Johnston will replace Gerry Knight, who has served the nursing home and its residents well for the past several years and plans to go into private business.

Approval from a state board in Austin paved the way for Johnston's new post after their meeting in Austin

on Thursday. The status of Medical Center Nursing Home will not change in regard to federal and state funding.

September 18, Johnston will begin his schooling in Austin. This training will be completed as of January 1, 1979.

Six months time as Administrator in Training and the completed schooling will qualify Johnston for the Nursing Home Administrator examinations. After completing the examinations, he will be a fully licensed Nursing Home Administrator.

Ms. Mildred Stephens of Memphis will be preceptor of Billy R. Johnston during his training and will serve as interim administrator of Medical Center Nursing Home.

Johnston has operated his own business, Johnston's Cleaners, and his wife, Janice, is the Clarendon school librarian. They have three daughters, Deborah, Dyanne and Michelle all in school here.

## Schools start breakfast program

The Clarendon Public Schools will be serving breakfast to any student who wishes to eat. The cost of breakfast will be 25 cents for students in grades K through 5 and 35 cents for students in grades 6 through 12. The cafeteria will be open at 8:00 a.m. and serve until 8:15 a.m. The breakfast program was mandated by the federal

government. If any school district had more than 10% of the student body eligible for free lunches, it is required to begin a breakfast program or lose federal funds that supplement the cost of the local lunch program. Without federal funds the cost of meals served would be doubled in price paid by the students.

## Bronchos now practicing two-a-day drills

The 1978 version of the Clarendon Bronchos began two - a - day workouts on Monday, the 14th. Shoes were issued on Wednesday August 9 in preparation for the workouts. Coach Allen greeted 59 young men for drills on Monday at 8 a.m. He expects that number to increase approximately to 70 before the two week drills are over. The Bronchos also workout at 6 p.m. in the evenings.

Coaching the Bronchos this year will be Boe Smith, varsity offensive line and linebacker coach. Boe will be beginning his first year at Clarendon having coached the past two years in Levelland. Charles Rust will be working with the varsity defensive line. He is a graduate of Oklahoma Christian University, coming here

from Idabel, Oklahoma. Greg Slover will also be a varsity assistant working with the offensive receivers. Dean Overcast will be the junior varsity head coach with Jack Hall as his assistant. Coaches Hall and Slover will be coaching the Jr. High football program. Coach Ted Allen, beginning his first year as head coach, will be working with the offensive backfield and the

Broncho secondary.

The Bronchos began drills in shorts on Monday then go to full pads on Friday, the 18th. The first scrimmage will be in Clarendon against Claude on Thursday the 24th at 6:00. Then the Bronchos

travel to Groom August 31st at 7:00 for their final scrimmage. The season opener will be at home Sept. 8th against Boys Ranch.

**American Red Cross Appeal**

In the last few days central and west Texas have been extremely hard hit by floods. In central Texas the following towns have been affected by heavy rains: Kerrville, Ingram, Center Point, Comfort, Waring, Bandera, Medina City and Uvalde. Where necessary, Red Cross shelters were opened and Red Cross staff and feeding vans have been on the job providing emergency assistance to people in these hard-hit communities. Closer to home, the towns of Abilene and Albany have been hit - one shelter was opened in

Abilene on August 3. At this time we have only unconfirmed information - six dead in Albany and 42 people evacuated from a nursing home. Disaster-action teams are enroute to the stricken area of Albany.

Additional serious flooding has been reported along the Brazos River in Young County (n. central Texas). Many evacuated from the towns of Eliasville, South Bend, and Graham. ARC personnel is on the scene providing emergency services and gathering damage survey information.

Over 100 Red Cross Disaster Specialists from outside affected areas are still assisting local chapters

in caring for victims. Latest reports show 26 confirmed dead, 127 injured, total of 887 families suffered losses. Eight Red Cross Shelters housed 1500 persons at peak of emergency. Red Cross teams provided mass care to 3000 victims and emergency workers, including meals from fixed and mobile feeding stations. ARC Assistance centers remain open to provide aid to victims on individual family basis.

Total cost of Red Cross Relief Operation is estimated to exceed \$300,000. Fund appeals are underway in affected areas and ARC chapters are accepting contributions to aid Texas flood victims.

## Preserving newspaper

Richard Smith, assistant professor at the University of Washington, has developed a prescription for preserving newspapers: Dissolve a milk of magnesia tablet or one tablespoon of milk of magnesia emulsion in a quart of club soda, recap tightly and let stand in the refrigerator overnight. Pour into a pan large enough to accommodate the flattened newspaper. Soak newspaper one to two hours, remove and pat dry.

This solution cannot be reused. Estimated life of the paper -- 200 years. Chemically, the magnesium oxide combines with the carbon dioxide in the soda to form magnesium carbonate which neutralizes acids in the paper that cause deterioration.

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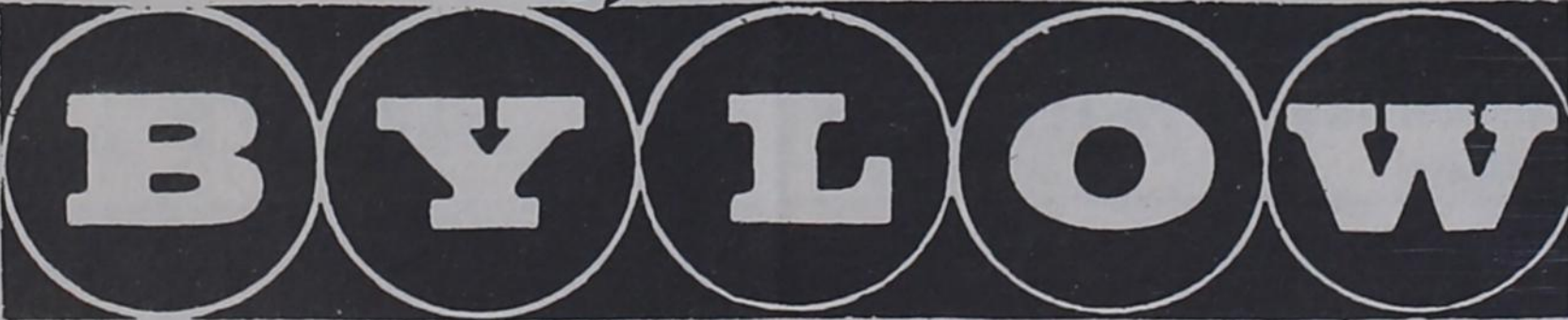

## Cystic Fibrosis to have campaign

The 1978 Kiss a Baby Week Campaign of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation begins Sept. 17 in the Clarendon area, and Chairman Nancy Selvidge is asking volunteers to donate their time to fund raising activities.

"I'm looking for people who can give a little of their time so that millions of lung-damaged children across the United States can live longer, more normal lives," said Sharon McClarney of the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

"Just breathing is a struggle for these kids. They must have constant care and treatment. Some must take as many as 50 pills a day to fight infection and aid digestion, and breathe a medicated mist from a face mask each day."

The much needed funds raised from the campaign will go to support research, care and education programs aimed at lengthening lives and finding a cure for C/F. These programs include support for more than 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the nation which provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children suffering from asthma, chronic bronchitis, "childhood emphysema," and recurrent pneumonia, as well as cystic fibrosis.

"In addition to finding a cure for C/F," said McClarney, "researchers are hoping to find a test to detect carriers of the C/F gene, and also a method of diagnosing the disease at birth. Early diagnosis and treatment helps extend and improve lives."

"In 1955, when the C/F Foundation was established, most children with C/F died before reaching 3 years of age. Now, more than 50 percent can be expected to live past age 18. But, we want to make it possible for all children with cystic fibrosis to live normal, full lives." Volunteers can help, she added, by giving of their time to support the giving of the most precious gift of all - the Breath of Life.

One of the signs of C/F, the most serious lung-damaging disease, is a salty taste to the skin. Mothers have sometimes alerted doctors to the possibility of C/F when kissing their babies and tasting salt.

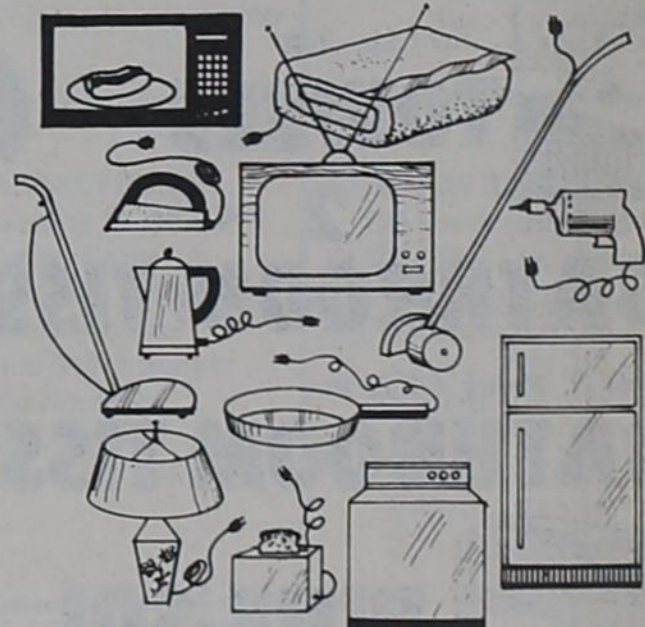

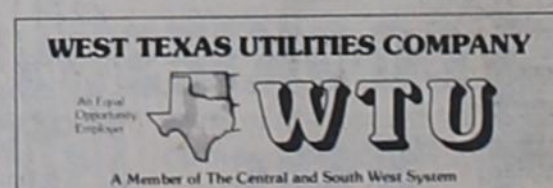

### PLAN AHEAD FOR PRE-SCHOOL CHILDREN

Plan simple activities for the child left at home when back-to-school bells ring. When school age children return to classes this fall, a young child may be left at home. The child left behind might get lonely, want parents to constantly play with him, or will become agitating and pesky because he is bored.

To help remedy this situation, make some "lesson plans" for the child at home. Select simple activities that entertain and teach basic learning skills without demanding great blocks of time.

Look around the room and think about the things the child likes to do in that room.

For instance, kitchen lessons for the lonely may include how to make plain gelatin, to prepare a cake mix or to make play-dough. To make play-dough, mix

equal parts of salt and flour with just enough water and food coloring to make a stiff colorful dough. Store in a tightly closed container. The child will work while mother supervises.

If the television is in the family room, lessons might include watching a children's program with the child. Then, read a story similar to the show. Or, offer him blunt scissors, newspaper and colors or water paints for an art lesson about the television show. Remember, let the child do his own thing in art while the parent admires, talks about or displays the artistic "it."

Children like to jump on beds, but few parents approve of this activity. However, for a bedroom activity, tie a string to a bed post and hold the other end. Let the child "high jump" over the string. Remember to keep the string low—three to eight inches—off the floor.

The bathroom offers unlimited water play experiences. Put the child in the tub and give him a dishpan of liquid soap and water with a straw to have a bubble "hey-day". Liquid food coloring and water teach a child colors, color formation and even how to pour liquids from one container to another.

Children left behind at home should not stay underfoot in the house all day long.

A child can play alone outside if the yard is safe, he has something to play with, he has someone to check on him often, and he can be easily seen while the parent works inside.

Only-children or the last child at home does not need an over abundance of toys, time or attention. Help the child to mature by teaching himself and to enjoy his own company with a minimum of interference or props.

A child wants to learn to get along with other children and adults, but total dependence on someone to entertain him is not healthy for the child or his family.
