## Girl Scout cookie drive to start Feb. 2

It's cookie time again and Girl Scouts of Quivera Council are in preparation for the sale which starts at 4 p.m. Friday, February 2, 1979.

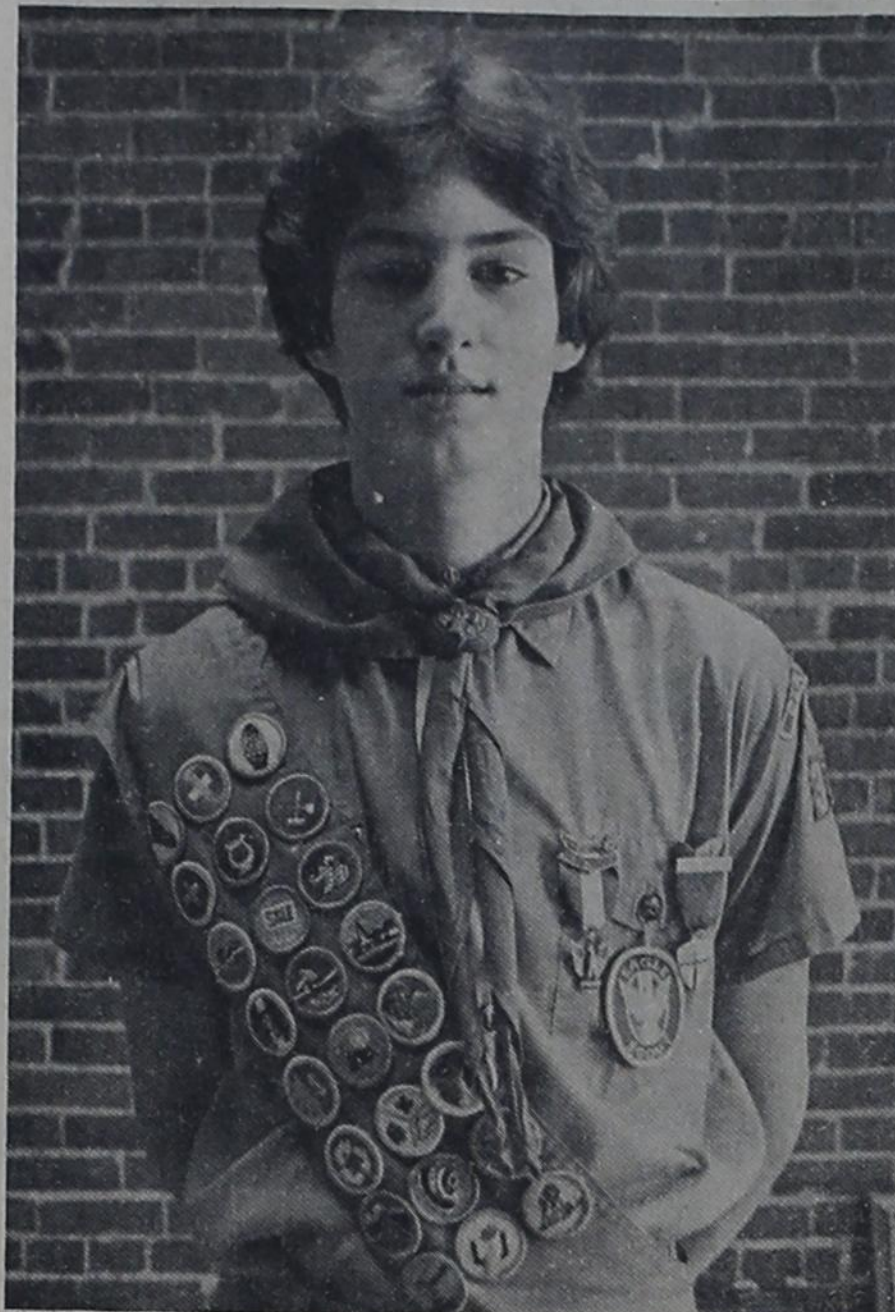
Proceeds from this annual sale are used to maintain Camp Mel Davis, near Lefors and Camp Cibola, near Clarendon, two camps used throughout the Girl Scout councils jurisdiction. Both camps are used for troop camping, day camping, council-wide camping events and at Camp Cibola also used for resident camp.

Troop activities and special events for each troop uses its portion of the proceeds and credit is given on registration fees for camp to girls selling more than two cases of cookies. Selling at \$1.25 per box or \$15.00 per case of 12 boxes, the cookies come in seven flavors--the caramel, chocolate and coconut Samoas, the peanut butter sandwich Do-Si-Dos, the shortbread Trefoils, the chocolate-coated peanut butter Tag-alongs, the chocolate and vanilla creme Vanchos, the brown sugar and molasses Granolas, and the chocolate-covered thin

minis. All the cookies are made without preservatives and with only 100 percent vegetable shortening. All freeze well so they can be enjoyed throughout the year.

Girl Scout cookies date back to the beginning of Girl Scouting in 1912, when the girls and their leader baked cookies, selling them door-to-door to raise money for their troop. In the fall of 1933, after many years of baking their own cookies, the Girl Scouts had another idea. Armed with recipes furnished by two Girl Scout volunteer adults, the Commissioner of a large metropolitan council approached the president of a local baking company and succeeded in getting the bakery to bake and package Girl Scout cookies. They were vanilla, in the shape of the Girl Scout insignia, the trefoil.

The high quality, good-tasting cookies for a good cause quickly caught on with the public. Today, Quivera Girl Scout council, of which Clarendon is a part, is carrying on that tradition with its annual cookie sale.

## Notice to pet owners

Due to the increase of complaints about dogs running loose, the City of Clarendon will begin the following procedure.

Dogs will be picked up on complaints called in or lodged against them, and will be taken to the Clarendon Veterinary Hospital where they will be held for five days. At the end of this time they will be put to sleep.

If your dog is missing you may call 874-3438 to inquire if the city has impounded them. If they have been picked up, the owner will be charged for the dog's keep for the time it spent at the veterinarians and for shots which are required, if it has not received them before being picked up.

## Report on agriculture movement

AAM, American Agriculture Movement, is locally alive and healthy, has the support of many farmers and considerable financial backing, but is less vocal and more determined than last year in its effort to help the farmer.

The objective is to get a resolution passed to implement the present farm bill which provides for a loan rate of 90% of parity for storable commodities.

This farm bill is not mandatory, and if implemented those producers who do not want any part of the bill because of government involvement do not have to take part in it. If implemented those who want it may use it.

On Monday, January 29, Denzil Lacy of Wellington, an extremely active member of the movement, reported from his sources some 2,000 vehicles in a 24-mile long tractorcade near Richmond, Indiana.

By Feb. 5, 40,000 are expected to converge on Washington D.C. Once in the city there will be a Farmers Market set up on the capitol parking lot where 1,000 to 1,500 persons will display their commodities and sell them for 100% of parity.

This is part of the activity undertaken by the American farmer to focus attention on his problem, which is the country's problem.

If your heart is with the farmer, if you have observed that the farmer-rancher is the backbone of the nation, if you realize that "As the farmer fares so does our nation" is a truism you can help the farmer. Listed are telephone numbers

### Cystic Fibrosis Foundatiuon names Nancy Selvidge and Martha Hill chairmen of Bike-A-Thons

Mrs. Nancy Selvidge of Clarendon and Ms. Martha Hill of Hedley were named Chairmen of Bike-A-Thons in Hedley and Clarendon respectively by Reuben D. Duke, President of the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

They will be conducting the Bike-A-Thon to raise funds which will support research and care for children affected by cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and other related lung-damaging diseases.

Cystic Fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited by one in every 1500 babies born in the United States. Both parents carry the recessive gene for CF and number among one in twenty persons in the U.S. who may be carriers, usually without knowing it. With improved therapy and constant research, many CF patients are now living into early adulthood.

"Most people do not realize there are millions of children affected by lung-damaging diseases, and by participating in

our Bike-A-Thon, you can help these children who can't take breathing for granted", said Mr. Duke.

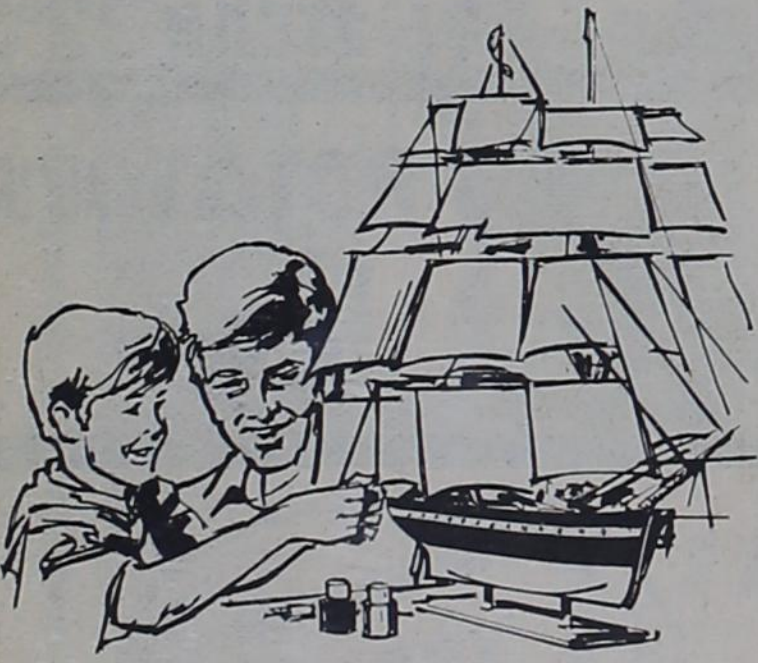

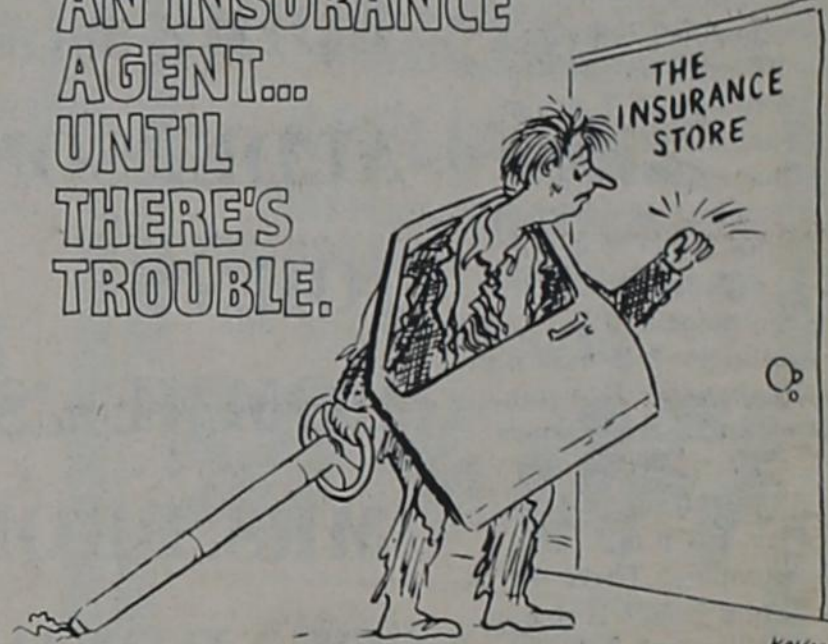

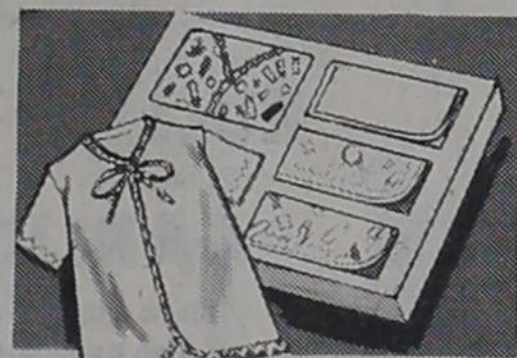

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## News from Senator Bob Price

Senator Bob Price, Republican of Pampa, announced today that he has introduced Senate Bill 311 which if passed would prohibit the delivery, transportation, or sale of any agricultural products into, through, or out of the State of Texas if it has been treated with any herbicide or pesticide prohibited by the Federal government. The bill would require foreign producers of agricultural products to maintain the same Federal and State standards as are required of the Texas farmer and rancher.

In addition, the bill would require the labeling as to the country of origin of each agricultural product, including meat, which is prepared, delivered, or sold in the State of Texas. Senator Price feels that Texas consumers should be given the choice to purchase

foreign or domestic agricultural products. During a hearing of the Natural Resources Subcommittee on Agriculture, held before the Legislature convened, numerous people testified that thousands of tons of vegetables were crossing into Texas, Arizona, and California which are being grown under conditions that are restricted in Texas and the United States. Foreign growers are able to use pesticides and herbicides to grow their crops that have been outlawed in the United States

because they have been found to have cancer causing agents in them. By using these chemicals, foreign producers have been able to market their crops at a cheaper price in competition to domestic growers and this is unfair and unsafe competition for American producers.

## Senator Bob Price reports

Senator Bob Price, Republican of Pampa, announced today he filed Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 19, which was adopted by the Senate to read as follows:

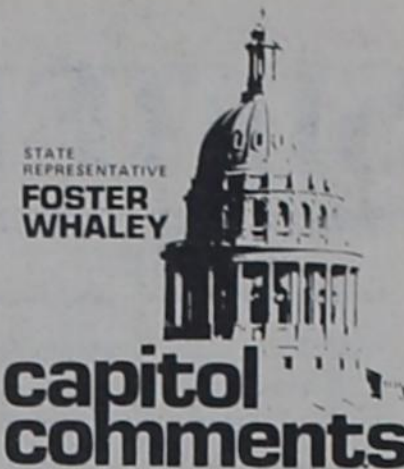

## capitol comments

The House of Representatives went into session at 2:30 p.m. on Jan. 15, 1979, to act as a jury concerning whether Donald M. Cartwright should be seated in the House. Cartwright, a Democrat from District 57H, San Antonio, was challenged by his Republican opponent, Mr. Kae Patrick. A number of charges were levied against Cartwright that had to do with some minor offenses when Cartwright was a juvenile. The House voted to seat Cartwright by a vote of 136 to 2. The opinion of most members was that it was nothing more than an effort to embarrass Mr. Cartwright.

Just had dropped on my desk a news release from Representative John Wilson, La-Grange, Texas. Wilson is announcing for the position of Speaker of the House for the 1981 session, Bill Clayton was elected for an unprecedented 3rd term to serve the present 66th Legislative Session. Clayton recently announced that he now has 90 signed pledges for the 1981 Speakership. Not all members are Clayton supporters but his overwhelming majority of supporters that voted 137 to 8 for his re-election show how strong he stands with members in the House. Ask anyone in the House why they support Bill Clayton. The answer is "Bill's word is his bond and he is fair, even to those opposing him". Even the liberal element that opposes his conservative philosophy highly respect him as Mr. Speaker.

Invitations to every kind of event are sent to legislators every day here in Austin. If you fail to get from four to five daily you have been slighted. Almost 100% of the invitations come from lobbyists trying to get the ear of a legislator. For instance, I have had invitations for one breakfast, two luncheons and four evening receptions and buffets all for January 24. What they really need down here is

one coordinator that will serve similar to the United Fund so you will just get hit up one time

instead of so many times separately. They might also have their Chamber of Commerce serve as a clearing house for suggested dates for meetings. The Pampa Chamber of Commerce and other Chambers on the High Plains have helped

coordinate meetings. I made this suggestion to one local person and they plan to follow through.

Governor Clements made the traditional State of the State Address to a joint session of the 66th Legislature today.

There were no real big surprises in his talk but a few new items I haven't heard him mention before. One of his lead statements was: "No one can deny the role of the Legislative Branch of Texas Government in making our state the envy of the entire nation". We were happy he recognized this fact.

The second item Governor Clements made that is worthy of mention is the following, "The Sunset Law passed during the last session of the Legislature was a major step. It was major not only in terms of how it can be used to eliminate useless state agencies, but also in the sense that it was a recognition of the fact that our Government has been drifting away from accountability."

## Texas Farm

### Bureau reports

The Texas Farm Bureau is urging the Texas delegation in Congress to reject any proposals to strip "vital functions" from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In a letter to the 24 Texas Representatives and two Senators, TFB President Carrol Chaloupka said, "I want to place the Texas Farm Bureau squarely on record in opposition to the proposed transfer of major USDA functions to other departments."

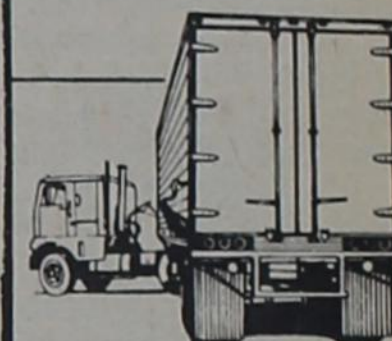
Chaloupka referred to proposals by President Carter to create a new Department of Natural Resources and a new Department of Community Development, and have them take over certain functions of USDA. "We believe that such transfers can only result in programs less responsive to the needs of Texas farmers and ranchers," Chaloupka said. "When farmers and ranchers are hurt, consumers invariably pay the bill in the form of higher prices for food and fiber."

Under the proposed reorganization, the U.S. Forest Service, all resource-related portions of the Soil Conservation Service, and the Rural Development Program would be taken from the USDA and transferred to the new Department of Natural Resources. Major functions of the Farmers Home Administration would be transferred from USDA to the new Department of Community Development which would be built around the existing Housing and Urban Development agency.

Chaloupka asked the Texas delegation to work with other members of Congress "to reject the proposed transfer of vital functions of the Department of Agriculture."

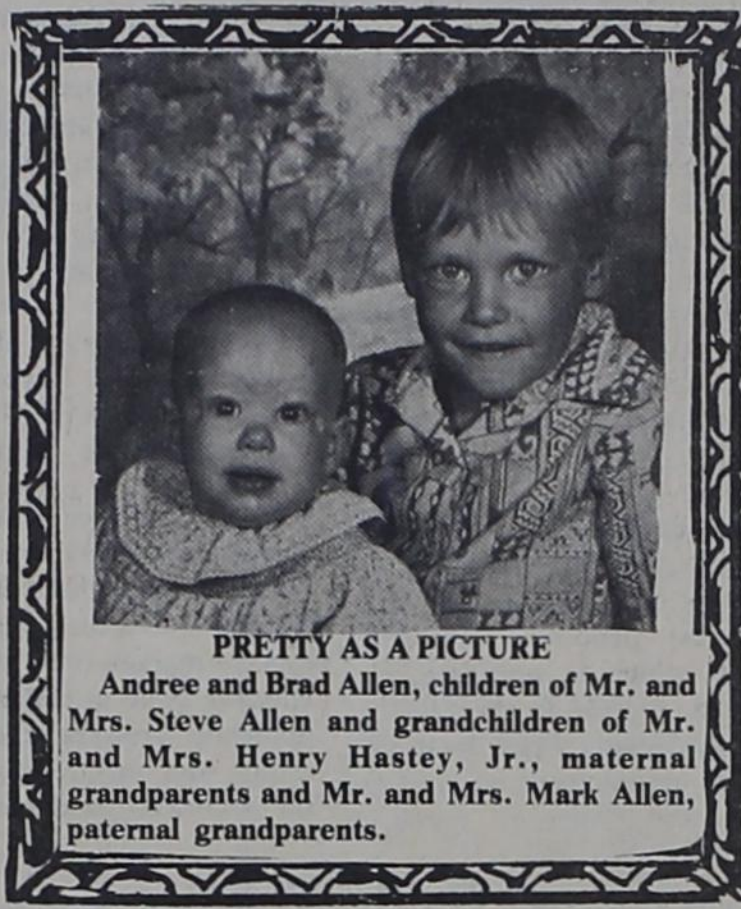
