Allen Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Health's Chronic Disease Division.

"In addition," reports Dr. Allen, "it contributed to the deaths of many more people with the primary death cause of heart disease, pneumonia, arteriosclerosis and kidney disease."

The Texas Department of Health puts a lot of emphasis on screening and followup services for diabetes, and during November local health departments and Public Health Regional offices will step up their activities. November is National Diabetes Month.

During the last fiscal year, local and regional health departments did approximately 60,000 blood glucose tests throughout the state. During the current state fiscal year, which began September 1, the Department hopes to do 75,000

blood glucose tests.

The past year we found more than 1,000 persons with undiagnosed diabetes, said Dr. Allen. "We feel that through this program we are reducing the mortality and morbidity associated with diabetes. If diabetes is discovered and controlled early in the course of the disease, it should help reduce the problems associated with diabetes," he said.

In recent months the Department has switched its testing procedure to using venous blood and the glucose oxidize laboratory method instead of the finger-stick blood and ferricyanide laboratory method.

The new procedure provides a more accurate system. Screening or casefinding—is very important because many of the quarter-million Texans with diabetes are undiagnosed.

Persons whose initial blood tests are high are asked to return to a State Health Department clinic for another test. The patient is asked to return two hours after eating a meal which has a specified amount of carbohydrates. This is called a two-hour postprandial test. If the blood is found to be above a specified glucose level, individuals are referred to their own doctors as suspected diabetics.

Once a diabetic is seen by the physician of his or her own choice, the local or regional health office will followup with

In addition to periodic blood sugar tests, departmental physicians, nutritionists and nurses counsel with the diabetics about diet and conduct patient education discussions about the disease and its effects on the body.

"It is essential that we help with information on blood sampling techniques, insulin dosage and other aspects of diabetic self care," said Dr. Allen.

"In general, our followup services are aimed at maintenance of control to avoid such complications as ketoacidosis and coma, blindness, kidney disease, neuropathy, infections and foot problems. One of the

complications of diabetes is a decrease of blood circulation into the feet which can lead to gangrene and amputation," he said.

The Health Department's diabetes screening program is an on-going one at no cost to the clients in all of the Department's 68 participating local Health Departments and 10 Public Health Regions, as well as in several migrant health associations.

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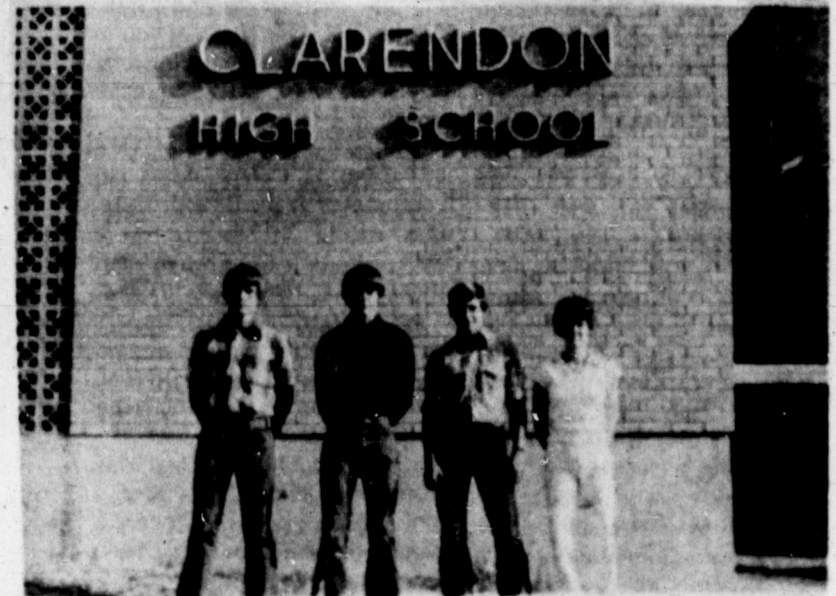

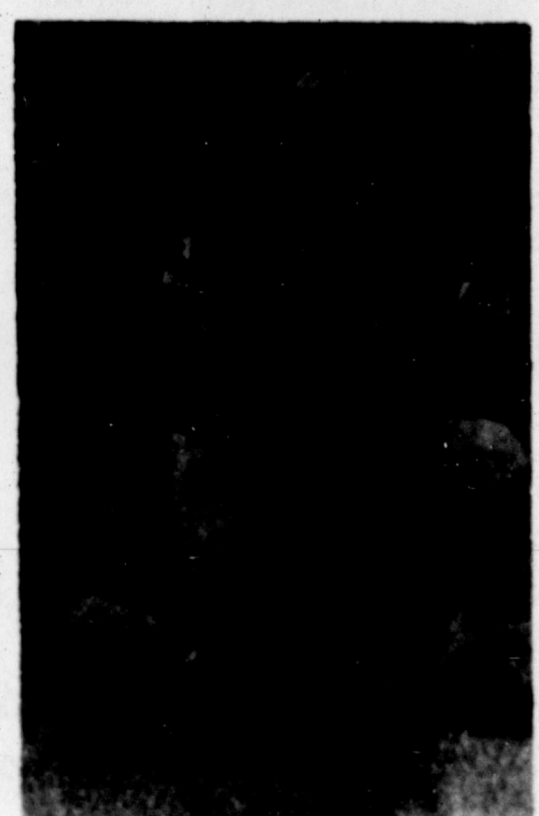

## Prussic acid poisoning in livestock

Frost will be hitting Donley county before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages, points out Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, emphasizes Gooch. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, Gooch outlines these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.
3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.
4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

## Clarendon College to offer EMT Class in Memphis

Clarendon College has scheduled an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Class in Memphis beginning in December. Registration for the class will be held at the Hall County Hospital in Memphis on December 12, 1978 at 7:00 p.m.

The Emergency Medical Technician Course is designed to train ambulance drivers, volunteer fireman, and others confronted with emergency medical situations in the field which result from accidents, drownings, fires, acute illnesses such as heart attacks, etc. Students are taught needed skills in the classroom, practice these skills, and then observe medical situations in the hospital. Upon satisfactory completion of the course the students will be certified as Emergency Medical Technicians by the Texas State Department of Health.

The class will be held on Tuesday and Thursday nights, from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. with allowances made for the holiday season. Cost for the course will be a \$12.00 registration fee plus
